"I smoke now on an average twenty-five cigars a day, and never felt better in my life." You never saw such an astonished man in your life. To make a long story short, I got that man to smoke a cigar, and before the morning was over he had smoked five. Tobacco put him out the uproad to heaven again and he is living yet.—St. Louis Globe-Democrat
