Mr. Laurier, with an imagination and culture above that of the average Brit, slips into the same old ruts. He can't rise higher than the crowd. He can't see that if manufacturing were discouraged by having our own industries swamped, as they once were by American imports, the exports would be much more remarkable, and both manufacturers and employees would note the warning given to them by the leader of the Opposition at Hamilton on Tuesday night. If Mr. Laurier gets into power he has no proposition for the improvement of the agricultural classes, and we don't blame him for that, because their well-being depends on their selves, upon the seasons, and upon a scale of prices controlled in Liverpool, not in Ottawa. But he is prepared to wipe out the manufacturers of Canada, to stop the swelling tide of wage-earners, and consequently to see all the education and flowering of the land deprived of what chance they now have to make a living here at home. Our free system of education leads to a development that makes farm life unattractive to the brightest products of the schools. These must either find occupation in the industries created and fostered by the N.P., or they must seek work in American cities. Possibly our system of education is rather ahead of the requirements of a steadily agricultural country. But every crop has its thorn, and he would be a bold man who would therefore argue in favor of restricted education. The growth of our industries is the one sure crop of an era that there is. And this growth, so long as our national frontiers are where it is, depends upon the protection afforded by the National Policy.
