SLIGHT FROST IN MANITOBA

Portage la Prairie, Aug. 20.—Slight frost visited some parts of the province last night but the general impression is that it did no damage whatever, as it was not severe enough to do any harm to the crops. Reports from along the Manitoba & Northwestern Railway show two and three degrees of frost at Shoal Lake, Birtle, Binscarth, Langenburg and Rapid City. There is no visible damage, and the temperature was not sufficiently low to damage the grain. A government report estimates the frost at twenty-two bushels to the acre.

A reliable gentleman from Edmonton reports some damage by frost there a week ago. The Free Press advises Manitoba farmers to go in for more diversity in their crops. A gentleman from Minnesota, abandoning the one-crop principle.

IN THE MANITOBA WHEAT FIELDS: The total population of the Province of Manitoba is about the same as that of the City of Toronto with its suburbs. Of the one hundred and ninety thousand population of the Prairie Province one hundred thousand are farmers, including their families and hired help.

The city of Winnipeg has thirty thousand people, and the other towns contain probably twenty thousand. The rest of the population is made up of fishermen, miners, etc. Of the one hundred thousand of the population engaged in agriculture, there are but twenty-one thousand actual farmers, that is, men who own farms and either cultivate them wholly themselves, or with the assistance of others.

When it was proposed that an electric lighting plant be purchased by the city and leased to a private concern to be operated for a period of five years, it was objected that the proposal was an unusual one and not in accordance with business principles. At any rate, we know that when the idea was submitted to the ratepayers it was overwhelmingly defeated.

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HUGHES' NAME STRUCK OFF

ENGINEER INSTEAD OF PAINTER FOR FIREMAN. Aid. Bell Re-Considers His Position—Appointments to Be Submitted to Council—Merryweather Steam Fire Engine Now Here—Big Test to Be Made of the Three Engines To-Morrow.

A special meeting of the Fire and Light Committee was held yesterday for the purpose of reconsidering the report of the sub-committee recommending engineers and firemen for the new steam fire engines.

Aid. Bell re-considered his position as a member of the Fire and Light Committee, and announced that he had decided to resign. He stated that he had been elected as a painter for firemen, and that he was not qualified for the position of engineer.

The committee on the subject of the new steam fire engines has reported to the council. The report states that the committee has examined the proposals of the three candidates, and has found them to be satisfactory.

The council has decided to appoint the three candidates as engineers and firemen. The appointments will be submitted to the council for their approval. A big test will be made of the three engines to-morrow.

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CHINA REFUSES AN ENQUIRY

Consuls Stopped En Route to the Scene of the Massacre. Hong Kong, Aug. 20.—Information has been received here confirming the previous reports that the Prefect accompanying the Commission of Inquiry into the massacre of Christians at Kucheng, as well as the Chinese officials at that place, have positively refused to permit the British and American Consuls to be present during the examination of the prisoners connected with the outrages. The Consuls have made a formal protest, and the matter has been referred to the Viceroy. In consequence of this action by the Chinese authorities, serious difficulties are expected.

Officials Afloat of the Enquiry. London, Aug. 20.—A despatch from Shanghai to the Pall Mall Gazette attributes the action of the Chinese officials at Kucheng, in preventing the British and American Consuls from being present at the examination of the prisoners connected with the massacre of Christians at that place, to the fact that the Chinese officials are afraid of the testimony of the prisoners will incriminate them.

Public feeling among Europeans in Shanghai is strongly inclined towards the conviction that British Minister O'Connor should demand from China the right to attend the examination of the Kucheng prisoners, and adds that the Chinese officials have been most obstructive in their refusal to consent, and that they will be immediately despatched to Kucheng to protect and assist them.
