Argument for Free Trade. The New York Evening Post, referring to trade and other matters which are about i begin between Canada and the United States, says :

"When we consider that Canada is among nations our third largest customer, the value of the goods that we sell to her being greater than that of our exports to nearly all the other states of North and South America, the indifference of our merchants to thi trade is astonishing. Their imaginations their profits are almost as large. During the seem to be so affected with dreams of the wealth of China and the islands of the South nstantly on the increase. Sea, that the possibility of a great commerce close at hand is totally ignored. Here is a country whose trade is worth more to u than the trade of all the rest of the continent -more than all the foreign trade of the Pacific coast, and we can increase it enormously by a simple measure of rational legislation. We do not need to increase our army or enlarge our navy in order to secure this profitable commerce ; on the contrary, the greater this commerce the more superflu will such armaments be. The most crack-brained military or naval "expert would not think of frightening Congress into increasing our military expenditure by warnings of a Canadian invasion, and the mos odthirsty patriot would find it hard to maintain that we ought to force annexation on the Canadians at the point of the sword The notion that in some magical way we

shall derive enormous wealth from sellin our wares to half-naked inhabitants of the Philippines, whose wants are few and who productive powers are not great, appear easonable enough when contrasted with our attitude towards Canada. Every inhabi tant of the Dominion, on an average, buys \$12 worth of American goods annually, and if our tariff were abolished, the trade would probably double in a short time. Let people who want to find an outlet for our ma tures open their eyes to what lies right be fore them, instead of gazing over the Pacifi ocean.

Canadian and American Currency.

While we are talking about an Anglo American alliance, a very sensible suggestion comes from that practical man, Mr. George H. Daniels, general passenger agent of the New York Central Railway to the effect that we bring Canada, the great North American British dependency into closer relations with the United States, by providing some meth od for an interchange on an equitable basis of the moneys of the two countries. There is great similarity in appearance between the silver coins of the United States and Can ada, and they do not differ much in intrinsi or face value. Yet it is a practice of many corporations in the United States to refuse to accept Canadian money, and one often finds himself inconvenienced on the street cars or elevated lines when he tenders a Canadian ten-cent piece and finds it thrus back at him as not current, except at a dis count. The same discrimin tion against

American money is shown in Canada. Nothing but an imaginary boundary separates us from our Canadian neighbor
