A little above the word exposition completes the sentence. This stamp is used by the merchants of the above city on their out of town mail being placed beside the postage stamp. Many have arrived in this city with the mails from Buffalo.

The color of the forgeries (they exist used and unused) is dull, the paper too thin, and the perforation too rough, whereas the color of the originals is bright orange or vermilion, the paper mefium thick and the perforation regular. The inscriptions on the forgeries are, however, well imitated and can easily mislead,
