The first we shall speak of howerer．is the Prince Royal，or fitus mge．This vatiety resembles very much，in habis and appearance，the＂king．＂of which we spote in our lasi number，to which spectes moded． it is by some supposed to belong：but that they are not the samt，is the opinion of the highest anthorities on these matiors．

It has been known to matmonts for centmies，being nentioned，in fach，by the writers of the cathes pertod， of which we have any record．Thas in the whithes of an ancient eastern travelur．We fun it stated．that．$*$ O



 From this we would intur，that，even as far back as the deluge，this ammal，as at the present day，was heh in rerthigh estem．if indeed，it was mot sated－an alea which is almost forced upon us when．in cenncctom whe the face of its having been chosen for this im－ portant duty，we consider the amost sacret resard in which it is sill held by lare chasses of people．

This animal was frot discovered in 1 sia，though it has since been found to exist，in large numbers，all over the eastern hemisphere，where it is muen sought after．

Like the＂hing，＂it is not indigenous o this contineme， though，since the successin establishment of subma－ rine cables，and the consequent annithlation of time and sface，and the immense increase of good－will，and wnty of feeling．between the various countries on either side of the Ablantic，a few have font there way hither．

The that ractyon this ammal is called the fabtic Arints，but why weare at a loss wh thermince as it is in name onfy that it bearsany partoular rosemblane to cither of the ohers deserbed abore It asescentally domestic on characier，and is foumd in larse numbers in all cmilized comeries．To has been known to nathmatis for about three cembutes only，but being nathally prolifie，has increased very mplity and is now the most common of this species．It is much smather than cither of the others，but is stronsly made，and is of a motied bhack and white colour．It is ome of the most uschal ot animals．being servicable in an intimite varicty of ways； but，like all oher animals which have the misfortune to exist in great numbers，is not properly appreciated．

It is generally very inteilisent，and can be traned o guard your interests with bawearying devotion，but when provoked to a guarrel，is apt to leave its opponent in a rather demomized condition．Like the geese of ancient Rome，it has frequenty sounded the waminer－ note of danser，and thereby saved a nation from im． pending evil．

## ETCHINGS OF GREAT CITIES.

No. 11.
KINGSTON.
In a recent number of Gencmuchte we published a cofital sketch of the Capital; to-day we devote a few spicy parasraphs to ne of the X-Capitals, trusting in due time to do a similar act of justice for all the leading cities of the Dominion, including Wianipes, Toronto, Miramichi. Slab City, and Mill Creck.

Kingston is one of the oldest and bluest cities in the Dominion, as its present interesting appearance denotes, old age sticking out prominently cerywhere, except at the British whig office, which is an Evergreen.

The city, just now, is in an intense state of commercial prosperity, as proved by the multitudes of pople who are seen eddying round continually in a ceaseless whirlwind of nervous business airs.

Trade is greatly on the increase seteral notable merchants having done a smashing business last year, and three of Morrison's famous basswood hams having been disposed of in the course of as many weeks hately.

The unmbers of firstelass shipping in the harbour are amost rabulous this year. These consist chefly of tugs, mats, cribs, barges, foating clevators, steamers, stiling cratt, and wend sows. the latter from the pictureque raging Canawl district amongst the drowned deat lands. The harbour in consequence presents a more than usuall anmated apparance.

Generally, a stamer is kept tmming all winter betwen the ctiy and Wolfe Istand, to prevent the water fiom freeing, as a great many rentaresome peope have beon drowned in passing to and fro-the ice, when jermizted to "ake" never being mere than two fee thick. All this is done in the interests of humanisy by the members of a chatered company, io whom the river belones.

When the ice persisis in formine in spite of stamers and padle-whects, and the united prayers of the companys servants, (who are wery pions.) certain industrous fishermen cut holes in it for the safety and bene fit of foot passengers. As "god wind nedis no bush." nether, it appears do these holes, which makes them all the moreconvenient and accessible.

The city is extending its limits wery mpidy, fise new houses. a blacksmith's shop, and wo dry goods establishments having "gone up" in 1 stion in additom to seteral of the ofdest inhabitants.

The travel in this direction conthues "all the year round," and the leading hotels are always full. "The most successful of these is the one bolonging to the Government." Dominion Company:" and playfully called the Pententary, where select ladies and gentemen are not only entertaned "free gratis for nothing." but are presented with a new suit of clothing (of many colours. like Joseph's coat) at the beginning of their term and another sut of sober brodeloth whon they retire. So popular is the establishment that as many as 500 and Goo boarders, from all parts of the comitry, have been mombered within its gay and festive halls at one time, many of them intending to remain ten or fifteen years. In addition to the suit of mourning given to each sorrowing boarder at the close of his term, he is also presented with what moner he may be entitled to
by the rules of the establishment, a large jack-knife. three plugs of tobacco, and a fine cambric handkerchief to dry his tears.

The "improvement" which is to do "great things" Sor the city is the Kingston and Madoc Railway, to be built of "leather and prumella"- the former to be sup. plied from the Tannery of the perpetual Chairman of the Common School Trustees. There is some difficulty in obtaining the prunclla.

The route of the kailway, after reaching the limits of the city, will be direct to the Daily News office; thence across the street through Ben. Holder's cabinet shop to the high fire-proof wall north of the city booksiore; thence (over the wall) through Harkes's gateway across King-strect, "fetching up," in the precise wording of the charter, "at the back door of the back offee of the Company's Secretary, in an opposite line to that taken by Hiawatha when he sailed into the sunset.'

The arrangement will admit of all the gold quartz of the hadoc region being stored in the Secretarys safe, until such time as Professor Bell ("of the Government Survey"; shall have returned to report on its genuineness to the principal city stockholders, Sir Samuel Loat and Philip the Twelfh.

A branch track is to extend from the rear of the Sectearys office to Gatden Island. passing through the adjacent cellars over the flag-stafi on the dome of the City luildings, across the steamer llatortoze (stationed midway) and thence to the remains of the old whar at the landing. This will be called the am line, and is to be presided over by Don Quisotes wooden horse, which will go furiously cither with the line or without it-a great point gained in locomotion, and for which the Companys Secretary is now taking out patents in Ottawa and Washington.

This branch is for the sole use of the late Warden of the County, M.L.P., and will be tapped "somewhere" and cominued (backwards) to the Court House (closely. following up Hiawatha) to enable that officer to attend the gencrat stitings of the Council and mectings of Committees, without losing time an route. The horse willalso be used occasionally to convey the Attorney of the County Council to and from Toronto, while attending the chances of the Court of Chancery, in the suits now pending between the Council and the City, and in which he erpects a judgment-on the Day of Judgment."

Although his fathful description has greaty excedcd our prescribed limits, it is necessary to add a closing paragraph of importance: A Select Commitice of the City Council. headed by Ademan Tomkins, was recenty apointed to employ Mr. Henderson to photograph the valuable property (in Brock-street) of Sir Johnoy MacD.
