He could not, however, eflect anything in this direction, and timally found his position so imiaired by this injudicious specuiation that he cailed a meeting of his crofitors hat week, at which it was deemed advisnble he shombassign, and one of the ereditors issued an attachment the same day. His liabilities are pretty heavy, between 880,000 and $590,000,0$ which sume $S 68,000$ is in mortgages on the mill, and property on the Main street, consisting of his business premises and shops adjoining. No estimate of the assets is set completed, but, outside the real estate, they are not large:

## MEETING OF THE QUEBEG LEGB. LATURE.

The Quebec Legislature was opened on the 20 th inst, with a speech which certainly was not calculated to excite party discussion. It was probably unfortumate that Mr. 'larte was solected to move the address in reply, is he departed froin the established usage on such ocensions, whieh is to adhere scrupulously to the sulyects discussed in the speech and to say noth: ing caleulated to provoke controversial discussion. Mr. Thute went otit of his way to attack the Premier of the Dominion Government, a course which, most assur: edly, will not meet with approbation. Ni. Joly, the leader of the Opposition, rebuked Mr. Tarte for his speech, but he likewise made an unjustifiable attack on Mr. J. J. Curran of Montreal, for taling part in the Yecent election for Quebec Bast. $\mathrm{Mr}_{1}$. Curran is Secretary to the Commission for He reyision of the statutes, but it cannot
be pretender that such a tompomary appoistment ean constitute MLr. Curron a member of the Civil Service or fetter his discretion as to interfering in clections. Mr. Joly also referred to the rumours of a lom of $\$ 500,000$ so as to cuable the 'Treasuer to reliene the public anxiety. Mr. Church explaned the circumstances under which this temporary loan had been obtained, it not having been deemed expedient to atompt to phace a now loath white the last one was still int the hands of the contractors. Mr. Parued in the Housc and Mr. Stames in the Legislative Council likewise criticized Mr. Church's temporay loan, and pretended that it would havo been easy to have obtained the money at a lower jute. We see no reason to doubl biat Mr. Churela acted with sound diseretion in this transaction, and in the interest of ho public. Mr: Joly made a strong appeal for legislation against public processions, including that of the Fete Diet, but was met with such a storm of disapprobation from his own party that he withdrew his recommendation and confmed it to at suggestion that the national societies should voluntarily abatidon their processions. It has, however, never been protended that the processions of national socicties give offence to any one, and noobject would be gainod by their abandomment. There is no probability of legiskation against processions of any kind, and we fear that there is but little use in appealing to the good sense of "hose who seem determined to put the eity to an manal outlay of several hou. sand dollars, and to excite the worst passions, and appatently for no object but, to eratify a parcel of boys who have no. stake in the country, but who aro, it must be admitted, encouraged to a groat extent: by those who ought to know better. Mr. Thomton, who sceonded the rosolations, spoko brielly but to the general satisfaction of the House, continiag himself to the topics of the specel. The Ministers who spoke acguitted themselves creditably: Mir Chumeh mate quite satisfactory explantions on the sulject of his tomporary loan, and Mr. Angers spoke temporately: and well on the various topics referred to by the leaders of the opposition. In the Legishative Conneil the address was mored by Hon. Mr. Hearn and secon led by Jon. Mr. de Brayere, both of whom acquitted thenselves most creditably. The most important speech was that of Mr. Archambatult in the Legishative Council, in which he eriticized the policy of the Jailway Commissioners in diverting the line of the North Shore latilway to Tere: bonne. There are conflicting opimions on this sulpeet, and it wauld be quice ont of
our power at present to place them before our readers. The subjech will, doubtless, be fully discussed after the adjourmment. The addresses were concurred in by boh Ilouses, and, so fat as we can jutge, tho Quebee Ministry is stronger this sassion than last.

## TUTCLES HASORY OF CANBDA.

Mr. Chates R. Tuttle, the book maker. has been silly enough to address a letam to a morning contemporary, which we candidly confess we fiml it dificuls t" chatacherize. It is of con'se areply to eriticism in this jommal, but we can hardly call it a delonee, as Mr. Tuthle, thoum claming for his work that is it is little better that all the rest" athe " but bat enough at that, I must almit." Consolittory this to persons who have pail sega for what the author admits to be " bad enough." However wo aro inclined 1 , be of ofinion that in luture Mr. Chathe: R. Tuthe will have to with for suberilus, to the books which he is mandactming: to sell, mutil they have mate their apporance and mademgone that critioism whith overy athtion must be pepared to endure. Mr. Chates R. Thities letter tombers some further notice of his work on our part absolutely necesstry. Had any ordimary writer ventured to publish such a paragraph as we are about to reprint, we shouk have been anazed, bui Mr. C. h. Tutbe has not led tis to think that he is orerscrupulous in his assertions. He says:"In no case does he place my work below "other histories of Cunada, and $\Gamma$ beliore "he will acknowledre it, riowithstanding "itsimperfection, bettor than any of its "predecessors." When Mr. 'futile wrote thus he had our aticle before him, in which, comparing his work to that of other Canadian listorians, we observed, "the least meritorious of whom is immeasurably superior to Mr. Tuttle." Mr. Tutule is likewise in crror in asserting that "ond complaint rests most heavily upon typographical ofrors." It is true that we noticed those crrors first as ovidence "of" the slovenliness and carclessnoss of the author" but we turned "to graver faults, and, although their number is legion, a specimen or tivo must sulhoe." We have read Mr. Tutules acknowledgment of the truth of our charge as to typographion error and the apology which he has oflered, but we are of opinion that the latter is wholly unsatisfactory. We do not beliere that "Lovell's famous printing house" is to blame for hose errors. The author, indeed, is grossly and absurdly inconsistent. He puts in as many inconsistent pleas as a special plenter: Tre telle us
that, "after the editor has stood over the printer and labored through three readings of the proof, mistakes will still appeni." Then he tells us "much of the proof I was unable to see at all, and the remaining portion I was enabled to read but once, a hundred miles from the establishment where the printing was done." Now, in our humble juclgment, when a book-maker andertakes to publish a costly work by subscription the least that his subscribers can expect is that he will read all the proofs, and we know enough of Lovell to assert that, if sent from a distance, they would have been revised, and that such scandalous errors as we pointer out could not have oecuired. But Mr. Tuttle is likewise inclined to blame " the scanty and oftentines uncer"tain signs which have been alopted for "the purpose." Iniz is simply absurd. The signs in question are as familiar to every printer as the written words. It must not be inagined that in what we published on the 1 tth inst. we intended to review Mr. Tuttle's book. We do not pretend to have reml it. The Ist volume contains 524 pages, about 30 of which are deroted to the history of Canacla from the Union to Confecleration, certainly not the least interesting portion of our history. That same period has likewise been treated by Mr. Louis V. 'Yurcotte in his work in 4 parts entitled "Le Cariada sous L'Union," and, although Mr. Charles R. 'ruttle has not incluted the name of Mr . Turcotte among our literay men, we can assure him that his cheap andumpetending work, although destitute of catchpenny engravings, is immeasurably superion to his own as a history. Wo refer again to this work because, although in our article of 14 th December we specially onlled attention to the contrast between it and Mr. Tuttle's, the lattel gentleman has ventured to insinuate in language that we have alyeady guoted that we acknowledge the superiority of his own. What must be thought of the witer of a history of Canala, who, after making the ridiculous blunder that "the new constitution, as expressed in the Union Aet, fully established the principle of responsible government," actually ignores the resolutions of 1841 , Which lurcotte gives at length with the preface, "Tere is the text of these magnificent resolutions." As we observed in ony former article, the errors in the portion of the work whicli we have read are so numerous that it is wholly impossible within the limits of an article to specify them. We shall, however, confine ourselves to one single page in which the history of Lord Syclenham's government ater the Union is comprised. No one
acquainted with the history of that period would have ventured to assert that the French party "held the balance of pow: er." 'herenever was a period when the French Canndians possessed so little influence as during the first session of the Union Pruliament. The balance of power, if such a term can properly be used, was held by the Reformers from Upper Canada, who were swayed by a desire to sustan the government inaugurated by Lord Syclenham, and by an unwillingness to alrandon Mr. Batdwin. And this leads us to notice another of Mr. Tuttle's blunders. He says:-_s Before the "end of the session, Mr. Baldwin resigned "from the ministry on account of a dif"ference of opinion with some of the "other ministers, and joined the opposi"tion, which subsequently caused a "change of government." It woull be impossible to convey an account of Mr. Baldwin's resignation more inconsistent with historic truth than the foregoing. Mr. Baldwin resigned on the very first dity of the session, on the gromed that the ministry, as then constituted, clid not reflect the opinions of the Parliamentary majority. Mr. Iurcotto has defined, in a very brief but lucid pararriph, Mr. Baldwin's position, which we translate from the French: "At the time of the "proclamation of the Union he had been "called to make part of this ministry, "without, however, forming a coalition "with his colleagues. Ile had constantly "acted with a party which was opposed " to them, and had reiteriated to them his "attachment to his old opinions. Mr. "Baldwin added that the Province was "then without a legislature. When the "result of the elections beaame known, " lie had informed the Gorernor that the "ministry did not possess the confidence " of the House of Assembly, and had "begged him to reconstruct his Council. " But this advice was not adopted. Me "tendered lis resignation, which was ac"cepted." No one could form an ilea from the reference to this most important transaction in Tuttle what led to the resignation of Mr . Bollwin. We shall refer to one more error in the sum. mary of Lord Syclenham's acts. It is aflimed by Iuttle that Lord Sydenham "had cione more to propitiate the French "element ancl to draw it into accord with "the English-spealing population than "any governor since the days of Guy "Carleton." A statement move clirectly at variance with truth was never made. It is notorious that Lord Sydenham's government was opposed by the great mass of the French Canadian population, and that he never even tried to conciliate
it: We might quote passage after passage from luwcotte in support of our assertion, bub it is unnecessary. The fact is that every page of the worls under consideration proves the utter incompetence of Mr. Juttle to wite a history of Canada. We observe that in his letter Mr. Tuitle excuses errors because "I wote another "large work of two volumes during tho " same time:" and we observe by the title page that not only has he witten "An Encyclopeadia of Universal History," a " History of the Countries of America," "a IIistory of the Border Wars of Two Centuries," but, " Tistories of the States of Michigan, Indiann, Wisconsin, Iown, se., se." It is quite eviclent that $M$. Tuttle has not even the most remote idea of the duty of a Mistorian. If he can sell such works as that before us, and he assures us in his letier that he can, then we are not surprised that he declares that his plans were "organized among a class of people who are not distingmished for their love of literature." Were we to abstain from noticing a persomal reference in'Mr. Tuttle's letter, it might be imagined by some that the individual, Six Francis Hincks, who is most unjustifiably referred to, was umble to meet the charge. Unfortunately for Mr. Tuttle, the passage in his history whi oh lie has had the audacity to refer to, is a tissue of the most infamous falsehoods, and a beference to the joumals of Parliament, which we are quite certain were never consulted by Mr. Tuttle, will convince him that the Bill which he alleges was introduced and caried by Mr. Inincles, was entrusted by the Corporation of Toronto to the member for the city, Mr. Wm, IT, Boulton, llis remarlss about using infuence in the location of the Quebee and lichmond Railway to enhance the value of his property are equally false. We have devoted much more space to the miserable production which heads this article than it cleserves, but we have the satisfaction of knowing that our estimate of the work is in accordance with that of those most competent to form a correct opinion on the subject.

## THE CAUGHNATVAGA CANAL.

We believe that our readers will not be somy if we notice very brienly Mr. Young's second letter on a subject which he has much at heart. On the assmmption that Mr. Shanly is correct that the Caughnawaga Canal is a most important link in our chain of canals, and that its omission from our system was a blunder, it must be obvious that such a work ought not to lue placed in the liancls of a private com: rany. We should have been glad if Mr.

Young had touched on the last negotiations at Washington and their effect. Negotiations may be resumed at any time, and there are important questions connected with the navigation to be settled. Mr. Young has confmed his argument to the question of the expediency of constructing a canal, but the real question is whether it is expedient to renew a charter which has expired, and when it is perfectly notorious that there is no probability that private capitalists will undertake the construction of the work. Though far from convinced of the expediency of constructing the camal, unless assured of the co-operation of the United States, of the State of New York, we think that question of scoondary importance at present. We are opposed, on what we think suflicient grounds to a renewal of a lapsed charter, which may nause embarrassment, but which camnot lead to the construction of the canal.

## A MARES MEST.

Some of the Opposition newspapers in the West have made a personal attack on Senator Brown in comection with a charge made against an ofticial in Washington for having fumished the Senator with statistical information to aid him in negotiating a reciprocity trenty. Mr. Brown has given a positive clenial that any money was expended for an improper purpose, and incleed it cloes not appear that it is even protended that any information was given beyond what was open to the whole public. It seems almost absurd to suppose that an oflicer of a statistical bureau could be in a position to furnish any information except what is generally considered as open to the whole world. Our inference from the statements made would be that some oflicer of the statistical department at Washington had been made a victim of party spite for fumishing some information of a strictly public character in a different form from that in which it was prepared for public use. Be this as it may, Canadians should not allow their party spleen against Senator Brown to induce then to impute improper conduct to lim. That he had a perfect right to obtain all the statistical information in the possession of the state departments is indisputable, and we are quite sure that our government would not have withheld any similar information in its possession from the American authorities. One would really infer from the tone of some of the articles on the subject that Senator Brown had gone to Washington in a surreptitious manner, instead of having been from the time of his arrival fully accredited to the
govemment of the United States for the very purpose of endearoring to arrange a satisfactory basis for a reciprocity treaty that would be mutually advantageous to the two countries. We have been chiefly led to notice the late attacks on Senator Brown because we are of opinion that in our negotiations with the United States, which it is quite possible may be renewed in connection with the fishery question, the patriotic course for all Camadians to follow is to imitate the example of their neighbors, who rarely allow their political differences, which run quite as high as our own, to prevent them from acting in concert whenever questions arise $i_{n}$ which their mational interests conflict with those of foreigners.

## AGENTS AND FILE INSURAXCE.

It is a practice which genemally prevails among property holders' to ieave the selection of the company in which they insure to the agent or broker who places the insurnace. On account of the linited knowledge which prevails with reference to the reliability of the various companies doing business in the country, perhaps it is best that the selection should be left to the agent, who of necessity knows more albout the tunstworthiness of the companies than the property owner can do, and if the agent is intelligent and honest he can place the risk where it will aflord the grentest security, and be of the greatest adrantage to the insured. Agents should exercise the greatest possible care in the selection of the companics in which to place the risis they control, for if they do not, nud the companies in which they are placed fail, they lose control of the business, and the insurer naturally, whether justy or not, blames the agent for his want of discrimination.
While these suggestions are applicable at all times, they are specially so now when so many companies are going to bankruptey or are tottering on the verge of ruin, through low rates, recklessness in the character of their risks and unjustifiable expenditures. An agent of ordinary perception can judge of the rates of a compary and the charncter of the risks accepted, and generally also of the managenent expenditure. The cases are rare in whick, an agent need make a mistake, and though he may be deceived, it is rery seldom inded that a property holder ned incur loss or inconvenience through misplaced risks.
These remarks apply equally to city insurance brokers and conntry agents. In a city one danger is that the iusured may be the loser by a great conflagration, which will surely ruin some companics, and lence the necessity to select companies whose risksare so distributed and whose lines are so prudent as to rednce the probability of their failure to a minimum. Another danger is that companies will fall by a gradual depletion, the result of long continued impridence, and that policies will have to be caucelled and risks removed to other companies, to the great annoynuce of the insured. The first danger does not beset the
country agent, but the second docs. Great enre should, therffore, be exereised by both, in the interest of their customers as well as themselves.
The above remarks are condensed from an article in the Spectator, which further disconmes of the claracter of agents in the following terins:-
The tendency for some years past anong the better class of underwriters, both officers amd agents, has been to elevate the business to a higher phane than that formery vecupied ber it: 10 conduct it with tore inteligence, more regard for the rights of competiors and for the rights of the assured. True, the wild scramble for business and the methouls employed by disregarding the relation which rates onght 10 bear to hazards which have disgraced the business for nearly a yenr past, point in a direction quite opposite to elerating the lusiness, am tend to discourage those who hoped tor steady progress; but these things caniot continue indetinitely, and when they are abrudoned we may hope to sec officers of companes treating each other with a degree of fairness, and manfesting a degree of faithfuntess to eren imphed obligations, which have hitherto been unknown. la the effort to elevate the business and make its management contorm to a higher standard in all regards, the arems and brolers call perform numportant phirt. They can compel ine respect of the people for the eumpanies and the officers who gurera themzelves by strict rules of probity, and manifest a fine sense of honor in their dealligs. The agents must largely reffect the elhatucter of the ofticers of the comptuits which they represent, and agente will render themselves and the business signal service by thensing to be identified with any company which disregards the rules. whith slounth govern it. Gertiinly ugents and brokers will render themselves, the buiness and their enstomers, valuable service lys selecting with the utmost care the companies in which they place the risks which they control.

## THE MILD TEATHER.

The extraordinarily mild wenther of the season bitherto bas scarcely a parallel in the memory of the proverbial oldest inhabitant. The possibility of a steambont excursion from this city on Christmas day was surely something worth noting by almanac makers and wiseacres. In the Province of ontario, farmers hare been plowing duting the past week or two, and even in this Province the few sleighs that ventured out fora single day, some two weeks age, have sive been lying unused. The want of the usual sleigh roads is sererely felt all over the country by all classes of dealers, and famers who deferred marketing their grain while ther had something else to do, and some who wished to pride themselves, even at a loss, by showing to their neighbors that they could hold their wheat over, are completely weatherbound, for the roads were never worse. The new fall wheat looks remarkably well, and a large area has been sown again this seat son. The Hessian Fly is not quite so numerous as supposed ; and it is just possible that, where it exists, the future dnmage may not extend deep enough to prevent the young plant from recorcring. Lumbering operations are greatly restricted; but, although the stock of sawn lumber on hand is lower than usual, it would have $n$ beneficial effect on the market if a scarce season were to happen. We are apt in Canali to complain of our long winters, not always considering shat blessings they bring us.

- The Quebec govemment advertise for tenders for the lease of the $Q$. M. $0 . \& O$. railway, which is rapidy approaching completion.
- The conviction of Glass, the Molsons Bank embezzler, has been confinmed by the Court of Appeal. The point raised was that a specific clinrge with day and date should be named in the indictment. The matter will be carried to the Supreme Court.
- E. H. Goff, late manager of the Canada Agricultaral Insurance Go., has addressed a Ietter to the shareholders, defending himself from the reflections cast upon him by the report of P. S. Ross, and the strictures made on the street. The communication is a somewbat sengthy one. We shall refer to it move fully next weck.
- Insolvents when making an assignment often retain money in their hands, which is as mueh a part of their estate as their stock in trade or renl estate, and showld be handed over to the assignee for the benefit of the creditors. 1 is of en dillicult to prove the possession of such and to make the holder disgorge, but when an opportunity occurs an example shonld be made. Milton Grifin, a member of the Insolvent foundry firm of Miles E. Rankin \& Co., Belleville, was arrested in Toronto a few days ago white on his way to the States, and after a pretiminary examination returned to Belleville for trial, charged with having fravdulently niproprited about $\$ 200$ belonging to $\mathrm{M} . \mathrm{B}$. Roblin, the nssignee of the estate. When arrested, Griflin had $\$ 1100$ in his posjession.
- E. W. Clark, a young broker and commeission merchant of his eity is being mourned for by a number of too confiding storekecpers sud others. Clark had only been in business a few months, and not finding it irolitable resolved to make a haul und then take the Adrice of the Sage of Chateauguay. Among his exploits be obtained a hogshead of brandy fictu a local wholesale house, for which he was 10 pay cash, but, as soon as be got possession of the goods, he pawned them, and, though a cupias was taken out, it was too late to be of any avail. He rietimized others in a different manber, geting a gold watch and chain in one case and a heary bill of dry gooks in another and paying for them wilha bogus check. We bear he even got railway and Pulman car tickets in the same manner. Altogether the sum total of his depredations must aggregate sowething considerable.
- A. Esinhart, who has done a large and active business at St. Joms, Que, for the past 16 months, bas to be numbered among recent failures. This was o:2e of the somewhat numerous new stores that opened upafter the great fire, and though the business done has been a large one, since $\$ 80,000$ worth of goods bave been sold, the profits do not secm to have been proportionate, and a nire occurring a few weeks ago, a meeting of creditors was shorty after held, at which liabilites were slown to be $\$ 21,400$ and assets $\$ 17,000$. A settlement at 65 cents on the dollar is now about effected, payable 35 cents in cash with his insurance award of $\$ 8,500$, balance in 3 and 6 montus. Mr. Esinhart was formerly a prominent merchant and grain dealer at Laprairie, and represcuted thin county for a
short time in the local house; lie failed there in $18 \pi 2$ with liabilities of alsout $\$ 60,000$, and subsequently bought back his stock, but did not continue long in the business. He came to Montreal, where be went into partnership with Donneville, the notorions robber of his own safe, in the grain business. The commection not proving satisfactory, he left the business about 18 months ago and established himself in St. Johns, with the results above shown.

Douglas, grocer, Guelph; John Dickinson, gencral store, Kingston, N. $B$. Hambleton \& Agnev, planing mill, Lacknow, are compromising at 50 cents. A demand of assignment has been made on Landry \& Dalglish, general merchants, Cownsville. E. C. Davies \& Co, commission merchants, Halifan, have been attached and left. Their liabilities are heary: Cutter \& Potter, builders, St. John, are about assiguing, with linbilities of over $\leqslant 6,000$. Several judgments having been obtained against J. L. Campbell, lumber merchant, St. Thomas, one of the creditors has had the estate attached to prevent auotber party getting execution. The wholesale confectionery business of the insolvent firm of Boyle \& Gurdner, Toronto, has been purchased by W. W. Parker \& Co., who continue to carry it on.
- The New York Witness expresses the following sound riews on the question of co-operative and Grangers' stures, - "Whenever this subject comes up, we have warned those who were asked to invest their capital or their credit in co-operative stores, of the danger of losing both. In the nature of the ease such stores cannot, as a general rule, succeed. It requires no smull ability and experience to conduct a dry goods, or grocery, or general store, well. Only think of the vast variety of articles that the manager needs to be acquanted with, and the best places to purchase them to adrantage, and the why to aroid an overstock or to preserve things that do not sell at once from deterioration, and to job them off before they are out of condition or out of fasbion. Success in storekeeping is only gained by contimul vigilance, as well as decided ability and good experience. When these qualities, united with integrity, are found in the nanager of a co-operative or Grangers store, all will go well; but the person who jossesses such a combination of qualifications could make fir more on his own account than any salary he could charge, and he cau only be retained, if at all, by a desire on his part to benefit his fellowmen. It is safe to assume that such persons cannot, as a general rule, be found for
co-operative stores, or, if found, earunot be long retained. With most of those put into the mangement fallure is only a question of time, even where there is no dishonesty; but if, as in some cases, that is added, the fature is yery ball. All the co-operative stores with which we have had any acquaintance have come to grief, and that from obvions causes."
- According to the provisions of the Iuteruntional Postage Treaty of Berue, articles subject to customs duty sent by mail are detained, stamped in" lble to customs dutr;" and sen back to the exchange oftice of the county from which they are sent. Such coutraband articles include gold, silver and jewels. The treaty includes nearly every country except Camad with which country the United States has it separate arrangement. According to the treaty with Canada, books, maps, plans, sheet music, photographs and similar printed matter maj be sent througl the mails, but are liable to duty, and if articles other than those enmmerated in the treaty be found in such mail matter, they are treated like all similar articles from other countries, and, after being detained and stamped, are returned to the Dominion.
At present all such articles seized, if their value is less than $\$ 50$, will be relensed on payment of the duty; and, if the duty is not paid, the articles are sold at public anction like other seizures.
By a new arrangement, however, which it is contemplated shall go into effect the 1 st of January, such articles, after having been stamped "liable to customs duty," are to be returned to the Dominion. This new arrangement has been made in order to cover certaia ingenious schemes by which watehes, jewellery, valuable flower seeds, drugs, and other articles, small in bulk but rich in value, have been sunggled through the mails.-Detroit Free J'ress.

## THE LIFF INSURANCE QUESTION. (Continued.)

To accomplish these end insurance supervision must be transierred from the executive branch of the government to the judicial branch, to which it belongs. The duties in which it can be useful are such as ouly a special tribunal, administering an extraordinary jurisdiction with full judicin powers, can ever perform. The present laws confer upon a political office, a branch of the executive, summary but indefinite powers of supervision orer these trusts, not one of which can be exercised except upon an anthoritative interpretation of the statutes conferting it, and, at the same time, jeave the interprelation of these statutes and the enforcement of thiat interpretation wholly to another branch of the government, the judiciary of the State. The Insurance Departneat appears to be clothed with vast authority, and to be under an enormous responsibility; but in practice it is fettered aud embarrassed at every turn, not only by the necessity of obeying and appealing to the courts, but by its li bility to be checked in every measure by any desiguing person who can employ an attorney. The actual result is, that it has boundless jower to harass and injure law-abiding companies, but is outwitted and defied by those which are in dishonest hands. If the work to be done were but the enforcement of a perfect and exhaustive code, it would be properly an execttive duty: but it is the supervision of a system
of trusts, in which every question of details requires the application to complicated facts of the principles of equity. No tribunal has ever been derised from which its performance can be expected or hoped, excent one tormed on the plan and aumed with the powers of a high court of equity.

Such a tribunal would produce, not words. but work. It need not vex the legislature and the public every year with a rolume of useless, unintelligible, and misleading figures, prefaced by essays in which every paragraph is a painful compromise between the desire to express some real conviction of a smatterer in science, and the necessity of courting the fisor of political demagogues. but it would quietly labor to prevent the mischief which the present system rainly and blind!y gropes after and seeks to detect, till long after it is hopelessly done. It must be able, by summary proceedings, to ascertain the beginnings of miswanagement; to compel proper clinges in the managers and trustees; to reorganize a company, if need be, not after it is ruined, but When it is firsi thentened with danger; to assume full responsibility for the proper administration of the trusts it controls. Were it once properly constituted, its existence would be an almost complete guaranty that its extmordinary powers would never need to be exercised. But its ordinary juriediction ought to extend to the settlement, without apperl, of every contested claim; and it might properly, and with the acquiescence of every honest man, be authorized, for the willful and deliberate resistance of a just, or payment of a fraudulent claim, to remove any oflicer or trustee. Above all, in the melanclioly case of a company which should, by any disuster, be rendered actually insolvent, this tribunal should be charged with the duty of applying the remnants of resources for the benefit of the purchasers of insurance, by distributing them, to the full extent that the wisest administration can secure, in the form of the insurance purchased by them. For the oniy method of distribution in such cases now known to our law, although the direct logical result of the curreat theory of net valua ions, is the crowning absurdity which that theory has produced. It gives each man his proportion out of the wreck of the reserve, on the assumption that all the lises in the company are egmally good in their expectation; reversing the first principle of insurance, it throws the burden on those who most need help, and makes of a false and fanciful hypothesis a pretent to rob and crush the feeble and the dying On the ralue of these suggestions concerning supervision, it would be unceasonable to expect an immediate umanimity of opinion; but the minds best qualified to judge of them, and to which I submit then with most confidence, are the able and upright men, and they are many, who are, or have been, insurance superiniendents of commissioners under existing laws.

Upon Life Insurance management as it is, it would not be difficult to write a criticism which should be at once tmatul and severe. But if it were intelligently written, it would astonish most the men whose clamon ngainst the companies is now the loudest; for it would pass in silent contempt the charges on which they mainly rely, and would still find in the business, difliculties, ertors, and eren wrongs enourh to make a plamsible case for its suppression, before minds from which all its merits and benefits sloatd be concealed. Yet such a case would not be half so stroug as one similarly made up for the suppression of the manufactures, mines, milroads, banks, or fire insurance, or of government itself; because, on the wholr; the scientific busis of Life Insurance is far more perfect than that of any of these, and the deviations from is requirements in practice have been proportionally far less serious and damaging. Tested by the standard of its ideal ams and methods, Life Insurance has achieved a success more complete, and has suffered in detail, frilures less disastrous, than any other form of associnted human enterprise. Such a criticism will have its own value, when it can be offered as a cleck and a guide to the mann-
gers of the business, ander the resistless pressure of a calmand ealightened public opinion. The time is not now, when the spirit of Aleibitdes and of the Gmechi, of Cade, Robespierre, and Lord George Gordon, is revived in oni hath, and has for the moment si:ngled out this institution as the object of its fury. It has bee: the trade of the vingar demagogne in all nges, wherever industry is depressed and labor overWhelmed with ansiety and want, to stir the passion of the populace, to set apparent need above right, to use the prejudices he crented so as to seize for himsell' the high places of power. The attempt by a few to practice this trade is now the disgrace of our own political life; nor is it confined to the petty orators of city gambling dens and remote Granger clulls, inithas aspired to use as its anconscious nids a small part of the respectable press, and has defileal the very throne of republican justice-ome batls of legislation. That it will come to manght is as certain as that the intelligences and moratity of the people will prevent, in all other respects, the ruin of society. But meanwhile the passions of a mob are claraorons to be enacted in statutes, and to control our governments and courts in dealing with these vast interests. Better than this would be the direct plander of corporate weal th by a violent and lingry populace; for even this would net so deply corrupt the moral foundation of our free society. it we must have nob law, let ns have it at first hand: and spare us the mockery of its administration by tools, with the pomp of legal furms and in the mame of government. It will not come to this; but that it may not, the duty of the hour is a frank appent to public opinion, which is sure to be right in its calm and final judgment, even where it is wrong in its first fevered impulse. Reform in a business is not ensy when all its energies are on the strain to prevent its destruction.

The appeal against hasty, ignorant, and therefore destructive, legislation has one practical argument wheh is conciusive: it is that every selious evil in Life Insurance hitherto has been the distinct result of legislative interference. I have shown how a false theory imbedded in law, and with the help of lav in public opinion, has brought ruin on some companies, and embarrassed all, by preparing the way for the present crisis of misunderstanding and distrust. But it has nerer, perhaps, been observed that the rast number of lapsed insurnices, which are the bane and danger of the business, liare been directly produced by a more sweeping and injurions interference of government, which was not aimed at this institution, but fell indiscriminately upon all moneyed institutions in the land. In 1801, the nation repudiated its demand debts, except as a carrency of broken promises would piy them, and disguised the repudiation by forcing all private creditors to accept a similar pretense ot payment.

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## THE CAUGHNAWAGA CANAL,

## To the Editor of the Journal of Commerce.

Sir,-In my letter published in your last issue, referving to youk remarks afout the Canghawaga canal, I stated that, "even it we State of New York refuse to enlarga hel canal from the Lake into the Hudson river, that it was for the iaterest of Canadn that it should be built." In this opinion yon difler from me, and say you admit that the camal. would be of "immense benefit for ressels loadting at Chicago and discharging at New York "tihout breaking bulk;" But, on the other hand "a canal between the St. Lawrence tini "Lake Champlain, which wonld make Burling"ton, or some other port on that lake, the "place for breaking bulk instend of Monireal, "Would be looked on in a very different liglit."
Although I find it dificalt so to condense my remarks on this matier as not to intrude on yunr limited space, yet I would ask rou wherein is the difference of lauding vestern produce:
provisions，\＆c．，withont brenking bulk，in Burling ton or other Lake Champlain ports，in－ stead of at New York？It is true that if the State of New Yorkx chose to enlarge her Cham－ plain canal from the Cake into the II idson， and allow the Westem propichor to go through from Clicago or Duluth on to New York with－ ont breaking bulk，that the business of the Canglimwaga canal wond be increased there－ by，but the value of the eamal is not dependemt min this being done．Various net works of rail－ ways centre at Whitelall，two hundred and tene miles from．Newe York，ind one humdred and thinty－seven miles nutrer the sel－boird than Oswego．Net works of railways also centre at Budington and other ports on Lake Champ－ lain，all in commection with Buaton and Port－ land seaports，besides passing througls on the way，all the fowns and ，illage of the New Eng－ land states，the great seats of manulfacturing industry，and where there now is it population of $3,500.00$ ．Now bear in mind that his popula－ tion are entirely depentent on recerving western grain，cereals，provisions，so．＂Jhese New ＂Enghand Stales，from inatue to Vonnecticut， ＂do not grow elutigh of cercals to feed lee ＂popilation for probmbly one month ont of the ＂welve；they have in fact，so tospeak，no cereal ＂crop，and their eapital fulal labor are embati－ ＂ed in other lines of induatry，better suited to ＂her condition and resources．＂ThoseStates nre vow largely supplied with wistern pro－ ducte by ruilways from illomy，which have come from Buffalo and Oswego through the Erie cannl．The manufactured goods from these Niw England Sintes are aratu ：aken to the West by raitway to Albany and throhgh the Erie canal． It is this npward freight which tends so much to cheapen transport from the west．＇＇his haw－ ever is only one branch of the trade poing into the New Enghan States，for which the matioal ports of discharge are Burlington and bher ports on Lake Ghamplain．Tho ：rale from Camada into the United States is very great：Of the $750,000,000$ feet of planks and lumber，shipped to the United States，Oswege has received in one yenr $310,000,000$ tret，most of which is distributed throughom New Eug－ land．．lthe Valley of the ot taw has shipped in one year over $300,000,000$ feet．Ihis is besides $4,000,000$ to $0,000,000$ lashels of Imrley， nearly alf of which，if a catal existed，would go on to Lake Champlain for distribution，as a great parthow does，through the Ghanhly camal on a route consisting of 90 miles river and twenty－one miles canal uavigation，against 30 mides by the Cauglamwaga canal，with 25 feet lockage，against 120 feet locknge by existing ronte．Messrs Bronson \＆Wesion，Perley \＆ Patty，A．Betdwin，Levi Young，R．Blackburn， E．B．Eddy，J．R．Booth and H．Crandall \＆Co．， manufactiarers in Ottawa，declared，that a saving of six days time in transportation would he sared by the canal over present ronte，and that the saring in transportation would be from one dollar to one dultar and iffif cente per thous－ and feet．It lins also been stated by practical men，on the Oumwe that the gumatity of inferint timber，unfit for shipment to Quebee，but which would be valuable ou Lake Champlain and ia： New England for various purposes，and which； rote anmually in the Onawa forests，would， if the proposed canal was constructed；by the！ lessened cost of transport by move than pay the annuml interest on its cost．With these state－： menta before yon any remarks of mine ne jerhaps unnecessary．But，bear in mind that all this Crandian trade into Lake Ohamplain is ont－ side of that great volume of trade which wotid flow from the Western United States independ－ ent of Now York enlarging her Champlain camal． As you may not have mach contidence in my opinions on such matters I will give you the opinione of those who hare made the subject at study．Messes．McAlpine，Kirkwood \＆Childs， civil engineers，in the United Siates，all men of vast experience，nad who have been often called upon to give their opinions on works in foreiga countries，dechare that the＂Construe－
 ＂from the St．Lawrence into Like Cinmulait： ＂will enable large Lake vessels to deliver： ＂their crigo at Burlingtoy or other lake ports
＂at twonty conts per ton less，even if the ＂Ohamplain canal shonld not be enbarged so ＂as to allow vessels to go to New York；and sthe economy of time nam tramsmort by the ＂Lake Champlatur ronte coulif not lail to atimet ＂a large share of the trade between the Western ＂amd Xew England States．＂

'The atr.val of' live stock by mil at point St. Charles since the first of the present month was 145 carloids, of these 98 carlonds were of vattle, 26 cuhloads mixed citule and sheep, 17 cinlonds of sheep 3 mixed loads catule and logs, 3 touble-decked and 3 single-decked entluads of hoge. During lie same period last yeny there arrived 25 carloads of live stock,
 32 mixed londs of catile and sheep. 5 carloads of hugs mind mixed cululoads ol cutcle and
hogs. The prices of catile and sheep are slighty higher this yeat than last, but hogs were rather more than 1 c . per pound dearer last year than at presint. There are ibout 150 hean of catile and abont as many live hogs unsold wating until after the New Year, when there will mobably be some demand for wem. bive hogs are held at 5 c . per pound. Shipments of live stock to Eugland continue hy way of the Grund Jruak and stmaner from porthand.

Lumber.- J. Bell Forsjh \& Oo., of Quebee, have issued their inmani timher circular. We extract the following renatks on the seneral state of the trade:-" "The winter of ista to 1877 was on the whole as favornble for the production of timber as the preceding one; althongh the totalsuphly falls a litule slort of the previous jear. it has been excessive and prejudicial to the mannfacturer's interest. The export has been henry, causing a glut in the timber markets of Grent Britain, as well as $n$ thll in prices there. The stock wintering will le fonnd slightly heavier as a whole than hast year, and all things considered greater than conld hase been desiven. A mnch larger proportion than usmal remains in first hands, which will ho doubt tend to curtail his winter's operations more than tiny other canse. Notwithstanding the ormerous and early arrivals from sea, the market opened without the slightest sea, the market opened withont the slightest
animation. and few transactions of any extent took place until the latter part of July. From that time until the commencement of Oclober, a consideratle quantity of timber changed hands, but there never existed that brisk dematud which we have witnessed in former years, and closing transactions slowed in many inslances a decline in mices." The Pembroke Observer bats the followiag:-"On account of the long continued depression of the lumber drade, and the quantity of hmber being got out this year, comparatively, the markets for the firming community are very low, and prices for any lind of stuft dimicult to be got. Beef was sold in Pembroke last week for S2. 75 per hundred, it can be rendily bought here for 83 ; pork from 84 to 85 per hundred; tlour 55.50 per barrel ; hay, atthough a light ctop this year, can be hought at from S8 to S10 per ton: In the local market there is little doing, and prices are unchanged.
