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

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
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TN an account of the banquet to Lord Strathcona, given by the Board of Trade, in the Pavilion, the "Globe" says:

"Then a group of girls, 'The Daughters of the Empire,' prettily dressed in white, and wearing white silk Glengarry caps, slashed with red, white and blue, appeared behind the guest table and began the flag drill. These girls were also pupils of Miss Edith LeLean. They carried Union Jacks, and as they marched and swung their flags over the heads of the guests they were again and again applauded. . . . An encore was demanded."

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Grand March with Flags.

TWENTY-FOUR girls of any size may take part in this drill. They should be dressed in a uniform costume—black skirts and red military waists, trimmed with brass buttons, look very pretty. If such a costume is difficult to obtain, white dresses, trimmed with red, white, and blue ribbons, will serve the purpose.

The music for this march should be martial. The more rousing the march that is played the more effective the drill. The pianist will play an introduction, or strike a chord when the march is to begin.

Each girl will hold two flags, one in each hand. It is well not to have the flags too small. About fourteen

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inches by nine inches, and mounted on a twenty-four inch stick, is a good standard size. Have them larger rather than smaller.

GRAND MARCH.

WHEEL.

The girls will form up in twos in the ante-room, and come down the centre of the stage, a flag in each hand, the inside flag of each girl crossed with her partner's. When the line reaches the front of the stage, it will halt for a moment, then the first twelve girls (i.e., the first six pairs) will turn a quarter of a circle to the right, and face the right of the stage; the last twelve (i.e., the last six pairs) will turn a quarter of a circle to the left, and face the left of the stage. As each girl turns she will bring both flags in front of her, holding her hands in a line with her shoulders. The eleventh, twelfth, thirteenth, and fourteenth girls will slowly turn, as on a pivot, and all the girls will wheel to the right, as the spokes of a wheel. The outer girls will have to take very long steps, in order to keep the shape of the wheel. See that the flags are all held in a straight line. Let the wheel revolve three times. The two outer girls of each

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spoke will now march to the right, while the inner sixteen girls stand as a smaller wheel. Let them march twice around.

The two outer girls of each spoke will now stand, while the inner wheel (consisting of sixteen girls) revolves twice.

As this movement is a very pretty one, if there be time let the whole wheel revolve again.

HOLLOW SQUARE.

The girls will now turn, face the front of the stage, cross inside flag with partner's, and come down the centre of the stage in twos. When they reach the front of the stage, the girls on the right will turn to the right, and the girls on the left will turn to the left; each girl will hold her flags straight out in front of her as she turns. They will go to the back of the stage, meet, crossing inside flags, and come down the centre of the stage in twos. The first and second girls will step to the front of the stage, a little to the right of the centre; the third and fourth girls will form up to the left of them, facing the audience, in the very centre of the stage; the fifth and sixth girls will form up to the left of them. Let all

flags be crossed, except, of course, the right-hand flag of the first girl and the left-hand flag of the sixth girl. The seventh, eighth, ninth, tenth, eleventh, and twelfth girls will march to the left of the stage, and form one line facing the left. The seventh girl should be at least two feet behind the sixth girl. The thirteenth, fourteenth, fifteenth, sixteenth, seventeenth, and eighteenth girls will march to the right, and form one line facing the right of the stage. The thirteenth girl should be about two feet behind the first girl. Let each girl of this line take her position from the second line that was formed, i.e., the line that is facing the left. The nineteenth, twentieth, twenty-first, twenty-second, twenty-third, and twenty-fourth girls will form one line facing the back of the stage, the nineteenth girl being about two feet behind the eighteenth. This forms a hollow square, facing outward. Let all flags be held crossed. Let each line wheel to the right, until the square be turned and all are facing the inside of the square. The first six girls will now have their backs to the audience. Let the square now wheel again, until all are facing outward. Again the line will wheel, as in the first instance, until the square is facing inward. This time all will march to the centre, at

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the same time raising their flags as high as possible, preserving the shape of the square. This movement may be repeated once or twice. The whole square will now wheel to the right, until it is facing outward, and the girls will march to their places in the line and come down the centre of the stage in twos.

ARCHES.

When all are in line, in twos, facing the audience, the right-hand girls will turn a quarter of a circle to the left, and the left-hand girls will turn a quarter of a circle to the right. Each girl is now facing her partner. The flags are held over the shoulders. The twenty-third and twenty-fourth girls will turn, face the audience, and with flags over their shoulders will march down through the line and take their places at the front of the line, facing each other. The line will keep stopping to the back of the stage, to make room for them. They will be closely followed by the twenty-first and twenty-second girls, who will march to their places at the front of the line, and so on, until all have marched through the line to the front, and the line is in its original position, first and second girls in front. This movement may be repeated. If

desired, each girl may cross her flags with her partner's, and form an arch, under which the girls may pass.

WHEELING.

Let the girls on the right now turn a quarter of a circle to the right, and the girls on the left a quarter of a circle to the left ; all are now standing back to back. The whole line will now wheel to the front, the first and second girls turning as on a pivot, and the twenty-third and twenty-fourth girls taking very long steps. The flags will be held well up. The twenty-four girls are now facing the audience. The girls will now backward wheel to places.

The line will now wheel in the other direction, the twenty-third and twenty-fourth girls will act as pivots, and the first and second girls will take long paces. The line is now standing with its back to the audience. Let the flags be raised so as to be seen in a straight line above the heads of the girls. The line will now backward wheel to place.

DIAGONALS.

The girls will now separate, the right-hand girls turning to the right, and the left-hand girls to the left ; they

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
will march to the back of the stage. Each line will then march across the stage diagonally. The first girl will march from the back of the right-hand side of the stage to the front of the left-hand side of the stage. The second girl will march from the left-hand back of the stage to the right-hand front of the stage. All the odd numbers will follow the first girl, and all the even numbers will follow the second girl. The second girl will pass between the first and the third, the fourth girl between the third and the fifth, etc. This movement may also be repeated.

COILS.

The girls will pass to the back of the stage, and come down in single file, flags over their shoulders. The first twelve will march to the centre of the right-hand side of the stage, the second twelve will march to the centre of the left-hand side of the stage. The first and thirteenth girls will act as leaders. They will lead each line in as large a circle as possible, taking care that one circle does not interfere with the other; then they will describe a smaller circle inside the larger, and so on until they reach the centre of the coil. Reaching the centre,

the leaders will turn around and unwind the coil in the same way. All through this movement the flags should be held over the shoulders. A large coil, in which all the girls take part, may close the march. The girls will then march off to the right.

[NOTE.—The right-hand side of the stage means the right of the girls as they face the audience.]



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
