PLAY ROLE OF ALICE IN BIG PAY FOR HEAD MEN

President McCurdy Received \$150,000 in 1904 and Others Paid in Proportion.—"Large Rewards for Large Achievements" the Motto.

New York, Oct. 6.—Closing a week every day of which has produced a sensation that has stirred the country, the special legislative committee investigating the methods of insurance companies, adjourned to-day until Tuesday of next week.

In today's testimony the sensational development was when Mr. Hughes demanded the pay roll of the executive officers of the Mutual Co. This was produced and showed the salaries of these officers since 1877. For the year 1904 President McCurdy received \$150,000, two vice-presidents were paid \$50,000 each; a second vice-president \$17,500, the third vice-president \$10,000, and the general manager \$25,000, who will this year receive \$30,000, and the treasurer \$30,000.

Robert McCurdy said he never knew the salary of his father until to-day, when he heard it read in the committee room. He thought, however, that there should be no limit to the salary of such positions, because they should be in accordance with the accumulations of the company.

President's Salary. When asked if it was any benefit to the policyholders to increase the president's salary, Mr. McCurdy said he thought the trustees had considered that when they increased the president's salary. No increase, however, had ever been considered when he was present at the trustees' meetings.

During Mr. McCurdy's testimony it was brought out that George Raymond, a brother of Chas. H. Raymond, was the general agent for Northern New York, with an office in Albany, and that all business of large magnitude was built up on that principle.

ORANGEMEN, TWO UNBIDDEN WILL JOIN IN GREY PARADE

Indignation at Way Brethren Have Been Treated Finds Expression in This Move.

Winnipeg, Oct. 6.—(Special).—There will be considerable doings in the vicarage reception parade to-morrow night if the Orangemen adhere to their present intention of taking part in the torchlight procession, altho unbidden. Papers to-day contained the following notice:

"All loyal Orangemen and Orange Young Britons are hereby requested to meet at Scott Memorial Hall to-morrow evening at 7.30 o'clock to consider the advisability of taking part in the loyal demonstration to Lord Grey, representative in Canada of His Most Gracious Majesty Edward VII, being your regalia and badges. This notice is inserted by E. H. Williams, a member of L.O.L., 1520."

Williams states that the Orangemen of the city have received no invitation from the city or from the general reception committee in charge of the welcome to the Governor-General of Canada.

When Earl Grey arrives to-morrow night there will be fully 600 Orangemen at the city hall, and the Williams, to tender him the heartiest of welcomes, and incidentally to find out why loyal Orangemen were not invited to take part in the organized demonstration. The matter was thoroughly discussed at a meeting of the committee last night and considerable indignation was expressed by the brethren at the way in which the Orangemen have been treated. Every Orangeman in Winnipeg wishes to participate in the parade to-morrow night.

"It seems strange that German, Scottish, English, Welsh, Hebrew, Scandinavian, Icelandic, and French Canadian societies should be asked to take part in the procession and not the Orangemen, who are the most loyal subjects to King Edward in the whole Dominion."

The only other two Ontario members whose names have been seriously mentioned in connection with cabinet recognition are Archie Campbell, M.P., and W. S. Calvert, M.P. One or other of these gentlemen will certainly be appointed to the cabinet if the time is not considered opportune for taking in Mr. Aylesworth.

Sir William Mulock's plans for the future are uncertain. If, as our correspondents state, he will not live in England, this circumstance eliminates the one really big office that is within the gift of the government. Perhaps Sir William would not mind going on the bench, and in fact some of his friends have been heard to say that a judicial position would not be distasteful to him.

Disclaims Antagonism To Public Ownership

With regard to my report on the Northwest and the suggestion that you take the trouble to read the document, it may, perhaps, surprise you to find that you, as well as the editors of some other newspapers, have been misled by marbled extracts. With regard to the second head of my report, I do not intend to initiate any campaign against municipal ownership of anything, and I have no intention of making any public statement on the subject. These remarks were made in a public meeting, and naturally without the qualifications which even on the spur of the moment I could not possibly be regarded as "initiating a campaign."

WORLD'S MARK BY ROSEBEN

Remarkable Race by Top Weight at Belmont—Summaries and Entries.

New York, Oct. 6.—C. Johnson's Roseben, carrying the heavy impost of 147 lbs., made a new world's record for six furlongs, circular track, when he won the Manhattan Handicap at Belmont Park today.

Members who had neither spoken nor voted against the bill were just as responsible for the passing as those who actually voted.

A great deal had been said about a round robin. He didn't see that it made any difference whether members signed one or not, but on principle he, himself, never signed round robins. The matter was to be decided by the House, and he decided by parliament, so why was there need for a member to bind himself?

"I have only this to say," said Mr. Foster, "there is no other way to take action on such a question than by a vote of parliament."

Very agreeable, remarked an interrupter. "It is rejoined Mr. Foster with complacent good humor. He went on to compare the \$250,000 which that given members of the United States congress who got \$5000 and \$1000 additional for clerical help. As to the objection that some of the members could not earn more than \$600 a year in private pursuits, Mr. Foster asserted that the blame rested upon the constituencies which elected such men.

A resolution of thanks to Mr. Foster was then moved, in which the charge that North Toronto Conservatives were not satisfied with their member's course was refused. Mr. Foster in reply said he believed his work in parliament was approved.

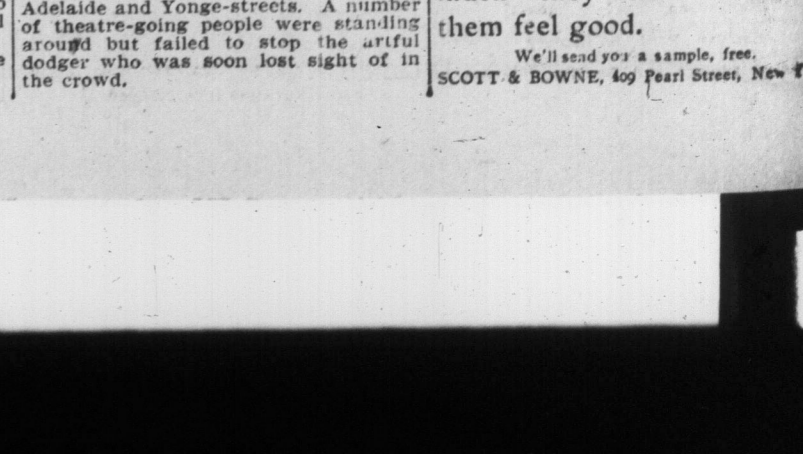
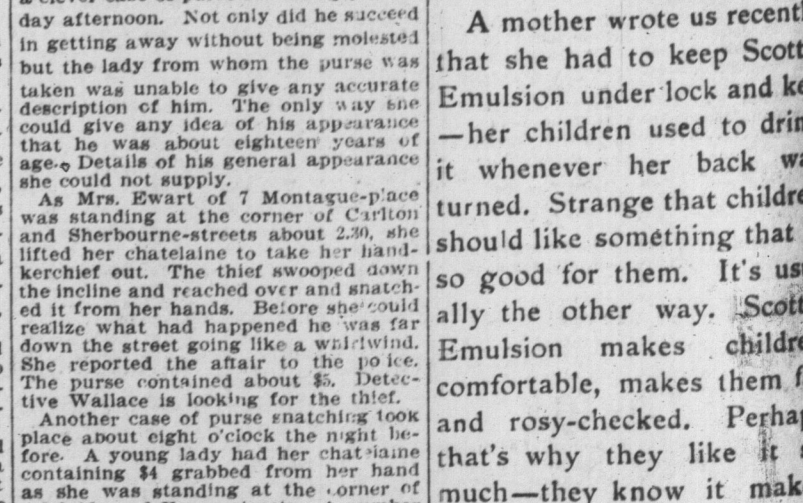

CHANGE TO WIELD THE AX EVERYONE NOT MOLLIFIED

Many Conservatives Think Premier Takes Too Firm a Stand on Patronage Question.

While Premier Whitney has evidently succeeded in mollifying some of the patronage committee of the City of Toronto there is a great deal of talk outside this circle about the mode of dispensing patronage, or probably it would be well to say, of withholding patronage, for there does not appear to have been very much said. A prominent Conservative speaking to The World yesterday, said:

"It is all right enough for Mr. Whitney to talk that way, but if he wants to do the square thing he can dismiss some of the fellows against whom it is not necessary to bring formal charges of offensive partisanship. Take the case of Hartyet, for instance, who is out now. Would anyone expect that it would be necessary to formulate charges against the police magistrate who sat in with Byron Lot and Shibley in the West Hastings ballot-box case? And there are other men who are equally as guilty as Hartyet. Why not dismiss them the day following Mr. Whitney's taking the reins of office."

"He could also, if he wanted to, without having to find any ground for dismissal, dismiss the men who were appointed by the defunct government since Jan. 25 of this year, in the case of the jailor of St. Catharines. The patronage committee of Lincoln County called upon Mr. Whitney to dismiss this man who had been thrown into the office a day or so before Mr. Whitney was called by the lieutenant-governor."

It is also asserted by Conservatives on the other side of the city that Mr. Whitney did not provide positions for Conservatives, but he has actually put Liberals into good positions after turning down Conservative applicants.

As the situation is today no Conservative cares to bring direct charges against any of the office-holders of the Ontario government.

"HUSTLE" AT VARSITY.

S. P. S. Men Join in Scrap and Wrest a Noble Victory.

The annual "hustle" which initiates the arts freshmen into the mysteries of Varsity life took place on the university campus yesterday. This is usually an affair in which the arts students alone are concerned, but on this occasion the School of Practical Science boys made things exceedingly lively by joining in the scrap.

The "hustle" assembled in the Y.M.C.A. building at 2 p.m. and after tastefully decorating each other's faces with burnt cork and robbing themselves in strange raiment they marched up to the campus to the tune of "John Brown's Body," sung by themselves. Soon after they reached the field the sophomores arrived, carrying the flag which was to be the trophy of the day. It was at this point that the gentlemen from S.P.S. arrived and expressed their intention of participating in the row. This announcement settled all differences between the arts men, and it became a contest between Arts and S.P.S. In the first rush Arts carried the flag almost to their goal, but the S.P.S. men held the sides of the ravine south of the gymnasium, and it became a matter of an hour's hard struggling. The S.P.S. forced the Arts men back to the campus, and from there they carried the flag on a victorious way down to their own building, this giving them the victory.

NEXT YEAR'S FAIR DATES ARE AUG. 27 TO SEPT. 10

New Process and Implement Buildings to Be Erected Without Avoidable Delay.

At a meeting of the exhibition board, held yesterday, it was decided, on motion of President McNaught, that the dates of the next exhibition should be from Monday, Aug. 27, to Monday, Sept. 10. The report of the executive committee was adopted as follows: That three dozen booklets, each containing thirty photographic views taken upon the exhibition grounds this year, be prepared at a cost not to exceed \$35,000 and be sent to prominent people in the empire. That the plans submitted for the process of manufacturing the permanent buildings be adopted and the same be forwarded to the board of control for their approval. The committee recommended that the building be constructed as follows: Walls either of brick or concrete, blocked off in wood stables with a metal covering; design to be in keeping with the present permanent buildings now upon the exhibition grounds. That the board of control be requested to secure the necessary permits for the removal of buildings should be removed by any labor, and the lumber in the buildings saved for future uses in Exhibition Park, either to repair present buildings or to be used in the construction of others. That the executive committee be authorized to amend bylaws making them conform with the act passed at the last session of the Legislature, amending the act incorporating the Industrial Exhibition Association of Toronto, and to report such changes to the board.

LIKES TORONTO.

Tidy Condition of Streets Impresses Touring New Zealander.

E. G. Johnston and daughter of New Zealand are in Toronto on a tour of the world, which they will complete by going west to Vancouver and thence home.

The thing that impressed me most in Toronto was the clean state of the streets in most parts of the city," said Mr. Johnston. "Tho, if I say it myself, the streets of the cities of New Zealand are much wider, and I believe better kept. Another thing that impressed me since my stay in Canada is the distinct difference in speech and customs of the Canadian people. I have visited nearly all the colonies and I find that there is a great extent influenced by old country methods and manner of speech, while the Canadian cities I have visited have a more distinctly democratic and Americanized."

HEALTH OF THE U. S. ARMY SHOWS SOME IMPROVEMENT

Washington, Oct. 6.—Surgeon-General O'Reilly has submitted an exhaustive report on the health conditions of the United States army. The report says that the military strength of the army, as shown upon the returns of the military secretary, was 69,138. There were 78,866 "admissions to the sick report" during the year. 406 deaths from all causes and 1877 discharges for disability. The figures show a steady and progressive improvement in the health of the army. As to the causes of death, pneumonia advanced to first place and tuberculosis is second.

Comparisons with foreign armies show that the highest rate of admissions is in the American army, and the lowest in the Russian. The highest death rate was in the American army, and the lowest in the Prussian.

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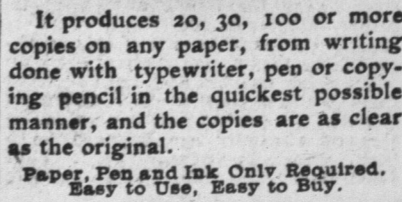
