

TRADE IN CANADA.

Ontario - Encouraging Signs in Industrial Circles.

Ontario-Encouraging Signs in Industrial Circles.

New York, Oct. 2.—Higher prices for some varieties of produce have stimulated trade in the Province of Ontario, from which Toronto jobbers have reaped benefit. Trade at Montreal is only moderately active, but shipments of flour and applies to Europe are heavy. There is no increase in the volume of business at Hallfax. The Nova Scotia potnto yield is very large, but the quantity gathered will be small. Notwithstanding bountiful crops in Prince Edward Island, trade is not stimulated, because prices are low. Bank clearings at Winnipeg, Hamilton, Torosito, Montreal and Halifax amount to \$18,623(000) this week, compared with \$19,792(000) last week and with \$20,541,000 in the corresponding week last year. Two years ago the total was \$22,710,000. Total business failures throughout the Dominion of Canada amount to 1651 for the nine months, an increase of 315 compared with the corresponding period of 1895.

Failures for the quarter show liabilities 11.1 per cent. less, amounting to \$73.—285,349, against \$97,809,682 in the previous half year. Manufacturing liabilities were \$22,479,196, or 37 per cent. greater than in the same quarter of 1893, while trading was \$28,788,217. and "other commercial" were \$12,067,236. To this must be added \$11,712,960, liabilities in 50 bank fallures, making, exclusive of railways, nearly \$85,000,000 for a single quarter.

In only six quarters in 22 years have defaulted liabilities been as large. The ratio to solvent business has been \$6.06 per \$1000, against \$2,34 for the same quarter last year. The proportion of increase has been greatest in the Western States, both in amount and in average islabilities per failure, and much larger in manufacturing than 1 n trading.
