

SOME SAMPLE DESPATCHES

Fire-Eating Correspondents Are Determined to Bring on War. The Gloomiest Quarter, However, Has Regard to China. Installation of Russia at Port Arthur a Blow to British Prestige—"The Open Door" an Idle, Conjuring Phrase—Japan Gone Over to Russia? France Must Call Off Her Dogs in Africa.

Washington, March 26.—The President's proposed intervention by sending food supplies purchased with American money is very distasteful to the insurgents. It is looked upon as another scheme for delay and one that will be of inestimable benefit to the Spanish soldiers.

Another correspondent writes from Washington to The Buffalo Courier that the President will get it a fairer to get a quarter of a million of dollars for any starting Cuba. He will get the money. The supplies will be sent. It is Spain's loss, the supplies will be sent, anyway, and that's all there is to it. If Spain objects, the court of inquiry has reported that 207 American sailors were killed in the battleship Maine in the harbor at Havana, and McKinley has told Spain that he will send a fleet to Cuba. The court of inquiry has discovered that the Maine was blown up by an internal explosion. It is not for a layman to say how or when, or if the explosion was accidental or intentional.

Another correspondent writes from London that the British government will not be injured by the account of the current four months of diplomacy in the far east shows decisive gains for Germany, Russia and France, but nothing for England except paper prestige and a joint loan, which is a failure in London and a striking success in Berlin. It is not strange that practical Englishmen consider sea power without armed diplomacy a reed shaken by the wind, and "the open door" an idle conjuring phrase.

CAN'T OUST THE GOVERNMENT

Sir Oliver Mowat Says City Has No Right to Russell Square. And Mayor Shaw Will Probably Not Bring Suit—His Worship Has Grippe—Ald. Woods Will Drop the "Label"—The City and Railroads.

The Ontario Government is impregnable in its position regarding Russell Square and cannot be ousted by the city of Toronto. Such is the opinion of no less an authority than Sir Oliver Mowat, His Honor's recently intimated Mayor Shaw that during the days of his legislative activity he looked thoroughly into this case in all its bearings, and arrived at the conclusion that, whatever prior right to proprietorship the city may have had, that the latter has so far neglected to enforce its rights as to have lost its opportunity of hitting back, and hitting hard.

THE RAINY RIVER RAILWAY.

Canada's transportation problem is again before Parliament. Another opportunity is presented for getting the railway question on national lines, as far as the Rainy River Railway is concerned. Ontario and Eastern Canada, even as much as Manitoba, are interested in securing cheap transportation to and from the Rainy River country and Manitoba. In order to secure competition, which alone can guarantee reasonable rates, the Government must make it a condition of the granting of any bonus to the Ontario and Rainy River Railway that running rights over it be accorded

George E. Foster, Sir Adolphe Caron, Hon. John G. Gossigan, Sir C. H. Tupper, Hon. John G. Hazegart, W. B. Ives, Sir John Carling, Sir Frank Smith, Hon. J. F. Wood, Hon. N. Clarke Wallace, Hon. J. C. Patterson, Hon. R. M. Daly, Hon. A. R. Angus and Hon. J. J. Curran, members of the late Conservative Cabinet, for \$1041, being the amount of an account for flowers furnished for the funeral of the late Right Honourable Sir John Thompson, by the late W. H. Davidson of Montreal. Circular No. 212 was received at the Grand Trunk offices here on Saturday from the office of the general freight agent in Montreal.

(4) Where the property is to be delivered at a point other than the original shipping point, the actual cost of cartage, when handled by the company's cartage agents, is to be added to the rate of cartage or switching, from the railway station to the cold storage warehouse and back, to be charged in addition to the stop-charge of 20 cents per 100 lbs.

(5) When a storage point is not in the direct run from the original point of shipment to Montreal, an additional charge of one cent per 100 lbs. for every 20 miles or thereabouts, to be added to the stop-charge, for the additional haul out of the direct run.

(6) Where the storage point is not in the direct run, and the rate from the storage point to Montreal is higher than that of the original point of shipment, the higher rate shall apply, plus the stop-charge, and one cent per 100 lbs. for every 20 miles or part thereof out of the direct run.

(7) This arrangement is intended to enable exporters to concentrate their shipments at cold storage points for the purpose of storage, inspection, and reshipment, and is not intended and must not be applied when re-shipments in quantities of less than 5000 lbs.

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

Dominion Estimates Laid Table Last Evening

A Small Decrease in Consolidated Account—Yukon Government estimated to Cost Over \$300,000.

Ottawa, March 28.—(Special).—The House rose to-night Mr. F. H. C. Stewart, Minister of Finance, laid before the House the Dominion Estimates for the year ending next week.

The total amount for 1918-19 is \$71, a decrease of \$1,000,000 from 1917-18. The chief increase is of government of the Yukon district, \$300,000, an entirely new item for operating expenses.

Salaries of immigration agents are increased by an equivalent of \$1,000,000. The appropriation vote is \$1,000,000. Militia clothing increased \$600,000 from \$1,000,000.

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
