Ready to Fight Russia, Who is Hatred, He Says, by Mussulmans, With a Bitter Hatred.

London, March 9.—(5.42 p.m.)—The Amer of Afghanistan has authorized his agent in London to publish the following statement of the policy of Afghanistan towards Great Britain and Russia. After saying that he had devoted much anxious thought to the possibility of Russia, taking advantage of the transit of the Afghan army through Afghanistan in India, His Highness adds: "I have come to the conclusion that Russia feared Afghanistan, as a war with the British would mean the loss of the Mussulman countries she has conquered in the East. There is No Room on the Monterey for the 120 Men to Fill Gap in First Contingent.
