SPECTACLE AND THRILLS
PROVIDE A GREAT PROGRAM
AT THE MILITARY TOURNEY

First Night Attendance Spoiled by Rain, But the Events Are All Good and Crowds Should Be Out To-Night.

The opening of the sixth military tournament at the armories last night was marred to some extent by weather conditions, which did not tend themselves to the large attendance which the merits of the entertainment provided easily deserved.

The tournament was a splendid success, presenting a well-varied program, and one that included a number of spectacular and picturesque features, foremost among which was the artillery drive, which has lost none of its old-time power to thrill.

The evening opened with the stirring spectacle of a "march past" participated in by squadrons of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, Governor-General's Body Guards, 8th Mississauga Cavalry, 9th Field Battery, and detachments of the Royal Canadian Regiment, Queen's Own Rifles, Royal Grenadiers, 48th Highlanders, Royal Canadian Engineers, Field Company Canadian Engineers, Army Service Corps, and Army Medical Corps.

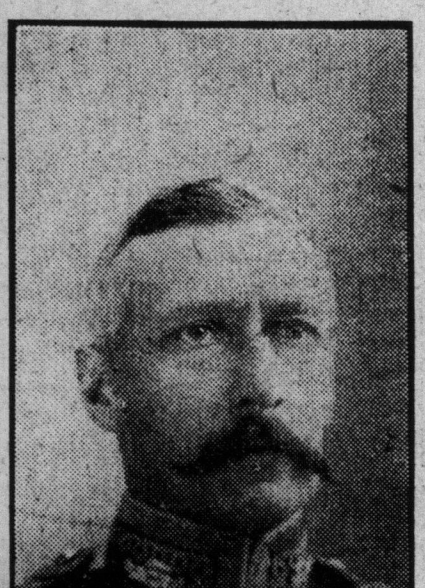
After a circuit of the tan-barked enclosure, cavalry and infantry found in column, and saluted his honor. The movements were performed with snap and precision. Wrestling on horseback. The horseback wrestling savored much of comedy, but the participants were grimly in earnest. The first tussle was between four-year-olds of the 9th Mississauga Horse and the R.C.H.A. third team. Meeting in the centre of the enclosure, the singed out their foemen, and, as well as the rearing and side-stepping of their charges would allow, grappled in fierce conflict.

SENATORS FAVOR
CLOSURE IN
COMMONS

Believe That Too Much Time is Wasted—The "Hansard" Reports Partly Blamed.

OTTAWA, May 13.—(Special.)—The adoption of the closure was advocated by Senators MacMillan and G. W. Ross to-day in discussing a resolution of the former to invite the commons to consider the advisability of arranging a more equal division of legislation between the two houses and the adoption of rules governing debate which will limit the time of discussion.

The length of sessions was becoming a serious matter, and was likely to have a serious effect upon the character of parliament, making the test men of the country unwilling to serve as members. In the last years of Liberal opposition the Liberals had only filled 49,828 columns of Hansard at a cost of \$27,501, while in the ten years of Conservative opposition the Conservatives had filled \$4,440, or nearly twice as much, and at a cost of \$25,002.

The opposition in the commons has become unreasonable and prolonged and blocked the transaction of business to such an extent that the time appeared to have come for the adoption of some such system of closure as the commons had adopted in 1852 in consequence of Irish tactics.

Senator Macdonald of British Columbia was of the opinion that two things chiefly lightened the session, and these were the undue use of time in committee of the whole, the other was want of frankness on the part of ministers, who apparently failed to realize that they were not the trustees of the people.

For class B, two ballots were received. The first ballot was ineffective, Richardson dropping out with 66 votes, Whitesides had 113, 4 short of election, and Macdonald 78. On the second poll Whitesides had 136 and Macdonald 96 votes. The nominations were as follows:

Passengers Make Up His Fare—Cannon's Extradition Ordered—Band Concert Arranged.

Col. J. M. Gibson says he has not received any notification either officially or unofficially of his appointment as Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario. If appointed he will retire from the presidency of the Dominion Power & Transmission Company.

The hospital governors to-day declining the work on the Southern Home for Incurable Consumptives stopped. They said the council could do so if the city was prepared to pay all the costs that would be incurred by a change of location. The Hamilton Health Association to erect a tent on the hospital grounds for eight cases of incurable consumptives, six of which are now being looked after in the city hospital.

HODGINS ON THE STAND

BACKS UP HIS CHARGES. Everything Well Until January, 1907, When G. T. P. Engineer Objected to July Estimates.

OTTAWA, May 13.—The Major Hodgins charges of fraud and over-classification in connection with the transcontinental railway again occupied the investigating committee this morning. Resolutions were passed calling for the production of various papers bearing on this subject from the Transcontinental Railway Commission and the government departments concerned.

There was a long argument in regard to the production of certain papers which were asked for by the committee. Major Hodgins charges, E. M. Macdonald, M.P., thought that when Major Hodgins undertook to malign public men he should have had the facts in his possession to back up his statements.

Charles Murphy, counsel for the commission, argued that Major Hodgins should be able to prove his charges against Mr. Parent and others, and that Major Hodgins should give evidence at once. The Conservative members of the committee and Major Hodgins' counsel considered that he should be allowed to handle his case in his own way.

At noon, however, the major took the stand. He had been employed, he said, for three years in railway construction work in district F of the Transcontinental Railway between Winnipeg and Lake Superior Junction, and prior to that had engaged in similar work in Ontario, British Columbia, Maine, Mexico and other countries. The section was originally estimated to cost \$13,000,000, and on this basis the contract was given to the major. He had advanced this cost to \$11,600,000. This would not include track laying. The contract for construction work was let to the McArthur.

Major Hodgins gave some particulars in relation to his staff and noted that his assistant, J. A. Robertson, was in the employ of the transcontinental commission. He said everything worked well until January, 1907, when the Grand Trunk Pacific engineers appeared on the line and objected to the July estimates. It came out by the appointment of a committee of engineers who had been objected to by Major Hodgins on the ground that the promotion was over his head, that there were direct and divisional engineers engaged to build any road, and that the G.T.P. inspecting engineer was co-operating with the district.

Major Hodgins said that he had visited all the principal points on the line and seen the work. However, when he found complaints as to slow engineering he perceived that office work had taken too much of his time and that advertising had been taken of his absence from the field.

About July the G.T.P. inspecting engineer began to make complaints as to classification. Mr. McArthur, he explained as to classification, but he found it hard to get him down to specific incidents when he had mentioned places he took steps to have the line in question re-measured.

The hearing sitting will be held on Tuesday afternoon.

HODGINS ON THE STAND

BACKS UP HIS CHARGES. Everything Well Until January, 1907, When G. T. P. Engineer Objected to July Estimates.

OTTAWA, May 13.—The Major Hodgins charges of fraud and over-classification in connection with the transcontinental railway again occupied the investigating committee this morning. Resolutions were passed calling for the production of various papers bearing on this subject from the Transcontinental Railway Commission and the government departments concerned.

There was a long argument in regard to the production of certain papers which were asked for by the committee. Major Hodgins charges, E. M. Macdonald, M.P., thought that when Major Hodgins undertook to malign public men he should have had the facts in his possession to back up his statements.

Charles Murphy, counsel for the commission, argued that Major Hodgins should be able to prove his charges against Mr. Parent and others, and that Major Hodgins should give evidence at once. The Conservative members of the committee and Major Hodgins' counsel considered that he should be allowed to handle his case in his own way.

At noon, however, the major took the stand. He had been employed, he said, for three years in railway construction work in district F of the Transcontinental Railway between Winnipeg and Lake Superior Junction, and prior to that had engaged in similar work in Ontario, British Columbia, Maine, Mexico and other countries. The section was originally estimated to cost \$13,000,000, and on this basis the contract was given to the major. He had advanced this cost to \$11,600,000. This would not include track laying. The contract for construction work was let to the McArthur.

Major Hodgins gave some particulars in relation to his staff and noted that his assistant, J. A. Robertson, was in the employ of the transcontinental commission. He said everything worked well until January, 1907, when the Grand Trunk Pacific engineers appeared on the line and objected to the July estimates. It came out by the appointment of a committee of engineers who had been objected to by Major Hodgins on the ground that the promotion was over his head, that there were direct and divisional engineers engaged to build any road, and that the G.T.P. inspecting engineer was co-operating with the district.

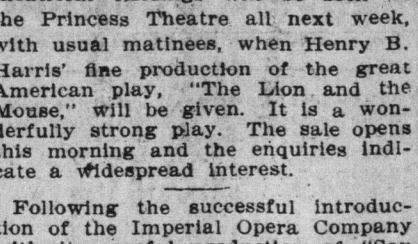

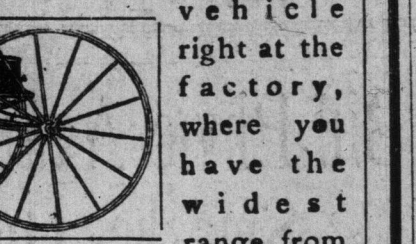

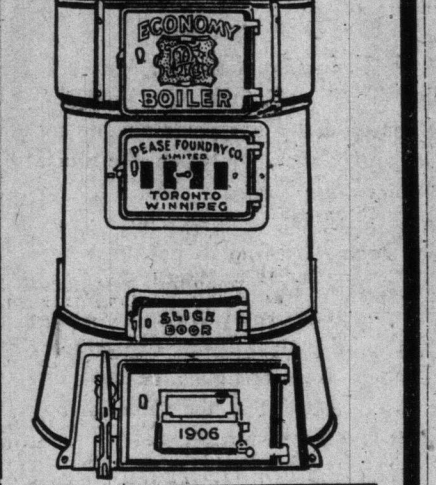
