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## ANNUAL MEETING,

February 19th, 1891.

The 54th Annual Meeting of the Grande Ligne Mission was held on the 19th day of February, 1891, at 3 o'clock P.M., in the French Baptist Church, ("The Oratoire") Mance Street, Montreal.

Rev. A. G. Upham, President, in the Chair.

The Minutes of the last Annual Meeting were read and adopted.

The Secretary, Rev. T. Lafleur, read the Annual Report which dealt largely with the progress of the Mission during the last decade.

The Treasurer, Mr. Joseph Richards, presented the Annual Report of receipts and expenditures which exhibited a considerable increase.

The Treasurer of the Building and Endowment Fund, Mr. John McKergow, presented the Annual Reports showing the present position of that Fund.

Both reports had been duly audited and on motion were accepted and ordered to be published with the Annual Report.

Dr. Saunders of Halifax, N.S., who had been nominated by the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces as a member of the Board, sent a letter proposing that their Board would make over to the Grande Ligne Mission properties in a French settlement belonging to their Convention on condition of certain Mission work being carried out therein.

This matter was referred to the new Board.

Mr. W. A. Scott gave notice that "In accordance with the requirements of By-Law VII, notice is hereby given of a motion which will be presented at the next Annual Meeting to alter By-Law III in reference to the qualification of members."

In affectionate words the President, Rev. A. G. Upham, gave his retiring address, which was enthusiastically received and ordered to be printed with the Annual Report.

On motion by the Rev. A. L. Therrien the following Resolution was unanimously adopted.

Whereas.—The Rev. A. G. Upham declines renomination to the Board of Directors;

Resolved.—That the members of the Grande Ligne Mission in general and of the retiring Board in particular, express to Mr. Upham their profound regret that the pressure of his pastoral work

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makes it necessary for him to retire from the Board, and that we record and express to him our gratitude for the very valuable services he, for the last seven years, has rendered the Society, during which time as the honored and beloved President of the Board, he has served with promptness, ability and dignity the cause which we here represent.

Before proceeding to the election of the New Board the retiring President drew attention to the desirability of electing a few representative members among friends and helpers at a distance, such as the Maritime Provinces, Ontario and Quebec City, while of necessity the majority of members must be in this City, which is the centre of operations.

On Friday morning the Missionaries and Officers met for Prayer and Conference.

Plans were made for Colporteur work and Evangelistic effort on a much larger scale than has heretofore been possible.

The great need of spiritual power was felt by all and was the subject of earnest prayer.

The Missionaries and Colporteurs left for their fields of labor much encouraged and benefitted, by this the largest and best of all our Annual Meetings. REV.

#### STUDIES.

No fixed course of study is prescribed, but the following studies are pursued by the pupils arranged in four general classes.

Class A.—Bible, French, English, Ollendorf, cours de lang a Anglaise, Arithmetic, Writing.

Class B.—Bible, French, Geography, History of Canada, Arithmetic, English, Writing, Compositions and Recitations in French and English.

Class C.—Bible, French Grammar and Reading, English Grammar and Reading, History of Canada, Arithmetic, Algebra, Geography, Latin, Book-keeping (elective), Writing and Drawing, Compositions and Recitations in French and English.

Class D.—Bible, French Grammar and Literature, English Grammar and Literature, English History, Algebra, Geometry, Latin, Greek, Compositions and Recitations in French and English.

The School opens early in October and closes by the first of May.

Preference is given to French pupils, especially those from Roman Catholic families. A very limited number of English pupils is received. When more extensive accommodations are provided, and the applications from French pupils can be overtaken, a liberal course of study may be provided for English students.

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## ANNUAL REPORT

OF

# The Grande-Ligne Mission.

Upon entering the last decade of the century, and asking ourselves, (looking a little ahead) as to what may be the state of the work of the mission at the beginning of the twentieth century, when several of its present directors and workers will probably have ended their earthly career, it is also natural to look back ten years to measure as far as we may what has been accomplished within the sphere of our labors.

We know nothing of the future, and really but a little of the past, still that little is sufficient, both to our physical and mental eye, to encourage us to pursue those labors, which it has pleased the Lord to acknowledge and to bless, in a manner at times marvellous in our eyes. Without despising statistics, your reporter is one of many who records them, and puts the exact figures down on paper, whilst making a liberal discount in his mind as to their real value. He is thus prepared to meet the under valuation of those who may not be in sympathy with the cause he works for, or the mode of his operations.

It is very easy to understand that in a work of religious, moral and spiritual Reformation, appreciations will vary according to the moral and spiritual standard of the examiner himself. Some statisticians number souls more or less developed, and others measure their value.

We who have followed with interest and with laborious co-operation the work of the Grande Ligne Mission for many years, some of us nearly from its beginning, and most of us for the last ten years, look upon this short lapse of time with sincere gratitude to God, for what He has wrought by His mighty spirit through our imperfect labors.

The Report of 1881, speaking of the year just elapsed, says: "In the spiritual as in the natural world there are years when the harvest does not correspond to the amount of labor bestowed on the field. The year 1880, has been such a one, though the missionaries have never labored more faithfully for the Master." This sad note was given perhaps from the remembrance that in the previous year a remarkable revival had taken place at Grande Ligne, when on a single occasion, thirty persons, young and old, had made profession of their conversion by baptism, and a little later on, thirteen more, as a result of that work of grace.

In the material aspect however, there was a remarkable result. The Feller Institute at Longueuil was sold at great advantage and rebuilt at Grande Ligne to concentrate our teaching labors there. The commanding building had been dedicated only a few months when our old missionary, Mr. Roussy, was called to his great reward. Though quite feeble, he was able to attend at the service of dedication on the 1st of July. Forty years before, Madame Feller and himself, with hearts overflowing with gratitude and hopes, had seen the "old house" dedicated to the service of Him who had sent them to begin this work. Mr. Roussy lingered four months and died suddenly.

After the death of Mr. Roussy the Grande Ligne Church was left pastorless. Influences were brought to bear on Mr. Therrien, who had been during the previous winter, the main instrument in the revival there, to become pastor of the church at Grande Ligne.

There was during that year, 1881, an aggregate of 31 baptisms, of which, 19 were at Grande-Ligne. There were also 63 admissions of pupils in the institute. Once more we had a testimony as to the far reaching results of our labors. The kev. J. N. Williams wrote:—"All the churches in the New England States—he means French Churches—are chiefly composed of those who have been brought to the knowledge of the Gospel by the Grande-Ligne Mission, many of whom have been its pupils." Yes, and a great many others, who, speaking the English language, have joined American Churches. At that time there were as yet no church buildings at Grande-Ligne or Montreal, the two principal stations

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of the Mission. At Grande-Ligne, for forty years the meetings had been held in the largest room of the Mission house, used as a double school room on week days; and many precious, blessed meetings had been held there. In Montreal, for more than twenty years, the meetings were held here and there; now in a church basement, now in a hired hall, and finally they were held in the New Jerusalem Chapel for several years.

The time had come to make a supreme effort; it was not the first, to raise money to build a church in this city, and put an end to those painful wanderings. By dint of perseverance, Ten Thousand Dollars were subscribed and partly paid, the conditional amount before beginning to build. The year 1882 saw the completion of a nice parsonage at Roxton Pond, and a very creditable church building in Montreal. We noted then a very important result, eliciting what progress had been made through our labors.

Four colporteurs were in the field, three of them students, during their vacations. Their report is this: "The people in the country are no longer the same toward the French Protestant Converts. Protestantism is now an accepted thing among the French; it is looked upon as a religion, as good as their own, and some of them even admit that it is purer, and surer to save. Some time they put the question: "Can we not remain in our church and be saved? Who can measure the progress made in the minds of the people through our labors, since the time when they looked upon our missionaries as agents of the devil, to destroy the only true religion!"

In the Report for 1883, we said: "Slowly but surely, the work of this Mission is drawing near the fiftieth anniversary of its foundation. We may say that on the whole, it has been a successful period of hard work, enough to encourage any modest laborer, and more than enough to inspire a far seeing one. It was a year of great turmoil among Roman Catholics, especially on the Laval University question, and one of several public discussions with priest and others, on the part of our laborers. Some of our students were at Woodstock, others at McGill, and one, Mr. Bracq, had just completed his theological studies at Newton. A church building was in progress at Grande-Ligne. The aggregate number of baptisms that year were thirty-nine, from the different stations.

In the new church in Montreal, (made free from debt now by a special effort of the pastor, Mr. Lafleur,) took place the four hundredth anniversary of the Reformation; it was crowded to overflowing, with an audience largely composed of educated Roman Catholics; many were unable to attend for want of room."

The year 1885 marked the fiftieth anniversary of the arrival of our missionaries, Madame Feller and Mr. Roussy, in Canada. Three days were devoted to commemorate the precious event. These were filled with the reminiscenses of the life and labors of many who had departed from our midst, and while their works followed them in the better land, the result of those labors remain to bless the spot where they lived, and to help those who continue their labors. This same year was marked by a revival of great power, in which forty conversions took place, and 36 persons were baptized. It was also during that year that a young priest, Mr. Grégoire, was converted and joined us.

The year that followed our Jubilee was marked by great activity and several changes in the personnel of pastorates in the churches, and teachers in the institution. The year 1887 was marked by other changes, in the pastorate of the Grande Ligne Church, and the resignation of Mr. and Mrs. Roux as Principals of the Institute. With sorrowing hearts here and there, the work was nevertheless pursued with vigor in most of the stations, particularly in Montreal, where the work of a frail, sickly woman was unprecedently successful in the sale and distribution of the Holy Scriptures, and in many welcome visits to Roman Catholic families. It was during that year that the idea of an Endowment Fund assumed a definite shape.

In the summer of 1888, there gathered on the banks of the beautiful Richelieu River, a company of French Protestants, which more than anything else, to casual observers, clearly indicated what progress had been made during those few years of missionary labor, the Grande Ligne Mission being the acknowledged pioneer in this work, by schools, by preaching, by writings, by colportage. More than six hundred French Protestants were there, with converted priests among them, to testify to the serious results of our labors. It need scarcely be said that those 600 were only a small portion of those who have left the Roman Church; they were chiefly those

The appearance of those people and the oratory they listened to, would have been commended by any community.

The year 1889 was in a great measure devoted to the pursuit of the serious enterprise of building and endowment by some of the business men of our Board of Directors, at the head of which, the Rev. A. G. Upham, though a pastor, has borne a large portion of the labor it entailed. The missionaries have had a share in it, though doing their habitual amount of religious work.

The churches in connection with the Mission met in Association at Grande-Ligne, on the 26th and 27th of June. Many of the laborers and former pupils exchanged greetings in the old rooms where they used to meet Mad. Feller and Mr. Roussy, little thinking that those rooms, the shrine of so many sacred memories, would, a few months hence, be entirely destroyed. During the last term of the school, some thirty young people had accepted Christ as their Saviour and had made profession by baptism.

Having fairly succeeded in the collections for the Endowment and Building Fund, the plans were already made, indeed tenders had been received for enlarging and re-modeling the old building, when on the 31st of January, 1890, it was entirely destroyed by fire. Painful as this was to us all, obliging us to close our school, because of the loss of the old house, the library, the house furniture, &c., our Board of Directors lost no time, in having other plans drawn, for a larger building, better suited in its construction to our present needs. It was with a great deal of difficulty, th + the new wing of the Institute was saved. Even when that was secured, the painful sensation of our loss came over us increased by the necessity staring us in the face, that in our delapidated state, we must disband our pupils, most of whom had lost their all All connected with the Mission set to work to repair the loss. Some deprived of their work of teaching went out collecting or preaching, supplying fields that needed it. Early in the Spring the plans were ready and materials on the ground. A whole summer of hard work and at times anxious thoughts elapsed and at last a stately building, with a remodeled and enlarged wing, all fitted up with modern improvements, with renewed out-buildings, were set apart with appropriate and most interesting services. On the 9th of October, 1890, a large number of friends of the cause, from Montreal especially, but

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During those ten years we have added from time to time, as many as seventeen missionaries to our staff of laborers, among them a converted priest; ten of whom are still among us, the others have gone to work elsewhere, especially in the United States, where many of our converts had preceded them.

From the number of conversions, that we have from year to year gratefully acknowledged, our different churches ought to show a large increase of members, as the total number of baptisms would reach nearly three hundred. But against this is the well known continual exodus to the United States, and some losses in our own vast country. We however have remaining with us a considerable increase.

In the matter of fields cultivated, or occupied more or less permanently, in spite of the competitive labors of other societies all around us, we have more than held our own; for besides the stations where we have established growing churches, such as Grande Ligne, Montreal, Ste. Marie, Roxton Pond, St. Pie and South Ely, we have occupied stations permanently at St. Johns, St. Constant, St. Philippe, Lapigeonniere, and part of the time at Clarenceville, St. Sebastien, the Ottawa Valley and Quebec, where our Evangelists have done excellent work.

A few days after the formal opening of the spacious and commodious building of the Feller Institute it was occupied by one hundred pupils, they now number one hundred and twenty-eight. The school is in full operation with the addition of some fifty more pupils than it could formerly accommodate; it is well equipped with a good staff of teachers, and by a peculiar good fortune, a whole library of choice standard French works was purchased at reduced prices.

With this imperfect survey of the last ten year's work and status, the comparison we are enabled to establish to-day, is such as to fill us with no vain glory, but with sincere gratitude to God that our position is very much better than it was then. We had then no church buildings in the two principal stations of the Mission, Montreal and Grande Ligne, and now we have in each

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place a beautiful building suited to our present wants. We have besides built three parsonages, one at Ely, one at Roxton Pond, and one at St. Pie, besides repairing the chapel in the latter place, so as to make it as good as new. With our institute buildings, these certainly present an array of strength and a promise of durability for our labors, and also larger progress if we only remain faithful to the tradition of the past.

In closing this long and hasty review of faithful, persevering, humble labors; showing very inadequate success to means employed, in the eyes of some who allow their fancy, more than cultivated reason, or experience, to judge in this great matter; we would once more insist on the fact, that the truth, the light, the leaven of the Gospel penetrate far beyond our actual acquisitions. There are very many enlightened, influenced, moralized, yea, and converted by our preaching the Gospel, who never join our churches or congregations—who remain in their church connexion, but better Christians for our influence on them. This is as good missionary work as the other, and will doubtless be accepted of our Heavenly Father.

During the year just elapsed ve have to record the death of a remarkable woman, Mrs. Normandeau. At one time she was a most prominent figure on the missionary staff, an intimate friend of Madame Feller, and for many years her co-worker at Grande-Ligne. She died at Granby on the 30th of October last, and her remains were buried at Grande-Ligne. Her husband, the Rev. Leon Normandeau, an ex-priest of the Roman Catholic Church, converted at Grande-Ligne, and one of the laborers of the Mission for a long time, survives her, in a very weak state of health, every day wishing to depart and be laid by the side of his devoted wife, near the remains of his beloved friends, Madame Feller and Mr. Roussy. Another old christian, Mrs. Therrien, the mother of Rev. A. L. Therrien, a faithful witness for the truth since her conversion from Romanism, also died at Grande-Ligne and was buried there, where her husband had also been buried.

We must also say a word of another departed one, though not a member of the church. Dr. L. Théodore Marceau, was for several winters a pupil of our Grande-Ligne Institute; has ever remained its staunch and generous friend, and a very frequent visitor there. He was called away in the prime of life, after long months of painful sufferings, patiently borne with humble christian fortitude. He has left in the world around him the example to Roman Catholics and to Protestants, of a christian gentleman, an able and devoted physician, freely giving his services to the poor, oftentimes giving them as well, nutricious luxuries their means could not procure. He spoke more by his works than by his words which were always few. May those exemplary lives help us to make ours what they may be with the help of the Lord.

#### FELLER INSTITUTE.

The school, broken up by the fire last January (1890) was re-opened however, as usual, the 14th October. Our faith could scarcely extend far enough, as we looked at the ruins, the day after the fire, to expect that at the appointed time for opening, so fine an edifice would be waiting for the anxious pupils. But during the nine intervening months, the girls' house, saved by the efforts of the pupils and friends, had been repaired, entirely remodelled and painted, while the Main building, much larger than the old one, quite modern in all its fittings and imposing in appearance, had been erected. All this was owing largely to the energy of the Board, and also to the active sympathy of a large number of friends that seemed to spring up everywhere. It is quite needless to add that we appreciate most heartily, such improvements as a good heating apparatus, gas lighting, bath rooms, lavatory and drying room, speaking tubes and dumb-waiter, and telephone between school and station. A gymnasium where the pupils could play rainy days, and good books for the library are still needed, but will be forthcoming soon we are confident.

The pupils were exceptionally prompt in coming and number at present, 112 boarders,—66 boys and 46 girls—and 16 day scholars. Of these, nine were Roman Catholics, but one of them left a fortnight after, alleging he was sick and could not study. His father, when desiring to put his son at school was reminded that probably the priest would interfere, but he replied: "the priest attends to his affairs and I to mine." It was only too evident however, that the priest did not attend to his own business.

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Another of the nine has, we trust, been truly converted. Making a late application, and being somewhat over twenty years of age, he was received into the school with hesitancy, but he has proved himself in every way worthy of our respect and confidence. We dare to hope he may eventually become a missionary.

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The young man, Roman Catholic, of whom special mention was made in the last report, decided, it appears, after buying his Bible since the fire, to renounce Romanism, and after hard and trying experiences with his family and the priest of his parish during the summer, has at last come out bright and decided for the Lord. His progress is steady and very satisfactory. Another Roman Catholic pupil seems to be yielding from week to week. He reads the Bible in secret and looks most attentively for enlightenment.

The religious interest that seemed to wane somewhat after the holidays has again revived and new voices are heard to testify in the prayer meetings. The girls' prayer meetings are especially interesting, and a society of Kings Daughters is shortly to be formed. The temperance society is active and the pledge has enrolled most of the names of the pupils.

The age and scholarship of the pupils is more varied than ever this year. A few are studying for matriculation this spring, a few for diplomas to teach in the Province, while some twelve are very beginners in everything. This gives an almost endless number of classes and proves the necessity of having either a Primary Department here, or a primary boarding school in some other of our stations.

The staff of teachers is the same as last year, save that Miss Scofield from the New England Conservatory teaches music in the place of Mrs. Miner, who resigned to work in another field. Mr. Fréchette our general help looks after the furnaces, gasmachine, &c., while his wife has charge of the bedding, linen and dormitories. Both have been efficient and helpful.

That the progress of the school may be uninterrupted and ever increasing is our daily prayer. Let all the friends pray for the young souls here intrusted to our care.

#### MONTREAL STATION.

"It is gratifying to witness the steady, though slow, development of our work here. Statistics carefully kept show from year to year a regular increase of numbers in the membership of our church and in the attendance upon its services." Thus did our report begin last year, and the statement holds good this year also.

During the year eighteen persons were added to our church, five by letter and thirteen by baptism. Five of these were once Romanists, two were converted from that faith this summer, and two others still, who were converted about the same time, are soon to confess their faith by baptism.

Amoug the many families to whom Mrs. Scott has taken the Bible there are some which are making it a subject of earnest study. Five or six of these have received us at different times when we met with them for the purpose of expounding the scriptures. These meetings were intensely interesting. The freedom and the cordiality which prevailed and pervaded the meetings, the earnestness and the evident anxiety which possessed every soul made these gatherings occasions long to be remembered. One intelligent and devout woman, mother of a family, who seemed to be hungering for the truth, has now found peace in believing, and is laboring to bring her husband into the light. While the doctrines of Romanism were freely discussed and forcibly shown to be at variance with the teachings of the Bible, the spirit which prevailed was that of charity, and each meeting closed with prayer and with the singing of hymns in which our Catholic friends heartily joined.

At our last gathering, a man who had lately married a very intelligent and dignified woman was present with her. He had been invited by his sister in whose house we had gathered, but had not been informed of the nature of the meeting which was to be held. When he found out what it was he was greatly disturbed in his mind and feared, at first, his wife would be offended. In order to free himself from any responsibility of the situation in the eyes of his wife, he manifested utter indifference in the beginning of the evening, only breaking silence to utter a joke of to raise a senseless objection. But when reproved by his sister for so doing and when he perceived that his wife was deeply interested

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and anxious to hear, he turned right around, and became not only an attentive listener, but an intelligent and earnest enquirer. When the writer, in answer to a direct question from him, explained to him the plan of salvation, and how he could just then be saved and find peace, he was evidently moved, and before we knelt in prayer, he confessed his great need of being prayed for.

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In the course of the evening this man's sister, already alluded to, expressed her wonder that she should find herself in such company and engaged in such a discussion, and at the enjoyment she was deriving from them. "What would our priests say if they knew this," she said. "But I do not care about what they would say," she added, "we used to think that Protestants only abused our church and our priests, but here you have been with us several times and we never heard you say anything abusive about them, you have only tried to teach us the truth, the way to be saved through faith in Christ, and not through our own good works. I am sure if Catholics in general knew this, many more would be glad to hear you." And yet, as was said above, besides expounding the Gospel of salvation to them, the missionary had reviewed, Bible in hand, the erroneous Romish doctrines of Peter's Supremacy, the Sacrifice of the Mass, the doctrines of Transsubstantiation, of Purgatory, of the Invocation of Saints, and of Auricular Confession. But it was given in a way not to give offence, hence the remarks quoted above.

The spirit of persecution is not as bitter as it was years ago among our Roman Catholic friends, but it has by no means died out. Whenever any of them renounce their faith to accept that of the Gospel they are sure to meet with more or less persecution and ostracism, as well as boycotting. Our brother and sister who renounced Popery last summer and united with us on the first Sunday in August were not a little surprised when, at 10 o'clock, p.m., they returned home from their baptism full of joy, and found about seventy-five persons at their door who greeted them with invectives, hooting, yelling, and throwing of mud and of sticks. But such was the behaviour of the assailed ones through it all that not many days after, one of the leaders of this band, conscience smitten, came to them, confessed his fault, and made due apology.

It is an encouraging feature in our work that Roman Catholics are frequently seen at our services. Sixteen, eighteen, and thirty

of them respectively, were seen in our congregations on baptismal occasions, and scarcely a Sunday passes without some one being present at one or both of the services.

But still we are anxious to reach more of them, and our long cherished desire to open a hall on some thoroughfare like St. Catherine or St. Lawrence Streets, which would be open at least three times a week, if not every evening is, we hope, soon to be realized.

#### GRANDE LIGNE CHURCH.

Not long after our last Annual Meeting the Pastor of the Grande Ligne Church was called away for more than two months to collect money for the Building and Endowment Fund. During his absence the pulpit was supplied by Prof. Marceau.

During the summer months we had the sorrow of losing several members of our church by removal, and they are persons whose absence will be felt. Several members of the congregation also have left the place, two have died. The first was an old lady who had been an invalid for some time; the last was a young woman of amiable character, and we trust, a true christian. She intended to join our church.

Our opportunities for reaching Roman Catholics have been somewhat more numerous than during the previous year. Not mentioning those in the school, many of the laborers employed in the building last summer attended our services occasionally. A few weeks ago, at the funeral service of the young sister mentioned above, in spite of a heavy rain, our chapel was nearly full, a good half of the audience being composed of Roman Catholics, some of the most bigoted in the neighborhood among them.

Towards the close of the summer we had a season of rejoicing, a sort of revival taking place in a quiet way among our young people. Nine of them were baptized as a result.

A few weeks ago this pleasure was renewed, two young people, husband and wife, from the field of Ste. Marie came here to be baptized, and another young couple from an out station, who were Romanists converted this summer, followed in the baptismal water.

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Then three persons who reside in the Institute came forward to profess their faith in the same way, making altogether fourteen baptisms in this station. There are more to follow.

#### ST. MARIE.

This is, we trust, the last report when we shall have to say that this important station is without a settled pastor. The Church has called our esteemed missionary, Rev. A. J. Lebeau, and we expect before this report is printed, he will have accepted the call.

During the Winter and Spring the services were held fortnightly. Mr. W. S. Bullock was employed during his summer vacation from Newton, and services were held every Lord's Day. This is one of our most promising fields. There are a large number of young people, who have been students at Grande Ligne, and who are now ready to be influenced for good, and we trust the new pastor will reap an abundant harvest.

Some members of the Church are men of means and influence in the place and we are hopeful that this will soon be one of our strongest French Protestant Churches in Canada. Your Secretary has had the pleasure of preaching there several times during the year, and occasionally to very large audiences, consisting very largely of Roman Catholics, among whom were the most influential men in the community. Some of these went so far as to express themselves as "delighted with the services." On two funeral occasions the Church was filled and even crowded with as many Catholics as Protestants. The missionary needs to use great care in dealing with Catholics, and at the same time to give them the Gospel. The reading of a few passages of scripture, the most simple expressions of the Christian faith in the great salvation manifested in Christ and the glorious resurrection, is enough to enlighten the mind and awaken the soul. After one of these services, two prominent and educated men of the village, said to one of the members residing there. "How beautiful such a service. What a cheering prospect for such as we miserable, mortal creatures. We never have such comforting words at our burial services, only dull Latin chanting." Surely such souls are ready to be reached with the message of the Gospel.

#### ST. PIE.

This Church is under the care of our esteemed missionary, Rev. A. J. Lebeau, who has spent much of his time during the last few years in collecting for the mission, but the field has not been neglected. Other missionaries, principally Mr. Brouillete has supplied his place during his absence. Two preaching services are held each Sabbath, also a Sunday School. Attendance varies all the way from 15 to 75, and from 15 to 20 children attend the Sunday School. In the village a Club has been formed of six of the most respectable citizens. At their meetings religious questions are discussed. Each of these men has a Bible, and is posted somewhat as to its teachings, and whenever they go to Church they take their Bibles and compare the priest's with the Apostolic teaching. So far it has been intellectual searching, but we trust it will turn into a spiritual one. The missionary has seen them and spoken kindly but strongly. Their reply was, that they would be crushed to the ground and lose their business if they became Protestants, and so they must wait. We trust they will not wait too long for their own souls. There are men in the community who have gone to the Priest and asked him to prove to them if there was a Purgatory.

We see by these things that there is independence of thought dawning among the Catholics, and each year the way is opening for us to give them the Gospel.

We have only to report one received by baptism and one by letter, but we are thankful that there has been no decrease. Eight pupils from this field are attending the Grande Ligne School and two at Pointe-au-Trembles. Two of those attending Grande Ligne are the children of Roman Catholics.

Temporal things are in good order. The chapel has been repaired and a Parsonage has been built, which was very much needed.

#### ROXTON POND.

This Church is under the pastoral care of our missionary, Rev. T. Brouillete, who says "Roxton has, especially during the last two years, lost some of its former prospects and has not fulfilled our hopes. At one time the congregations gradually the per French Catholic so they where become in the evange

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increased so that the small chapel was not large enough to hold the people attending services. History has repeated itself in this French village. The Protestants feel the pressure of Roman Cathonicism and the want of suitable opportunities in Canada, and so they emigrate to the States. If some plan could be adopted whereby these people could be kept at home until the cause becomes stronger, the Protestant community would become bolder in the expression of their convictions and also more ready to evangelize their Catholic neighbors."

It has been a sore trial to our much esteemed and devoted missionary, to lose some of his most intelligent and promising families and young people, but he consoles himself in the fact that in the neighboring Republic, there are French Protestant business men, Dentists, Physicians, Musicians and Ministers, who were brought to a knowledge of the truth on his field, and are now having influence with their neighbors, and so spreading the truth where they live.

Though the congregation has been diminished, they still fairly fill the chapel, and with the help of Colporteurs and the probable coming of an Evangelist, we hope that brighter days are in store for our missionary and for this field.

Services have been held as usual on Sunday, and week day prayer meetings. The interest in the Sunday School is well maintained.

Collections from this field towards general expenses and towards the Endowment Fund have been liberal, and besides this they have \$117 on hand for repairs on the Chapel, or towards the building of a new one, when the time matures for that.

#### SOUTH ELY,

This Station is now under the pastoral care of Rev. M. O. Therrien, who reports much of his time devoted to the educational interest of the French Protestant families in South Ely and Lawrenceville, and in putting into proper repair the buildings and property belonging to the mission. He reports the usual emigration to the States and the difficulties in maintaining continued

interest where the families are so scattered. He speaks of the value of the day school taught by Miss Ida Dutand, who has scholars in both languages. There are 16 French Protestant families containing 80 persons at this station.

Service has been held in the Chapel every Sunday morning during the year, with attendance varying from 20 to 60. Prayer meetings have also been regularly held and a good many gatherings have taken place in families for the poor, the aged and the very young. They have a good Sunday School and the religious exercises therein are valuable in the training of the young. A large number of Catholics are accessible to the truth of the Gospel, and are yearning after something better than the religious instruction they receive in the Church of Rome.

To some extent Mr. Therrien has the spiritual care of several English families in the neighborhood who attend the services and have encouraged our missionary in his work.

#### ST. JOHNS.

This Field has been occupied during the year by our Venerable Brother Riendeau, who is very much enfeebled in body and mind, and really now unable to perform any missionary work. Since our annual meeting, the Board have appointed Rev. J. Gregoire (ex-Priest) to this field, where it is hoped he may obtain a congregation and be of considerable influence, as his relatives and friends reside in that district. It is also expected that he will be able to do some evangelistic work, as although a man who speaks in a very quiet manner, the fact of his having been a priest and his peculiar experience, has a great influence upon all French speaking people. The Catholics feel that he is living a life which they know nothing about, and the truth seems to shine out from his soul as he so gently speaks words of truth to them. May God grant that this prominent point in our missionary field, so near to Grand Ligne, and on which a great deal of labor has already been spent, may become abundantly fruitful.

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#### ST. CONSTANT, ST. PHILLIPE AND ST. MICHEL.

This large field, with the families much scattered, is under the care of our young missionary, Mr. Jacques Cesan. He is working under difficulties owing to the want of a proper house of worship and also the lack of Protestant day schools. The work has been regularly carried on, as far as weather, roads and long distances permitted. One meeting is ordinarily held at one of the stations on Sunday, sometimes in two different places. The families are very regular in their attendance. The Sunday School is maintained at St. Phillipe. More interest is being shown in spiritual things. Some young people from the field have been baptized at Grande Ligne and others at Montreal.

Mr. Cesan says "Roman Catholics are courteous and there is more of the spirit of liberty abroad than in former years, and hence more cordial sympathy from the whole community. Sometimes the expression is heard, "Well, I think your religion is good, but mine is also good. You will be saved in yours and I in mine."

On one occasion an intelligent man asked me how many Protestants I had in the place, how many places I preached at, and what I said to them in our meetings. When he heard that I preached the Gospel of Jesus Christ, he exclaimed, quite astonished. "Do you say you believe in Jesus Christ?" Then, as briefly as possible, I made him acquainted with our faith. No doubt he had been taught that the Protestants have no religion and are infidels. I took good care to point out to him that there was really a great difference between those who follow the teaching of the Gospel and those who submit to the teaching of Romanism.

On another occasion in one of our Protestant families, I met an intelligent Roman Catholic, and after a considerable conversation with her, she quite modified her expressions, and asked for a New Testament. A few weeks after it was returned, doubtless under the influence of the Priest, but every reading of the Bible must have its result. These are only two of many instances of conversation with the Roman Catholics.

#### HULL, P.Q.

Those who follow the current news of the day will remember how last February the City of Hull was disturbed by a Catholic mob who attempted to, and succeeded in breaking up a Gospel meeting held by Miss Wright, assisted by the young men of the Y.M.C.A., Ottawa. Two thousand, or more, gathered outside the building, stones were hurled in all directions, shots were fired, while shouts of "tue! tue!" "kill! kill! now is the time to stop nese meetings before they go any further!" Ten or twelve were more or less wounded, and some of the blows proved nearly fatal. The authorities, however, finally quieted the disturbance. Being called upon to work there for the summer months, some thought similar scenes might occur. But even here, where so much enmity exists against the preaching of the Gospel, no further serious disturbance has resulted, and something has been done for the Master.

After some effort, a building was obtained, and for four months services were held in French every Sunday evening. The first evening, besides the French Protestant families that attended, some French Catholics were there, we never held a meeting without some Catholic present, and the number increased to six. During the last month the services were becoming more and more int esing, and two successive Sundays a large crowd gathered outs, is the building, while some even ventured to come in, and all seemed eager to obtain one of our French tracts as they were being distributed. Our meetings have not been without results. During my labors I met with a Catholic young man who had been somewhat among Protestants, partly from the fact that his mother had recently married one. He attended our services regularly, began to read the Bible, and was brought to see his lost state by reading about the Saviour's crucifixion. On hearing of salvation as a gift from God he gladly believed unto salvation. The Pastor and Deacons of the 1st Baptist Church, Ottawa, being fully satisfied with his experience, he was baptized and united with that Church. He is now at the Feller Institute, determined to have an education. We trust a true soldier of the cross will be found in him. This young man's mother, although not having made a profession of faith, is now very anxious that all her children may read the Bible and see the truth for the uselves. It would gladden many a mother's heart, to s heard her obtain an e and we tru

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One of to Cameron, assis have the local heart, to see the look of happiness on this mother's face, when she heard her son's decision, and then of his desire to go to school and obtain an education. Her husband is anxious for her conversion, and we trust the way of life will soon be plain to her.

Since my return to college, I have heard from a friend in the work there, concerning nother family whom we visited together. The wife was a staunch Catholic, who seemed quite indignant when we spoke about salvation to her, saying, that her religion was just as good as ours, etc. She has at last seen her error and has accepted Christ.

I hope the friends of Hull and Ottawa are intending to obtain a building of their own for French and English services. It is expected that this field will have student labor next summer. Much more might be said of the great opening for work in the Ottawa Valley.

#### OTTAWA.

For many years we have employed colporteurs, missionaries and students at intervals at various places near Ottawa. Student Geo. R. MacFaul occupied this field last summer and met with encouragement both in preaching and in personal conversation with Catholics.

As a result one Catholic is attending the Grande Ligne School and it is hoped one family have come into the light of the Gospel. The Board have appointed Mr. B. Frappier as colporteur who will labor principally in Ottawa and Hull. The ladies of Ottawa have promised \$75.00 towards his support and it is expected most of the balance will be provided in that District.

He will visit other points as opportunities offer to present the written Word, or to converse with Catholics.

One of the newly appointed members of our Board, Mr. Jno. A. Cameron, assisted by Deacon Lamb and Mrs. Dr. Edwards, will have the local over-sight of the colporteur's work.

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#### QUEBEC.

For a number of years our former missionary, Mr. Normandeau, (ex-priest) occupied this field. In 1889, Mr. Bullock spent a summer in Quebec and received so much encouragement that the Board intended at the first opportunity to place a man permanently on this field.

The Women's H. M. Board of Ontario voted \$500 to support a Missionary in Quebec which enabled the Board in December to appoint Mr. A. W. Grenier and Mrs. Grenier to the work, and they entered the mission commencing their labors on the 1st of January.

They are both members of the Quebec Baptist Church where providentially they can give Mr. Grenier a good audience room for holding services in French without disturbing their own English service.

We are much favored in having Pastor Dykeman and a new member of our Board Mr. A. W. Marsh, from whom our missionary may obtain counsel and advice.

#### ISOLATED PROTESTANT FAMILIES.

There are a number of families principally small farmers who seldom see any of our missionaries, this is notably the case at Clarenceville and St. Sebastien where formally we had good stations. It is hoped that during 1891 our colporteurs may gather in the scattered sheep and prepare the way for our missionaries.

#### FELLER INSTITUTE BUILDINGS, GRANDE LIGNE.

The new buildings of the Feller Institute at Grande Ligne were begun after the fire which totally destroyed the original main or centre building on 31st January, 1890, and were completed for occupation the beginning of October, 1890.

The new centre building is 64.0 front, by 45.0 deep. The wing on south side is 82.0 by 42.0. The new building is four stories in height, besides the basement floor. The walls are of

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solid masonry, the front being built of Scotch Ashlar work, with chiselled trimmings for windows and doors. The entrance has a handsome ornamental verandah, eight feet wide the whole width of front, which forms an open balcony from the second floor windows. The Mansard with which the building is finished, has a finely designed iron cornice, half lower surmounted with an ornamental cresting rail and flag staff. The basement floor is occupied as laundry and drying room, all very complete.

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The wash-room is fitted up with a row of slate tubs, fitted with hot and cold taps, and the furnace room adjoining has two of the largest of "King & Sons" boilers.

The ground floor is divided into general class rooms. On the second floor are the music rooms, masters offices, pupils bedrooms, etc.

On this flat is a fine bathroom, with baths and a row of basins, all supplied with hot and cold water. The two upper flats are generally fitted up for dormitories and pupil's bedrooms. The staircases are wide and handsome, and on each landing fire hose is laid ready for instant use.

The water supply is obtained from a reservoir about 600 yards from the building, where a supply of very fine fresh water is constantly gathering, it is conducted through iron pipes to the college and pumped to a large tank on upper flat by a patent hot air engine. The water rises by natural gravitation about four feet over level of ground floor, and is therefore available in the basement as in the City. A constant full supply of this fine water is at all times to be had, and by the hot water boiler in kitchen, plenty of hot water for bathing or other purposes is always available.

The buildings are also lighted throughout with gas from a patent gas machine, which has been found to work satisfactorily and give a good light.

The buildings are heated with hot water in coils, and are in every way most comfortable; and besides having plenty of light are very easily ventilated.

The south wing has been entirely re-modelled and is occupied by the girls. What is wanting now to complete the appearance externally and the further usefulness internally is the erection of the new north wing.

#### PLANS AND PURPOSES.

Appointments have already been made of Mr. A. W. Grenier and Mrs. Grenier, to labor in Quebec; of Mr. B. Frappier, as colporteur in Ottawa and Hull; of Mr. Gendreau, as colporteur in the Eastern Townships, and of Rev. N. Grégoire, as missionary stationed in St. Johns, Que., but to engage in evangelistic work at various points, as may be required.

We have yet to locate Brethren Bullock and Dutand, who graduate from Newton this spring, and to provide fields of labor during the summer vacation for students Geo. R. MacFaul and Leonard Therrien, who are peparing as Missionaries.

Thus the plans made when Endowment was conceived are now about to be fulfilled in extended missionary work. The Society have confidence that the denomination will support the mission in its forward movement, to give an open Bible and a pure Cospel to the French people of Canada.

It is hoped ere long by a combined effort among all who in every demomination are interested in French work to put the "Aurore" (the only French Protestant Newspaper in Canada) on a good financial basis, and thus use the press in this work.

Nearly every English speaking Protestant Church in the Province of Quebec has more and more each year to contend with the influence of an ever increasing French population.

If we are to reach them with the Gospel, it must be as a rule through their native tongue.

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In no way can our English Churches become so aggressive as through the instrumentality of English pastors who can speak fluently the French language.

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If some of the Churches are to live it must be by such a course.

We need young men, both French and English (and women too) who will devote their lives to this work with as great enthusiasm as do Foreign missionaries.

Surely the call is as great to learn the language of more than a million of people who are ignorant of the pure Gospel—people who are our neighbor and fellow citizens—as it is to go anywhere else to learn the language of those who are without Christ.

The French language can be acquired at Grande Ligne, while pursuing the regular course there of Greek and Latin, or other studies preparatory to entering University.

"And how shall they believe in Him of whom they have not heard? And how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach except they be sent?"

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# REPORT OF THE GRANDE LIGNE LADIES' ASSOCIATION OF MONTREAL FOR 1890.

The Annual Meeting of the Grande Ligne Ladies' Association of Montreal was held in the parlor of Olivet Baptist Church on Monday, the 15th January, the President, Mrs. Upham, in the chair. After the usual routine business had been transacted, the Annual Report of Madame Scott, the Bible woman, was presented by Mrs. Therrien. A few extracts are gleaned that the work may be rendered familiar to those interested:—

- "We are happy to say that Madame Scott's arduous and faithful labors have not been without tangible results."
- "Precious souls have been brought to a saving knowledge of the truth as it is in Jesus. Two have already confessed their faith by baptism, another is desirous of doing so soon, and a number of others are anxiously enquiring after the truth."
- "Of late, five families have shown interest enough to invite the Minister, at four different times, to meet with them for the purpose of reading and explaining some of the precious truths contained in the Word of God."
- "It was pleasing to those of us whose privilege it was to accompany the Pastor, on entering the house appointed for the gathering, to find all in readiness to receive us, with a table placed in the most prominent part of the room, upon which was placed a Bible and hymn-book, and, at one time, a list of questions for the missionary to answer. There were on one occasion thirteen Roman Catholics present, who seem to be literally hungering for the bread of life."
- "Madame Scott says: 'In offering my book for sale one day, I was told by a lady that she did not need one, and had no time to look at them.' 'But, my good lady,' I replied 'you say you do not need any books; you do not know, for you have not looked at them.' She was persuaded to take one in her hands and to look

at it, saying as she did so, 'when I was a little girl, I lived at a place called Grande Ligne. There was a fine, intelligent-looking and cultivated woman who used to go from house to house to sell just such books as these. I remember that one very cold day she called at our house, and, after making a few remarks about the weather, the children, &c., she asked my mother if she was fond of reading. My mother said see could not read, but that she liked very much to hear her daughter read. The lady then began to read, and it was so interesting. But when my father came in and saw our visitor he was very angry, and, taking her by the arm, led her to the door, telling her to go away and never to enter his house again.'"

"This, alas! was not the first and only time that our dear departed Madame Feller received such treatment, for not only was she rudely repulsed from the homes of the inmates to whom she had gone on her errand of love, but the sacred Book was often thrown after her into the snow, or destroyed before her eyes."

"I returned to the subject of my books," says Madame Scott, saying, "With your permission, madame, I will read a few verses that you may see what these books are like. I had scarcely read a chapter half through when, looking up, I saw great tears in the woman's eyes as she said, 'How beautiful it is!' and going at once to an adjoining room, she brought the money saying, 'I must have that book, for I am sure that my daughter will enjoy reading it.'"

"Since then Madame Scott has visited her several times, and finds her interest in the Holy Word to be steadily increasing. She has also given the 'Bible woman' names of some of her friends who, she was sure, would be glad to have a book like hers."

"In a conversation I had with a woman to whom I had sold a Bible, she told me how the priest came one day, and seeing it on the table, took it without saying a word and threw it into the fire. He then returned to his seat, and solemnly said, 'Why have you been reading that book without my permission? Do you not know that reading such books might do you a great dea! of harm? You cannot understand the Bible.' But I did understand it, and will have another, and neither priest nor any one else shall prevent me reading such a good book."

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"We had a long conversation together," says Madame Scott.

"What a contrast from the time when Madame Feller first began her work in Montreal."

It will be seen from these incidents that a most important work is being quietly carried on by Madame Scott, under the Grande Ligne Ladies' Association.

Her salary (\$25 a month) is contributed by ladies of the Baptist churches in Montreal, with some assistance from other benevolent donors.

Any addition to their number will be gladly welcomed by the Treasurer, Mrs. G. B. Muir, 2490 St. Catherine Street, and will enable the Society to widen and increase efforts required for the mission in other directions.

Towards re-furnishing the linen department in the new building at Grande Ligne, the following articles were contributed:—

From Olivet Church: 60 Sheets, 76 Pillow Slips, 4 Doz. Towels, 3 Doz. Napkins, 2 Table Cloths, 1 Quilt.

From Grace Church: 16 Sheets, also a large and valuable contribution from the First Baptist Church.

The interest of the meeting was further enhanced by a paper read by Miss Greene, of the First Baptist Church, giving a vivid word-picture of the day of opening the new building at Grande Ligne.

In the election of office-bearers Mrs. A. A. Ayer, was elected President; Miss Green, Vice-President; Mrs. G. B. Muir, Treasurer, and Miss M. A. Cramp, Secretary.

### EXTRACTS FROM THE FORTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BROOKLYN LADIES' ASSOCIATION, IN AID OF THE GRANDE LIGNE MISSION.

At the Dedication, this Association was represented by Dr. Wood, of Strong Place Church, and Miss Josephine Tyler. The missionaries and Canadian friends have written many times of the encouragement and inspiration given by the presence and words of our delegates.

At the Quarterly meeting of this Association in March, the ladies spent no time in grieving over the loss of bedding and other things sent by them in January, but began to think at once, what they could do to meet this great need. Much sympathy for the Board, missionaries, teachers and pupils was shown, and it was resolved that this expression of sympathy should take a substantial form, and that the Brooklyn Association should ask to have the privilege of again furnishing the parlor in the new building. One lady, a very early friend of the Mission, now in her ninetieth year, offered, as she has often done before, to be one of twenty to make up \$100, this was pledged in a few moments. Individuals and churches offered to furnish teachers or pupils rooms. One lady gave \$30, as a thank offering for the recovery to health of a dear friend. Another had not long before sent \$1,000 to found a scholarship in memory of her little daughter. This extremity of the Mission seemed our opportunity and to-day we can report that there is again a "Brooklyn Parlor" at Grande Ligne. It is well furnished with a handsome carpet, curtains and portieres, comfortable chairs and sofas, a handsome marble clock on the mantle, and many pretty bits of ornamental handywork. The frescoeing of the room and a handsome chandelier were donated by the contractors. One chair and a table, which belonged to Madame Feller bring to mind, amidst the new surroundings, the sacred memories of the past. Individuals and churches in Brooklyn have sent the money to furnish thirteen rooms in the new building, in addition to the parlor, which are named respectively: Braislin, Emmanuel, Marcy Avenue, Hanson Place, Maplesden, MacDiarmid, Henrietta Feller Burke, Elise Feller, Genevra Russel Bate, Berinthia M. Wood, Evaline Kelsay, Nell Longly and Leeming rooms. The four boxes

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and one barrel which have been sent to the Mission, contained all necessary bedding and towels for each room furnished, also bed and table linen for general use, and valuable and useful clothing both for missionaries and pupils, besides many dainty adjuncts, such as table and bureau covers, silken scarves and pictures. One teacher writes, "our house is so pretty all through, we are really more like a large family than a school. The boys and girls take a great interest in their rooms, and try to keep them in good order. It is pleasant to hear them speak of the Maplesden, Emmanuel, Elise Feller rooms, etc." "But better than all, the pleasure they take in their new surroundings, we rejoice to have her add, "God is working amongst us, we feel it, our prayer meetings both private and public are very interesting, and many are seeking secret prayer, and in bidding us good night, often ask with tears for our prayers."

In Boston last summer the French services at Tremont Temple were conducted by students of Grande Ligne, thus New England reaps continually the benefit of her work.

Mr. Masse writes us that the Mary Aline Ropes scholarship is being used in behalf of Marie Geurtue, aged fifteen years, she is a very quiet, neat and industrious little girl, and her teachers commend her highly and place great hopes upon her. The Brooklyn Ladies' scholarship is applied for the benefit of Jacob Nicol; he worked all summer in an English family, in order to learn English, and comes from a hard working respectable family.

Some of the very early friends of the mission may remember Madame Normandeau. Her husband was a converted priest and was baptised in 1840, they were long connected with Mr. Roussy and Madame Feller, and also Dr. Cote in the work of the Mission. A few weeks since, this dear old lady passed away, and was buried (as she had long desired) by the side of Madame Feller at Grande Ligne.

There has been a constant interest in everything connected with the Mission this past year, and we have much that is joyful to make mention of with praise. Many of our workers have been raised up from severe illness, many preserved amidst great danger at the time of the fire. The President of the Grande Ligne Board, who returned from England recently on the steamship "Vancouver," writes that his church and family have welcomed him back as from

the dead. A terrific storm during the voyage, swept the captain and his chart-house into the sea in an instant, and we here add our thanksgiving that Mr. Upham was brought safely home.

Last Spring, Mr. Upham and Mr. Therrien visited Philadelphia, where they received a warm welcome, and much sympathy with the Grande Ligne work. A thousand dollars was given by one friend, to be called the "Peddie Scholarship." A Ladies Association similar to this one was organized with representatives from fourteen Baptist Churches. We are hoping much from this sister society and pray that similar ones may be revived in New York and Boston, so that our little streams of interest and money may flow together and form a mighty river, rushing with a wonderful spiritual power through the Province of Quebec, so that its long frozen winter of superstition may melt, and many trees of righteousness grow up in every town and village.

We are thankful also for new helpers, increased interest, and a better understanding in our churches of the need of the Mission. We have done much the past three years in raising our scholarship fund, giving towards the endowment, and now meeting the needs of the new building in so many substantial and graceful ways. But there are reasons for still going forward, not for doing less in the future.

The Endowment Fund still lacks many thousands of dollars. Another wing must be built, for even with all the increased accommodations, many have applied for whom there is no room in the school. The Bible work needs support, colporteurs, bearing the precious word should be everywhere in that land of sealed Bibles. The missionaries should have enough at least to live upon without anxious care. We, who have our names or those of loved ones in this Mission school, must feel an especial interest in those who occupy our rooms, and above all else we should add our prayers for their conversion and growth in Christian life.

If we ourselves are living and growing we must forget the things which are behind, and press forward to the goal of our high calling in Christ Jesus.

Mrs. told Fello a ye New Asso New advisable

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(Read at the Annual Meeting of the Grande Ligne Mission, February 19th, 1891.)

I first heard of the Grande Ligne Mission through the late Mrs. S. S. Cutting, of Brooklyn, so long its devoted friend, who told me, when a young pastor, of the life and labors of Madame Feller. This was in 1879 or 1880. I heard of the Mission again a year or two later, through the Rev. J. C. Bracq, then a student in Newton Theological Institution. Having been appointed upon an Associational Committee on the work of French Evangelization in New England, I consulted Mr. Bracq about a Missionary, and he advised me to write to the Rev. A. L. Therrien, as one who would be able to advise. I little thought then that I should ever have the pleasure of knowing Brother Therrien, and calling him my friend.

My introduction to the work of the Mission came through my dear Brother, the Rev. Mr. Lafleur, who honored me with his presence at the welcome Meeting held in the Olivet Baptist Church, when I became its pastor. I well remember, how in the course of his address, he turned to me and said impressively, "Sir, the Grande Ligne Mission is a great Institution." From what I had previously heard of it, I was prepared to find it so, but I must confess that my first impressions of the school, drawn from personal observation, were a little disappointing. Brother Lafleur went with me to the Spring closing of the school in 1884. It was a cold wet day in March or April, the roads were the worst I had ever seen; the houses of the village looked small and inferior; the school building itself, inside and out, was plain to the last degree; and to my eye the school seemed lacking in nearly all the things which belong to a well appointed institution of learning; and I wondered where the greatness of it was. But as I stayed at the Mission house a day or two, a change came over me. I enjoyed the courtesy and hospitality of good Mr. and Mrs. Roux, principals of the school, and their assistants. I saw the happy feeling that pervaded the school, and made it seem like a large family. I was impressed by the tender and affectionate spirit which the teachers showed towards their pupils, and with the simple earnest piety that was everywhere

manifest; and when they took me out to the little cemetery, in the rear of the building, and showed me the last resting place of their sainted dead, I felt that I was in a sacred place. And these first impressions have remained, and have been deepened by every subsequent visit.

That year I was elected a member of the Board, and the next year the Board honored me with the office of president, which I have been privileged to hold ever since. I accepted the office, hardly knowing what it involved. I had always believed that Roman Catholicism was hostile to civil and religious liberty, to popular education, and to spiritual and enlightened Christianity. I had advocated Missions to Roman Catholics before I came to Montreal, and I had been permitted to baptize one French Canadian upon personal confession of faith. But I came here, not as a Missionary, but as a pastor, and it seemed to me that the oversight of a city church would occupy most of my time and strength. I saw in this office however an opportunity of doing good, providentially placed before me, and I accepted the position as from the Lord. I fear however, that during the first three years of my connection with the Board, I was a learner, rather than a leader. I was new to the place and the work, and had no very definite ideas how it should be carried on. The Board meetings were small, and held at irregular intervals. Little besides routine business was done, and this was left largely in the hands of a faithful few, who had long borne the burden and heat of the day.

But as I lived on here, I came more and more to feel that this is missionary ground, and that this, the oldest French Protestant Mission in North America, should be better sustained, and take a more prominent part in the work of enlightening "Darkest Canada."

As I met brethren in the West from time to time, and presented the cause of the mission, I saw that they were ready for forward movements, and I believed that they would sustain this cause better and better if they were sure that it was put upon a strong, sound basis.

The annual cry of the lack of room at the school, and the turning away of so many applicants, year by year, because of this reason, became too painful to bear; and when God in His providence

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raised up our sister, Mrs. Scott, and gave her such success as Bible woman and colporteur, in this very city, it seemed as if God himself was speaking to us, saying, "go forward." And so the work of enlargement and endowment began, which has occupied most of our time during the past three years. I am thankful to have had any share in this work, but I am afraid I have not been much of a helper. I am sure I never was made for a collector, and had it not been for the able and willing support of the different Boards, and the cordial welcome received in different parts of Canada and the United States, I do not know how this work could have been done. I well remember a letter received about the time we began it from my honored and beloved brother, the Rev. Dr. Clarke, now of Hamilton, N.Y., in which he said in response to a letter from me, telling him of our plans, "God bless you all for your bravery, it is the very thing needed, but how is it ever to be done?" As. I look back on the work to-day, I can only say, "hitherto hath the Lord helped us." We have not accomplished all we wished, and the work is not yet completed; nevertheless, we have come to a point which seems to mark a new stage in the history of the Mission, where we may profitably consider our present situation, and attempt to forecast the future.

How stand we then to-day, and what are our present needs?

- 1. We are better organized than ever before. By a new Act of Incorporation passed by the Provincial Legislature in 1888, the Mission has come definitely and formally into the control of our own denomination. It was practically a Baptist institution for some time before this, but it is openly and avowedly such an one now, no person being eligible to election on the Board who is not a member in good standing, of a regular Baptist Church. Our school and our churches also are better organized, and the latter are moving in the direction of self-support, which is, and always has been our desire and aim for them.
- 2. We have a larger and better school than ever before. The fire which destroyed the old building a year ago proved to be a blessing in disguise, as it not only created sympathy with us far and near, but enabled us to build on larger foundations, and with greater regard for the needs of our work. The school buildings to day are good enough, as far as they go, and the teachers have all

the old time earnestness and enthusiasm. A person must be hard to please who is not satisfied with the comforts of the present Feller Institute at Grande Ligne. The only lack in outward things is the new wing, without which we shall still be unable to meet the growing demands of the work. I trust that this need may be supplied in the near future.

3. We have more Churches, Mission stations, and Missionaries than formerly. I am informed on good authority, that seventeen names have been added to our list of Missionaries within the past eight years, while five have left us for other fields of labor, leaving us a net gain of twelve. The younger men and women of our French Churches are proving themselves not unworthy successors of Madame Feller and Mr. Roussy. Necessarily we have paid considerable attention to the school of late, but we have never forgotten that God's great method of saving men is by the preaching of the Word. The school itself is not only an educator, but an evangelizer, since through Roman Catholic children converted there, we have again and again been able to reach the parents, and enter new fields. "A little child shall lead them." We have also worked from time to time with English Churches, and we shall always be glad to do so when pastors can be found who can speak both French and English. But at present such men are rare.

4. We have more friends than ever before. This work of faith and labor of love has never lacked friends, and it never will. Holy men and women of God have cared for it throughout its history, and God has raised up special helpers now and again who have come to its rescue at critical times and periods. We owe much latterly to our sisters in Ontario, as we have long owed much to the Ladies' Grande Ligne Associations in Montreal and Brooklyn. But it is surely a gratifying fact that while our friends in Great Britain and the United States have not diminished during the past seven years, our friends in Canada have greatly multiplied. I believe I am right in saying that whereas ten years ago the bulk of our contributions came from abroad, now they come from friends at home. The Mission to-day is no small, local affair, but is known, loved, and supported by our churches throughout the Dominion. It is an organization through which Canadian Baptists may well do their part in the work of French evangelization.

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This is not saying that the Mission is perfect, and can make no further advances. Far from it. Like all other human institutions, it is open to criticism. But this I know and do declare, that no Mission was ever conducted with a greater eye to economy, with more self-denying laborers, and a more earnest desire to glorify and honor our common Lord and Master. We have had our trials, and we expect them. They have done us good, and doubtless we are in a better position to go forward because of them. We know our weaknesses, and are fully alive to the desirability and necessity of strengthening our weak points, as far and as fast as we can. It has been a grief to us again and again to have to say to those who have asked for helpers here and there, "we have none to send." But we cannot make men to order, and if the Lord does not raise them up we are not expected to use them.

Happily the need of laborers is just now being met, so that we are entering new fields, and occupying more and more of the strategic points of the Province. It has been a grief to us also to be obliged to take our Missionaries from their fields of labor from time to time, to go among the churches collecting funds for the current expenses of the Mission. Even this is not without its compensations. It is good for our churches to see and hear a missionary now and then, and learn something of the work from one who is personally engaged in it. But if the churches do not wish this expense to the Mission and interruption of missionary labors, the remedy is in their own hands. Let them put this Mission upon the list of their regular benevolences, make their own offerings, and send them to the treasurer as they do for other objects. I hope the time will soon come when we shall be obliged to have a man to give his whole time to the work of superintending the affairs of the Mission. The time which has long been given by different members of the Board, has been given voluntarily, and the work done has been a labor of love. But as the Mission grows, as I trust it will grow, it will need a head, a general secretary or superintendent, as does the work of Home and Foreign Missions.

There is a cry coming up from different portions of the country for closer relations between the Mission and the other Missionary organizations of the denomination. I am glad to hear it, for it shows that our brethren, East and West, are taking greater interest in this work than formerly. It is not our work alone, it is theirs also, and if they help so largely to carry it on, it is but right that they should have a voice in the management and conduct of it.

distance and will gladly avail ourselves of it at all times. If the Missionary Convention of Ontario and Quebec will nominate a member of the Board as the Convention of the Maritime Provinces has already done, I doubt not that such nominations will be always ratified by the Mission at its Annual Meetings, and the nominees of these conventions elected on the Board. Under our present organization, this seems to be the most practical means of denominational union in this work. It should be remembered that all auxiliary societies or churches which aid the Mission have a Constitutional right to be represented by a delegate in the Annual Meetings of the Mission.

But whatever the organization of the Mission in the future, its head quarters will necessarily be in Montreal, whence the majority of the members of the Board should be chosen. This must be the working centre of this cause, and however the work may enlarge, as God grant that it may enlarge continually, I believe this organization is sufficient to meet all demands, and I trust that our churches throughout the country will continue to give it their sympathy and their increased support.

For myself I can only say in closing, that I believe most heartily in the principles and the methods of this Mission. Seven years residence in Montreal has taught me some lessons concerning Roman Catholicism, and the best way to meet it, which will not easily be unlearned. Whatever be the spiritual condition of the vast multitude of adherents to the Roman Catholic faith, (and God knows what that is better than we do), it is enough for me to know that they have not the open Bible, without which the religion of Jesus Christ can never be the blessing it was meant to be to man. But the best way to preach down error is to preach up truth. Controversy may sometimes be necessary and our Missionaries are not unprepared to engage in it, or to endure persecution, as they have sometimes been called to endure it even in these latter days. We would be against Rome, by being so much for Christ. We would carry his Word to the minds and hearts of the people,

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
preaching its truths to all, regardless of previous religious condition, and trust the Lord of the Harvest to fulfil his promise that his Word shall not return unto him void. We would put the Bible in the place of the Pope, and Jesus Christ in the place of the Priest, and thus shed rays of heavenly light into this dense darkness, and leave to God to bring many souls out of darkness into his marvellous light. We would "preach the Word," in season, out of season, in our churches, in our school, in private houses, by the way side, as we have been doing for the past fifty years, and as we expect to do more and more in the years to come. We would speak the truth in love, knowing that when Paul plants and Apollos waters, God will surely give the increase.

This may be a slow way of advancing the Kingdom of Christ on earth, but it is the way of Christ and his apostles, the way which has the sanction of the ages, and which, if persevered in, will not fail.

This good work has a glorious past, and I trust it will have a still more glorious future. Let us not fear, but go forward as the providence and Spirit of God may direct, knowing that no work undertaken in his name can fail.

May God bless the work and workers of the Grande Ligne Mission.


