The table of *Remarkable Days* has been carefully revised and also extended by the additional record of the dates of several recent events.

A *Gardener's Calendar*—especially written for this Island—has been substituted for the *Farmer's*. As horticulture has, within the last two or three years, been practised to some extent in the Colony, and is likely to be gradually still further advanced, as its importance shall become known, this substitution will, the publisher hopes, be found generally acceptable.

So many complaints have been made on account of the omission of the *predictions concerning the weather* in the last year's Calendar, that the publisher has thought it best to return to the old usage in this respect; and has therefore inserted the *predicted changes* for the year 1853, taken from the same source as that from which they were derived for previous years. These *predictions*, it is well known, are no more than *vague guesses*, based on the general observations and experience of former years, and severally extending over periods of such duration as to admit of a probability of fulfilment; the publisher, therefore, cannot think that they will be received for any more than they are really worth.

The *Sun's declination*, being chiefly used by seamen, has been taken from the *Nautical Almanack*, as it is calculated for the meridian of Greenwich.

ECLIPSES IN 1853.

There will be three this year—two of the Sun and one of the Moon.

1. June 6—An annular eclipse of the sun, invisible in the British Provinces, but central and visible in the North and South Pacific Oceans, and in South America. It will be partial in some of the Southern and Western parts of the United States.

2. June 20 and 21—a partial eclipse of the Moon.

First contact with Penumbra, 20th, 11h 38m A.

First contact with the shadow, 21st, 0 50 M.

Middle of the Eclipse, 1 47 M.

Last contact with the shadow, 2 35 M.

Last contact with the Penumbra, 3 56 M.

Magnitude of the Eclipse (Moon's diameter equal to 1) 0.204 on the Northern limb.

3. November 30—a total Eclipse of the Sun, invisible in the British Provinces, but central and total in the Pacific Ocean and South America. It will be partial in the Southern part of California and in part of Texas.

Mercury will be a Morning Star until Feb. 20; after which it will be an Evening Star until April 10; thence a Morning Star until June 13; after which it will be an Evening Star until August 17; thence a Morning Star until Oct. 2; thence it will be an Evening Star until Dec. 3; after which it will be a Morning Star.

Venus will be a Morning Star until May 16; after which it will be an Evening Star to the close of the year.

Mars will be an Evening Star until Feb. 13; after which it will be a Morning Star to the close of the year.

Jupiter will be a Morning Star until June 10; after which it will be an Evening Star until Dec. 27; then a Morning Star.

Saturn will be an Evening Star until May 11; after which it will be a Morning Star until Nov. 17; thence an Evening Star to the end of the year.

GARDENER'S CALENDAR.

As nothing can be done in this month in the open air, look over and make a catalogue of the Seeds you have and will want;—procure the latter in due time, sending to the States or Britain for such of the more rare or curious sorts as may be required.

Plants in the house should be well looked after, and not exposed to too great variations of temperature,—the lowest, according to Lowden, is 45° of Farenheit. Look to garden tools; replace and repair where necessary. Turn over and mix well the mould, which is or ought to be laid by in a corner of the cellar, for the purpose of your early hot-bed.

Keep the manure for the same under cover; this will enable you to begin in March.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.

Your house plants will require all your care, to keep them from the danger of too great heat by day and too much cold by night. Water sparingly; remove dead leaves; destroy insects—When the aphid, or louse, attacks them, get some one to smoke them well with tobacco, having previously watered the leaves.

Turn over the hot-bed mould in the cellar. Look to the hot-bed frames and sashes; mend the glass in the latter; and wash the former with lime water, mixed with lampblack.—this will tend to preserve them,

and the black colour will absorb the rays of heat, and radiate during the night.

Take care that carrots, beets, parsnips, celery, &c., which are destined for seed, be kept in a cool place, so that they may not vegetate till planted out.

Keep collecting manure for the hot-bed; and turn it often, to prevent its heating.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.

Look well to your house plants; they may now have a more abundant supply of moisture; open the windows from the top in fine weather; apply liquid manure at times.

Cuttings may now be planted: in doing this, place them so that they be in contact

with the sides of the pot,—they will be more certain to strike. Put them in small pots, so that they may be transferred to the corners of the hot-bed.

Some mild day, after the 20th, make your first forcing bed, for melons and early cucumbers, which is to be done as follows: Select a part of your garden, with a Southern exposure, the most sheltered from high winds; clear the snow from the spot where you intend forming it; put down first a good layer of loose straw, on this place your manure—a foot larger every way than the size of your frame. In making your bed, do not tramp the manure, but strike it smartly with the fork; let it be five feet at the back, and four feet in front—facing the South or South-East. Have a smooth stick,—the top of a bean pole, well freed from knots, will answer well,—stick this in the centre of the bed, in a slanting direction, so that you may pull it out with ease; this will enable you to judge of the heat on application of the naked hand.

Put on the frame, and glasses, immediately; and cover the whole with bass matting, old carpet, or any thing that will prevent the heat escaping.

GARDENER'S CALENDAR.

On the most sheltered spot in the kitchen garden, sow a row of early Peas—Washington & Hotspur, American—Charlton & Frame, English, are the best. If you

like Windsor Beans let them be put in as early as possible in this month. Chose a spot open to the south and protected against the north for sowing Lettuce for early sallads, and transplanting. Early, curled, and brown Cilicia—indeed almost any sort will do for the former, but for the latter, take Imperial, Grand Admiral, and Paris, Green and White Coss. There are many varieties, however, and most people have their favourites. Sow early York, early Cauliflower and Cape Brocoli for later crops. Parsley and Celery must be sown as early as possible; soak the seeds 24 hours in sulphur and water, it will make them germinate more quickly. Sow Radishes, Cress, and Mustard. Early Horn Carrots and Turnips—rooted Beet for summer use. Onions, early, if possible. The soil cannot be made too rich for this valuable esculent—a compost of wood ashes, soot, the manure from the poultry-house, night soil and rotten dung well mixed, will well repay the trouble; never apply fresh dung of any sort, and keep to the same spot manuring it annually. The Americans mix the seed with sand, and keep it warm and damp till it just sprouts, and then sow it immediately.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.

Your work now begins in earnest. The early part of this month is, in general, the season for putting in all your standard crops—Carrots, parsnips, beets, stone turnips, or flat Dutch do. should be sown. Use drills not less than nine inches apart, and thin out to five in the rows. There is no more common or

more fatal error than crowding plants in a garden.

About the middle of this month plant Indian Corn, in rows, they are preferable to hills. Dig a trench one foot deep and fill it with good rotten dung—that from the pig-sty is best—cover with earth four inches, and plant the corn six inches apart, in double rows. Let there be a space—at least three feet—between the rows, or, what is better, put the rows in different parts of the garden. Plant early potatoes—Governor or Levett whites.

Kidney Beans should be planted at different times of this month. Transplant early Cauliflower, Broccoli and Early York, two feet apart. Lettuces twelve inches, on rich well manured land. Water Asparagus beds with a weak pickle, it will nourish the grass and keep down weeds. Your strawberry plants should be looked to and hoed round, rotten manure forked in, and all dead leaves removed, as well as young plants, which may be transplanted elsewhere. Keep the plants a foot apart.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.

Continue to plant kidney beans and peas, for a succession of crops. Transplant cauliflower, brocoli, early York, Savoys, and cabbage of all sorts; as also lettuces. Tie up the Coss lettuces, that they may blanch in the heart. Sow thyme, sweet marjoram, summer savory, sage, &c.; let the soil be very fine; do not

cover deeply; keep the bed moist till the plants appear. Celery is usually planted in this month and the next, for early and winter use. In a dry part of the garden, dig a trench, from 12 to 18 inches in depth by 12 in width. Let the earth taken out be placed carefully on each side, in a slanting direction; fill the trench with good rich compost and rotten dung, well mixed, to within 4 or 5 inches—which must be completed with rich soil, in which put your plants—having first trimmed the roots, and cut off the straggling leaves from 3 to 10 inches asunder; water well, and shade with mats or boards, leaving plenty of air till the plants have struck; when this happens, remove the covering; and as the plants increase, bring the earth from the sides, heap it up round the plants—taking care to leave the heart open. This must be continued until November, when they must be carefully taken up, and placed in the cellar or root-house, in sand or fine dry mould. Celery makes a delicious winter salad; besides flavouring soups, gravies, &c.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.

You will now have to turn your attention to weeding and watering; and you cannot be too attentive. Sow Peas, marrow and others;

dwarfs are best for a small garden. Plant kidney beans. Do not forget a few nasturtiums; they make an excellent pickle. You will in this month have leisure to look to your garden walks; make them neat, clean and level; some people sprinkle them with salt,—it keeps them free from weeds. Select some of the best lettuce plants, for seed; stick a couple of laths near each, in order to tie them to. Sow turnips; thin out carrots, parsnips, and beets; plant out sage roots and other sweet herbs. See that your melon and cucumber plants get plenty of water, or liquid manure; that they are properly trained,—for that purpose, make a trellis round the bed. In the Flower Garden, put sticks to the tall plants, as hollyhock, &c. Look to caterpillars, and other vermin.

In this month, you will find enough to do in keeping down weeds, and giving a sufficiency of water. Keep all parts of the garden clean and in good order. Hoe your early potatoes, and all the cabbage tribe. Earth

up the celery. You may plant out strawberry slips. Take up the bulbous-rooted plants, that have done flowering, and put them aside in a cool dry place, under cover,—such as narcissus, daffodil, &c.; they must be put down again the last of October, or the beginning of November. Take up eschalots and garlic; water cucumbers but sparingly; take off the frames altogether. On melons, raise the frames, and let the vines push freely out. Keep these plants watered, and give liquid manure occasionally.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.

There are few directions to be given in this month. Take up the remains of the early peas in the haulm, and lay by under cover; keep a good look-out for seeds,—

have little paper bags for the purpose; in particular, look to the lettuce, and pick off the buds when they are full and withered; do not mix them. Take up tulip bulbs early in this month,—see that the flowering stem is yellow; put them in a dry place, and mark them with their proper names, if they have them—if not, with their colours.

glasses at night and during cold days. Dig carrots, and put them in the cellar or root-house, in dry sand—if river sand, well washed. Take up the beets very carefully, so as not to break the small roots and make them bleed. Transplant trees and bushes of all sorts, fruit as well as flowering and ornamental; make a bed for early lettuce, and another for carrot,—sow in the last week of this month, and put pea sticks or spray of any kind over the bed, in order to catch the snow. Put in the tulip bulbs where they are to flower next summer, about six inches apart, not more than four nor less than two inches deep. Take up celery, and put it in sand or dry loam. Dig in manure, where you wish early crops.

GARDENER'S CALENDAR.

If the weather continues fine, continue on as in last month. Take your bean-

poles and pea-sticks and put them by for next year. If you have a safe place for peas and bean haulm, put it away without threshing; if not, gather the peas and beans into paper bags and mark. Do the same with all other seeds. Have all your garden as clean as possible for next spring. Look up all your tools, and put them carefully by.

For young Cattle and Horses.—Mix, occasionally, one part of salt with four parts of wood ashes, and give the mixture to different kinds of stock, summer and winter.
