He went to San Francisco and began the practice of law there and made a notable place for himself in the courts on the Pacific Slope. He remained in San Francisco until 1886, when he went to Nevada. He has long been an advocate of the coinage of silver. He was a member of Congress from 1893 till 1903, when he was elected to the senate. His home is in Reno, Nev.

COST OF EDUCATION

Some idea of the expenditure for education under modern conditions may be gathered from the fact that no less than \$70,793,505 was spent for that purpose in New York state during the school year ending July 31st. Of the total mentioned, \$47,077,719.97, or about two-thirds, was expended for the education of children in the common schools, while \$8,549,614.03 was used for secondary schools and \$15,160,171 for collegiate education. It appears from statistics gathered in the annual report of Commissioner of Education Draper, from which the above figures are taken, that the average cost per pupil based on the registration in elementary schools was \$37,39, an increase of \$1.16 per pupil as compared with the preceding year. The average cost per pupil based on attendance was \$48.48, an increase of \$1.16 per pupil as compared with the preceding year. The average daily attendance at school was 970,370, or 77 per cent. of the enrollment. This represented an increase of 7 per cent, which is credited to increase deficiency in the enforcement of the compulsory education law. 


