With wanton prodigal ity Charles squandered her dower on hit favorites, pauperizing not only her but himself. His ' extravagance knew, no bounds till at last it put him so deeply in debt-and disgrace with the tradesmen-that he was denied credit. During the 22 years of her queenhood as wife of Charles II.
