Ottawa, July 6 .- The principle of conscription has been confirmed by the House of Commons. After thirteen days of actual debating, voting upon the bill and the amendments to it began this morning at a quarter to three o'clock. At that hour the galleries were crowded, and on the floor of the chamber the attention of members was greater than has been since the naval debate, five

The last speaker, strangely enough, was Bourassa, not the leader of the Quebec Nationalists but a humble mem ber from Levis, not related to the more noted Henri Bourassa

When he had declared for referendum and sank back into the obscurity that has enshrouded his parliamentary career until this bright night, the subamendment, the amendment and the motion were read,

ONLY NINE FOR HOIST

Sir Robert Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier sat facing each other ready to divide the votes of the members about them. The situation was one of the most dramatic that parliament has seen. Then, as though it were the most lace of occasions, the speaker called for votes of those favoring the ionalist call for a six months' hoist. As soon as the clerk had announced that there had been nine votes cast for and 165 against the Nationalist proposal that there had been nine votes cast Speaker called for voices upon the Laurier referendum proposal, asking first for those supporting it.

### REFERENDUM PROPOSAL DEFEATED

The Liberals split, but most of the government's Quebec supporters voted with Sir Wilfrid. Among them were Sir Rodolph Forget, Hon, Mr. Paten-aude, Paquet, Boulay, Barrette, Girrard, Gilbault, Bellemare, Achim and Mondu

Sir Robert Borden was cheered when he arose to cast the first vote against the referendum, and one after another the government's supporters cast their votes in the same way.

Then the clerk turned to the Liberal side where the first man to rise and cast his vote against the Laurier resolution was Hon. George P. Graham, who was followed by Messrs. Pardee, Guthrie, Carvell, A. K. MacLean, Cruise, Charlton, Turriff, McNutt, H. H. McLean, Nelley, Loggie, Dr. Clark, Buchanan, Douglass, Champaign, McCraney, Duncan, Ross and Nesbit. The amendment was declared lost by 111 to 62, a government majority of 49.

Daylight was beginning to show through the windows and the impatient members were anxious to cast their votes for or against conscription, and go to their beds. They were denied the immediate pleasure for A. B. Copp arose and announced that he had a few remarks to make on the main motion, which was that the conscription bill should be read the second time. There was a groan from both sides over the delay, but Mr. Copp serenely began. Declaring that the support provided for the dependents of soldiers was inadequate and badly managed, that they were compelled to depend upon voluntary contributions and subscriptions of a charitable nature when their supporters were fighting for the state and empire, he concluded with a resolution that called for the state to undertake the support of soldiers fighting at the front, thus doing away with the patriotic and similar funds.

The reply of Sir Robert Borden was that the Canadian soldiers were an ong the best paid in the world and their dependents were well looked after. This contention was supported by Sir Herbert Ames, head of the patri-

otic fund. The contention was disputed by Hon. Frank Oliver and Dr. Mulloy from the Liberal side. A vote on this amendment was reached at twenty minutes

# Germans' Strongest **Offensive SinceVerdun Beaten Back by French**

French Front in France, Wednesday, July 4—(By the Associated Press)—After their strongest offensive effort since Verdun the Germans found themselves today thrown back everywhere along an eloven-mile front on the Chemin Des Dames, leaving the ground thickly strewn with their dead and having failed to take even one French soldier prisoner. The French lines remained intact and the French commanding general who watched the operations, throughout from the front trenches was able to declare tonight that not a single yard of territory had been lost.

yard of territory had been lost. The Germans came forward everywhere in the closest formation and in successive waves, preceded by the famous "shock" troops, who were mown down by the French fire. At the first onslaught in the vicinity of Cerny, and on the Californie Plateau the French were obilged to give way, but their yielding was only momentary and a counter-attack remedied the slight dent immediately and in addition gave them possession of some German trenches in the vicinity of

Cerny, which they held. The German infantry appeared to have all the dash taken out of them by the French defence and made no attempt to regain the ground lost by the French reaction. Their artillery throughout the day, however, maintained a sweeping fire, but its effects were minimized by the enemy's lack of observation posts.

### ALLIED CAPTURES IN TEN WEEKS.

From April 15 to June 30 the Franco-British troops on the western front captured 63,222 prisoners, including 1,272 officers, says an official summary of the operations issued today. The war material taken in the same period includes 509 guns, 503 trench mortars and 1,318 machine guns.

El Paso, Texas, July 5-Since the pro-Ally campaign in Mexico was first started by El Universal in Mexico City, the sentiment favoring the Allies has reached northern Mexico and, during the past thirty days, a well defined movement favoring an open break with Germany has developed.

A reflection of this sentiment was seen recently in the stateme Francisco Gonzales, acting commander-in-chief of the northeastern military zone with headquarters at Chihuahua. "Tell the German consul he, the imperial government and the Kaiser may all go to hell," General Gonzales answered.


