



Rousing Meeting Here For National Service

R. B. Bennett, Hon. J. D. Hazen and Other Speakers - Letter From Hon. Wm. Pugsley---Last Phase of Voluntary Effort

The national service meeting last night at the Imperial Theatre was beyond question one of the biggest and most enthusiastic meetings held in the city of St. John since the beginning of the war. The speakers received a most atten-

tive and enthusiastic hearing and made a deep impression. It should be noted that R. B. Bennett, director-general of national service, said in last night's speech something which he has not made so clear at any other point during his tour, and that is that, while compulsion has not been mentioned in connection with the national service scheme, this national service plan of voluntary effort represents the last of the purely voluntary efforts to organize the men and resources of the country for war purposes. Mr. Bennett, clearly intimated, that should this plan fail to produce wholly satisfactory results-though he was confident that it would not fail-other and more effective methods must be employed in order that Canada might live up to the full measure of its duty, for, as he said, in the words of Gladstone, "This voluntary plan will not exthe resources of civilization."

The audience heartily cheered this intimation that other measures would follow this final phase to voluntary organization of the country's men and resources if the national service campaign should fail to bring Canada's contribution up to






