### COUNTY OF LAMBTON,

PROVINCE OF CANADA.

AND THE PRESS. IN THE FREE PRESS.

This county is bounded on the north by Lake-Huron, on the east by the county of Middlesex, on the south by the county of Kent, and on the west by the river St. Clair, which separates it from the State of Michigan. It contains eleven municipalities, viz.: the townships of Brooke, Dawn, Bosanquet, Enniskillen, Euphemia, Moore, Plympton, Sarnia, Sombra, Warwick, and the Town of Sarnia. The townships of Sarnia, Plympton and Bosanquet are situated on the shore of Lake Huron. Moore, Sombra and part of Sarnia are on the river St. Clair. The townships of Warwick, Brooke and Euphemia join Middlesex on the east. Sombra, Dawn and Euphemia border upon the county of Kent; Enniskillen is an interior township. Lambton is one of the most westerly counties in the Province, and has excellent facilities for communication by railways and water to the markets and ports of Canada and the United States. The Grand Trunk and Great Western Railways both run through the county; the former in the northern part, through the townships of Bosanquet, Plympton and Sarnia; the latter through Warwick, Plympton and Sarnia. They have done much towards furthering the progress of the county, and have already stations of considerable importance along their lines. The county is heavily timbered with oak, elm, beech, maple, ash, and other valuable woods. The manufacture of potash, the making of square timber (oak, elm, and hickory), and staves, which has been such a source of prosperity to Lambton for years past, will still be so for years to come. Before entering on a description of the soil, &c., it may not be out of place to devote a short space to the geology of the county, which presents a field which is,

however, by no means within the limits of our work. The rock formations present in Lambton, according to Sir William Logan's geological survey, are the Devonian, being the third in point of age of the rocks that compose the crust of the earth. This formation underlies the counties of Lambton, Kent, Essex, &c. It contains four subdivisions, viz., the Oriskany, Hamilton, Corniferous, and Portage and Chemung. The Portage and Chemung formation is present only at Kettle Point, on Lake Huron. The Hamilton group is seen in the township of Bosanquet, while the Corniferous, distinguished for its bitumen—found sometimes in the form of petroleum, or rock oil—is present in the township of Enniskillen, in which immense quantities of the finest surface and rock oil have been procured within the last three years. To the geologist the county of Lambton is particularly interesting, affording a wide field for observation and study.

The surface of the county is level or gently rolling, and the soil is of great depth and fertility; but somewhat different in the several townships, according to their proximity or remoteness from the lake. The principal stream is the Sydenham, or Big Bear Creek, which runs through Warwick, Brooke, Euphemia and Dawn. Its north branch waters the townships of Moore, Enniskillen, and Sombra. There are also other numerous streams, brooks and creeks that irrigate the land in all directions. The river Aux Sable runs north between the township of Bosanquet, in the county of Lambton, and West Williams and McGillivray in the county of Middlesex, and Stephen in the county of Huron. It then makes a circuit, and enters Lake Huron at Port Franks, about five miles above Kettle Point. These streams possess innumerable privileges for driving machinery, many of which are occupied by grist and saw mills. Numerous and valuable water power privileges can still be obtained throughout the county, where capitalists might invest with advantage to themselves as well as benefit to the

The county of Lambton contains a large proportion of good farming lands, especially the part watered by the Sydenham and its tributaries, some of which cannot be excelled by any in Canada for fertility and adaptation to the raising of crops of every description. There are parts of the county marshy and wet, but by adequate drainage much valuable and rich lands may be reclaimed and rendered fit for cultivation. To show the increase in value of the lands, it is only necessary to state that in 1846 the Crown lands were offered for sale at 8s. currency per acre.

We deem it superfluous in a work like the present, designed simply as an abstract record of statistical and general information, to give a lengthy and elaborate history of the early settlement of Lambton, although ample material exists to render such a record both interesting and instructive.

The territory now comprised by the County of Lambton, at one time formed part of what was called the Western District, which was thus described in 1796 by Surveyor-General Smith: "It is bounded southerly by Lake Erie, easterly by a meridian passing through the extremity of Long Point, and comprehends all the lands north westerly of these boundaries not included within the bounds of the Hudson Bay Company or the territory of the United States." The other Districts were the Home, Midland and Eastern. By the British act 31, Geo. 3. chap. 31, (1791) it was provided that the Governor General of Upper Canada might divide the province into as many Counties or Districts as he liked. Col. Jno. Graves Simcoe, (the first Governor of Upper Canada,) in 1792, in accordance with such authority, issued his proclamation dividing Canada into nineteen counties, viz :—Addington, Dundas, Durham, Essex, Frontenac, Glengary, Grenville, Hastings, Kent, Leeds, Lennox, Lincoln, Norfolk, Northumberland, Ontario, Prince Edward, Stormont, Suffolk and York. Districts having, in 1849, by Art. 12 V. cap. 78 (which came in force on the first of January 1850) been abolished, and counties erected in their stead, certain counties to remain united till the junior county should attain a population of not less than fifteen thousand souls, in which case it became entitled to a separate establishment of courts and county institutions. Kent and Lambton were so united, Lambton being the junior county, but from its geographical position it was deemed expedient to make provision for its separation before it had attained the population required by law to entitle it to sever the judicial union between it and the county of Kent. Accordingly in the year 1851, an act was passed authorising such separation, and establishing separate courts, &c., and making it to include and consist of the Townships of Brooke, Dawn, Bosanquet, Enniskillen, Euphemia, Moore, Plympton, Sarnia, and Sombra, embracing an area of 456 square miles, with Sarnia, a town, beautifully situated on the St. Clair river, near the entrance to Lake Huron, as its county town and judicial seat. Below we give the number of acres of land taken up and under cultivation, with the population and value of rateable property in 1846, which, compared with 1861, is sufficient to show that Lambton has made such progress as must be at once gratifying to its early settlers and brave pioneers, and encouraging to those who may purpose making it their future home.

Bosanquet.—Number of acres taken up [1846], 3490. Number of acres under cultivation, 295. Value of rateable property, \$5672. Population, 1235.

Brooke.—Number of acres taken up, 3412. Number of acres under cultivation 404. Value of rateable property, \$6408. Population, 190.

PLYMPTON.—Number of acres taken up 19,484. Acres under cultivation, 2516. Value of rateable property, \$31,836. Population, 639. SARNIA.—Number of acres taken up 10,540. Acres under cultivation, 1,366. Value of rateable property, \$33,888. Population, 610.

Sombra.—No. of acres taken up, 13,476. Acres under cultivation, 1,589. Value of rateable property, \$34,832. Population [1842], 800.

WARWICK.—Number of acres taken up, 26,448. Acres under cultivation, 3080. Value of rateable property, 44,816. Population [taken with Bosanquet].

"There are a little over 500 souls in the county, including those at Kettle Point. They constitute but one band or tribe. I first saw them 32 years ago. They were then, as all uncivilized and unchristianized Indians are, dissipated and dying at the rate of about eight or ten per cent. per annum. At that time they had made no improvements in agriculture, but lived entirely by fishing and hunting. At the present time they raise about 1,500 bushels of wheat per annum; have many cattle, horses, hogs, &c., &c., raise about 70 tons of hay, and, counting all that is measured by the bushel, they raise annually some eight or nine thousand bushels. All of this material prosperity is fairly attributed to the preaching of the gospel among them. In addition to producing all this addition to the income of the country, there are, doubtless, more than 100 men and women living on these reserves. who, but for the labors of the missionary, would have destroyed themselves by dissipation. There is a day and Sabbath school well attended, and over 200 adult church members out of a population of 500 souls. There is a gradual and healthy increase of the population over and above the deaths. They have about 10,000 acres of land, or about 100 acres to each family; only sufficient for their wants.

"This is the easiest and cheapest way to dispose of the Indians of North America; for they must be disposed of in one of three ways: killed in war or by drink, or Christianized by missionaries and thus made useful members of the community. Having been in the mission among the Indians for the past 35 years, and having lived and labored among them in that capacity, I am acquainted with most of the tribes from Texas to the Hudson's Bay territory, as well as in Canada. have taken pains to gather the statistics of the various Indian warsthe Florida, Black Hawk, and others, and I find it requires \$25,000 to dispose of an Indian by war, in addition to one white man being killed for every Indian. To dispose of them by drink I found by the statistics of those tribes who had large annuities, and consequently drunk much, that it required about \$2000 to kill an Indian by whiskey. In taking the statistics of our own Indian missions, I find it requires about \$200 to Christianize and civilize an Indian, and train him twenty years, and thus give him a chance for both this life and that which is to come. Thus it is seen that it requires as much to kill an Indian in war as would Christianize 125, and train them twenty years. It requires as much to kill an Indian by whiskey as would Christianize and save ten. There are 125,000 Indians in British North America."

### EDUCATIONAL.

In the very important matter of education, great progress has been effected in the County of Lambton, and she has now the advantages of a liberal and permanent provision for the general and thorough education of her rising population, fully enjoying the privileges and benefits conferred by the excellent School Act for Upper Canada (13 & 14, Vic. cap. 48, 1850). The reports of the Local Superintendents of schools for the county, in general indicate a growing interest in the subject of education, and a steady progress in the different sections and townships, that is highly satisfactory. The Rev. David Armstrong, Local Superintendent of schools for the Township of Moore, in his remarks accompanying his official report to the Chief Superintendent of education, says :-- "Taking our schools in this township as a whole, they are in a better condition than in many other places I am acquainted with. During the month of January last, I travelled the counties of Huron, Middlesex and Perth, and part of Waterloo, and when I compare our schools with those in the above counties, I find the comparison very favorable indeed to us." Parts of the county are new and not very thickly settled; but most, if not all, of the schools are kept open the whole year, and are taught either by teachers licensed by the County Board of Public Instruction, or educated in the Normal School.

There is a good Grammar School in Sarnia, with an average attendance of 47 pupils. The following is a report of the School Statistics of the County.

### RECEIPTS.

1. The amount appropriated and paid by the Department of Public Instruction from the Legislative Grant for salaries of teachers was, in the county, \$2471, in the Town of Sarnia, \$240.

2. The amount apportioned and paid for the purchase of maps, apparatus, prizes and libraries, being in proportion, and equal to the amount expended from local sources, was, for the county, \$146 84. Sarnia, \$33 50.

3. The law requires that each municipality shall provide a sum by assessment, at least equal to the Legislative Grant, but each municipality can provide as large an additional sum as it may think proper

for school purposes. The amount provided by municipal assessment was for the county, \$3577. Sarnia \$215:

4. As the Council in the Municipality, so the Trustees in a School Section, have authority to provide money for the support of their school or schools, by assessment, and also by fees on pupils, unless the ratepayers decide in favor of a free school. The amount of assessment levied by Trustees, in addition to the levy by the Municipal Council, was \$18,251 12, for the county.

5. Ratebill fees on pupils are only imposed where the schools are not bee. The amount of ratebill imposed, was \$216.

6. The amount received by Trustees from the Clergy Reserve Fund and other sources, and appropriated for the county, was \$715 52.

7. The amount available in 1862, from the balance of 1861, was, for the county, \$2839. Sarnia, \$89.

8. The total receipts for Common School purposes, for the year 1862, in the county, were \$28,216 10. Sarnia, \$2802 35.

### EXPENDITURE.

9. The amount paid for the salaries of teachers, was, in the county \$20,214 99. Sarnia, \$2045.

10. The amount expended in the purchase of maps, apparatus, prize books and libraries, was, for the county,\$362 78. Sarnia, \$86 05.

11. The amount expended for school books, stationery, fuel and other expenses, was, for the county, \$1874 27. Sarnia, \$399 32.

12. The amount expended for the purchase of school sites, and the erection of school houses, was, for the county, \$961 17.

13. The amount paid for the rents and repairs of school houses, was, for the County, \$836. Sarnia, \$153.

14. The unexpended balances of the preceding years, were, for the county, \$3967. Sarnia, \$118.

# TOWNSHIP OF SOMBRA AND INDIAN RESERVES.

This Township is bounded on the east by Dawn, on the west by the river St. Clair, on the north by Moore, on the south by the County of Kent. The north branch of Bear Creek runs through the centre of the Township. There are other numerous small streams. The soil is principally clay, but it contains a few sandy ridges. Fall wheat and grain of every description are produced in great abundance. The population of Sombra in 1842 was 800. The value of rateable property was \$35,000; it is now \$309,333. There were only 1589 acres under cultivation in 1846; the number of acres under cultivation in 1861 was 8187.

### TOWNSHIP OF BOSANQUET.

This Township is bounded on the North-west by Lake Huron, on the East by the Townships of Williams, McGillivray, and a part of Stephen, and on the South by Warwick and Plympton. The River Aux Sables runs between it and Williams, and McGillivray on the east, and Stephen on the east and north. At the northern extremities of the Township it makes a sudden bend, and runs parallel with Lake Huron, at an average distance of about half a mile, for ten miles, when it enters the Lake. There are other streams that water the Township in all directions. The land in the northern part is not of such good quality as in the southern, where the soil is good, and adapted to the raising of crops of every description. The value of rateable property in the Township of Bosanquet in 1846 was \$5,000. The population in 1861 was 3097.

The north branch of Bear Creek runs through the north-west corner of the Township. There are other small streams that water the land in different parts. ## TOWNSHIP OF ENNISKILLEN.

This Township is bounded on the north by Plympton, on the east by Moore, on the south by Dawn. The Township is watered by the north branch of Bear Creek, which enters it at its north-east corner, running through it in a south-westerly direction, and also by Black Creek, both tributaries of the Sydenham, which empties itself into Lake St. Clair. A great portion of the soil in Enniskillen is of excellent quality, heavily timbered with elm, maple, beech, oak and ash. It is rapidly improving since the discovery of Petroleum in the southern portion of the Township, at the Village of Oil Springs, under the head of which will be found particulars regarding the oil trade. The roads have undergone great improvements within the last few years, thus affording increased facilities for the transportation of produce, &c., to market, and enhancing the value of property considerably. In 1846, lands were sold at \$1.60 per acre, and there was only one grist mill in the Township, and its population, with that of Moore, was only 780. The following table exhibits the state of the Township in 1861, since which time, however, agriculture and manufactures have rapidly increased.

## TOWN OF SARNIA.

Sarnia, the county town and judicial seat of the County of Lambton, is pleasantly situated on the St. Clair river, immediately opposite and distant one mile from the City of Port Huron, in the State of Michigan, which has a population of in or about five thousand inhabitants.

Sarnia was laid out by private individuals in the year one thousand eight hundred thirty-three, and within the last eight or ten years has rapidly increased in population and business importance.

The two great railroads, the Great Western and Grand Trunk, have their termini here, the former immediately in the town at its southern end; the latter at Point Edward, a place not exactly within the corporation, but on a neck of land or promontory immediately north of it, both of which have done much to enhance its position, and each have elevators of the largest capacity. The Grand Trunk has a stage running six times daily from the principal hotels to Point Edward, to meet the trains both on arrival and departure; fare each way 12½c. They also have a large ferry-boat called the St. Clair, and an immense vessel called the Huron, for the conveyance of freight cars from one side of St. Clair River to the other. The Huron takes 18 cars heavily loaded across each trip. She was originally built for a swing ferry-boat, but failed; she is now towed by the St. Clair.

In connection with the Great Western, a very nice though small ferry-boat, the Sarnia, runs from Sarnia to Port Huron, making trips every half hour; James Moffat owner and master, fare 10 cents, going and returning.

Sarnia, previous to the introduction of steam tugs, was the last place of departure for hundreds of vessels, some of which often were weather-bound there for ten or twelve days, and helped the town considerably, taking their lake stores from thence. The harbor, which is considered one of the best on the lakes, is situated about two miles south of Lake Huron, and its bay, which is of great size, sheltered by Point Edward, capable of giving safe anchorage to five or six hundred vessels, is deep and free from current; but the river St. Clair, from the lighthouse at Fort Gratriot, in Michigan, having a current of over four miles per hour, is not navigable to vessels (not propelled by steam) save with a very strong south or south-easterly or westerly wind. In consequence of the introduction of steam tugs, but very few vessels are now wind-bound in the harbor.

The soil north and east of Sarnia, for about five miles, is quite sandy and

unproductive, and on the south-east, where it is of a rich clayey loam, four square miles are reserved for the Indians, in consequence of which the river road to Moore, and other southern townships, is allowed to get into bad repair, the township of Sarnia considering that Government should do the four miles. Notwithstanding these drawbacks, however, the town is well supplied with all descriptions of produce, large quantities finding their way across the river.

Sarnia is a Port of Entry, has a Collector of Customs and Landing Waiter resident in the town. It has two Out-posts, namely, Point Edward and Moortown, with officers at each. Previous to the war there was much smuggling done, but the tables are turned, and the business goes the other way now.

Sarnia is about sixty miles west of London, and same north-west of Chatham, Windsor and Detroit; has to the former place a plank and macadamized road, and a branch of the Great Western Railroad; to Chatham a common graded road, and to Detroit and Windsor water and railroad communication by Grand Trunk. At the time we write, there is in construction a plank road of the best description to the Oil Springs, in Enniskillen, which will open up a splendid woodland country, and will tend to keep the wood market at a low rate; the distance is only eighteen miles. The corporation took \$20,000, or about half the stock in it. It is believed the road will pay without taxing the inhabitants. There are also other roads leading into Sarnia, which make it accessible as a market for the products of a rich agricultural country, to the east and south.

The value of the exports from Sarnia in 1844 was only \$14,237, principally potash, fish and lumber, all other articles amounting in value to about \$500. In 1850 the exports were valued at \$156,425, showing an increase in six years of \$142,188. The population in 1846 was about 400, while in 1850 it was upwards of 800, having doubled itself in the small space of four years. Its population now is about 2,500, giving an increase in the last ten years of 1,700. Its general appearance has also been greatly improved in the same period, by the erection of a superior class of private dwellings, stores and public buildings. The Bank of Upper Canada, School Houses, Town Hall, Court House and Gaol, the three former being built of brick and the latter of stone, are all situated in the North Ward, and all (with the exception of the schools, which are on George street) on Christina street. The streets, generally, are regularly laid out at right angles, the only exception being between Front and Christina streets, where, in consequence of the former being on the river line, it causes an angle in many of the lots. The sidewalks are good, and in Front street eleven feet wide, the other streets generally four feet. The town is built on a flat tableland, about eighteen feet above the river.

Manufactures of various kinds are carried on with great success. There is a large foundry capable of turning out eastings 4,000 pounds weight, a steam brewery, two saw mills, a grist mill, two tanneries, and three oil refineries, all in active operation. We may here remark, that on completion of the new plank road the petroleum trade of Sarnia will form an important item. It also contains three waggon and carriage shops, four blacksmith shops, two hardware stores, two bakeries, two watch-makers, two cabinet shors and warehouses, several boot and and shoe stores, and numerous dry goods and grocery stores, seven hotels and three saloons, four billiard tables, and four butchers, who have stalls in the market on Lochiel Street, besides private shops for corned, dried meats and sausages. The town also contains the following churches,-Episcopal, Roman Catholic, United Presbyterian, Wesleyan Methodist, Congregational and Baptist. It has also a temple of the National Division of Good Templars, a Temperance Society, a Freemasons' Lodge and Chapter, and an Orange Lodge, the officers of all of which for the current year will be found in another part of this work. Two newspapers are published weekly,—the Observer, J. R. Gemmill, Esq., Editor and Proprietor, is a Reform paper having a very large circulation, and the British Canadian, Conservative, owned and edited by J. H. Wood, Esq. The former has been published with great success for the past ten years, and will bear comparison with any other paper in the Province. The latter has been published about six years.

The town has three members in the Legislature,—Hon. Alexander Vidal, M.L.C., for the St. Clair Division, Alexander Mackenzie, M.P.P. for the County of Lambton, and Hope F. Mackenzie, M. P.P. for

North Oxford.

Sarnia contains its share of mechanics, &c., and its business is in a flourishing and healthy condition; having the benefit of navigation in summer and railroads in winter it does not experience the fluctuations consequent upon the absence of one or both of these.

In a word, Sarnia may be denominated a flourishing town.

## OIL SPRINGS.

This large and rapidly improving village is situated in the Township of Enniskillen on Bear Creek, a tributary of the Sydenham. It is distant from Wyoming, a station on the Sarnia branch of the Great Western Railway, 12 miles, (daily stages run between both places,fare 50 cts.,) from Sarnia 22 miles direct, and 28 by stage and rail, and from London 56 miles. Oil Springs owes its rise and progress to the discovery of petroleum or rock oil in the vicinity and place where the village now stands. Oil was observed here on the surface of the water a number of years previous to its nature and value being understood. The International Mining Company, formed for the purpose of ascertaining the mineral wealth of the Township of Enniskillen, was superceded in 1858 by Mr. Williams, who subsequently sold out to the Canada Rock Oil Company, of which he is at present president. When it was discovered that petroleum existed in what was then considered inexhaustible quantities, capitalists came to the field from the United States and different parts of Canada, encouraged by the extraordinary flow of oil from the first wells. From the want of adequate preparations great quantities of oil were entirely lost; the number of barrels of oil lost from one flowing well, owned by Messrs. Black & Matheson, being estimated at 30,000 barrels. The copious flow of oil from the first wells had the effect of enhancing the value of the oil territory to an almost fabulous degree, and gave an impetus to business of every description in the village, which was laid out in 1860 by J. M. Williams, James Thompson, W. E. Sanborn and Hugh M. Shaw, since which time it has attained a population of about 2,000 inhabitants. It contains eight general stores, five blacksmith shops, two shoe shops, twenty-five carpenters, one cabinet shop, two tailor shops, one carriage shop, five cooperages, five hotels, one physician, two churches, a good school, an agency of the Bank of Montreal, an office of the Oil Springs and Wyoming Telegraph Company. The Oil interests are represented and advocated by a weekly journal under the title of the Oil Springs' Chronicle, edited by Messrs W. W. Evans and T. J. Hudson. The number of oil wells now sunk are estimated at 300, some of which are pumped by steam the rest by horse power. Wells, refineries and stills extend along Black Creek for three miles. The aggregate capacity of all the refineries is 1,800 barrels, of the stills 500 barrels. The 8th Division Court is held here, of which Mr. George Adamson is Clerk. Although the yield of petroleum has considerably decreased, a steady and advantageous business will undoubtedly be carried on in it for a number of years,

## MOORETOWN.

A post village pleasantly situated on the St. Clair River, opposite the City of St. Clair, Michigan, and distant from Sarnia about ten miles, from Detroit fifty. The post office was established in 1834; Mr. James F. Baby was the first Postmaster, who afterwards (in 1852) laid out the village. Boats call daily at this point on their way from Detroit to Port Huron, and on their return. Great quantities of staves, square timber and cordwood (the steamers being supplied,) are shipped at this port. It contains two steam saw mills, six general stores, four shoe shops, one tailor shop, two waggon shops, three blacksmith shops, one cabinet shop, a saddlery, a brewery, two carpenter shops, two hotels, two physicians, one lawyer, a custom house, and three churches, viz:—Episcopal, Congregational and Wesleyan Methodist. There are also two temperance organizations, an Orange lodge, and a good school. Mails, tri-weekly—Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Wm. Mc-Pherson, P. M.

## WYOMING.

The village of Wyoming is situated in the township of Plympton on the line of the Sarnia branch of the G.W.R.R., being twelve miles north of the village of Oil Springs, sixteen miles from Sarnia and forty five miles from London. County Court.—Presided over by a resident Judge in each county.—Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed £50; and to all suits relating to debt, covenant, or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties, or signature of the defendant, to £100; and to all bail bonds and recognizances of bail given in the County Court, to any amount; but not to cases involving the title to lands, validity of wills, or actions for libel, slander, crim. con., or seduction. An appeal lies to either of the Superior Courts of Law. These Courts also possess equity powers, to the amount of £50, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery. COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS.—For the trial of issues of fact, and the assessment of damages, on the second Tuesday in March, June, September, and and December, in each year. Charles Robinson, Chairman.

Surrogars Court.—The jurisdiction of these Courts relates to all testamentary matters and causes, and to the granting or revoking of probate of wills, and letters of administration of the effects of deceased persons having estate or effects in Upper Canada, and all matters arising out of or connected with the grant or revocation of probate or administration, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery. The County Judges are also Judges of the Surrogate Courts. J. R. Gemmill, Registrar.

Law Circuits.—The Courts of the western Circuit are held in St. Thomas. Sandwich, Sarnia, Chatham, London and Goderich. Clerk of Assizes, Deputy Clerk of the Crown, ex officio.

Division Courts.—For the summary disposal of cases by a Judge; but a jury of five persons may be demanded in certain cases. Their jurisdiction extends to actions of debt or contract amounting to £25°; injuries or terts to personal chattels amounting to £10; but not to actions for gambling debts, liquors drunk in a tavern, or notes of hand given therefor, ejectment, title to land, etc., or any toll, custom or franchise, will or settlement, malicious prosecution, libel, slander, crim. con., seduction, or breach of promise, or actions against a J.P., for anything done by him in the execution of his office, if he objects to it. Courts are held once in two months in each division, or oftener, at the discretion of the Judge.—The Divisions are established by the Courts of Quarter Sessions.—Charles Robinson, Judge.
