JEMOCRACY OF THE CANADIAN SYSTEM

London, Jan. 26—"Canada's Demo-cratic Army" is the title of an article in the Daily Chronicle, intended to show that the staff college standards of leaderhip in the field are mistaken. The writer says that if the government wants an example for recruiting a general staff from a wider and more fruitful field, let hem observe the unquestioned success of the Canadian Corps. Yet the Canadian eorps has very few staff soldiers. He points out that the commanding officer of the Canadians, Lieut.—General Curcer of the Canadians, Lieut.-General Currie, though always a keen military student and citizen soldier, is a real estate agent. Lieut.-Colonel Turner, commanding the Canadians in England, is a member of a large Quebec firm of wholesale grocers, but a born soldier.

The Canadian artiflery is led by a former editor of the Ottawa Citizen, General E. B. Morrison. Brig.-General Ross is a miller in business. Brig.-General Maclaren, Griesbach and Mercer are all solicitors, and Brig.-General Watson, commanding the 4th Canadian Division, who had no active service before this war, formerly was a reporter.

Make It Dominion Wide

(Regina Leader.) Regina being committed to what is popularly known as "Daylight Saving" during the summer months, that is, mov-ing the hands of the clock forward one during the summer months, that is, moving the hands of the clock forward one hour during the months of long hours and sunlight, it is in the general interests of this city and district that this innovation should be made uniform all over the Dominion, all over America in fact.

Last year Sir George Foster introduced a bill in parliament with this object in view, but he lacked the courage to make it a government measure, and, in the face of some opposition from a few members, withdrew the bill. With Union government in office, pledged to the taking of any and all measures no matter how radical or even drastic, calculated to result in increased production and decreased expenditure and consumption of articles essential to the carrying on of the war, efforts should be renewed to secure the early passage of a daylight saving law for all Canada.

One of the most pressing problems in Canada and the United States today is the conservation of coal. The problem is most acute at the present time, and fears are expressed that there may be a shortage amounting to actual hardship before the winter is over. In order to save coal our railway services are being activated.





St. John's, Nfid.—An illustration of how the material prosperity of the Newfoundland people has increased this year is found in the estimate that three million dollars will be deposited in the savings banks of the Island during 1917, against somewhat over one million dollars in 1916, and rather less than a million in 1915, while it is calculated that fully another million dollars has been invested during 1917 in sailing vessels.


