AUSTRIA REPORTED READY TO BREAK FROM GERMANY AND MAKE SEPARATE PEACE

London, Jan. 26.—Austria has declared her readiness to conclude a separate peace without Germany, and to accept the Russian democratic programme, with the exception of self-determination of nations, says a despatch from Petrograd to the Exchange Telegraph Company.

CZECHOSLOVAK SPEECH MORE PEACEFUL THAN THAT OF GERMAN CHANCELLOR

Comment in England, France and United States on Deliverances of Enemy Statesmen

London, Jan. 26.—An Amsterdam despatch to the Central News, quoting a speech of the German newspaper content, is divided on the subject of Chancellor Von Hertling's speech. The pan-German newspapers approve of his remarks on Alsace-Lorraine, but reproach him for his conciliatory tone in regard to Belgium and France and for "not using the language of a victor."

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BAR CLOSED ON THE VOYAGE TO CANADA

Toronto Paper Speaks of Complaints About Some Officers

Toronto, Jan. 26.—The telegram says: "Drastic measures are to be taken immediately by Ottawa to ensure that in the future the conduct of officers and men returning to Canada shall not be open to criticism. The minister of defence has issued a circular to all officers and men returning to Canada, advising them that they are to be held responsible for their conduct during their absence."

REPORTS ON COAL SITUATION IN STATES

Pittsburgh, Pa., Jan. 26.—With the daily output of fuel through the anthracite belt barely exceeding the tonnage needed for the winter, reports are being received, according to mining officials, and it is feared that suffering for coal will be acute if the railroads face further traffic congestion.

HALF MILLION FIRE IN PETERBORO

Peterboro, Ont., Jan. 26.—This morning one-half of the business section in George street, between Simcoe and Charlotte streets, was wiped out. The fire broke out about 6:30 o'clock in the shoe store of Robert Neill, due to the explosion of a hot water boiler. The fire spread quickly, taking in the retail store of the Matthews-Blackwell Company, the Dominion Bank and the Royal Motion Picture Theatre. The Neill shoe store, the Royal Theatre and the Matthews-Blackwell Company's stores are complete wrecks. The Dominion Bank building was badly gutted. The loss will be well up to a half million.

UNITED MINE WORKERS FAVOR TAKING OVER OF MINES BY GOVERNMENT

Indianapolis, Jan. 26.—After expelling industrial workers of the world from membership in the organization, if there are any, the United Mine Workers yesterday went on record as favoring the taking over of the coal mines by the government, on condition that the union men had the right to make collective bargaining. They asked no special privileges in the operation of the selective draft, opposed conscription of labor and adopted a "war resolution" declaring the coal diggers to be in full accord with President Wilson's announcement and demanding the "unrestricted right of working men and women to organize and deal collectively with their employers."

Prepare To Meet Greatest Attack Yet Attempted

Lord Curzon Sees It Coming On The West Front

DEFENSE STAFF GENERALS

Discussing Peace, Says It Not Obtainable From Enemy, at Moment, on Terms Consistent With Our Honor and Safety

London, Jan. 26.—Lord Curzon, speaking at Cardiff last night, admitted broadly speaking, that the war aims of the Labor party agreed with the war aims of Premier Lloyd George and President Wilson. He said that the British forces on the western front were preparing for the greatest attack yet delivered by the enemy. It is unlikely, he said, that Germany will not employ the large force released by the Russian collapse, and added that four forces may be called upon to ensure the greatest strain they have yet borne. He warmly defended the staff generals against press attacks made on them.

ALL GRAIN MILLS TO BE LICENSED

Food Controller Extending His Sway—Profits to Be Limited

Ottawa, Jan. 26.—An order-in-council has been passed requiring that all flour mills, irrespective of capacity, and all mills for the manufacture of any food from wheat, barley, oats, rye, Indian corn or maize, peas or buckwheat, must obtain a license. The food controller, by being brought under license and subject to the food controller's regulations, the price of these articles will be limited to a maximum average of twenty-five cents on the milling of sufficient wheat to make a barrel of 166 pounds.

RAID NEAR LOOS

London, Jan. 26.—(Delayed)—"After heavily battling our positions this evening, a few prisoners last night in patrol encounters southwest of Cambrai. Hostile artillery was active early in the night against our positions in the Scarpe Valley."

MATTER AFFECTING CANADA'S SOLDIERS

Ottawa, Jan. 26.—The department of militia and defence has issued a memorandum to acquaint the relative and friends of soldiers serving in the Canadian forces with the policies which have been adopted with respect to promotions, transfers, furloughs and kindred matters, and also to inform those interested where to direct inquiries about such matters.

EIGHT MORE BODIES RECOVERED FROM MINE

Stellarton, N. S., Jan. 26.—During last night and early this morning eight more bodies were removed from the Allan mine. Some are badly disfigured. So far no fire has been discovered. Owing to the rise of water in the pit another pump has been installed, and when this is set to work the searchers expect to make better progress.

SURPRISE IN CONNECTION WITH DRAFT IN STATES

Boston, Jan. 26.—The age limits for drafting Canadian and other British subjects in the United States will cause surprise, said Captain Kenneth A. Maczigt, of the Canadian-British recruiting mission, last night in announcing that the United States and her allies had reached an agreement for the drafting of aliens.

Toronto, Ont., Jan. 26.—Premier Borden has in view the immediate nationalization of all railways, either temporarily for the duration of the war, or permanently, according to the views of the higher officials of the Canadian Northern Railway, who returned from Ottawa yesterday.

Grave Disorders in Berlin And Talk of Revolution

Rioters Said to Be Clamoring for Peace; Bread Riots Ruthlessly Suppressed; No Confirmation, But Censorship on Telegraph Lines

London, Jan. 26.—The Amsterdam correspondent of the Express says that extraordinary reports are current concerning a revolution in Germany, and that there have been rumors of grave disorders in Berlin during the last two days, the rioters clamoring for peace. He also reports bread riots, which were ruthlessly repressed by the police, many men, women and children being wounded.

The correspondent admits that confirmation of these rumors is impossible, but thinks that it is remarkable that no telegrams, either press or commercial, were received in Holland on Friday direct from Berlin, all coming by round-about routes. None of Thursday morning's Berlin newspapers have arrived.

Washington, Jan. 26.—A flood reported in the upper Rhine Valley has inundated the city of Cologne, destroying quantities of provisions stored in cellars, according to despatches received here. In some localities the rise of the river was so rapid that the people had to be aroused by the tolling of bells. Troops were sent to aid the inhabitants. The tributaries of the Rhine also are overflowing, interrupting railroad traffic, while many communities in the valley of the Moselle are completely cut off. Railroad tracks are said to be under water in many places.

THE WRITING ON THE WALL

Amsterdam, Jan. 25.—The Cologne Gazette, in reporting a debate in the Prussian lower house, says that a great uproar arose over a speech by Herr Hoffmann, independent Socialist, who said that the government was sending in Austria. "The events in Austria are the writing on the wall and here, as Austria, we are within close range of a catastrophe. The people have had enough of being goaded to war."

PAN ZARETA THE QUEEN OF SPRINTERS

Won at Least One Race on Every Track She Started on—Was a Great Favorite

Pan Zareta, a great racing mare, which died the other day, was insured for \$10,000, but her loss to the turf is far beyond any money value.

She has been called the Queen of Sprinters, and rightly, for few horses ever developed in this country have shown such remarkable consistency and speed over a stretch of six racing seasons.

She holds the distinction of having won one race or more over every track on which she has started, and whose started on practically every track in the United States and Canada.

Was Eight Years Old. Pan Zareta was a chestnut mare by Abe Frank-Cadell Griffith and turned eight years of age on Jan. 1. She has won eighty races out of 100 starts in six seasons on the turf, an average of something over fifty per cent. She passed King's mark of seventy-five winning races at the Empire City track last summer, and was on the high road to equal or better Logan's remarkable record of 100 victories.

Pan Zareta was amazingly popular, and no wonder. From the day she became a two-year-old she has been raced almost continuously winter and summer. Her only respite came for a short period in the summer of 1913, when she was turned out for a well deserved Raced on All Tracks.

From New Orleans to Canada by way of the Middle West and back again was her yearly pilgrimage until last season, when for the first time she was taken to the New York track where she quickly earned the same popularity that marked her career from the beginning.

She won race after race, usually under big weights, to the marvel of horsemen and to the profit of her owner and his Her Best Performance.

Her most striking performance perhaps was six furlongs in 1:12.5-5, establishing a new track record.

On that occasion she took up 188 pounds and raced five and a half furlongs in the fast time of 1:05-5-3, establishing a new track record.

Behind her on that day were such good sprinters as Top of Morning, High Noon and Wood Tray among others. In truth, she probably had no equal at any distance up to six furlongs among the older horses.

In her six years of racing she had averaged just under fourteen races a year, a record perhaps that will never be equalled in the history of the American turf. On top of this she was rarely outside of the money, usually finishing second or third when beaten.

THE WAR SITUATION.

Official Germany is still for war, until such time as it can dictate the terms of peace. The Allies could not for a moment pause to listen to such terms as Chancellor Von Hertling suggests.

Official Austria is less aggressive, but there is nothing in the speech of Foreign Minister Ceramlin to indicate that Austria will not continue to support Germany in the field.

The conditions in Russia are very bad. The army is said to be demoralized at the very time Germany presses her demands and threatens another invasion.

THE PROBATION SYSTEM. An interesting account of the probation system for offenders against the laws of Massachusetts appears in an address recently given by Mr. James F. McLaughlin, who is probation officer of the town of Leominster. He thus defines the system:

"Probation is a system of rules devised for the supervision of those who violate the rules of society, and educating them how to regain and maintain their place in society. The probation officer acts as the clearinghouse of trouble, has to listen to all the troubles and then acts as an adviser and supervisor."

Mr. McLaughlin points out that recent penal methods tend toward greater discrimination in dealing with different classes of offenders, and thus reviews the progress of the newer methods in Massachusetts.

"In 1847 the state established the State reform school for boys, now the Lyman school, at Westboro, and in 1855 the State reform school for girls, now the State industrial school for girls, in Lancaster. In these schools, besides schooling and farm work, the girls are taught domestic science, and the boys are given a training along industrial lines, all of which has proven a great benefit to them in later years.

"In 1874 the act creating the reformatory prison for women at Sherburne was passed and about ten years later the reformatory at Concord was established. These two reformatories are in a large measure industrial schools. In 1905 the prison camp and hospital was established at Rindford for prisoners having tubercular disease.

"Another significant line of development of our penal law is the placing out of juvenile offenders in private families. This method was used early in the history of our two reform schools, and is still followed, and is an important part of the state's correctional machinery. In the year 1880 a law was enacted whereby mayors and aldermen in cities and selectmen in towns might appoint probation officers, and in the year 1903 it appearing that the method of appointing the probation officers was unsatisfactory a law was passed whereby it became mandatory that each police district and municipal court judge should appoint a

Robertson MORE DIFFICULT GAME THAN KITCHENER

Northcliffe is Tackling Complex Problem in His Next Campaign; Known as Good Soldier

London, Jan. 25.—In opening the campaign against General Robertson, chief of staff, Lord Northcliffe is tackling a much more complex problem than when he attacked Lord Kitchener. The latter was still a popular figure, but his most fervent admirers, in circles where the facts were known, believed that his best work, that for which he was peculiarly fitted, had been done, and splendidly done.

Robertson has not the same popularity as Kitchener, and the cavalry may not burn the Daily Mail for his sake. The general public, however, which in these matters draws its impressions from the army, which now forms so large a part of the nation, looks upon him as a good soldier.

Robertson is charged by Lord Fraser, who views the Daily Mail as careful not to expose in their entirety, with being the representative of the caste system of the old regular army. That officers of the territorial and new army battalions are confined to regimental duties, while staff appointments are regarded as the prerogative of the old regulars, is one way of stating the charge. Another way is to say that, whereas the regular officers are but three per cent of the total number of officers in the present British army, they occupy 80 per cent of the staff positions. A third way is to assert that only regular officers ever get beyond the rank of brigadier-general.

With this part of the argument advanced by Mr. Fraser, and its corollary, that the brains of the new army were not receiving their best employment, there has for some considerable time past been, if not general agreement, at least considerable sympathy. H. Spencer Wilkinson, Chichele professor at Oxford, is one of several students of military history who have been advancing the proposition that if the best results were to be obtained, the best brains must be used, irrespective of whether they belong to the old regular cadres or to the territorial or other branches of the new army, under the scurrilous, but now happily rare, classification of "T.B.s" otherwise "temporarily gentes." It has been the common belief, in circles generally described as being "in the know," that steps were about to be taken to provide a remedy for this acknowledged evil.

What has occasioned the most surprise is the particular method by which the Northcliffe campaign has been opened. The announcement of the resignation of

THINK \$4,000 A YEAR TOO MUCH FOR AVIATORS

Washington, Jan. 26.—Discontinuance for the duration of the war of the extra pay allowances for men in the aviation corps is under consideration at the War Department. The extra pay was provided on the theory that aviation was the most hazardous branch of the service but that while flying in peace time it was relatively most dangerous in war time it is safer than the infantry and other arms. Under present regulations a first lieutenant in aviation, who secures a rating as military aviator, is immediately awarded, for purposes of pay comparison, promotion to a captain, which carries a salary of about \$2,400 a year. A detail to duty requiring regular flights adds 50 per cent to this sum and another 20 per cent is added for foreign service, increasing the lieutenant's pay to more than \$4,000 a year.

OUR AIRMEN DO GREAT WORK

Attacks on the Cruiser Goeben Kept Up

BUSY TIMES ON WEST FRONT

Sixteen German Machines Brought Down on Wednesday and Thursday and Enemy Works Are Successfully Attacked

London, Jan. 26.—An official statement issued by the admiralty last night says:—"Since the last official communication, aerial attacks on the Goeben have been carried out incessantly, and during the last forty-eight hours some seven tons of bombs were dropped on and around the ship and on an airfield at Galata, several direct hits being observed and the results confirmed by photographic reconnaissance."
"A Turkish cruiser which was near the Goeben has left port proceeding to the Straits, and a steamer which apparently was engaged in lighting the Goeben, was destroyed."
"The anti-aircraft fire has been very severe, but the only casualty yet reported is one Greek officer, whose machine was shot down. The operations are continuing."

On West Front
Naval aircraft bombed a German airfield at Varsenere on Friday, making direct hits. All the machines returned.

In patrol fighting on Wednesday, two enemy aircraft were destroyed and two were shot down out of control. One British machine is missing.
There was aerial activity on a large scale on Thursday owing to favorable weather conditions.
More than 300 bombs were dropped on the Courcel, Ledeghan and Douai railway stations, the airfield near Courcel and on German billets west of Cambrai. The enemy's hangars at Douai and other ground targets were also bombed. Seven hostile machines were brought down and five others were driven out of control. Two British machines are missing.

So soon as it was dark British night flyers bombed a German airfield north-east of Ghent and other airfields near Courcel and billets west of Cambrai. All of the machines returned. At the same time other machines raided several objectives in Germany, making direct hits on factories, docks and in the town of Mannheim.

The barracks and railway station at Treves, the steel works at Thionville, and the railway stations at Saarbrücken and Oberkail were also attacked with excellent results. The pilots report large explosions at all objectives and a big fire at Treves. One of the British machines failed to return.

LABOR NEVER SO FIRMLY DECIDED TO CARRY ON WAR

Nottingham Convention, Just Closed, Most Important Party Has Ever Had

Nottingham, England, Jan. 26.—The British Labor party has closed the most important convention in its history. The outstanding fact of the three days' proceedings was the decision to carry on the war. British labor emphatically asserted that the world must be completely won before any peace is negotiated. The pactist element in the conference, although demonstrative, was beaten decisively on every occasion its proposals reached the voting stage. For three years the question of the conduct of the war has been the principal pre-occupation of this annual conference and each time labor has decided to go on, but it never before has spoken in so emphatic and specific a manner as this year, nor with such unanimity.

During the course of the convention there were occasional outbursts of revolutionary sentiment from irresponsible delegates, but Arthur Henderson, as head of the party, disposed of them with scant courtesy.

A resolution for abolition of the House of Lords and against any form of second chamber was reported to the conference yesterday.

Representatives of the railway men said that the railway employees had reached the breaking point and that the union would back them if they declined to work on account of lack of food. The responsibility, they said, would be due to mismanagement on the part of the government.

LENINE TAKES LEAF FROM CAZAR'S BOOK

London Opinion is That the Bolsheviks Have Demonstrated Their Dishonesty—Provoking Anarchy

London, Jan. 26.—Bolshevik suppression of the constituent assembly at Petrograd has killed whatever inclination might have been growing here to regard the leaders of the movement as honest, if misguided, fanatics. Lenine has taken a leaf out of the Czar's book and has gone him one better, and Trotsky, while pleading for the self-determination of other peoples at Brest-Litovsk, has taken effective measures to deprive the Russians themselves of that sacred right.

This action cannot be regarded as a sign of the Bolsheviks' acceptance here as showing that their object is to provide complete anarchy by tyrannous oppression, and to prevent by every means any sort of civilized reconstruction of the old government. It is a sign of the Bolsheviks' determination to gain the ascendancy, but there are signs that it is getting nervous about the world.

Premier Lenine has informed a delegation of Workmen and Soldiers' delegates that the assembly will not be permitted to reassemble anywhere, but that a national convention would be formed by the forthcoming congress of Workmen and Soldiers' delegates, says a Reuters despatch from Petrograd. Other despatches say that the Bolsheviks are now hunting out supporters of the assembly. All non-Socialist papers have been suppressed, the correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph reports, while the Red Guards are reported to have received orders to arrest any member of the Keresky government, believed to be in Petrograd. One report says the Bolsheviks intend to arrest M. Tcheronoff, chairman of the constituent assembly. On the other hand some of the Red Guards are reported to have refused, saying they considered the action of the Bolsheviks toward the assembly as opposed to liberty.

The revenue of the Dominion for the nine months was \$190,628,370, as against \$168,826,249 for the similar period in 1916. For December alone the revenue was \$20,617,263. In December, 1916, it was \$21,948,772. Expenditure chargeable to revenue totaled \$66,862,637, as compared with \$81,696,506 in the previous year.

The total net debt of the Dominion on December 31 stood at \$976,428,504. On the same date in 1916 it was \$722,111,440. During December the revenue increased by \$18,427,908, which was approximately a million less than the war expenditure for that month.

Make It Dominion Wide

(Regina Leader.)
Regina being committed to what is popularly known as "Daylight Saving" during the summer months, that is, moving the hands of the clock forward one hour during the months of long hours and sunlight, it is in the general interests of this city and district that this innovation should be made uniform all over the Dominion, all over America in fact. Last year Sir George Foster introduced a bill in parliament with this object in view, but he lacked the courage to make it a government measure, and, in the face of some opposition from a few members, withdrew the bill. With Union government in office, pledged to the taking of any and all measures no matter how radical or even drastic, calculated to result in increased production and decreased expenditure and consumption of articles essential to the carrying on of the war, efforts should be renewed to secure the early passage of a daylight saving law for all Canada. One of the most pressing problems in Canada and the United States today is the conservation of coal. The problem is most acute at the present time, and fears are expressed that there may be a shortage amounting to actual hardship before the winter is over. In order to save coal our railway services are being restricted, special services, etc., are ordered to be discontinued, and the coal thus saved utilized in the moving of freight trains carrying munitions, grain and other war supplies. Sufficient coal to keep all munition factories, steel works, shipbuilding plants and other war industries must be forthcoming. Therefore, every possible ton of coal must be saved for these essential industries. What better course could be followed than by lengthening the period of the natural day this summer and thus cutting off one hour in which artificial light is required—light produced in most of our cities and towns by the consumption of coal to produce electric energy? It is during the summer months that our residential stocks of coal are built up for the ensuing winter months. Daylight Saving in England, it is estimated, resulted in the saving of 300,000 tons of coal. For the United States

and Canada it is computed that the saving that can be effected by this means would amount to the huge total of one million tons. Our own Regina electric light plant records reveal a saving to citizens in electric light bills of several thousand dollars every summer. But the saving of coal is only one of the many economies effected by daylight saving in the summer months. There are admittedly some disadvantages in daylight saving when it is in vogue in one community and not in others, but all these, or practically all, would disappear by a universal acceptance and enforcement of the change. We do not know that any disadvantages would then remain, but such as they were would be overwhelmingly offset by the other beneficial results obtained. In fact, it passes our comprehension why there should be any objection raised to the general application of daylight saving. It can only be accounted for on the score of the deep-rooted feeling of ultra-conservative people against all new ideas and changes in the existing order of things. Discussing this question as it affects the great republic to the south, the New York Nation says: "With the need of saving coal greater than ever, advocates of the daylight saving bill, which passed the senate last summer but was blocked in the house, are preparing to make every effort to obtain its enactment this winter. The weight of argument behind it is fairly overwhelming. Twelve European countries, including England, France, Italy, Germany, Austria, Denmark, Holland and Sweden, with Australia, have adopted a similar measure, and England alone computes her saving in coal at 800,000 tons. The development of small-scale gardening or farming, the promotion of outdoor recreation, the more natural day, are all reasons for the innovation, and it is not believed that even those countries which undertook it purely as a

war economy measure, will return to the old uniformity in summer and winter hours. The measure has been endorsed by President Wilson, by the whole cabinet, by the advisory commission of the council of National Defence, by the American Federation of Labor, and by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States." So far as Regina is concerned, committed as we are to the daylight saving policy, we should without delay exert every influence we can to prevail upon the Ottawa authorities at the approaching session of the new parliament to apply it to the whole dominion as a war measure this summer. 



The schooner, which is now at sea, is in command of Captain McLean, formerly of the schooner Irma Bentley.

The board of health reports the following deaths for the week: Senility, four; heart disease, three; tuberculosis, two; heart failure, two; and one death from each of the following disorders: typhoid, meningitis, pleurisy, pneumonia, endocarditis, Bright's disease, carcinoma of stomach, shock from injuries and carbolic acid poisoning, making a total of twenty-three.

MRS. MARY SARGENT.

The death of Mrs. Mary Sargent, widow of Thomas Sargent, occurred this morning at her residence, 52 Moore street, after a lingering illness. She was seventy-five years old and leaves two sons, James T. and William M., both of this city; two daughters, Mrs. David Clark and Miss Huetta, and one sister, Mrs. Agnes Reynolds, all of this city. The funeral will take place on Monday afternoon.

GREEN SIDE WON.

Members of the senior Epworth League of Portland Methodist church met in their hall in Portland street last evening to hear the result of a recent missionary campaign. The members had formed two sides, one captained by Miss Hattie Wright and the other by Miss Jennie Day. The former was known as the "White Side" and the latter as "The Green." President R. H. Maxwell announced that the green side won the contest and that a substantial amount had been collected for missions. Gordon Stevens, president of the Young People's Union, gave a short address which evoked hearty applause. During the evening games were enjoyed and refreshments served.

SURPRISE GATHERING.

On last Friday evening a large number of St. John folk still gathered at the home of Mrs. W. Priddle, 59 Somerset street, having gathered there to celebrate Mrs. Priddle's birthday. Music, games and refreshments were greatly enjoyed, after which a useful gift was presented. The only expression of sadness was that Mr. Priddle was absent. He is fighting for his king in France. He enlisted in a siege battery. The party dispersed in the early hours of the morning, all wishing Mrs. Priddle many happy returns.

BIG SEIZURE OF LIQUOR IN CITY TODAY

Inspectors Take Five Cases and Trunk Containing Eleven Gallon Cans—Seizure at Minto Also

Liquor inspectors Crawford and Barrett made a large seizure at the Dominion Express Company's office on King street this morning when five cases and a new trunk in which were packed eleven one gallon cans of whiskey were found wrongly addressed. This liquor was taken to the inspectors' office in Prince William street, and will eventually find its way to the depot for concealed liquor in Smythe street.

Rev. W. D. Wilson, chief liquor inspector for the province, arrived in the city this morning. He will be out of the city over Sunday, but expects to be back on Monday morning. On Monday afternoon Patrick O'Keefe will be tried on a liquor charge in the police court. Chief Inspector Wilson, on his return today was accompanied by Inspector Thomas Barrett. They had visited Minto, where a seizure of two cases of liquor was made and some samples of beer secured for analysis.

LEMON EXTRACT MUST BE POTENT

Policeman Testifies as to Threat of Mr. Peterson to Shoot Off Head of Colored Companion With Flashlight

Henry Craft was remanded in the police court this morning on charge of being drunk in Main street last night and having liquor in his possession. He was arrested by Policeman Kierstead.

Bradford Mason, colored, and Arthur Peterson, white, faced charges of being drunk, drinking in public and having liquor in their possession, all as a result of attempting to replace the "old original" with lemon extract. The two, according to Policeman Saunders' evidence this morning, were "falling all over the street and into each other's arms." The occasion was on Tuesday last at Kane's corner. Saunders swore that Peterson gave the other man a bottle which he drained and threw on the side of the road and that Peterson then threatened his companion's life and drawing a pocket flashlight from his pocket said: "I'll shoot your head off, and I've got the gun here." Saunders testified that at this point he placed both men under arrest. He found eight bottles on Peterson, six of them full.

Peterson pleaded guilty to all charges, but Mason said that "well, I wasn't drunk, exactly, and seemed disposed to think he was wrongly accused. No like he was drunk on him. His Honor remanded both men until the extract could be analyzed and the inspectors could find out from where the liquor came.

A boy was charged with stealing two horse blankets, valued at \$10, from the New Brunswick Telephone Company's barn in Peter's alley. He pleaded guilty and said that the blankets for \$4, but refused to divulge the name of the person to whom the sale was made. He was remanded.

REV. F. P. DENNISON IS CALLED TO ONTARIO

St. Thomas, Ont., Jan. 26—Rev. F. Patrick Dennison of St. John, N. B., has accepted a call to Centre street Baptist church here. He succeeds Rev. O. C. Ellette, who resigned to go to Toronto to do evangelical work under the home mission board.

Rev. Mr. Dennison said today that he had received the call on Thursday of this week but had not yet decided as to acceptance.

LOCAL BAKER TO CONFERENCE IN OTTAWA

Joseph Dwyer, of Dwyer Bros., bakers, is to leave for Ottawa this evening to attend a conference of bakers of the Dominion to be held there. Mr. Dwyer represents the local bakers. This conference, which is of national importance, will extend over two days. The flour situation will be fully discussed and also plans for the conservation of wheat.

ST. JOHN SOLDIER WEDS IN ENGLAND

A wedding of much interest to the people of St. John was solemnized in St. Giles' church, Walton, England, when Miss Alice M. Breakpear, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Breakpear of Walton-on-Thomas, was united in marriage to Corporal W. A. Alward of St. John. Corporal Alward was one of the first to enlist in St. John, crossing to England with the old 12th battalion in October, 1914. He went to France with the 15th battalion. And there, with the exception of a few weeks' furlough, he has been ever since. His many friends will wish him and his bride much happiness.

LETTER FROM SOLDIER SON

Mrs. D. Cummings of 6 Delhi street, has received a letter from her son, William Cummings, dated in France, Jan. 2, in which he says:

"Every mother who has a son in the Canadian army can always hold up her head and say: 'My boy belongs to the finest fighting soldiers in the world.' We have been told so by the commander of the army corps. We are having lots of snow over here now and lots of ice. I only wish I had had my skates on Christmas Day. I suppose when I get back you would not know me. I am not a boy now as it was when I left you at the station in 1914. I will meet you again at the same station, I hope, in 1918—not a boy but a man. Tell Dad he never brought his boys up to be cowards."
