that there are 1,600 vacancies for lieutenants, "chefs de sections," and there are numerous vacancies in the ranks of the re-enlisted non-commissioned officers in more than eighty regiments of infantry.

The number of young aspirants in the military schools is diminishing at an alarming rate. In 1903 there were 1,543 candidates for the examination at St. Cyr. In 1912 there were only 880, which shows a falling off of nearly 700 candidates. On the other hand, while in 1903 only 330 were admitted, the number of those accepted in 1912 was higher, amounting to 460, from which it might be inferred that the standard of admission had perhaps to

candidates has been still more remarkable during the last ten years. In 1903 there had been 732 candidates; in 1912 there were only 378. And yet the number of applicants admitted was 240 in 1903 and 250 in 1912, which again raises the query whether the conditions for admission had not been considerably relaxed. In fact, it has been pointed out that in 1912 several candidates had to be received at St. Cyr whose average at the examinations did not exceed seven. Last year the number of vacancies offered to non-commissioned officers at St. Maixent for the colonial army was forty-five, and yet only fifteen candidates presented themselves.
