Daily Hints For the Cook

MAKING NUT MUFFINS.

Two cupfuls of flour, half a teaspoonful of salt, three tablespoonfuls of baking pewder, one cupful of milk, half a cupful of chopped nut meats, two eggs, two table spoonfuls of sugar, three tablespoonfuls of melted butter, and half a teaspoonful of wanila extract. Mix and sift the dry ingredients, then add the beaten yokes of eggs, butter, and milk. Beat well, add the vanilla extract and the stiffly beaten whites of the eggs. Divide into buttered and floured gem pans and bake in a hot oven for twenty minutes.

During the fishing season Gun Metal Calf Skin Ox- which extends from April 27 to June 30 roughly, 11,000 men are engaged in actua roughly, 11,000 men are engaged in actual fishing, and 8,000 people are employed in the 682 canneries. In short, Canada possesses a more extensive and valuable lobster fishery than any other country in the world. Lobster canneries were first established in Canada in 1869, and in that year 61,000 one lb. cans were put up. By 1881 the maximum pack in the history of the industry was reached, when over 17,000,000 pounds were canned. Since that year there has been a decline. In 1898 the production was about 10,000,000 pounds and since 1909 there has been a further falling off.






