EXTRADITION TREATY.

TEXT OF THE CONVENTION NOW PENDING BETWEEN GREAT BRITAIN AND THE UNITED STATES.

"Political Criminals not to be Surrendered--Provisions of the Treaty of 1842 Extended to Cover Embezzlement and Other Offences--Accompanying Letters of Secretary Blaine."

The new extradition treaty with Great Britain, negotiated by Secretary Blaine and now pending in the Senate, is given herewith in full, together with the letter of the Secretary of State, submitting the treaty to the President. The treaty itself differs radically from the one negotiated by Secretary Bayard, in that it does not contemplate, in the simplest degree, the surrender of what are called "political criminals," and also in that it adds a large list of crimes the one which, under the treaty of 1842, are declared to be "extraditable." The treaty and accompanying letters are taken from the New York Tribune of Sunday. The text of the treaty is as follows:

EXTRADITION CONVENTION BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA AND HER BRITANNIC MAJESTY. WHEREAS, by the Treaty of Commerce and Consular Rights, concluded between the United States of America and Her Britannic Majesty on the 30th of August, 1842, provision was made for the extradition of criminals between the two countries, and whereas it is now desired by the high contracting parties that the provisions of the said Treaty should be extended to cover certain crimes not therein specified, and should extend to fugitives convicted of the crimes specified in the said article, and in this Convention:

1. The provisions of the said 10th article of the Treaty of Commerce and Consular Rights, shall be extended to cover the following additional crimes:

2. Counterfeiting or altering money; uttering or bringing into circulation counterfeit or altered money.

3. Embezzlement, larceny, obtaining money, goods or valuable securities by false pretenses; using any money, valuable securities or other property, known to be stolen or obtained by fraud, larceny, or other crime.

4. Burglary, housebreaking or shopbreaking.

5. Revolt, or conspiracy to revolt, by two or more persons on board a ship on the high seas, against the authority of the Government of the country to which the vessel belongs, or attempting to do so; assaults on board a ship on the high seas, with intent to do grievous bodily harm.

6. Crimes and offenses against the laws of both countries for the suppression of slavery and the slave trade.

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SECOND EDITION. HALIFAX MATTERS.

THE POLYNESIAN'S STORMY PASSENGER.

Chief Officer Fairfull Calls for Volunteers to Assist in the Landing of a French Steamer in Distress.

HALIFAX, N. S., Jan. 28--The Allan line steamer "Polynesian" arrived this morning from Liverpool having left that port Jan. 15th. The weather experienced during the entire run was of the very worst character, continuous heavy seas and cold weather being encountered. The thermometer at times registered 25° below.

On Sunday morning last while the sea was running mountains high, accompanied by a driving sleet storm, a vessel was seen by the lookout laboring heavily. Her sails, with the exception of the top-sails, were blown down. The vessel failed to answer her helm. The steamer bore down on the vessel. The weather being very boisterous at times it was thought a small boat could not be sent.

Chief Officer Fairfull, of the "Polynesian," however, cared little or nothing for the weather when life was at stake, and asked for volunteers to assist him in the rescue of the vessel's crew. After a short time No. 2 boat was launched, and the chief officer and six men were on their way through the surging sea to the distressed vessel. After much difficulty captain and crew, six in all, were taken from the sinking ship to the steamer.

The vessel proved to be the French brigantine "Mathilda de Nantes" which left Montevideo, West Indies, for St. Pierre Miquelon on 5 Dec. in ballast. Three of the crew on the brigantine were badly frozen.
