Dewey Victorious!

Is Governor General of Manila.

U. S. Warship Captures French Naval Reserve Vessel.

(Special to the Advertiser.)

KEY WEST May 6.—An Associated Press despatch says the big French liner Lafayette with a full compliment of passengers and a general cargo, from Corunna, Spain, was captured off Havana shortly before sundown last night by a U. S. warship.

KEY WEST, May 6.—It is said that there is a serious international aspect to the capture of the Lafayette, as she mounts guns and is a french naval reserve vessel.

NEW YORK, May 6.—A Kingston, Jamaica, Special says four war ships have been sighted off Porto-Banes, Cuba, supposed to be part of Sampson's fleet.

Singapore, May 6.—Reliable information received here, corroborating news of Dewey's victory at Manila; and that he is now executing the duties of governor general there.

LONDON, May 6.— A special despatch from Shanghai says commander Dewey after crushing the Spanish fleet and disposing of Cavite bombarded Manila, which was soon on fire. Great loss of life is reported.

HAVANA, May 5, 9.30 p. m.—The new colonial congress held its first session at noon today. Former civil governor Jose Bruzon was elected president of the senate, and Senor Jose Manuel Del Cueto president of the lower house.

PARIS, May 5.—Ex-Queen Isabella refuses to receive political visitors. She has gone into mourning for the Spanish sailors killed at Manila.

MADRID, May 5.—Fears are expressed that the United States fleet has gone to capture the capitol of Porto Rico.

Died Today.

Mrs. Harvey McKinney, reported elsewhere in this issue as convalescing took an ill turn shortly after dinner today and immediately died. She had been ill for sometime but was apparently recovering. Today she ate a heartier dinner than for two weeks.

U. S. Manila Consul.

WASHINGTON, May 4.—The understanding at the state department is that Oscar E. Williams, United States representative at Manila until the recent war began, is now aboard the flagship Olympia in Manila harbor, having accompanied Commodore Dewey from Hong Kong, so that advices may come from him to the state department as well as from Commodore Dewey to the navy department.

A mail report from Consul Williams reached the state department recently, dated Manila, Feb. 28th last. It gives a full description of the Philippine Islands, their resources, growth of American trade, etc., and will be incorporated in the next volume issued by the bureau of statistics of the state department. Mr. Williams' report says: "Local and European authorities estimate the area of the Philippine Islands at 150,000 square miles, and their population at 15,000,000. The island of Luzon, on which the city of Manila, is situated, is larger than New York and Massachusetts, and has a population of 5,000,000, and the island of Mindanao is nearly, if not quite as large. There are scores of other islands."

Mr. Williams states that twenty-two consulates, representing the leading commercial countries of the world, are established at Manila. He adds the surprising statement: "The volume of the export trade, coming under my official supervision, equals that of my twenty-one consular colleagues combined." He then shows in detail how the trade of the Philippines with the United States exceeds that of all other countries combined, and is growing at a rapid rate.

In another report Mr. Williams gives the railroad and ocean steamship facilities of the Philippines. The main railroad from Manila is first class, having steel rails, stone culverts and English engines, which make forty-five miles an hour. There are four steamship lines to Hong Kong and a monthly line from Manila to Liverpool. A Gazetteer published at Hong Kong gives the population of Manila at 225,000.

Dress Coats In Cold Storage.

Men's overcoats and dress suits and other clothing, as well as furs and carpets and rugs, are put into cold storage nowadays in summer to keep them safe from moths. Women's gowns are also stored in this manner. A man in this city has lately put into cold storage eight or ten suits of winter clothing. Dress suits, overcoats and other clothing are received and hung up in the storage rooms just as fur garments are, or they are received in trunks, which is the less expensive method of storing them.—New York Sun.

Mr. Gladstone's Last Days.

The great career, like that of Mr. Gladstone, which, as we write, seems ending in hopeless struggle with the infirmities of age, and in sleeplessness and unceasing pain, has its compensations.

One source of consolation for him during weeks of suffering has been the disappearance of all signs of political enmity and bitterness. For a long period Mr. Gladstone was reviled by his partisan opponents as the arch-enemy of the United Kingdom. The upper classes in England turned against him, and reproached him for plotting against the peace and welfare of society. Since his retirement from public life criticism has ceased. The caricaturist has dropped his pencil. The leaders of London society have neither ridiculed nor scoffed at him. Partisan animosity has been at an end.

Mr. Gladstone also has the satisfaction of knowing that while his Home Rule bill was not enacted, his championship of Ireland has led to a successful policy of reconciliation. When he proclaimed it, the island was a state of lawlessness, and could be governed only by force bills and a large military garrison; and Parliament was at the mercy of Mr. Parnell and the Nationalists.

The island is now at peace; there are no more agrarian outrages and political crimes; the enactment of a sweeping measure of local government

reform has been rendered easy at every stage; there is good temper between England and Ireland. These are the indirect results of Mr. Gladstone's Irish policy.

There has been a marked disposition on all sides in England to do justice to this great statesman during his closing years. Parliament has seemed a dull, prosaic body since he disappeared from Westminster. Liberals have been unable to reconcile themselves to any leadership except his, and have been hopelessly adrift in politics. Even the Unionists who opposed him have agreed with one accord in describing him as the master debater and orator of the Victorian era—a great Englishman, commanding the respect of the Anglo-Saxon world.

The Duke of Wellington, like Mr. Gladstone, suffered from the rancorous hatred of political opponents and the blind fury of a mob. During the Reform agitation an angry crowd surrounded his residence, Apsley House, and broke some of the windows. The Iron Duke never forgot this affront. He would not have the glass replaced, but ordered iron shuttets to be fitted from outside, with a sliding mirror-panel for the interior.

When he had regained his popularity and was followed by an enthusiastic crowd up Constitution Hill, he stopped at the entrance of Apsley House, pointed grimly to the iron blinds, and bowed contemptuously to his admirers.

Mr. Gladstone, whose windows had also been pelted with mud and broken, and who was reviled with passionate animosity by political enemies for many years, was too high-minded to be resentful at the end of his career. He seemed to have only benignant words of gratitude and peace, like his farewell to Bournemouth: "God bless you all, and this place and the land you love."—Youth's Companion.
