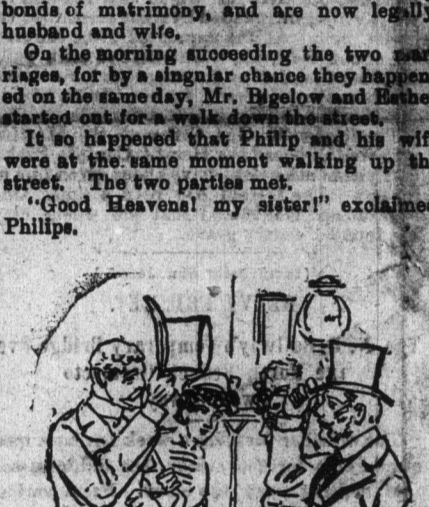
"What is it you refer to?" asked Esther unhesitatingly. "A wife," was the significant reply. Instantly a deep crimson flushed Esther's cheeks.

MANURE FOR GARDEN CROPS SHOULD BE APPLIED IN THE FALL.

Well-cared corn-fodder is proving a very good food for stock, and in New England is receiving more attention than ever before.

The economic and profitable feeding of stock is now fast becoming a science, and the farmer should study and practice to ascertain what kind of food is best adapted to the needs of each animal.

It is used to be considered that the manure from older mills was worthless as food for stock, and so it was left to rot around the mills to decay. But now it is made a better use of by feeding it to cattle, as they eat it quite as well as sawdust.

It is true sheep husbandry does not pay so well as in former years, but it does not follow that it should be abandoned, or that farmers should be discouraged.

On an Illinois dairy farm, one hundred cows are kept, but they never eat a pound of hay because the owner grows no hay. His cattle are all kept on corn-fodder, which is harvested when in blossom. It is cured in stocks in the field, and used as wanted.
