

# HEIRS IN WESTERN MINES

An intrepid attendant pounced upon the intruder, seized her by the arm and hastily led her back, while the shrinking legislators timorously watched, expecting that the fiery Pankhurst crew would rush to her rescue.

Mr. Kennaway, the nearest member, rushed boldly after the retreating woman, followed in hot haste by the sergeant-at-arms, whose arduous duty it is to maintain decorum in the Chamber and its approaches.

Happily the peril passed. The members recovered their equanimity upon learning that the petticoat invader was innocent of offence, having mistakenly followed Mr. Kennaway, who had come to procure her a ticket of admission to the Women's Gallery.

The lady, who was unfamiliar with the topography of the House, was covered with confusion when she realized the enormity of her unpremediated intrusion and hastened blushing, under Mr. Kenneway's escort, to comparative privacy behind the grille which shields the Women's Gallery.

FROM "SPOTTED FEVER"

EDINBURGH, March 21—Professor Osler, being on a visit to Edinburgh, gave a lecture to the university medical students. He said in New York some 3,000 deaths had occurred in the last two years from the epidemic known as "spotted fever." The disease was not pandemic, but one of its peculiarities was to appear in widely separated places. Its mortality as an acute affection almost equalled that of plague. They knew of no disease which struck a patient with such lightning rapidity. It had probably the same degree of infectiousness as pneumonia in home epidemics. Many instances proved it could be communicated from one person to another. At present it was not widespread as an epidemic in Brittle and there was no reason why it not widespread as an epidemic in Britain, and there was no reason why i should be. It was not likely to prevai should be. It was not likely to prevail beyond the winter season. As to treatment, it had been found that frequent hot tubs were a great comfort to patients. Professor Osler thought it a hopeful feature that a serum had been prepared which had rendered monkeys immune, and it was not unreasonable to look for the elaboration of a similar serum for use in man.




## THAW IS NOT AFRAID OF A LUNACY COMMISSION.
