FORTUNES FOR WOODMAN HERS IN WESTERN MINES

Starr Trophy Presented to the Moncton Hockeyists— John T. Hawke Reorganizes the School Board

MONCTON, N. B., March 22.—The Starr trophy, emblem of the Maritime hockey championship, was formally presented to the Victoria last night, when a much delayed reception was held in the Opera House. An enthusiastic crowd of five hundred people were present, as well as the band, the players being driven to the Opera House in a four horse barouche. They were formally congratulated by Mayor White and J. C. Lithgow, president of the M. P. A. A., who made the formal presentation of the cup. Later in the evening President Lithgow was presented with a handsome gold locket on behalf of the hockey team in recognition of his services as president of the M. P. A. A. towards the Victorias.

The city council last night decided to purchase the Spurr lot on Main street used as a city square. The price paid will be twelve thousand two hundred dollars, the same lot being offered to the city some time ago for ten thousand. The lot is centrally located and was used as a square last summer. Public opinion is overwhelmingly favorable to the purchase.

The I. C. R. has recovered from the blockade occasioned by Wednesday's big storm and the road is once more in good shape. Two maritime express which were stalled in the snow at Harcourt arrived last evening and the northern division is now clear. This morning Cassel could not work the same game. Woodman and there are a number of heirs in P. E. Island, as well as several scattered throughout the States. The mines are said to be valuable and would give each heir a snug fortune if sold at the present value.

The school trustees last night practically re-organized their mode of procedure and adopted a new constitution. A long series of recommendations made by Chairman J. T. Hawke. He submitted a new order of procedure, increased committees from three to five, the new committees being one for visitation, and the second for safety, health and recreation grounds, which is a very important new departure. He also submitted a set of regulations for janitors, recommendations for increased fire protection, one of which requests the city council to install fire alarm boxes on the exterior of school buildings and that the class rooms be made inter-communicating. He also submitted a new set of regulations for fire drill rescinding those already in force. The recommendations were elaborate and were unanimously adopted.

HEAD LINER REPORTED TODAY FROM BRIAR ISLAND

Innishowen Head Will Likely Arrive Here This Afternoon.

The Head Liner Innishowen Head, which was sighted off Briar Island on Tuesday apparently disabled and steaming only two knots an hour was not reported again until this morning when she was once more sighted off Briar Island heading towards this port. She is expected to reach here this afternoon. It is thought that the steamer to avoid the heavy storm sought more room in the Atlantic and is just returning after a fight in open water against the elements.

The steamer sailed from Andrews, her coaling port on March 4th and has a general cargo.

TWO HUNDRED LIVES LOST IN THIS WINTER'S STORMS

Toll of the Sea on the New England and Maritime Province Coasts—Larchmont Disaster the Worst in Years

BOSTON, March 22.—A total of 199 lives and 54 ships have been sacrificed to the storms and the treacherous coasts of New England and the Maritime Provinces for the winter just ended, according to the statistics compiled by the Associated Press today, of the vessels. No account has been taken of the dozens driven ashore and later floated, and figures do not include the loss in Connecticut waters. The long list of dead is swollen out of all proportion to those of many previous years by the sinking of the steamer Larchmont in Block Island Sound, the

THE PEASANT REVOLT IN ROMANIA BECOMES SERIOUS

Many Persons Reported Killed or Wounded in Conflicts With Troops—Towns are Sacked and Burned

VIENNA, March 22.—According to the news received today in Budapest from Moldavia, the present movement in Rumania is spreading. The town of Dorogoi has been sacked and burned by the peasants. The inhabitants were compelled to flee for their lives. At Cucuteni, where many Hungarians live, a fight occurred between the Hungarians and Rumanian inhabitants. Four Hungarians are reported killed and 30 wounded. Fourteen peasants were killed in the collision with troops at Belgesti, while in Pokshani the people are in revolt against the authorities. The village of Sulice was destroyed by peasant rioters. The fate of the inhabitants is not known.

BUCHAREST, Rumania, March 22.—The agrarian revolt, which at first was confined around Botosani, has now spread practically over the whole of Moldavia. Telegraph and telephone communications have been interrupted, and marauding bands are beginning to hold up travellers. A serious encounter between troops and raiders

IMPORTANT JUDGMENTS IN EQUITY COURT TODAY

In equity court this morning the case came up of Tooke Bros. et al vs. Brock and Patterson and E. W. Patterson. The hearing on the injunction was begun. E. W. Patterson gave Brock and Patterson bills of sale some time ago of all his goods, also covering future advances. And Will Not Become Effective for a Year— Plebiscite Will Be Ordered and St. John People Must Immediately Decide on the Scheme They Wish to be Adopted for Civic Elections

The St. John delegates who went to Fredericton last evening are firmly convinced that the ward system bill, now before the legislature, will not be passed.

AS IT STANDS.
A formal report to this morning's meeting is published below, but in conversation with a number of the delegates today, the Star learned that previous to the meeting an informal discussion took place, at which the matter was gone into in more detail than at the regular session. Further conversation was heard after the meeting, and the delegates were assured that the bill would not come up until after the public meeting to be held in St. John on Tuesday evening next. They were also practically assured that a plebiscite would be attached to the bill. The understanding is that the citizens of St. John must, on Tuesday evening, decide on some scheme for conducting civic elections, that their proposal must at once be sent to Fredericton, where it will be incorporated in the bill, and that the plebiscite will be ordered, giving the people the choice between whatever system is proposed and the ward system. This plebiscite will be taken at the coming civic contest and the bill will not become effective until next year.

It has been arranged that if the Myrtle-Harder Co. do not decide to play in St. John all next week, the Opera House will be engaged for the public meeting Tuesday evening, but if this company does stay the committee in charge will secure the next largest hall available. From expressions of opinion on the part of the municipalities committee today it is practically certain that no change in the electoral system will be made for at least a year.

FREDERICTON, N. B., March 22.—A. O. Skinner, J. H. McRobbie, Dr. D. A. Smith, Ald. Vanwart and O. H. Warwick, a delegation from the St. John Board of Trade and citizens generally, were heard this morning before the municipalities committee in opposition to the St. John election bill, recently recommended by the committee to the legislature.

The chairman, Mr. Allen, reminded the delegation that the committee had already recommended the bill to the house, but as the delegation was then present the committee would hear what they had to say without prejudice to anything that had already been done.

Mr. Skinner, who spoke first, stated that the bill as it had been forwarded by the city council provided for an increase in aldermen from 15 to 17 and that when the delegates promoting the bill agreed to increase the number to 19 they had done so without the sanction of the council. The change had been strongly condemned by a meeting of St. John citizens and that all the heavy

NOTHING IN THE DOCUMENTS TO COMPROMISE THE CHURCH

PARIS, March 22.—The Figaro, a paper with Roman Catholic sympathies, says that the documents seized at the Papal nunciature here, after the expulsion of its secretary, Mgr. Montagny, include a despatch from Cardinal Merry del Val, the Papal secretary of state, to Mgr. Montagny, advising him to give the Catholics free rein in opposing the church inventories under the Separation Act. A despatch from M. Maspari, secretary of ecclesiastical affairs at the Vatican, embodying instructions relative to the French electoral campaign, is also among the documents.

ratepayers were opposed to the bill as recommended. Before any change was made the wishes of the people should be first ascertained, and they also should be allowed to express their opinion as to which system they would prefer to the one now in use. He had not come to argue against the bill, all he asked was that the people be given a plebiscite.

Mr. McRobbie said he fully corroborated the remarks made by Mr. Skinner, and that in view of the great opposition that had arisen to the bill the citizens should be given an opportunity to express their opinion. The council of St. John had no mandate to bring about the proposed change. The bill is a restriction in the people's rights. They now possessed the privilege to vote for an alderman, but under this bill a ratepayer could only vote for one alderman in addition to the aldermen-at-large. He contended that there were precedents for what the delegation was now asking and that no harm would be done if the legislature should attach a plebiscite clause to the bill. Speaking from a personal standpoint Mr. McRobbie thought that action on the bill should be deferred until next session, when a civic tax bill, based on the commissioner's report would probably come before the legislature. Dr. Smith claimed that if the bill were passed, the electors would be disfranchised. Many leading ratepayers had petitioned against the change which showed that the people did not ask or require it and it was not in the rights of the council to ask for legislation which the citizens did not want. In closing he thanked the committee for giving the delegation a hearing.

Mr. Warwick said that the citizens of St. John felt that they should move carefully in these matters. They wanted a plebiscite clause attached and that finally they could decide which plan was in the best interests of all.

Ald. Vanwart referred to the large petition that had been signed in opposition to the bill. This petition contained the names of St. John's best citizens. He was prepared to stand up for the citizens' rights and he believed that these rights would be sacrificed if the bill passed in its present form.

Mr. Maxwell, M. P. F., thought the delegation should submit any proposals they might have in regard to the bill.

Mr. Skinner in reply said that it was for the citizens to formulate a scheme and that the matter was to come up and be discussed at a public meeting to be held in St. John next Tuesday evening. All the delegation asked for now was the attachment of a plebiscite clause.

UNION CLOTHING CO. DISCUSSES MODERN METHODS OF TREATING CONSUMPTION

In the Nova Scotia department of health, A. P. Reid, provincial health officer, makes the following comment on tuberculosis, in his annual report:

TUBERCULOSIS. This malady in its many types as usual dominates all the others and deserves its title, the Great White Plague, and though much can be done and is being done by the sanatorium, and by public discussion, yet I would suggest that, as with other diseases, the public school be made use of as the public educator to a greater extent than it is. I recognize the fact that now it is being very largely used, and no doubt in time it will be able to fulfil its mission.

I take the liberty of making a lengthy quotation from the Maine, U. S., Bulletin on this subject, because it is not only a good presentation of it, but it applies equally to Nova Scotia and Canada, as to Maine, and as the education of the public is of paramount importance. This may serve as an aid, as it tends to dissipate so many false notions that have for long prevailed, and is quite "up-to-date."

"There are two useful lines of work open to us. The first is to teach the public those vital facts that tuberculosis or consumption is preventable and that it is curable. Second, to furnish means of cure.

In Nova Scotia the provincial board of health, amongst others, printed and distributed a circular (1923) on the Prevention of Tuberculosis, and the provincial government has established a sanatorium for its cure that is doing most useful work.

"Climatic conditions have but little direct action in determining the extent of the prevalence of tuberculosis. The greatest death rates from it are found in densely populated regions where in stum districts. The presence of infection and the faulty conditions of human life which favor the contraction of infection are the most important factors in a high death-rate from consumption. Travellers tell us that the climate of Terra del Fuego is vile enough, yet tuberculosis was never there until the English mission was established. The wife of the pastor, a consumptive, was the introducer of the disease which a mercurial epidemic of phthisis spread among the natives.

"The same epidemic pest was brought to the native people of the Hawaiian Islands by the whites, and tuberculosis and alcoholic drinks have been the chief agencies which have swept some primitive races from the face of the earth, though their climes have been congenial. Yet in the rigorous climates of Iceland, the isolated region of Greenland, the Russian Steppes, and other places where the population is sparse or the infection has never been introduced, tuberculosis is almost or quite unknown.

Dr. Mosler, director of the medical clinic at the University of Griefswald, Germany, says: "Based on my opinion upon my own ample experience I concur with Dettweiler and Meissen that cur former expectations of cur tuberculosis have not been fulfilled. I have observed improvement in many cases, but of recurrences I have done worse, for if a case is hopeless, all means let the patient die at home in the midst of his family and friends, and not far away among strangers—Dr. S. A. Knopf.

"During my year as interne in the Los Angeles County Hospital I have stood at the bedside of dying physicians, ministers, lawyers (one a former statesman), clerks and representatives of all trades, who had come to Southern California in the various stages of tuberculosis. All came with the hope of getting well and making a comfortable living. I am convinced that nearly every one of them would have done better had I been properly treated in his home climate while in the incipient stage. If a patient could not have done worse, for if a case is hopeless, all means let the patient die at home in the midst of his family and friends, and not far away among strangers—Dr. S. A. Knopf.

"It is safe to say that a united effort of state and private philanthropy in a direct warfare against human tuberculosis along lines that have been well staked out by those whom we should safely follow, and with the expenditure of sums of money not a tithe of the present waste, and we should see our terrible consumption death-rate rapidly retreating to the vanishing point. That our own State (Nova Scotia also), among the first to begin the work of instructing officially the people that consumption is preventable, should keep well to the front in continuing efficient preventive and curative work, should be the wish of every son and daughter of Maine or Nova Scotia, whether now within or without the fold. Whether we are or are not our brother's keeper, we should be our brother's helper, and in so doing we may be assured that we shall, every one of us, participate in the blessing, or in the profit, if you please, which will surely follow.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 24, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.
Entry must be made personally, at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.
The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:
(1) At least six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.
(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of the homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.
Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

TRAGEDIES

BARBOURSVILLE, Ky., March 21.—In the circuit court here today Fred Stewart who shot and killed James Higgins, at Barbourville, Ky., last October, was sentenced to the penitentiary for 99 years. The murder resulted from jealousy, both young men being suitors for the hand of Miss Jennie Green, a young society woman. Stewart was a candidate for the legislature.

Lamson, the wife of the assistant cashier of the Temple Place Branch of the Old Colony Trust Co., in this city, committed suicide by shooting today, in the women's lavatory in Young's hotel. Mrs. Lamson left a private sanitarium yesterday, where she had been under treatment for a nervous disease for the past four years. Her body was discovered this afternoon by a maid in the hotel, the unfortunate woman having shot herself in the mouth. The family, who lived in Medford, were notified and the body was removed there by permission of the medical examiner. Mrs. Lamson was 35 years old and leaves two children.

PALESTINE, Texas, March 21.—As train No. 4 on the International and Great Northern, north bound, was leaving Elkhart, twelve miles below here tonight, Express Messenger Winley Womack, of the Pacific Express Co., was knocked in the head and thrown out of the car. He was not missed from the train until the morning. A message was received from Elkhart stating that he had been assaulted by robbers. The safe in the car where he was the train reached Palestine. The sheriff and a posse is leaving Palestine on a special train for the scene of the robbery.

PORTLAND, Me., March 21.—At a fire in the rear of 27 Beach street this evening Mrs. Annie Joyce, aged 60 years, was burned to death and her son, Edward, aged 29, is at the Maine general hospital where he was taken for treatment for the burns he received about the face and hands. The cause of the fire is unknown. The victims were asleep at the time the fire broke out. The loss by fire was only a few hundred dollars.

THE GLOUCESTER NAVIGATION CO.

Mr. P. P. Morals of Shippagan, manager of the Gloucester Navigation Co., was here on Wednesday on his return from the Provincial capital, where he was promoting the interests of the new corporation. His efforts have been crowned with success. The company has been incorporated with a capital of \$40,000, and has been granted a provincial subsidy of \$1,500 a year. A GLEAM OF HOPE

Prince Edward Island's grievance continues to crop up at Ottawa. The perennial discussion on winter navigation is no farther advanced than it was twenty years ago when Senator Howland, now deceased, went about with a pocket full of plans and maps. His scheme was just as nearly approved by the federal government as the tunnel proposition is today or will be in the next generation. Much of the fault is found in the Islanders themselves. Everybody wants the tunnel, and all Canada would be pleased to see such means of communication provided, but it is a great undertaking and one not likely to be definitely considered in the near future. Still much may be brought about by persistent effort.

But in the meantime people of Prince Edward Island have allowed themselves to be divided. Instead of uniting for the common good they are broken up into small parties each following some particular promoter, or supporting some different scheme. When such a state of affairs exists it is little wonder that the federal government acts according to its own ideas. There is no one at Ottawa, there has been no one, who can speak for the whole Island on anything but the tunnel, and this is not what is wanted at present.

Recently, however, in spite of the somewhat sensational tone of the press, in spite of the declamations in parliament by Island members that secession will be the outcome of continued neglect, there is evidence of a more settled purpose. The people are beginning to realize that a man who never takes a bath should not abuse the board of health when he gets the fever. They are talking union, and in the 100,000 Islanders is one fixed policy, not a dozen different schemes supported by a dozen little districts as have in the past interfered with settlement of the communication difficulty. There is a tendency towards this end, and a general sitting out of ideas will lead to the desirable result.

At this distance it would seem that the natural solution of the whole question is the complete control of Island communication by the railway department, the establishment of a steam ferry service for both winter and summer, and the operation of these steamers as part of the government system. It would be very unfair to ask the department to provide a steamer service for the winter months alone, and to give the cream of the business to a private company. Under present arrangements freight to and from the Island pays for three short hauls, but if the steamers were under railway instead of marine department control, and were operated both summer and winter, through rates could and would be arranged. More than this, the railway department would undoubtedly see that the most powerful steamers capable of running in this route, would be put on, and that communication would be as regular as is possible to make it without the tunnel.

THE VALLEY RAILROAD.

Premier Pugsley's budget speech has been the most important for many years, not only in its review of successful undertakings but in its forecast of even greater development in the immediate future. He reserved the highest cards for the last, and his announcement regarding the construction of a valley railroad will arouse deep interest all over the province, and throughout Canada as well. That section through which the proposed road would pass, is the best stretch of farming land in New Brunswick, and is settled by the most enterprising people. Yet within the past ten years more young men have moved away from the Valley district than from twice the area in any other section. There has been everything to keep them home—excepting the railway communication—and this lack of opportunity for marketing the products of the fertile soil has been the sole cause of the exodus. Dr. Pugsley draws an attractive picture of the country to be fed by the new line. He might, had it not been for his detestation of anything in the nature of pessimism, have shown the other side of the picture. The most abundant crops, capable of producing most abundant crops, now occupied only by aged men and women, the parents of boys who have moved to the west; of other properties vacated because the owners can make enough elsewhere to justify them in leaving this portion of their capital; and of the fears entertained among those who remain in the river country that before long the entire section will be depopulated. The only hope for the valley is in larger opportunities, such as would be afforded by regular communication and for this reason the importance of the proposed railway cannot be overestimated.

IN CANADA IN 1874.

I was again in the Dominion in 1874, when I was on the Atlantic Coast, and saw something of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. Of the great interior portion of Western Canada I have, however, seen nothing until the present time, and, as I say, nothing would express too strongly my admiration.

LORD BERESFORD SPEAKS ON CANADA

Established at Rapid Progress of the Dominion

War Lord Discusses Reduction of Armaments and Empire—Affairs at Winnipeg

WINNIPEG, March 21.—Lord Charles Beresford left here last evening on his way to New York. He came to Winnipeg in connection with the death of his brother.

"One of the common remarks that I hear in Great Britain with reference to Canada is that the Dominion the coming country, which is very new. There can be no doubt regarding the future of the Dominion, which will be increasingly bright for hundreds of years to come. The fact, however, is that Canada has already arrived, she has passed through the early years of infancy and childhood, and has taken her place as one of the great nations of the world. I tell how pleasantly I have been impressed by all that I have seen in the western portion of the Dominion. I had not previously seen much of western Canada. Many years ago, it was in 1884, I spent some time on Vancouver Island and on the mainland of the Pacific Coast. Those were the days when I was with the squadron on the Pacific Coast. I was on three frigates on the Pacific, and was from time to time on shore, on many fishing and hunting trips. The memories of those days are exceedingly pleasant.

THE COLONIAL QUESTION.

"In England the feeling unquestionably is that the connection between the Mother Country and the Dominion, and, in fact, all the colonies should be drawn closer. I have frequently expressed the conviction, which is the conviction of large numbers of British people, that the colonies are of more consequence to Great Britain than Great Britain is to the colonies. I have not anywhere in the colonies seen able to find any traces of a feeling in favor of any change in the relations between the Mother Country and the colonies. If Canada should decide to break the connection between herself and the Empire, the world, of course, at once be broken. I conceive, however, that there is no one of the colonies in which the people are more attached to the Mother Country than they are in Canada. The colonial system of the Empire has been so recently examined by the Admiralty, because it was the policy of Great Britain to put the colonies at once under the control of the navy, and the sailor disappeared and the civil governor took his place. That is to say, the people ruled. The country was controlled and governed not by force, but by the appeal to reason and common sense. Men were compelled to rule through, and by the people, and what the people really wanted was in most cases done."

REDUCTION OF ARMAMENTS.

"There has been a great deal of discussion in recent years of the reduction of armaments and the substitution of a board of arbitration for the arbitration of war," said the speaker. "My sentiments on the matter are well known," replied the admiral. "I am fully convinced that it is the time when men will submit the matters on which they think most deeply to arbitration has not arrived. We have not reached that state. Since this is the case, we must be prepared for the actually existing condition. It would certainly be a desirable thing to reduce the armaments of the various nations of the world, but the difficulty is that it is impossible to persuade all the nations of the world to do this. There are some things which men will fight for and die for, and which they will never leave to any court of arbitration. It is not practicable at the present time to consider the matter of the reduction of armaments. As for war, there is less chance for war than at any previous time in the history of the world. One reason why a war is unlikely is that the people are more educated so great an influence in the affairs of nations. There was a time when war was a necessary evil, and when it was made war and made peace. This is no longer the case. War and peace are now made by the people. War cannot be declared unless the people are for war, and peace is not made until the people are for peace. Now the people are as a rule for peace, and there is no reason to believe that they will ever be otherwise. It is essential that we should have a sufficient organization—sufficient, I mean, in size and in numbers—but it is better to have a small force, perfectly organized, than a large force disorganized. There can be no doubt that it must be the policy of the empire now and for many years to come to be prepared for war."

SIR CHARLES TUPPER'S PLAN.

Lord Beresford was informed of the contents of a letter appearing in the Morning Post from Sir Charles Tupper, suggesting that the representatives in London of the colonies should be members of the Privy Council and thus admitted to the councils of the nation.

"I should say that it was a most excellent idea," he said. "We must get closer to the colonies. I believe that the proposal would be warmly received in all parts of Great Britain, and there is no reason why the suggestion should not be adopted. It would certainly tend to the binding together more tightly the component portions of the empire. You have seen that the thousands of the men for whom Great Britain was too small. England was not big enough for their energies and enterprise, and they have found a place in the development of the enormous natural resources of the Dominion."

IN DEATH NOT DIVIDED.

LONDON, March 21.—When the daughter of John Shepherd, the landlady of the Three Horse Shoes Inn, Chalmersdale, near Warriminer, took up a cup of tea to her parents yesterday morning she found them both dead in bed.

BERESFORD WILL NOT RUN FOR PARLIAMENT

CHICAGO, March 22.—Admiral Lord Charles Beresford, of the British navy, yesterday passed through Chicago on his way to London from El Paso, Texas, where he has been settling up the estate of his brother, Lord Delval Beresford, who was killed in a North Dakota train wreck.

A cable despatch from London of Feb. 23, which said: "Lord Beresford is in a huff and declines to rule the Channel fleet, objects to withdrawal of ships from service for reserve, and his command and may run for parliament to advocate his views on naval matters," was shown to Lord Beresford.

Lord Beresford said he felt the home squadron should be under his command as admiral of the navy. "As for running for parliament," he concluded, "that is beyond my intentions. It sounds too much like sulking, and a sea-dog like myself will not sulk."

WON TYPEWRITING CHAMPIONSHIP AGAIN

CHICAGO, March 22.—Miss Rorel Fritz, two time winner of the typewriter contest, at the Coliseum last night won the championship for the third time, winning permanently the silver cup offered, and breaking the world's record for copying dictation from shorthand notes. CHICAGO, March 22.—Admiral Lord Charles Beresford, of the British navy, yesterday passed through Chicago on his way to London from El Paso, Texas, where he has been settling up the estate of his brother, Lord Delval Beresford, who was killed in a North Dakota train wreck.

THAW IS NOT AFRAID OF A LUNACY COMMISSION.

NEW YORK, March 22.—The status of the Thaw case, now that District Attorney Jerome has furnished Justice Fitzgerald with the affidavits of seven alienists who substantiate his expressed opinion that the prisoner is insane and incapable of consulting his counsel as to his defense against the charge of having murdered Stanford White, is this: By two o'clock tomorrow the attorneys for the defense must file affidavits answering Jerome's assertion and combating his affidavit.

The district attorney has not formally asked for a commission to inquire into Thaw's mental condition, but has left it to the "conscience of the court," as he expressed it on Wednesday. Justice Fitzgerald will consider the affidavits submitted by each side and inform all the counsel when to appear in court to hear his decision. He may defer the weighing of the affidavits, for he may call for more evidence before he makes up his mind what procedure is advisable. In particular he may seek the opinion of Dr. Allan McLane Hamilton, the alienist, who, when called to the stand by the defense on Wednesday, evoked District Attorney Jerome's statement as to Thaw's mental condition and brought about the present condition of the case. Should Justice Fitzgerald do this, the defense, it is certain, will strive to bar Dr. Hamilton's testimony on the ground of professional privilege, inasmuch as he was engaged by the defense to examine Thaw. In all this the jury will have no part, although it was excused yesterday to appear in court this morning. This, however, will be a formality, and they will be again excused until it has been decided whether Thaw must undergo an examination as to his sanity.

Notwithstanding District Attorney Jerome's belief that Thaw is a paranoiac and the corroborative opinions of the state's experts that he is practically insane, the defense will make a determined effort to combat the appointment of a lunacy commission or his going to an asylum. His five lawyers met at the office of Delphin M.

Delmas last night, and discussed plans towards the end. A line of action was proposed. This will consist of sworn statements of alienists that they have found Thaw fully capable of advising counsel and sworn statements by counsel and relatives to this effect. Probably Dr. Evans, Wagner, Hammond, will make affidavits which will set forth that they have sat in court beside Thaw for several weeks, have talked with him freely, and are convinced that he is quite competent to confer with his counsel as to his welfare in this case. A number of letters to his counsel since the trial began will also be submitted to the court. If Justice Fitzgerald decides to appoint a commission in lunacy, it will consist of three members, an alienist, a lawyer and a layman. The alienist must necessarily be one who has not figured in any wise in the case. The commission, if chosen, will examine Thaw and report to the court. If it were to find him sane, the trial would be resumed; if otherwise, Justice Fitzgerald would be obliged to order Thaw's confinement in the hospital for the criminal insane at Mattewan.

Thaw is not greatly disturbed, it is said, over the possibility of having to be examined by a physician. His lawyers have told him that the question at issue is mainly whether he can instruct them properly. He is confident on this point, and confident also that when once this question is disposed of, he will be all the easier for his lawyers to persuade the jury as to the "brain-storm" line of defense.

THE CANADIAN BIBLE SOCIETY

The Canadian Bible Society at its annual meeting just closed at Ottawa, reported an income exceeding that of the previous year by \$16,000. It has been recommended to the British and Foreign Bible Society \$30,000 being \$12,000 more than former contributions. At the same time the cost of the work in Canada had been met and a much larger balance of \$10,000 is kept to carry on operations on an extended scale throughout the Dominion. Nearly 90,000 copies of Scripture were circulated in Canada and Newfoundland during the year, many thousands of them among the polyglot immigrants in their many tongues at Quebec, St. John and Halifax as they arrived, and at Winnipeg before they scattered over the prairies.

The Society has forty colporteurs and Biblewomen. Rev. J. Bowen, (Church of England), Ladysmith, C. D. Rev. W. S. Hazard, B. D. (Methodist), Toronto, and Rev. Thomas Bennett, (Presbyterian) Montreal, were appointed District Secretaries for British Columbia, Alberta, Ontario and Quebec, in addition to other agents in the field. The General Board consists of 42 representatives of all the Auxiliaries from the Atlantic to the Pacific with Dr. N. W. Hoyle, K. C., as president, Rev. Dean Davis and Rev. Dr. W. D. Armstrong as vice-presidents, Elias Rogers as treasurer and Rev. R. E. Welsh as general secretary.

The Governor General the Earl Grey speaking at the close of the public meeting in Ottawa after addresses by Archbishop Armitage, of Halifax, and Dr. Cameron, of Toronto, said he had come as the patron of the Society to show his sympathy with its objects. When he heard of the six millions of copies circulated every year, and of the 200 millions issued since the Society was founded, he thought how the output must be the largest output of all the publishing houses in the world. And when he heard how these had been issued not in one, but in four hundred languages, he thought of the complicated work which reflected the greatest credit on the gentlemen who had given their brains to the task.

It was a privilege to belong to a Society which knew no denominational divisions and had a platform broad enough to include all.

THAW IS NOT AFRAID OF A LUNACY COMMISSION.

NEW YORK, March 22.—The status of the Thaw case, now that District Attorney Jerome has furnished Justice Fitzgerald with the affidavits of seven alienists who substantiate his expressed opinion that the prisoner is insane and incapable of consulting his counsel as to his defense against the charge of having murdered Stanford White, is this: By two o'clock tomorrow the attorneys for the defense must file affidavits answering Jerome's assertion and combating his affidavit. The district attorney has not formally asked for a commission to inquire into Thaw's mental condition, but has left it to the "conscience of the court," as he expressed it on Wednesday. Justice Fitzgerald will consider the affidavits submitted by each side and inform all the counsel when to appear in court to hear his decision. He may defer the weighing of the affidavits, for he may call for more evidence before he makes up his mind what procedure is advisable. In particular he may seek the opinion of Dr. Allan McLane Hamilton, the alienist, who, when called to the stand by the defense on Wednesday, evoked District Attorney Jerome's statement as to Thaw's mental state and brought about the present condition of the case. Should Justice Fitzgerald do this, the defense, it is certain, will strive to bar Dr. Hamilton's testimony on the ground of professional privilege, inasmuch as he was engaged by the defense to examine Thaw. In all this the jury will have no part, although it was excused yesterday to appear in court this morning. This, however, will be a formality, and they will be again excused until it has been decided whether Thaw must undergo an examination as to his sanity. Notwithstanding District Attorney Jerome's belief that Thaw is a paranoiac and the corroborative opinions of the state's experts that he is practically insane, the defense will make a determined effort to combat the appointment of a lunacy commission or jury going to an asylum. His five lawyers met at the office of Delphin M.

PRINCE OF WALES COLLEGE TO JOIN

The Montreal Star, referring to the affiliation of Prince of Wales College with McGill, says: One of the most important steps to be taken towards the higher education of Canada for a long time is the application of Prince of Wales College to affiliate itself with McGill University. This makes a unified chain of educational institutions, stretching across Canada, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, with McGill as the central link. Some time ago Vancouver made application and was admitted. Now Prince Edward Island is heard from. Premier Peters yesterday in the legislature having given notice of a bill for the affiliation of Prince of Wales College of Charlottetown with McGill. Prince of Wales, as a small institution, has been in friendly relationship with McGill for a long time, and it has now been decided to make some practical use out of this friendship. The course in the smaller college, instead of trying to branch out into mining, metallurgy and other higher forms of education, will limit its curriculum to a thorough training in the first two years of arts or science. These two foundation years will then be accepted by McGill in the same manner as if the student had attended lectures in Montreal, and he will be enabled to continue his studies at McGill, entering the third year without having to pass any entrance examinations. This affiliation is looked upon as a very important factor in the educational development of Canada, and covers in a way which no other action could, the idea of unification, which eventually must lead to the higher education of coming generations.

PORT OF MONTREAL UNDER HANDICAP
Doubts Entertained as to Whether Shipping Season Will be Profitable

(Montreal Star.)
Montreal shipping interests are not too sanguine as to the prospects of trade at the port of Montreal for the coming season, and grave doubts are entertained as to whether the season will be as remunerative, as under other and better conditions. It is generally believed that the port of Montreal is seriously and heavily handicapped is well known, owing to a great measure to the conditions existing in regard to the St. Lawrence channel, and to the high rate of marine insurance which naturally follows. In addition the river port charges are very heavy. All this taken in connection with the fact that competition in the shipping trade is keen, places the port of Montreal in a very unfavorable position as compared with the ports of the United States, which are today getting so much of the trans-Atlantic trade. This condition of affairs requires a remedy, first of all the deepening and widening of the channel, and then in order to be a factor in the competition of the shipping world, Montreal should be made a free port.

Mr. Robert Reford, president of the Redford Company, when asked regarding the shipping prospects for the coming season, stated they were very doubtful. "This is so for several seasons," said he, "trade is changing very materially, and the competition that formerly existed from the Argentine Republic, Australia, India and lumber in Canada, and the increased demand for Canadian lumber in the United States has greatly decreased the export of this article to Great Britain, while formerly lumber was a very important factor in the cargoes shipped to the Old Country. Great Britain now buys lumber very much cheaper on the Continent, and the lumber thus purchased serves her purposes equally as well as the Canadian material. Consequently the freight now obtainable on lumber shipments, are much less than formerly, are so low, in fact, as to make them almost unprofitable.

"The same thing is true of the freights on grain, which give little more than the cost of loading or discharging. The high insurance rates on both ships and cargoes, compared with United States ports and competing points elsewhere, are also a deterrent to Canadian trade. In addition to all this, our river and port charges are too heavy, heavier than in competing ports, and our accommodation and facilities for handling cargoes at present are entirely insufficient and too expensive, thus making the profitable carrying on of a shipping trade in general cargo from Montreal almost an impossibility. The only business that shows any chance of profit for the coming year is the passenger trade, without which many of the boats could not live."

Mr. Andrew A. Allan, discussing the question, believes it is simply a question of improvement of the channel and the making of Montreal a free port. "The whole question of the trade of this port is a very broad and a very serious one," declared Mr. Allan. "It is a question of our securing in the St. Lawrence channel the greatest depth and the greatest width of water. The government are doing good work, and we have every reason to believe will continue to do so, and it is only by putting this port on an equal footing with other competing ports that the trade to and from this point will hold its own. The most important part of the entire work is, I believe, the deepening and straightening of the Beaujeu channel."

GIRLS FICKLENESS CAUSED SUICIDE
Young Englishman Killed Himself in Montreal Yesterday

Went Back to Old Country to Find Sweetheart Married to Brother Whom He Wouldn't Betray

MONTREAL, March 21.—At a quarter to three this morning Jack Freebody was found in his room, 167 St. Antoine street, lying on the floor, his throat cut from ear to ear and an open razor clutched in his right hand. Freebody was an Englishman, thirty-five years of age, and had been in Canada working and saving his sweetheart's money, and used to be employed in the freight yards of the C. P. R.

HAS LITTLE HOPE FOR ANY CHANGE IN TELEPHONE BILL

Mayor Sears, Back from Fredericton, Feels that the Protest from Municipalities Will Have But Little Effect

Mayor Sears returned last night from Fredericton, where he represented the New Brunswick Union of Municipalities in opposing the telephone bill.

The company had not guaranteed to give a cheaper service and therefore the city should derive a little from that large corporation.

Mayor Sears speaking of the ward system bill stated that in all probability it will be passed. Nearly every member is in favor of it he says.

Continuing his speech he stated that with the additional aldermen the city will be given a better opportunity to select good men, and he does not think that the majority of citizens are against the bill.

Several members of the house are in favor of having the additional aldermen elected and cutting the salaries of each down to \$150.


