# CHARLES EVANS HUGHES NEXT UNITED STATES PRESIDENT

From Thirty to Forty Factory Employes Perish in Waters of Fort Point Channel, Near South Station Boston.

DRAW HAD BEEN OPENED TO PERMIT PASSAGE OF TUG AND LIGHTER-MOTORMAN SAW NO SIC IALS AND PONDEROUS TROLLEY CAR CRASHES THROUGH GATES.

Boston, Nov. 7.—The lives of from thirty to forty persons were lost tonight when a crowded passenger car of the Boston Elevated Street Railway plunged through an open drawbridge into Fort Point Channel, just outside the South Station terminal.

Twelve other persons were rescued from the water by fire boats and tugs. One man, Thomas J. Gannen, died after being brought to shore. Two bodies were found with grappling irons, but the recovery of other bodies was delayed and it was believed they were pinned in the car which rested on the bottom of the channel 35 feet deep.

Lights Missing?

Gerald Walsh, motorman of the car, who jumped before it went over the edge of the draw, asserted that the accident was due to the fact that there

accident was due to the fact that there was no light on the gates protecting the opening. He and Geo. McKeona, the conductor, who also leaped and so saved his life, were arrested on technical charges of manslaughter. The conductor was unconstant and the police were unable to learn exactly the number of his passengers.

Some of the rescued people estimated the number of passengers at upwards of 90. J. Harvey White, publicity agent of the Boston Elevated Railway, in a statement, issued soon after the accident, said his information agreed with that of the police that about forty persons were unaccounted for.

South Boston Victims.

Most of the passengers were employees of the Western Electric Company's factory in South Boston, and were returning to their homes from work. Many women and children were included in the number. The car was of the closed type, with a narrow door at each end, so that escape was impossible, except for those who happened to be standing on the platforms. The draw tender on the bridge said that he received a signal about 5,25 p. m, from the fow boat William G. Williams, which was going upstream with a lighter in tow. "I was in the controlling house," he said, "and I took all the usual precautions. There were red lights on the gate. I opened the draw and the tug boat started to come through. It was more than five hours after the car went down that the divers started the actual removal of the bodies within it. One of them worked inside the car, passing each body, so he came to it, out to another diver, who raised it to the police boat guardian at the surface. Ten bodies were taken out thus very quickly, and were transferred to the police boat. All the bodies first recovered were these of men. The bodies of five other men were taken from the vicinity of the sunken car by police grapping irons before the divers began their work, and it is believed that 25 or 30 additional bodies still remain in the wreek.

BULLETIN—Paris, Nov. 7.—The French took German positions on a front of four kilometres (2½ miles) extending from Chaulnes Wood to southeast of Abiaincourt refinery, says the official communication issued by the war office tonight. The villages of Abiaincourt and Pressoir and Abiaincourt cemetery were captured. More than 500 prisoners were taken. The statement reads:



# Britain Has Solved The Rubber Riddle

Rubbers and Overshoes Are Cheap as Ever Today, While Other Necessities, Particularly Shoes, Have Nearly Doubled In Price.

> Where Germany's Vaunted Chemists Fail British Empire Builders Succeed

Rubber has been one of the most insistent and intensely interesting problems of the twentieth century—and its solution is proving of vital importance to the Empire in this great war.

Until 1910 the world depended for its crude rubber on the forests of South and Central America and Africa. The supply increased slowly, if at all, while consumption, since the advent of the motor car, has grown enormously. From an average of \$1.00 a pound in 1908, the price jumped to \$3.00 in 1910. Manufactures of rubber kept pace—no doubt you remember what rubbers cost for a year or two—and the situation looked

The search for synthetic rubber was redoubled in vigor. German chemists had been working on it, and the world seemed to expect them to come through with some ingenious process for manufacturing rubber from its known ingredients, on a commercial scale and at a low cost. But the world still waits—and so does the Kaiser, judging from his indignation over Britain's refusal to let him import rubber by registered mail.

Relie's from a rubber famine came instead from the far-sighted development policy of Britain's Empire builders, who for years, in spite of general ridicule, had been encouraging the growth of plantation rubber on a large scale in Ceylon, Sumatra, Java and the Malay States. Money was advanced to planters to carry them through the seven-year period before the trees started to produce, and hundreds of thousands of acres were planted.

By 1910, when the pinch came, British plantations produced 8,200 tons—11% of the world's output. The next year saw 14,000 tons of plantation rubber—nearly 20%. In 1912 it had grown to 29%—in 1913 to 44%—in 1914 to 59%—last year to 68%,—or 107,867 tons. This year's production is estimated at 150,000 tons, or 75% of the world's supply.

With three-quarters of the rubber production thus controlled by Great Britain, and the seas in the grip of her mighty fleet, the Allies are assured of an abundant supply for war purposes, while the Teutons' troubles from lack of it are growing daily more serious.

Having a practical monopoly of the supply, and the power to impose such prices as she chose, Great Britain has made it, except to her enemies, a benevolent monopoly, and has made the price of crude rubber lower than it was before the war.

To Canadians this is doubly important, because the climate makes rubbers and overshoes a necessity. Now, when shoe prices are soaring, while rubbers are as cheap as ever, it is clearly economy to protect expensive shoes to the limit by systematically wearing rubbers at every sign of bad weather. Even with heavy soled shoes this pays, for shoes so protected will wear far longer, saving the cost of the rubbers several times over. 
