THE F. C. Baptist General Conference of New Brunswick held its Thirty-fifth Annual Meeting with the Church on the South Branch Oromocto. The first meeting, which was a Social Conference, began at 10 o'clock, A: M. There was a large attendance, and a good season enjoyed. Many spoke of the dealings of God with themselves, and the afflictions through which the denomination had passed during the year. The death of our lamented brethren Hartt and McLeod were frequently and affectionately spoken of. A good spirit pervaded the entire assembly, and many spoke of consecrating themselves anew to the work of the Lord, with a determination to labour more faithfully than ever before for the upbuilding of the Zion of our God.

The afternoon meeting was opened at 2 o'clock, when the Conference was organized. The names of the members of Conference were recorded, and Elder John Perry elected Chairman, and Elder

After a few introductory remarks by the Chairman, the Corresponding Secretary was called upon for his Annual Report, which was read.

ANNUAL REPORT

Of the Corresponding Secretary of the F. C. Baptist General Conference of New Brunswick, for the year ending July 5th, 1867.

DEAR BRETHREN-

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"Grace be unto you, and peace, from God the Father and from our Lord Jesus Christ." Once more has our Heavenly Father permitted us who are "alive and remain," to greet each other in General Conference. Changes of vast importance have taken place since we separated one year ago. Chang abroad and at home—in the Church and in the State—political, commercial, national and social. The most important epoch in the history of our country has just been declared. The formation of our "New Dominion" has affected our entire national position. Upon it we earnestly invoke the Divine favour, But of however great importance we regard these things in the relationship we sustain thereto, we feel that, as a denomination, by nothing have we been so seriously and immediately affected as by the sad work of death. The last year has been a most trying one. Never did we before assemble in an Annual Meeting when our hearts were so full of heaviness, and mourning. Never, in the history of the denomination, has your Annual Report contained so solema and sad an announcement as must be made this day. Death—cruel death— has invaded our sanctuaries, and broken our ministerial ranks. Incomprehensibly mysterious have been the providential dealings of God with us. Our ec lastical year was ushered in with death. Just as we were closing our bus session last July, one of our Licentiates, Bro, Hatfield, was closing his li He died in St. John, and was buried before any of the brethren from that city returned home. His death was but the forerunner of the fearful ravages that have been made among our older and leading ministers. How shall we speak of those noble veteran brethren, who were with us, and who acted well their parts in the transaction of our business at our last General Conference? Will they meet with us no more? Is it so-must it be so-that our ven highly esteemed Father Hartt, who for so many years toiled in raising up the denomination, and in care for all the Churches, will never, never enter our midst again? Our solemn answer is, YES, IT IS TRUE! Rich as he was in experience—deep as was his care, and valuable as was his counsel—yet the Lord has seen fit to take him to himself. No more shall those weeping eyes and berience—deep as was his care, and variable is was his counset—where has seen fit to take him to himself. No more shall those weeping eyes and that affectionate voice bespeak the deep anxiety of his heart for our welfare. He has gone to his rest. He died at Brighton, in Carleton County, on the 16th January, 1867. On the 17th of March, our sad hearts were made sadder, and our desolation was rendered more afflictive, by the sudden and unexpected death of our vigorous, hard-working, and beloved brother, the late editor of the Religious Intelligencer. Strong and scalous, and occupying as he did a sphere of wide-spread usefulness, it seems strange too that he should, just at this time, be taken from his loved employ. Yet so it is. Our beloved Brother McLeod, who, by his superior talents and distinguished consecration, laboured so successfully for the good of the denomination, has met with us for the last time. Last year he prepared and read our Annual Report. To-day, as this Report is being read, he is mingling with the spirits of just men made perfect, in heaven. In his death our entire denominational interests have lost a strong and devoted workman. He has exchanged the editorial chair and the pulpit for a crown and a seat with Christ. Yea, brethere, it is really true that Elders Hartt and McLeod, to whose labours we are so much indebted for our present prosperous state, will meet with us no more. Neither the white locks of the one, nor the careworn countenance of the other, will ever grace our meetings

again. Their work is done. The last storm has been faced—the last trial endured—the last tear shed—the last line written. Absent from the body, they are present with the Lord. Like faithful soldiers of the Cross, they died at their posts. Until the very day each was confined to his bed, both publicly laboured in the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ, "Blessed is that servant whom his Lord when he cometh shall find so doing."

> "The voice at midnight came They started up to hear; A mortal arrow pierced their frames, They fell, but felt no fear. Tranquil amid alarms, It found them on the field Veterans slumbering on their arms, Beneath the red-crossed shield."

Brethren, may it be our ambition, by the grace of God, to number our days in working for the promotion of the cause in which they spent their strength, that, like our departed brethren, it may be said of us, after we shall have passed away, that we did what we could. We feel that now the care and lapassed away, that we did what we could. We leet that how the care and bours of the departed devolve upon the living, and our earnest prayer to God is that He would raise up burden bearers, who will go forward in the great work that lies before us, so that the cause of Christ may not be stayed.

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It is now our duty to proceed with the work of reporting the labours and successes of our brethren who are yet in the field, and as far as we can, to give some knowledge of the state of religion amongst our Churches. With our present number of Churches and ministers, it is not convenient to speak of the labours enjoyed by each Church, or expended by each brother. We will, however, refer to the different Districts in numerical order, and give, as nearly as we can, the amount and known results of the labours bestowed upon each Dis-

trict separately, and the whole collectively.

Our First District embraces the Churches in the upper section of the country, reaching from Salmon River, in Victoria County, to Peel, in Carleton County. There are in this District thirteen Churches. Two new ones were received at the last District Meeting. But one ordained minister has resided within the limits of these Churches during the whole year. Only two of these Churches have had pastoral care during the year. A large number of them have had repeated visits from the brethren sent to them as Home Missionaries. Some of these Churches have enjoyed seasons of refreshing. Additions have been made throughout this extent of country. One new Church was organized, and we think the efforts put forth by our brethren have produced good fruits. True, not so much has been done as we could desire, nevertheless we think this District has gained somewhat the last year. It is a whitened harvest-field, and needs more labourers. Quite a number have been added to this District during the year.

The Second District embraces the Churches on both sides of the St. John River, from Peel, in Carleton County, down to the town of Woodstock. There are twenty Churches in this District. Within its limits our General Conference was organized, and some of our older Churches are located. A number of our ministers have lived and laboured with these Churches. Six have had pastoral care—some all the time, others a portion of the time. Revivals have been encare—some all the time, others a portion of the time. Revival has been depicted by several, and to some of them the accessions were considerable. Two Churches have been organized, and one meeting-house commenced. This is an important part of our denominational vineyard, and needs much faithful care and labour. We think this District is also improving, and feel especially anxious that it may prosper, and exert a powerful influence in favor of truth and holiness

Our Third District extends on down the river as far as the city of Fredericton, and embraces all the Churches in the County of York, about seventeen in number. How many of these Churches have had pastoral oversight, we cannot

say. Some of them we knew have. Others have had visits from Home Missionaries, and other itinerant brethren. Good revivals have been experienced by some of these Churches, and numbers added that we hope will be of substantial value to our denominational interest. Much mora-labour is called for and needed in this District. In parts of it great destitution exists. Upon the whole, however, we think we can say there are evidences of progress and increasing hope. Two fine meeting-houses have been dedicated to the wership of God, and one hundred and twenty-six persons baptized during the year; one Church organized, and two more meeting-houses commenced.

In the Fourth District there are ten Churches, scattered over the country between Fredericton and Upper Hampstead, including those in the flourishing section of the country in which we are now assembled. Some of these Churches have been quite destitute of labour all the year, but others have been under the constant care of pastors some portion of the time. More regular labour has been bestowed here the last year than there was the former year. Additions have been made, and an increased interest has been manifest in some parts of the District. Faithful labour is much required here. Some of these Churches that have long been established, and that have good houses of worship, and where large congregations would assemble to hear the Gospel, the bread of the Gospel.

The Fifth District includes eighteen Churches. Excépting these on the Washademoak Lake, and one or two others, these Churches have had the oversight and ministry of pastors. Considerable revival has followed the labours of these pastors and large additions have been made in some parts of this field. Several of these Churches are in a more efficient state than they have been for years. Some missionary labour has also been expended here to good advantage. One Church has been organized, and two good houses of worship commenced duringsthe year. The Churches referred to as being without labour are experiencing serious loss. Some of them are large, and present an inviting field of labour. For those on the Lake we feel anxious. Will not some brother who has heard the Lord of the harvest saying "Woe" and "Go," now hear from this field the cry, "Come," until his heart will be moved to commit himself to this destinute part of this important District? We are anxious to see this field supplied.

The Sixth District stretches towards the East as far as Taylor Village, and has nineteen aChurches. As in the other Districts, here also the labour has been partly pastoral and partly missionary. One Church has been organized, and one meeting-house dedicated to the worship of God. In some other Churches limited revivals have been enjoyed, but no very large accessions have been made. Some of these Churches are quite small, so that it is difficult for them to secure regular labour. A number of them have, however, had constant care a portion or all of the year. Had we the ministers to enter this section of country, large congregations could be gathered where we have no Churches, and large accessions, we believe, be made to the Churches we have. In some portions of this District, the cause is sadly declining, and some of these Churches must receive help, or they will lose their influence, if not their visibility

In the Seventh District there are ten Churches, including those on the Islands and in the City of St. John. These Churches have had a large share of pastoral labour, and yet some of them have been without the regular ministry of the Gospel a part of the year. This is our youngest district, and in some respects it is prospering quite satisfactorily: yet more labour is called for and is needed, and much more might be don. Perhaps in no District in the denomination could more be accomplished by entering new fields and planting Churches, than in this. The harvest is great even here. God has blessed the labours of the brethren who have ministered to these Churches; revivals have followed, and additions have been made to the most of them. Connected with these ten Churches there are eight Sabbath Schools.

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We have but briefly spoken of each District, giving a general representation of the state of the cause. Each held its Annual Meeting at the appointed time. Several Churches have been organized, and one that had virtually lost its visibility has been re-organized. Five meeting houses have been completed, and a number of others commenced. Four young brettren have been ordained to the work of the ministry, and five hundred and eighty-five have been baptized and added to the Churches during the year. The labours of two of our Elders have been spent nearly the whole year with our brethren in Nova Scotia. They saw much good accomplished there. Although the number of additions is quite encouraging, doubtless had all our brethren continued with us, the number would have been considerably increased.

Many whitened fields lie before us. Never had we so much to do. One year ago we had with us brethren deep in experience, vigorous in labour, and strong in faith, who did work that others must do this year. The care of the Churches, and the labour of our different organizations and enterprises, now rest with us who are present. We have not enough ministers to supply all our Churches with the labour they actually require, even should they all spend their entire time in the ministry; but some of them do not give themselves exclusively to the work. In some instances we think the ministers are to blame, and in other cases it is the fault of the Churches themselves. To properly distribute the labour, and provide for the wants of all the Churches, is a matter of vast importance, and one that, at the proper time, will be introduced for the consideration and deliberation of this Conference. In this matter we need especial wisdom. If ever wisdom, care and counsel were necessary for our guidance and prosperity, it is at this very Annual Meeting. The Lord has planted us, and erowned the labours of our brethren with abundant success. Our doctrines are becoming better and more favourably known; but we need a deep and abiding consecration to God, and a gracious baptism of the Holy Ghost, that we may continue perseveringly in the duties before us, with an eye single to the glory of God. We need working men, who will feel that, beyond their immediate Churches or districts of labour, there are general denominational duties to be done, and who are willing to do all they can. Now that we have reached our present position of numerical strength and influence, we must see that our work still progresses. Our mission is aggressive. Many communities are erying to us for help-many souls are looking to us for

Our Home Mission Society is steadily prosecuting its noble work. Its Annual Report, which will be read before the Public Meeting of the Society on

Monday evening, will give the details of its operations.

Our Foreign Mission Society is also increasing in vigour and in favour with Our Foreign mission Society is also increasing in vigour and in rayour with the people. Our Churches are awaking to the importance of the work, and the justness of the claims of the heathen upon us. Tuesday evening we will hear from the Secretary, of the workings and efficiency of this Society. Our Educational Society is still looking forward to the time when more will be done in this department of our work. Not very much has yet been accomplished, and yet we believe the leaven is working in the minds of our people, and the time will some when we will de something worthy of our denomination.

The many Sabbath Schools connected with our Churches are working away with their usual interest in the great toil of training and instructing the children of our families and the communities. This is by no means the least important part of our work. It will, however, be reported to you by the pro-

per persons, at the proper time.

We have a number of brethren with us to-day who are looking towards the ministry, several of whom now hold licences to preach. We want more. We want intelligent, pious, educated young men, who will come to the work feeling that the hand of God is upon them, and who are willing to sacrifice and toil for the salvation of souls, and wait for their reward until shey shall be called home to heaven. The responsibilities of the sacred office of the Gospel

Soon, one after another, we will all pass away. Now is our working time. In heaven we will not be able to win souls to Christ. Who of us will be missed a year hence? May the Lord help us, and guide us through the meanderings of life, and ultimately bring us to glory, through our Lord Jesus Christian

The following letter from Bro. Boyer accompanied the donation, and was read:

To the Free Christian Baptist General Conference, in session at South Branch Oromocto:

DEAR BRETHEEN IN CHRIST—You may remember that at the last General Con-Dear Brethern in Christ—You may remember that at the last General Conference, held at Wakefield. I pledged myself to give to the General Conference, for general purposes, for the support of the cause of God, the sum of one thousand dollars. Now I consider myself under further obligations to do something more financially. Calling to mind how the Lord has blessed me, in basket and in store, with a sufficiency of this world's goods for our own support and that of our children, with their industry and proper economy, to make them, confertable through life, and still having something to spare. I make them comfortable through life, and still having something to spare, I make a further donation to General Conference of one thousand dollars, in gold, to be vested in real estate, say lands only, without perishable property, such as buildings, thereon; and also the first donation, to make security doubly secure. The interest of the second one thousand dollars shall be paid, one-half to the Foreign Mission Society of Free Christian Baptists of New Brunswick, and Foreign mission Society of Free Christian Baptist Education Society of New Brunswick, and the other half to the Free Christian Baptist Education Society of New Brunswick, yearly, or oftener if necessary, for all time to come. If at any time either or both of these Societies should cease to exist, the said interest shall be used for general purposes, for the support of the cause of God, by the Free Christian Baptist General Conference of New Brunswick. Especially do we regard it the duty of all Christian men to discountenance and discourage the use of intoxicating beverages, and to support and promulgate the principles of total abstinence. If men who only profess philanthropy are zealous in this good reform, how much more active should we be who profess Christianity. Professing the greater, we cannot with consistency be found indifferent to the less. In becoming Christians, our obligations to seek and promote the moral improvement of our fellow-men, are only changed by being made more binding and solemn. THE SABBATH.

The Committee appointed to take into consideration the subject of the proper observance of the Sabbath Day, beg leave to submit the following

Report:—
It appears plain to us that right views on this important subject are of invaluable benefit to those holding them, tending as they must to lead them to apply the rest of the Sabbath to its true and legitimate purpose, directing us to give the sacred hours to the service of God, and to use the day for the purpose of our spiritual elevation and moral improvement.

Few questions have encountered more steady opposition than the question of the proper observance of the Sabbath; for persons generally regard it either in accordance with the state of their own hearts, or in accordance with their early religious education, and so it comes to pass that while some content for a strict observance of its sacred hours, others cry out for a laxity that amounts almost to a profanation of this sacred day of the Lord. Divinely instituted it certainly was, and that for the good of the entire race; not, indeed, for the advantage of the few, but for the good of the many, and hence it follows that all men are under imperative obligations to observe the sacred hours that were set apart by the wisdom of our heavenly Father, in the way he has ordered in his holy Word. And here it becomes a question of no small importance for us to ascertain the purposes for which the day was appointed, and the best methods of carrying out the objects contemplated by it.

The ends sought to be obtained by the institution of the Sabbath were undoubtedly two—rest and devotion, and it may tend to our interest to note these ends, and to mark the principles they involve. Rest from all secular toil, and a participation in the services of devotion, are the great purposes of this holy day. The Divine example illustrates these objects by showing us that when He had put the last finishing touch to the work of creation, his crowning act was to sanctify the seventh day and make it holy. And so here we have act was to sanctify the seventh day and make it holy. And so here we have act illustrious example as well as a beautiful type of both rest and devotion. Behold the Divine Architect ending his work, and resting on the Sabbath, for the simple purpose of distinguishing the day and marking it as a time whose hours should be observed for holy and spiritual ends. As God made the world especially for man's benefit, so for precisely the same object did he sanctify the seventh day, that his intelligent creatures might enjoy a portion of time exempt from secular cares and worldly anxiety. And again, the word Sabbath signifies rest, and is a fitting term by which to designate the day, as well as the purposes for which the day was intended, and also to be used as a lively type of that celestial rest whose repose will be sweet, and sorrow and toil be known no more, but joy and pleasure here are the contraction of t

well as the purposes for which the day was intended, and also to be used as a lively type of that celestial rest whose repose will be sweet, and sorrow and toil be known no more, but joy and pleasure be our delight for ever and ever.

But we go still further, and remark that, constituted as we are, cessation from manual labour, for at least a portion of the time, is a vital necessity, and it becomes alike needful to both body and soul, that we should have one day in seven for rest and devotion. It has been often demonstrated that real physical and mental vigour can only be permanently sustained by seasons of repose and intervals of enjoyment. The history of our race teaches us that many constitutions have become prematurely feeble, and decidedly imbedle, by the continuous strain of unceasing labour, without the intervening repose of the Sabbath. Yea, even when man was holy and upright, he needed a day of rest.

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mperance also that, principles. dent suping to our time will How much more now, since he has become fallen and wretched, and lives in a world where sin and sorrow, disappointment and anguish meet him at every step. If God considered the Sabbath a necessity before man was contaminated with evil, how much more now, when he is surrounded by the perils of the world, the flesh, and the devil. In every way it appears plain that man needs the rest of the Sabbath, and the privileges of devotion that is to be obtained on that day. Moral and spiritual improvement we certainly need; and as secular toil engrosses the greater part of the week, it seems reasonable that the hours

of the Sabbath should be devoted to moral and spiritual services.

The methods by which the Sabbath may be properly observed, are easily seen, and may be very clearly contemplated. Certainly it is not observing the day to spend its hours in carelessly lounging about the house and the fields, or indolently sleeping the sacred hours away. Neither is it by spending the time in rambling and sight-seeing, which is only another name for triffing and folly, sometimes falsely called pleasure. Visiting of friends, and the amusements of parties is, to say the least of it, a disgrace to the holy day of the Lord. Worldly pleasure is always enfeebling to the moral powers as well as being unfavourable to the great purposes of the rest of the Sabbath, and is sure to bring down the consequences of Sabbath desecration on the head of the offender. And, again, it cannot be that the day is observed by giving part to God and part to the devil. We mean, by giving God our religious worship the first part of the day, and the latter part of it to sin and folly. This scheme is certainly endeavouring to partake of the Lord's table and the table of devils, and is a union that is associated with harm, and the influence of which is destructive to good society. But, it will be asked, what are our duties on the holy day of the Lord? We answer, they have been already indicated; but that they may be distinctly seen we observe—to use the day properly, and to spend its hours well, they should be spent in devout meditation and scriptural reading, to works of necessity and benevolence, to private and public worship, to sacred singing and to devout prayer; indeed, any exercise that shall lift the soul to God, or be beneficial to our fellow man, may be properly attended to on the Sabbath day. Let us then engage in those services that shall tend to a preparation for our eternal rest; and by a conscientious application of its hours to spiritual duties, the Sabbath will become a bright and verdant spot in this wilderness of sin and sorrow—an pasis in the desert of life, where satisfaction may be enjoyed, and real comfort found. In conclusion, we say to all, gird on the armour, and do battle manfully against Sabbath desecration, and in favour of a proper Sabbath observance; and then, when the battle of life shall be ended, we will insure a noble fitness for that heavenly and eternal Sabbath that shall be given to and enjoyed by A. 5th. Resolved, That in the case of Bro. S. Therefore Resolved, That no licentiate has, by virtue of his license to preach, or can have until he shall be ordained, the right or authority to receive members into our Churches by giving the right hand of fellowship, or to administer any rite or ordinance whatever in connection with the Churches, beyond the exercise of his gift.

Further Resolved, That all ordained ministers shall hold themselves in readiness to assist licentiates in their labours, by administering the ordinances, and receiving members into Churches for them, when required so to do.

The following Report of the delegates to the Nova Scotia General Conference was read and received:

Your delegates met in the Nova Scotia General Conference, which convened in September last, at Canning, Cornwallis. Only five Elders were present: others were prevented by ill health and uncontrollable circumstances. We also met two visiting ministers belonging to the F. W. Baptists of that Erovince. The most important business of that session was the forming and adopting of a basis of union between them and the F. W. Baptists of Nova Scotia. Tour delegates took an active partin the work of union, which has been fully consummated, and for which the brethren were very grateful. We further recommend that the General Conference give them their support and influence, as when the paper was under the con-troul of the late Editor. In view of the fact of the Religious Intelligencer being the organ of the Free Baptists of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, and in view of the youth of the present Editor, who has been so unexpectedly placed in the position, we recommend that an advisary Committee be appointed, to advise with the Editor when necessary.

The following brethren were appointed the advisary Committee referred to in the Report : Revs. B. Merritt, J. Perry, and T.

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The following Preamble and Resolutions were introduced by Bro. Wm. Peters, and after some discussion and deliberation, were unanimously adopted.

Whereas, For several years it has been the desire of a number of the members of this General Conference that there should be a permanent fund established in this General Conference for the relief of sick and disabled ministers and their families; and Whereas, there has been a fund established by the Church at Fredericton, called the "McLeod Ministers' Relief Fund," the principal of which will, according to the rules of that Society, come into the hands of the General Conference after the term of four years; and as there is already \$1000 donated to the Conference by Bro. Boyer, to be used by the Conference as it may decide; and Whereas, We find by experience that to receive donations it is necessary to have definite objects properly set before the public-

Therefore Resolved, That this Conference do with pleasure note the evidence of the great love of the Fredericton Church for their late Pastor, Rev. E. McLeod, and do with them deplore our loss in the death of our lamented brother, and that we do deeply sym-

pathize with his afflicted family; and further

Resolved, That this Conference proceed to form a Society for the purposes in the Preamble to these Resolutions intimated, under the name of the "F. C. Baptist Ministers' Relief Fund," not to conflict with the above named Society, but to more effectually provide relief for needy ministers and their families.

Brethren G. A. Hartley, J. T. Parsons, Wm. Kinghorn, G. T. Hartley, and Geo. W. McCready, were appointed a Committee to draft a Constitution for the government of the F. C. B. Ministers'

Relief Society. The Report and Constitution submitted by them were received, and a Society organized. The Constitution and Officers of the Society will be found elsewhere in these Minutes.

Whereas, Bro. G. R. Boyer, one year ago, made a donation to this Conference of one thousand dollars, the interest of which is to be used by this Conference for such purposes as they deem advisable—

Your Committee appointed to arrange some plan by which the care of the Churches may be more fully realized, by the introduction of the Circuit system (so called), beg leave to recommend, that our denominational field be divided into about twenty-five circuits, as the Conference may decide; and that Circulars be prepared for distribution among the Churches, to be so worded as to determine whether the Church to which it is addressed is willing to submit such a system as therein described; if so, what amount it will guarantee to raise during each year for ministerial labour; said Church to make known its decision at the next annual meeting of the District of which it is a member and that the Secretary of each District Meeting be required to make a full report to Conference of all the Churches within the District in favour of said system, and also of those not in favour. with regard to the scale of salary, your Committee is unable to come to any decision, unless the Elders consent mutually to a classification.

The Home Mission Society held its third Annual Meeting in the meeting house in this place on the 8th of July, at 8 o'clock, P. M. B. J. Underhill, Esq., President, occupied the chair, called the meeting to order, and opened the services by giving out a

ANNUAL REPORT

Of the Corresponding Secretary of the Home Mission Society of New Brunswick.

My Christian Friends-The rapidity with which time passes is startling. Scarcely can we realize that a whole year has passed since we met in our Annual Meeting at Wakefield. But so it is. We are this evening assembled Annual faceting at viaceting, and it is now my duty to give you a report of our doings during the last twelve months. The Society has been prosecuting the work for which it was organized, and we are more than ever impressed with the importance of Home Mission labours. Many of our Churches are without the importance of theme Mission labours. regular care and preaching, and are entirely dependent for the ministry of the Word upon itinerant or missionary labour. Some of these Churches are small, and without much means for supporting the Gospel, and must be cared for, or lost to the denomination. We have very much to do, and need system, means, and men to do it. We cannot at present do all we wish to, nevertheless much good has already been accomplished, and we hope to increase in efficiency and

success as we advance in age.

Believing that Reports should be reports on the state and progress made by the Society, rather than essays on the objects of the organization, I will at

once give you an account of what has been done.

At our last Annual Meeting, our Executive Committee engaged the Rev.

Wm. Downey for the year. Bro. Downey only spent half a month with us, when he requested to be refleved from his engagement, that he might follow that the property of this short time he the lead of his mind, and go to Nova Scotia. spent at Stanley, where labour is much needed.

The Rev. F. Babcock has been engaged by the Society nearly nine months. A part of this short time he

He has visited a number of our Churches, and laboured faithfully for the up-building of the cause. At New Town, Smith's Creek, the Lord blessed him, and gave him to see a good season of revival. He baptized quite a number, and

organized a Church.

organized a Church.

This Church gives evidence of life, and we believe may, with care and labour, become large, and exert a healthy influence. He spent some time on the Millstream, at Sussex, Upper Sussex, and several other Churches in the eastern section of the country. At Prince William he also was blessed in promoting revival. The Spirit of God rendered his efforts powerful for good at this place. A good number were revived and reclaimed, and others were converted to God. He baptized several here. This Church was very much strengthened, and its influence greatly extended, by this timely visit of our brother. Kingsclear, and other places in that section of the country, were visited, and the cause somewhat helped.

Cause somewhat neged.

The Rev. A. Taylor has spent some eight months under the direction of the Executive Committee. His labours have been divided amongst a large number of the Churches is the upper part of the country, principally in the First District. The urgent request made by this District last year for help, caused us to feel that we could do more good in our efforts to supply destitute Churches with care, by bestowing more than a proportion of our means on these scattered Churches, than in any other way; hence we have kept Bro. Taylor in that part

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of the country all his time. Our brother has travelled almost constantly, and laboured faithfully in general oversight and care. He has accomplished much good in getting things in order. He has seen some revival interest, and organized one Church. He baptized in several places. Although his labours were not concentrated so as to produce revivals in all the Churches he visited, yet we believe much good has been done, and the way prepared for future in-

The Rev. Samuel Downey was employed by this Society for four months and twenty-two days, and spent the time principally within the limits of the Sixth District. Dutch Valley, Portage, Snider Mountain, and other places were visited by him. In some of these Churches he saw revival interest and the cause helped. His labours in the families, as he went from house to house, were He baptized twenty-three.

Rev. T. Vanwart spent one month very profitably at Cole's Island. He saw quite a good revival, and baptized six persons. He made a short visit to Stanley, and saw that little Church considerably strengthened.

The Rev. A. B. Marsh made a short mission to the Staples' Settlement, where the Lord blessed his labours, and converted a number of souls. Eleven were baptized by him, and added to the little Church in that place.

The Rev. Robert French spent one month with the Church at New Ireland, Queen's County. Our brother visited faithfully and laboured industriously in this place, and we trust good-both for the present and future-was accomplished. This Church has a fine meeting house; but, like too many of our Churches, has very little regular preaching. It needs care and oversight

Bro. Solomon Smith had a short mission; and Rev. C. McMullin spent one menth in profitable labour with some of the up-river Churches.

The Rev. Yerxa White also laboured one month.

Two Churches have been organized and a large number of others have been cared for and supplied with about all the labour they received, by our Society. At our annual meetings we not only wish to report and seview the past, but to strengthen our seal for the future as well. This is not the most successfully accomplished by statistics, or even by expressions of religious patriotism, but accompanied of statements, or even by expressions of religious partitions, the by unreserved consecration to the work. Those who give their money, and those who are kept in the field by it, together feel that the money is the Lord's, and the great end aimed at by its use is the conversion of sinners, and the upbuilding of the cause of our Redeemer. We do rejoice that the Master permits us to do something in so noble a part of his great work on the earth.

Time is rapidly passing, and ere another annual meeting of this Society shall be held, some who are now present may be numbered with the dead. What we do for the salvation of the ungedly around us, must be done at once. Soon the work will be left to others. In our fine and prosperous country, there is great need of the blessings of the Gospel becoming more universal. In all directions new settlements are being planted, and to these communities the Gospel must be carried. The calls now are numerous, the fields inviting, and the duty solemn and binding. Who has and who will continue to de his duty?

duty solemn and binding. Who has and who will continue to do his duty? The claims of our own kindred and of our own country are first and greatest. The commission from on high is imperative. Somebody must preach the Word of Life to our feeble Churches, and carry the glad tidings into places where now we have no organizations. Had we the men and means, we could find fields of labour for more than a zerry of Free Baptist Missionaries in this Province, outside of our Churches altogether.

The deep interest, almost amounting to enthusiasm, that has been taken in our work, in each of our past annual meetings, encourages us to hope that substantial aid will be rendered this evening. We want constitutes and pledges from all. The mite of the poor, as well as the large offerings of the risk, has always been acceptable in the treasury of the Lord. O, for consecration I for a spirit of devotedness to the work of God, that will make us a power in accomplishing good! Our hope is that when we shall be done giving and preaching, praying and working, those who have supported, and those who have

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is duty? greatest. he Word es where ould find toiled, and those who have or who may be converted as the fruit of our efforts, may meet in heaven above, where we shall ascribe all the praise to the Lamb for ever and ever.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Your Executive Committee, in laying before you its present Annual Report, has to say that the duties devolving upon us during the year have been attended to, and the interests of the Society promoted as: far as we have been able to do so. We held sixteen meetings for business during the year. Eight missionaries have laboured under our direction: the most of them, however, had but short missions. The whole time of labour expended by us is equal to about two years and four moints by one man. The amount of money spens is about \$800. We have paid all demands against the Committee, and hope that fands may come in at this meeting by which the Society will be enabled to continue its important work.

The third Annual Meeting of the F. C. B. Foreign Mission Society was held in the meeting house N. B. Oromocto, Sunbury County, at 71 o'clock, P. M. The President in the chair.

In behalf of these, and hundreds of others left in the same position, we ask the earnest and sincere prayers of all who love our Lord Jesus Christ, that they may be converted, and become useful members in the Christian Church, and a great blessing to their native land, now sunk in idolatry and wretchedness. We can but rejoice in the good work that is being done by our missionaries in India; and as the all-wise God has given the Free Baptists of North America a very important field of labour in the heathen world, let us faithfully occupy it. We are called upon by a million of precious and immortal souls, sunken in idolatry and misery, to do our part in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, the send them the lamp of life, and while others are casting in of their abundance, let us do what we can to bring them into the fold of Uhrist. After listening to the able speeches made by the mover, seconder, and supporter of the above Resolution, the Treasurer made a very satisfactory statement of the finances of the Society.

Subscription lists were then opened and circulated, and \$285.11 pledged, of which \$89.24 was paid, including collection taken up in the meeting, \$10.50.

B. Ministers' Relief Fund Association.

(ORGANIZED JULY, 1867.)

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

This Society shall be known as the "F. C. Baptist Ministers' Relief Fund Association," under the auspices of the F. C. Baptist General Conference of New Brunswick.

ARTICLE II. THE OBJECT OF THIS SOCIETY.

The object of this Society shall be to establish a Fund for the assistance of sick or disabled Ministers in regular standing with the F. C. B. denomination, and the families of deceased ministers.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERSHIP.

A male can become a member of this Society by paying annually the sum of \$1.00; and by paying \$10.00 at any one time, may become a life member. A female may become an honorary annual member by paying 50c.; and by paying \$5.00 at any one time, may become an honorary life member.

ARTICLE IV.—OFFICERS.

The Officers of this Society shall consist of a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Auditor, and a Disbursement Committee of five, who shall be elected annually by the Society. The Disbursement Committee and President shall be ordained ministers; the other Officers may be laymen—all to be members of F. C. Baptist Churches.

The Secretary and Treasurer shall be associated with the Disbursement Com-

mittee, in any business that may come before them.

The foregoing Officers shall hold office until others are chosen.

It shall be the duty of the President, and in his absence of one of the VicePresidents, to preside at each meeting of the Society, and conduct its business

to a speedy and proper result.

In the absence of the President and all the Vice-Presidents, the oldest member present shall call the meeting to order, after which they shall proceed to

choose a presiding Officer for the occasion.

choose a presiding Officer for the occasion.

The Disbursement Committee shall form its own Rules and Regulations; appoint its own meetings; fill any vacancies that may occur in its own members, or among the Officers of the Society during the year; and call all Annual Meetings of the Society, and also special meetings, when, in their opinion, the interests of the Society require it. They shall inquire into all cases of actual need that may come under their notice, and take such measures for relieving them as shall be deemed expedient by a majority of a legal meeting of the Board—three members of the Board constituting such legal meeting of the Board—three members of the Board constituting such legal meeting.

The Treasurer shall take charge of the funds of the Society, and keep an account of the same, showing the source, from which they have been derived, and the manner in which they have been appropriated. He shall invest the

funds of the Society safely, but no permanent investment shall be made or changed by him, without the concurrence of the Disbursement Committee. He shall report quarterly to the Recording Secretary on the state of the finances, and pay all orders of the Disbursement Committee, as far as he may have funds on hand.

The Auditor shall carefully examine the accounts of the Treasurer, and if found correct shall certify the same, which shall be entered upon the Treasu-

rer's book.

It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a fair and impartial record of the transactions of each meeting, and enter them upon a book of records, and certify that the records of each meeting are true. He shall also attend to all the correspondence of the Society, and prepare an Annual Report of its proceedings, which shall be submitted for acceptance at the Annual Meeting of the Society.

ARTICLE V .-- ANNUAL MEETING.

This Society shall meet annually, at the time and place of meeting of the F. C. Baptist General Conference, to elect Officers, to hear Reports from the Treasurer and Secretary, and to transact all other necessary business of the Society. A quorum of nine members shall be requisite to transact business at all meetings of the Society. A less number may adjourn.

ARTICLE VI.-CHOOSING OFFICERS.

A Committee shall be appointed at each Annual Meeting of the Society, in such manner, and consisting of such numbers, as may be thought best, whose duty it shall be to nominate Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE VII.—AMENDMENTS.

No alterations or amendments to this Constitution shall be made without a a two-third vote of the members present at an annual meeting, and only then when the proposed alteration shall have been submitted to the Society in writing at a previous meeting.

ARTICLE VIII.—MONIES.

All monies placed in the hands of this Society shall be under the controll of the Disbursement Committee, and shall be by them invested in a safe and profitable manner, the interest of which alone shall be used for the objects of the
