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### FOURTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Restigouche Agricultural Society,

1851

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The period having again arrived when your Agricultural Board are required to render an account of their stewardship, they beg leave to submit the following Report of their Proceedings during the past year. They regret that it has been one of disappointment, as respects the importation of Stock, in consequence of the early vessel from the neighbourhood of the place where the large English Sheep had been formerly-got, sailing too early on both voyage; the first was unusually so, and considered too great a risk—and the second took place before the grasses and vegetables had arrived at a site of sufficient maturity to furnish suitable provender for the voyage; consequently those Sheep ordered were not shipped, but are ready for the first safe convegerance.

In respect of the Horse, your Committee viewed the resolution of the Legislature as to vegue, uncertain, and incurring so heavy a pecuniary responsibility, that they deemed it most prodent to decline importing via St. John, with those intended for other Agricultural Societies in that neighbourhood; but preferred instituting enquiries, in order to obtain the best possible information as to where the most suitable animal was to be obtained, and the readiest way of a rehasing and transporting him hither direct—
They had too at the same time, a prespect of getting a Norman-

dy Percheron I orse, on safer terms, through the kindaess of DAVID LEBOUTILLIER, lequire, M.P.P. for the County of Bonaventure, Gaspe, who very generously offered to select, purchase, and bring out one or nore if required, with one he intends importing to Paspeblie, should be neet with any of his ships at home coming out in ballast. Your Committee were not however sufficiently acquainted with the history or description of that breed of Horses at the time, and not wishing to introduce so valuable an animal as a Horse into the County, without consulting the members of your Society generally, preferred waiting an opportunity for so deing, which this Meeting affords, and they now solicit an expression of opinion on the subject.

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From the history of Canada, your Committee learn, that the far-famed Canadian Pony was from the Normandy Diligence Horse, brought there on the early settlement of the Province by the French; and experience has proved him to be an active Horse of all work, possessed of great strength, and uncommon power of endurance; but it is more in breadth and size of bone and nuncle that he excels, than in height. They have also learnt that the highly prized Prince Edward Island Horse was originally the Canadian crossed by the Duke of Kent's breed from Nov.—Scotia. Enquiries have also been made, as to the size and prebable cost of a Dartmoor Horse, the larger English or Clydesdale breeds being donsidered too clumery to be generally weful.

The revised Premium List published immediately after your last Annual Meeting, has had the desired effect in distributing more widely the funds of your Society, and has given general satisfaction, excepting in the sums named for the different samples of Clover Seed, which is thought by some too low to remunerate the producer for the extra cost of threshing and cleaning that article.

The Crops were ail harvested and housed in good condition, and yield in most places a fair average, thereby remunerating the hasbandman for his labour, which he has the more reason to be throwful to a bountful Providen e for, as many other parts of the Province have not been so highly favored. Your Committee have much pleasure in adding, that from the best information they can obtain, there is in this County an abundance of food for both man and beast; whilst the only grain imported the last season, appears by the Customs' returns, to be the unusual small quantity of 6500 bushels of oats for lumbering purposes.

Since your last Annuel Meating, two additional Grist and Oat Mills with Kilns have been erected, and in successful operation, affording increased facilities to the farmer for converting his grain into bread-stuff. Mr. ALLAN VAUGHAN, one of the proprietors, has given in a memorandum, containing a very gratifying account of the superior quality of the grain grown in the lower Parishes; he states, that 4½ bushels of wheat lately brought to the mill by Mr. JAMES O'NKIL, produced 232lbs. of flour equal to the best Candian bread, and 44lbs of seconds, hesides bran; that several other samples were of a like quality, one, superior, and that it is not uncommon to predoce 22lbs. of meet per bushe is of oats, hesides sends, &c.

The Justices of he Peace at their General Sessions last January, reled "That no bull be allowed to run at large, except these

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epproved by your Secretary." He, in consequence, was directed to parchase a thorough-bred Ayrahire three year old from Mr. Withtran Douglas, and to turn him loose for the use of the public. The animal proves very quiet and harmless, and his winter's feed was let by auction, with the intention of leaving him the next season in the Parish; he is wintered by Mr. Remar Watson, and has him now in charge.

Your Accounts having been audited, show a green balance of 1512. 18s. 24d. including outs anding debts, amongst which are bad and doubtful, that have been accountiating since the formation of your Society, to the amount of 582. 10s. 0d, which being deducted from the balance of last year, under the old regime, will leave a reliable balance of 982. 8s. 24d. in favour of your Society. The stock of Seeds are in good-condition, and will afford a sufficient quantity for early sowing; a full supply is expected in the spring, as heretofore.

Your Committee continue to urge the necessity of erecting a Market-House, for the selected and safe keeping of your agricultural produce. The want of such a building is acknowledged by all, and none experience greater inconvenience than the agriculturist and mechanic.
