MUNICIPAL CORPORATIONS.  
In our last, we promised to look at the motives which appear to actuate those who oppose this proffered boon.  
Some oppose the Act because it will take from them the power of controlling local affairs, which they have so long enjoyed, and place it in the hands of those elected by the people, to whom they will be responsible. Such opposition is not to be wondered at, as it is very natural for persons in power to be anxious to retain it. They call it "vested rights" and despise popular interference. We would not however wish to be understood that all persons holding offices, are against the measure, as we know a few who are in favor of it.  
Others oppose it conscientiously, fearing that the County expenses will be materially increased—and that consequently the taxes will be doubled, without any corresponding benefit, and it is not at all unlikely that they may not understand the working of the system. But the more they become acquainted with the principles of the Corporation Act, the sooner will they be in favor of it.  
The next parties to whom we shall allude, are those who are in the enjoyment of official emoluments. These parties use a variety of arguments, which are really too absurd to notice, yet as this might be supposed rather a summary method of disposing of their opposition, we may mention that they assert "the majority of the people are too ignorant to have Municipal institutions conferred on them." Hear that, ye sturdy yeomanry of Charlotte! These same people talk much about the expense of the new system, and profess to oppose it from motives of economy. But the truth is, the people do not rely upon these parties "professions" of an economy they do not "practice."

**THE TRUNK RAILWAY.**—NEWS FROM ENGLAND.—We understand that the last English mail has brought advices from Mr. Hicks, and we are happy to learn that Canadian credit never stood higher in England than it does at present. It affords us additional gratification to be able to state that Mr. Hicks anticipates no difficulty in making such arrangements as will ensure the speedy construction of the Great Trunk Railway from Halifax throughout the entire length of the Province.

We have reason to believe that action has been taken by the Canadian Government to ensure the commencement of the survey of the whole line within a very short period.—(Quebec Gazette.)

**LEGISLATURE.**—The Liquor bill yesterday was reported by the Committee of the whole House with a variety of amendments and laid on the table to be printed. The yeas and nays were taken upon the question of striking out the proviso referring the bill to the people and the motion prevailed, the vote standing 190 yeas to 163 nays. There were 38 absentees. The vote will be found recorded in another portion of this day's paper. Another important amendment was made in Committee of the Whole. The provision permitting the sale of wine for sacramental purposes was stricken out. The bill will not probably come up for discussion again until Monday.—(Boston Atlas, Apr. 1.)

**MAINE LIQUOR LAW IN NEW-YORK.** The Maine Law was discussed in the New-York House of Assembly on Wednesday in the morning and evening sessions, and it was ordered to a third reading by a vote of 51 to 35.

**ENGLISH RAILROAD IRON.**—The Wilkesbarre "Farmer," in noticing certain accidents which had lately happened on the railways in his neighbourhood, in consequence of the breaking of the iron rails, says:—

"Good English iron is doubtless a very good thing. But there is more difference in the quality of English than there is in American iron. The English railroad iron brought to this country, and about which there is so much clamor made, is what is called 'cinder iron.' It is rotten and worthless and without any real value at home."

**C. Hanson, of Brooklyn, New York,** proposes to Congress that he shall establish a line of steamers between Brooklyn and Gloucester, on the Elbe, and near to Hamburg, so as to make semi-monthly passages between Brooklyn and the city of Hamburg. He proposes to build four steamers, of 2,000 tons each, the first two to be ready in two years, and the other two in three years. He proposes to carry mails and passengers at such rates as he shall be able to obtain. He offers to do this if Congress will give him for the first three years one hundred thousand dollars per annum; for the next three years eighty-five thousand dollars per annum, and for the next three years seventy-five thousand dollars per annum, for each vessel engaged in the service.

A. H. Pringle & Co., of New York, have been arrested at the instance of passengers returned from Panama, for selling worthless tickets to California. The complaint was made by Peter Schmidt, of New York, who purchased tickets for himself and five associates from Maine.

**WEDNESDAY.**—The Legislature House on the evening of March, a Temperance Law substantially like the Maine Law was reported, abolishing all Licenses, suppressing the

Legalized Traffic subject to approval on a direct vote by the people. A Minority Report is to be submitted. Up to that day, petitions for such a law had been presented with 14,092 signatures, and remonstrances against it with 4,822 signatures. Besides these, there were 1,252 petitions for a total repeal of the License Law.

**NEW-BRUNSWICK SOCIETY FOR THE ENCOURAGEMENT OF AGRICULTURE, HOME MANUFACTURES, COMMERCE, &c.**  
Great Provincial Exhibition to be opened at Fredericton on Tuesday the 5th October next, under the auspices and patronage of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor and Lady Head.

**TO THE PUBLIC.**  
The Legislature having passed a grant of £500 in aid of the funds of the Society to provide for the expense of getting up and managing the proposed Exhibition, and thereby showing their approval of the same, upon the plan and contemplated arrangements contained in the resolutions of the Society passed at the general meetings held on the 15th October and 7th January last, which have all been heretofore published and widely circulated throughout the Province. The Executive Committee are now actively engaged in the preparations requisite for carrying out the scheme; and all local committees for the different Counties in the Province to the general Committee, consisting of the Legislative Council and Members of the House of Assembly, in their private capacities, in their respective Counties; the several County Agricultural Societies, and Mechanics' Institutes in the different parts of the Province; Manufacturing Companies, and all Agriculturists, Horticulturists, Manufacturers, Mechanics, Artizans and Artists throughout the country, and all other persons taking an interest in its welfare and prosperity, are now called on to be up and doing, in aid of this great work; as no time is to be lost in preparing articles to be brought forward for competition and in raising subscriptions in aid of the fund necessary to provide for the large expense that must be incurred.

It will be seen by the schedule and classified list of the objects for the Exhibition, already published, that it will be open to all the natural productions, both mineral and vegetable, of the Province; to all kinds of Agricultural produce; to all articles of Home Manufacture of every description; to cattle, horses, sheep, pigs, poultry, and cured meats of all kinds, and to specimens of all the different branches of the Fine Arts.

Farmers, gardeners, manufacturers, musical instrument makers, jewellers, watch-makers, clock-makers, carpenters, wheelwrights, blacksmiths, whitesmiths, foundries, mill-owners, carriage builders, boot and shoemakers, saddle and harness makers, and indeed all descriptions of mechanics, artisans and artists, are therefore strongly invited to come forward with the respective productions of their industry, labor, skill, ingenuity and ability in their different callings, for a generous competition with each other for excellence, and thus show what the resources of the Province are, and what the people in it can do.

The Ladies of the Province are also solicited to exert their talents and ingenuity in fancy and ornamental works for the show.

Liberal prizes will be awarded to the victors in this praiseworthy avocation, a list of which will be hereafter published as soon as it can be prepared and arranged. Pecuniary assistance to a limited amount, so far as the funds will permit, will be placed at the disposal of the respective local committees for Counties at a distance from Fredericton, to afford aid to such persons as may be in need of the same in the expenses of transmitting their articles for competition to the Exhibition, and the more liberal the subscriptions from such Counties are, the greater will be the amount to which such aid can be extended to them.

The Exhibition will be opened by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in person, on Tuesday the 5th October next, and closed on Saturday the 9th, during which time a Fair will be held with the Exhibition, at which Ploughing Matches, Regattas, and various kinds of public amusements and sports will be provided for, according to a programme that will be hereafter published; as the object is to make this great Exhibition and show not only highly beneficial to the Province at large, and thus carry out the most important objects of the Society, but also instructive and amusing to all who attend it.

The use of the Province Building has been kindly granted to the Society for the occasion, in which all articles of a nature to require great care, safe keeping, and protection from the weather, will be placed.

Every exertion will be made to provide the means of comfortable accommodation in Fredericton and its immediate vicinity, for visitors to the show.

It is hoped and trusted that the public Press of the Province, that powerful engine for promoting all great undertakings, will be

exercised in behalf of this good cause, and that the Editors of Newspapers in the several districts of the country will give insertion to their respective papers to this Communication and exert themselves to give general information on, and keep the public attention alive to all matters connected with the scheme which may tend to its success, and excite an extensive spirit of enterprise and desire for excellence among the people.

**THE PROVINCIAL EXHIBITION.**—On Saturday last the Assembly passed a grant of £500 in aid of the Provincial Exhibition, to be held in this City in October next. The grant was to procure a tent and other movable accommodations for those who were willing to show what New Brunswick can do in Agriculture and domestic manufactures, and young as the country is, the fine arts were not forgotten in the discussion. On Monday the House by a large majority decided that the Province Hall should be placed at the disposal of the Society for promoting Agriculture, Home Manufactures, and Commerce, for the purposes of the exhibition. The application came from the Hon. Judge Street, the President of the Society, and although opposed, was carried by a handsome majority.—Head Quarters.

**A LAUGHABLE SCENE.**—There was quite an unexpected debut at a theatre in Liverpool, England, recently, during the performance of the last and most impressive scene in the play of Julius Caesar. The elder Van Horn sustained the character of Brutus. He was at the passage where, after his army had been defeated, he requests his freedmen to kill him, and resolves to commit suicide. At this juncture a venerable-looking gentleman with a long beard, made his appearance at the side-scenes, and took a deliberate survey of the house. The audience, at first surprised at this novel apparition, burst into roars of laughter, to the evident horror and astonishment of the tragedian, to whose ears the uproar for sounds were a profanation. The cause of this merriment walked deliberately down to the foot-lights, and stayed at the audience, whose roars of laughter soon startled him, and drove him once more up to the stage. In the mean time Brutus stabbed himself, with as much tragic dignity as possible under the circumstances, covering his face with his robe. The goat, seeing his fall, walked over to the prosaite Brutus, surveyed him, took a sniff at him, and then, amidst louder roars of laughter than ever, in which the actors heartily joined, removed off the stage.

**ONLY BELIEVE HALF A REPORT.**—When Miss Chudleigh, afterwards Duchess of Kingston, once met Lord Chesterfield in the room at Bath, they began to talk of the company present, and the lady was very communicative in her narrative of things and of Lady Caroline, Miss Langens, &c. &c., and concluded by remarking, "Yet much of this may be scandal; for, do you know, my lord, that since I was lately confined to my chamber by illness, they have spread an infamous report of my being brought to bed of twins."

"Oh, my dear lady, do not be uneasy," replied the peer; "for my part, I have long made up my mind only to believe half of what the town says."

**EARLY PLANTING OF POTATOES.**—The best way to escape the Rot and the potatoe bug, is to plant your potatoes early; put a little lime in each hill when planting. I have planted my early potatoes in this way for the last five years, and none of them have ever rotted. I have always planted some in May every year for several years, (without liming) and they have always rotted more or less.

But putting lime in the hills will not prevent the bugs from eating off the tops; neither will sprinkling lime on the tops put a stop to their gormandizing. But if you plant very early, your potatoes will be of good size before the bugs make their appearance, and you will have potatoes in spite of the bugs. While those planted late attacked at the same time, they will scarcely be worth digging, as they grow none after the tops are destroyed.—(Holt, Stevens.)

**A QUIET WAY OF SETTLING A DISPUTE.**—One of the neatest things in its way that we ever heard of, came off yesterday on Long Wharf. It seems that a party of four persons were spending the Sunday quietly in playing billiards. One of the parties, however, not content with the chances of the game, and determined to chain the fickle goddess to his side, established a kind of telegraph with his partner, by laying his hands carelessly on the table after each deal, and extending his fingers, designating very intelligibly the number of trumps which he held. The device was ingenious and highly successful, for a while, but was unfortunately discovered by one of the opponents, who, on a repetition of the offence, very dexterously whipped up a bowie-knife and cut off two fingers. The

unfortunate lambs screamed with pain, and having picked up his stamps, rushed from the room. His partner inquired of the amateur surgeon what his reasons were for such conduct, when he quietly replied, "It was fortunate for your friend that he had no more trumps, or he certainly would have walked off with fewer fingers." Cool that—S. F. P.

**INDIAN CENSUS.**—Efforts have been made, for a year or two past, by the Government, to obtain a census of the Indian population inhabiting the United States. By the accounts received from census agents, and information derived from other sources, it is ascertained that the entire number of Indians in all parts of our country amounts to about 418,000. Of this number, 30,000 is the estimated number of those inhabiting the unexplored territories; 34,100 are the Indians of Texas; 92,130 belong to the tribes living in New Mexico; 32,231 are in California; 34,733 are in Oregon; 11,500 in Utah. Many of the New Mexico Indians are civilized, and have fixed habitations and towns.—(St. Louis Inad.)

We take the following from the leader of the European Times, March 27:—  
"The reasonable conclusion to which the new Government has come, of winding up the session without delay and dissolving Parliament, takes from the present deliberations of the Legislature much of the attention which they would otherwise command. In two months from this time we shall be in the vortex of a general election, amidst a degree of excitement and clamour for a principle to which up parallel has existed in our day."  
"If the average of general elections cost, as we see it stated, the enormous sum of two millions sterling, the forth coming contest may fairly be expected to considerably exceed that amount. Two millions sterling! What a libel on popular suffrage!"

"Our parliamentary system for teaching bribers is very imperfect. We have seen it suggested that some means should be taken, during the approaching election, to detect as far as possible the presence of bribery. That bribery will be enormously practised in every part of the country cannot admit of a doubt. The Carlton Club, it is a well known fact, have already subscribed largely towards filling the House with the supporters of the broad axe. In this case the motive is clear, and the probable gain is worth the outlay. It is this kind of expenditure which requires looking after, and if bribery committees were established in the large towns and in the rural districts, they would be the means of effecting much good. The Anti Corn Law League's £50,000 looks very small when contrasted with the two millions sterling to which we have referred. The fourth part of that huge electioneering fund, which is required to 'take the sense of the people.' And yet, if the League could appropriate any part of their fund towards forming such committees as we have suggested, the very announcement of the fact would carry conviction in quarters which require a thorough surveillance. The subject is worthy of consideration."

**A MONSTER PLANK.**—A ship named the Enigrant has arrived this week in ballast from Portsmouth, where she delivered a cargo of masts and spars brought for the government from New Zealand. She has now on board a gunwale plank of the following extraordinary dimensions, viz—1444 feet in length, 19 inches in breadth, at the narrow end, and 6 inches in thickness. The plank is perfect throughout, having only a single knot about ten feet from the top. We understand that it was cut from a tree 301 feet in height, and that it is not the centre plank, which must have been even larger. It is perfectly straight, and the timber is pronounced by competent judges to be of very superior quality. The vessel is lying in the Brunswick Dock, and the plank is to be rafted for £100.

**FATAL AFFRAY IN THE SOUTH SEAS.**—Advices from Australia just received represent the tragic end of Mr. Benj. Boyd, the founder and managing director of the Royal Bank of Australia. It appears that the unfortunate gentleman, with some of his men, was seeking capture of tortoises in the South Seas when, it is reported, a dispute arose between the cannibals, or natives, and the crew, and that Mr. Boyd perished in the fray.

The Austrian Ambassador in London has presented a gold snuff box, set in diamonds, worth £250, to Mr. R. A. Stephens, chief superintendent of police in Birmingham and a magnificent ring, an amethyst mounted with brilliants, to Mr. G. Leadbitter, of Bow street for their exertions in bringing to justice some forgers on the Austrian Government.

The copy of the Bible used on the occasion of the admission of General W. H. Harrison to the order of Masons was exhibited to the brethren assembled at a meeting of the Lodge of Virtue, held in the Albion Hotel, Manchester, on Wednesday evening week.



## European Intelligence.

The steamship *América* arrived at Halifax on Thursday morning, at 3 1/2 o'clock, bringing Liverpool dates to the 31st inst. She was off the harbor at 6 o'clock the previous morning, but could not get in on account of the thick weather which prevailed along the coast. The *A.* brought out 65 passengers, 18 of whom landed at Halifax.

Business affairs were not brisk in the manufacturing districts.

The cotton market has again given way, and prices were 1d. lower. The sales of the week amounted to 30,750 bales.

The market for Broadstuffs was also dull and drooping.

Money continued abundant as ever in London, and discounts easy, although rates were not reduced by the Bank of England. The returns of 2d show the amount of Bullion in the Bank to be £19,815,745, being an increase of £29,815. Consols steadily closed on 2d at 98 1/2 for money and account.

Freights are rather higher, and passengers pay extreme rates, in some cases as high as £5 in the steerage.

**PARLIAMENTARY.**—In the House of Commons, Mr. Secretary Walpole had introduced the new Militia Bill; its provisions aim at raising a force 80,000 strong—50,000 the first year by voluntary enlistment—term of service five years—bounty £4 to £5 either in one payment, or by monthly instalments—time of training and discipline 21 days each year, but power given in case of emergency to increase it to 7 weeks or reduce it to three days—estimated yearly expense £240,000.

Lord Palmerston supported the measure.

Lord John Russell did not oppose, but found fault with some of its provisions.

Mr. Hume protested against numerous amendments when they were by no means needed.

Mr. Cobden ridiculed the idea of an invasion, and complained of expenditure being incurred to "provide against an imaginary evil."

The Bill was read a first time.

Mr. Anderson had made an ineffectual attempt to induce the Commons to place the British Commercial Marine, so as to be available as a reserve to assist in the defence of the country.

Mr. Henry Barkley's Bill to provide for taking votes in Parliamentary elections by ballot, was rejected by a majority of 102.

Mr. Sherman Crawford's Irish tenant-right Bill, had also been buried by a "manœuvre on the part of the Government."

The Attorney General for Ireland had, however, promised to produce an unexceptionable measure.

Mr. Bailey Cochran had given notice that after Easter, he would move a resolution having for its object the establishment of Steam communication between the Canadian and Newfoundland Colonies and Great Britain.

In the House of Lords on 2d, Lord Derby intimated that it was not intended to interfere with the Maynooth grant.

At the same time, Mr. D'Istria in the Commons, in answer to Lord John Russell, stated that Parliament would be dissolved as soon as the necessary measures for the safety and service of the Country were passed, and that the sense of the new Parliament would be taken upon the policy of the present Government during the current year.

The approaching General Election was absorbing much attention throughout the United Kingdom.

The Protectionist party had held a great Meeting at Liverpool, at which Mr. Forbes McKenzie, one of the Lords of the Treasury, and Mr. Charles Turner, the Tory candidates for Liverpool, attended and gave an account of their political faith.

Mr. McKenzie's Speech was remarkable for the fact, that it contained the announcement that Lord Derby's Government would not seek to reverse the Commercial policy of Sir Robert Peel, but merely to modify and amend it so as to afford relief to the Agricultural and Shipping Interests, while the repeal of the Corn and Navigation Laws had generally depressed.

Sir Thomas Birch had issued his farewell address to the Electors of Liverpool.

The Reform and Free Trade party had nominated Mr. Joseph C. Ewart in its stead.

Sir James Graham had delivered a remarkable Speech to the Electors of Carlisle; in the course of which he advocated an extension of the suffrage—extolled Free Trade, but was not prepared to support Vote by Ballot.

**IRELAND.**—Mr. Chas. Gavin Duffy, of the Nation, is a candidate for the representation of New Ross. He is opposed by Mr. T. N. Reddington, late under-Secretary for Ireland.

The Parliamentary Committee of the Catholic Defence Association held daily sittings to decide upon the merits of the new candidates for Parliamentary honours, and to recommend those of their choice to the Irish constituencies.

A Meeting of the Citizens of Dublin had been held on the subject of Tenant Right.—Mr. Crawford's Bill was unanimously approved of, and the Meeting pledged itself to support no other candidate at a General Election but such as were staunch supporters of a National Tenant Right.

A numerous and influential Meeting had been held at Lord Charlemont's house in Dublin, for the purpose of taking steps to erect in Ireland a suitable memorial in honour of the lamented Poet, Thomas Moore.

Sir Wm. Somerville, the late Chief Secretary for Ireland, has been hunted from the representation, and it is said sought refuge in Canterbury.

**FRANCE.**—The French Chambers were

opened on the 29th ult. by the President in person. He was attended by a brilliant Staff, General Officers, Colonels of Regiments, Councillors of State, &c. His reception was of the warmest kind. In alluding to Foreign powers, he says, it is for all our interests to keep with them the most amicable relations. He next explains what his conduct will be in doing so, he disclaims any intention of degrading himself Emperor. If the restless and disaffected portion of the community by underground intrigues endeavour to sap the basis of his Government, if in their blindness they could excite the legitimacy of a popular election, or enlarged by their incessant attacks the future prospects of the ministry then would he demand from the people in the name of the repose of France, a new title which would irreversibly fix upon his head the power with which they invested him.—Immense applause greeted the various salient points of the address, and at the end, cheering and cries of Vive Napoleon were enthusiastic. Neither General Cavignac nor M. Carnot attended. It was reported that the President's donation would be fixed at ten millions of francs, with an addition in case of marriage. The feeling increases that the Empire may be expected—no farther arrests had been made except according to law.

### TO THE POLLS!

#### MUNICIPAL CORPORATIONS.

**MEN OF CHARLOTTE!**—To-morrow is the day appointed by the High Sheriff for holding a Public Meeting for the purpose of taking into consideration the propriety of incorporating the County of Charlotte, in conformity with the Act for the establishment of Municipal authorities in this Province. The meeting will take place at the Court House at 12 o'clock, noon, when we trust the intelligent yeomanry from the various Parishes of this County will be present and accept or reject the Charter as they may deem proper. It is unnecessary for us to add, that we have been for some time convinced, not only of the necessity but the absolute benefit of this proffered boon. We are not insensible to the fact, that many of our Magistrates, Representatives, and the largest land-holders with few exceptions, are opposed to an adoption of it; but let not the people be deterred, they have the power in their own hands, and it is their province to say, "the bill, the whole bill, and nothing but the bill!" We understand that persons from different parts of the County will be present, and address the meeting.

We take the following extract from the Grand Jury's Report at the present April Sessions, as we are desirous the people should know the views of that respectable Body on the Municipal Corporation Act.

"The Municipal Corporation Bill having been commented upon by former Grand Jurors, this Grand Jury would remark, that the 22d day of April is advertised as the period when its merits will be discussed, and the Bill either rejected or adopted, as the majority may determine.

"The present Grand Inquest for the County of Charlotte, view the Bill as a boon offered to all persons interested therein, which, if properly appreciated, will have a tendency to afford them the full enjoyment of their rights and privileges as British subjects, and while they acknowledge the principle of equal rights, they consider the Ballot Box as the proper medium of determining."

We have been requested to copy the following paragraphs from the 25th section of the Municipal Act, shewing the power of the County Council.

1st. For making, maintaining, or improving any new or existing road or street, or for stopping up, altering or diverting the same, not being a great road.

2d. For the erection, preservation or repair of any new or existing bridges and public buildings.

3d. For the purchase and management of such real estate as may be required for the public use of the inhabitants of the County.

In the last "Miramichi Gleaner," we observe another requisition to the Honble. Mr. Street, signed by 80 published names, but said to contain over 1,000 signatures, in which he is again called upon to resign his seat as Representative for Northumberland.

The people of that County appear to act by impulse, and are determined, if they can, to oust Mr. Street, for his manly, straight-forward, and patriotic advocacy of the Railway measures, passed during the last Session of the Legislature. Of this, his constituents may rest assured, that Mr. Street will receive that support from the other parts of the Province which he is so eminently deserving.

**CALIFORNIA.**—Dates to the 17th March have been received at New York from San Francisco, giving accounts of a great flood overflowing Sacramento, Marysville and Nevada, by which several lives were lost.

No pains have been spared by the High Sheriff to give the greatest publicity to the fact that a Public Meeting will take

place to-morrow, Thursday, at the Court House; a large number of Handbills, containing the requisition and signatures, have been circulated in every Parish in this County, and have reached its most remote districts, where a newspaper is seldom if ever seen; in addition to which, besides our own circulation we have struck off extra copies of our paper containing the Municipal Act.

#### Saint Andrews Iron Foundry.

This establishment, we are happy to notice is in full and active operation, under the management of its proprietors, our townsmen, Messrs. Alex. and John Watson, and the facilities for work in every department of the Iron Foundry and Blacksmith business have been greatly increased. The quality of the castings is quite equal to any imported, and the patterns are of the newest and most improved descriptions. They are constantly casting Cooking Stoves, Franklins, Patent Windlasses, Plough, metals, Mill, and Ships castings, &c., which will be furnished at lower prices than they can be imported for. It is as much a duty, as it is our interest, to encourage "home manufactures;" and we hope that the enterprising Messrs. Watson, will meet with that patronage, which their exertions and workmanship justly entitles them.

**IMPROVEMENTS.**—We are happy to notice, that the new stores in course of erection in Water-street, are spacious and present very neat fronts, making quite a pleasing addition to the Eastern end of the town. We observe also, that several of the old buildings are undergoing repairs and alterations, which will add materially to the appearance of our streets. A coat or two of paint would contribute largely to the benefit of many of these buildings.

**FRUIT TREES.**—We would again call the attention of persons requiring fruit trees to the advertisement of Mr. Sharp in our column. He has a large nursery, an extensive assortment of the best varieties of grafted apple and plum trees, which are adapted to this climate, having been raised in the vicinity of Woodstock, and his prices we learn are moderate.

**OBITUARY.**—We have the melancholy duty to announce the demise of Mrs. OWEN, the lady of Rear-Admiral the Hon. W. F. W. OWEN; which took place at the family residence, at Campo-Bello, on Thursday last, after a brief illness, deeply and deservedly regretted by her relatives and numerous circle of acquaintance.

**COMMON PLEAS.**—The following notes of His Worship, the Hon. H. Hatch's charge to the Grand Jury, furnished us by a friend, were omitted in our last number:—

A very full Grand Jury being called and sworn, coming from almost every Parish in the County, the Chairman of the Session, (the Hon. Justice Hatch), addressed them: the prominent parts of his speech, are nearly as follows: He informed the Grand Jury, that there was no criminal case before the Court, and, therefore, he had no particular point of law to give them in charge, but if they would advert to a part of their oath, wherein they were required to present all things that should come to their knowledge to the best of their understandings, they would come to the conclusion they had duties to perform among themselves. This knowledge was obtained in two ways: first, by the Court sending witnesses sworn to them to give evidence upon an indictment; and secondly, if any of them, coming as they did from different parts of the County, knew of any breach of the law by any party, or any nuisances by which the rights of the public were interfered with, the Grand Jurymen in possession of these facts, was bound by his oath to disclose the same to his fellows, and if they, or a majority of them, agreed that the matter so disclosed was an offence against the law, the foreman should cause the same to be reduced into writing in the shape of a Presentment, and hand it over to the Court for their action. They would see the importance of their Body, as a Criminal Court was almost powerless without the intervention of a Grand Jury, and therefore a duty was imposed upon them to be a careful investigation upon every subject brought under their consideration, and they should perform their functions without fear or favor, as they are, in a great measure, responsible for the quiet and peace of society in bringing offenders to justice. Having said thus much upon their duties, he would now call their attention to the public accounts of the County, and he would observe, that the public contributions for any object, there should always be a full and open disclosure of the expenditure. That the speaker was always of this opinion, and never neglected any occasion to carry these views into effect as an amateur not only of policy, but as a matter of right. He would state, for the information of the Jury, what he had received from the County Treasurer, and upon his own examination of the County accounts of the present year. The amount of expenditure from April, 1851, to the present Session was £424 13s. 9d. This sum includes all the ordinary accounts passed last April and September, the salaries of the public officers, amount paid

for conveying lunatics to the asylum in Saint John, bread and fuel for the goal and Court House, and the insurance of this building. To meet this expenditure, there was a balance in the Treasurer's hand of £57 7 5.—Amount of assessment for the year 1851 was £300. Received for licences, fines, auctioneer duties, &c. £226 15 9, amounting in the aggregate to £584 3 15 leaving a balance in the County Treasurer's hands of about £160 to meet the expenses of this Session. He, therefore, congratulated the Grand Inquest upon this favorable state of the monetary affairs, and that a County situated upon the borders, consisting of 20,000 inhabitants, was only assessed for the last year £300, and that the same amount would cover the requirements of the County, with some repairs on the County gaol. The County was in no ways in debt, but had money in hand, and in all probability would remain so. From the present law, every assessment for County purposes must be laid before the Grand Jury in the first instance, subject to their Presentment, and the expenditure of the same in like manner, and this is a salutary check upon any unnecessary or improper expenditure by the Justices.

He would now observe upon another subject, which, as it was of importance to the public at large, it was customary to give it publicity through the Grand Jury, and that he had taken this opportunity to do so. It has been brought under general observation that the public mind has been turned very much to agricultural pursuits for some time past. Agricultural Societies have been formed in every part of the Province, and they have been engaged in obtaining the most improved seeds, implements of husbandry and stock. The New Brunswick Society for the encouragement of agriculture, home manufactures and commerce throughout the Province have taken advantage of this public disposition and have resolved, at the annual meeting in Fredericton the last year, that a general exhibition of the industry of the whole Province, under a form of a general Show or Fair, should be held in October next, to embrace all kinds of agricultural, mechanical and domestic productions, and works of art and science, and, in fact, every thing of interest, manufactured or unmanufactured. Here is a great field opened up for competition, where all parties are interested from all parts of the Province to come together, bringing with them their various productions. Here the man of art and science, the geologist, the mineralogist, the agriculturist, the mechanic, and manufacturer, will greet each other, interchange their information upon the various productions—call forth observations which will have a tendency to open up the mind, and which, altogether, must have a good effect upon the future destinies of the Province, in disseminating sound information upon the objects aimed at.

Agriculture stands first in the order of three different interests, in which the New Brunswick society proposes encouraging; and it is the first in importance, inasmuch as all other interests are subservient to it. Without the cultivation of the land, the human family could not well exist, especially the civilized part, and, therefore, he that raises the staff of life must be an important and essential person in any community. The improvement of the soil is an honorable employment, and it was so stamped by Omnipotence itself in the case of our first parents, and will ever remain so until time shall be no more. It is of great usefulness to encourage home manufactures. If we could bring the whole Province under the conviction, that all articles used of every description should be made and prepared therein for home consumption, it would be the means of stimulating industry, create an internal trade of barter, and the utility of the measure would be gradually developed by its effects. The commerce of the Province is an object that all parties have an interest in. Our timber, at least a part of it, has drawn the attention of merchants in England from its durability. It should be fostered and protected, and manufactured in various ways, especially in the shape of ships as an article of export in payment. The Minerals of this Province are daily coming into repute from their variety, abundance and superior quality, and it only requires capital to make them extremely productive at home and an export abroad. A very valuable mine of asphaltum is now being worked in the County of Albert, the original licence gave five pounds to Government for it, and he afterwards sold it for three thousand to another party. It is chiefly used in generating gas.

The licence law has been read, and it has always been a difficult question to dispose of, and this arises principally from the want of a paid police, whose duty it would be to inform against vagabonds. In the absence of this, no person will undertake to become a common informer, and, therefore, delinquency escapes. Probably the great transition in cause of progress, will bring relief.

**THE AUSTRIAN GOVERNMENT AND THE BIBLE SOCIETY.**—Religious toleration in Austria has been further illustrated by a ministerial edict forbidding the meetings of the Anabaptists in certain of the crown lands, that are not named. The measure entirely corresponds with those already mentioned, for the suppression of the Scriptures, and the late expulsion of the Scotch missionaries from Gallizia and Hungary. Although there is every reason for believing that the treatment of these gentlemen was dictated by other feelings than that of religious bigotry, still it is manifest that the ultra-catholic Jesuit party are on the alert throughout the monarchy, and are not ever scrupulous as to the means employed for the extermination of papal doctrines, and the extinction of heresy. Another seizure has been made of 900 Bibles, the property of the British and Foreign Bible Society, who have two printing establishments in Hungary,—the principal one at Güns. The printing office has been forcibly closed, and the publication of the sacred volume interdicted by order of government. This invasion of the rights of property is the second instance of the kind that has occurred recently, and the English agent of the society has not yet succeeded in obtaining any satisfactory answer to his inquiries on the subject. As the circulation of the scriptures was allowed in Hungary in the middle ages, when protestantism thrived in that country, it is hardly credible that government really intends to forbid it now; but, should such be the case, it does not follow that the members of an English society should be out of pocket—which will be the case if the act of confiscation be not withdrawn. The property belonging to the British and Foreign Bible Society, in the different provinces of Austria, is estimated somewhere between £3000 and £4000.—[Vienna Correspondent of the Morning Chronicle.]

**REVIVALS IN RELIGION.**—Very deep interest is being manifested in Religious subjects among the various societies in New-York, Brooklyn, Harlem, and adjacent places. In Harlem, Brooklyn and Williamsburg this is particularly the case. Union meetings of all denominations are being held daily, the attendance upon which is very large.—[New York Sun.]
