THE AMHERST Street Railway Corporation have their cars running early in the spring.

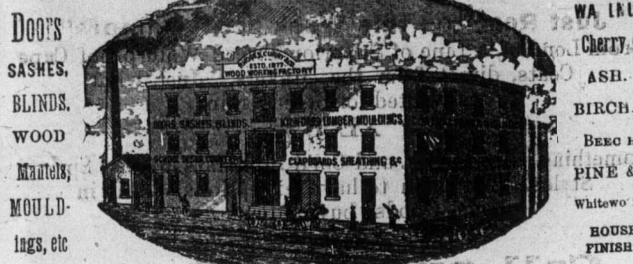

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THE BEGINNING OF A BOTTLE.

The process begins with the gather-

ing of the blowpipe. It is a tube of

lighter weight than the pipe used in

blowing window glass. He dips the

end of his pipe into the molten

contents of the pot, and brings out a

mass of red-hot plastic glass. If the

bottle to be blown are small, one

gather is enough; but for larger work

two or even three gatherings may be

necessary to get the requisite supply

of material on the end of the blow

pipe. When the gathering is done

properly, this lump of red-hot glass is

a perfectly homogeneous mass. It is

subsequently flattened out into a

disc, and then rolled into a long

rod. He takes the blowpipe from the

gatherer, and, resting the plastic

glass against a revolving table of

slow or fast iron, he gives the pipe

a few adroit rotations, thus fashion-

ing the glass in an even cylindrical

shape. By further rolling it along

the edge of the table he forms the

smaller prolongation of glass which is

afterward to become the neck of the

bottle. Lifting the still red-hot glass

from the table, he blows through the

pipe, forcing a still bubble of air in

the interior of the mass of glass.

This is afterward extended until it

becomes the unwieldiness of the bot-

tle. The partly finished bit of glass-

ware is now introduced into the

mould which one of the "shop" boys

has already opened to receive it. For

convenience in working, the mould

is placed on a somewhat lower level

than that on which the blowers stand.

It is made of cast iron, and is com-

monly formed in two pieces. One of

these is stationary, while the other

opens outward, its motion being con-

trolled by a foot-lever. When the

blower places his incomplete bottle,

still attached to the blowpipe, into

the mould, he closes the mould with

his foot, and blows through the pipe

until the plastic glass is everywhere

pressed against the sides of the mould

and has impressed upon it the form of

the prison—From Popular Science
