OTTAWA, Jan. 29.—Yesterlay was the 68 birthday of Hon. Alexander Mackenzie. Many were the congratulations that he received at his rooms at the Grand Union Hotel, and while spending a couple of hours in the Chamber in the afternoon. The career of Hon. Mr. Mackenzie in Canadian politics has been one to emulate and honor. There is no man in public life to-day whose record would lend more encouragement to an aspiring young Canadian who had his own way to carve in the world, and there is none that the young man could follow with more safety as to character and repu-tation. He would never find himself bidden tation. He would never find himself bidden to sacrifice principle for the advantage of the noment, and yet he would find success in many places where success is clean-handed and honorable. Mr. Mackenzie is a standing rebuke to the charge that no honest man can win prizes in Dominion politics. There is no dispute as to the venerable statesman's birthplace. He first blinked in the sunlight that falls on the hills of Dunkeld, Perthshire, in the opening of the year 1822, and came to Canada in 1842. His career in Canada was straight up from the apron of a builder to the position of First Minister of the Crown and then straight on, taking the shadows that lay athwart his pathway rather than turning out into the sunshine of expediency. HUMAN VAMPIRES.

Practices of the Missouri Samaritans.

Kansas City, Jan. 29.—Rumors of [the existence of a new religious sect which has gained a foothold in the territory adjacent to the Blue River, just east of Kansas City, have been afloat. They have reached the ears of the authorities, and the Secretary of the Human Society recently rethe ears of the authorities, and the Sected tary of the Humane Society recently re-ceived a letter from a man living in that neighborhood telling him that if the authorities did not interfere the people would take the matter into their own

would take the matter into their own hands.

According to the reports the practices of the sect were founded upon the Biblical injunction to do good to the sick, but the sect has degenerated into a band of blood-suckers, those who were well allowing themselves to be bled for those who were ill. Gradually he widened his teachings, until he openly advocated the drinking of blood for all diseases, giving as authority for such action the fact that the Bible taught that the blood was the life.

Their bloodless appearance, however, excited the suspicion of the officer and he compelled them to show their arms. Natural Gas Discovery at Forest-More Wells Going Down,

GLENCOE'S MISFORTUNE.

The Most Destructive Fire in Three Years.

oss Estimated at \$12,000 - The Building Destroyed—Losses and Insurance.

GLENCOE, Ont., Jan. 29.—The most disastrous fire which Glencoe has experienced since the big blaze some three years ago occurred early this morning. About 12:15 fire was discovered in a large frame store owned by Geo. Dobie and occupied by J. H. Hunt, grocer, which spread through the whole building almost instantly, and before it was got under control completely entire the second of the seco whole building almost instantly, and before it was got under control completely enveloped all the frame buildings between the Traders' Bank block on the south and McMillan & McLean's brick block on the north and totally destroyed them. The firemen did good work and managed after a long and hard fight to confine the flames within this space.

Hints to Emigrants. TORONTO, Jan. 29.—At the request of the Conference of Associated Charities Godwin Smith, president, has addeessed a letter to the editor of the Charity Organization Review, London, Eng., advising intending emigrants to Canada. It warns those wishemigrants to Canada. It warns those wishing to engage in lighter occupations that the market is already overstocked; admits there is still a demand in Ontario for farm laborers and domestic servants, and perhaps a very slight demand for mechanics. It points out that 4 per cent. of the population of Toronto receives relief, and that the cost of living in Toronto for a workingman is at least 35 per cent. higher than in London. It adds that the only kind of emigrant needed in the Northwest is the farmer, who works himself and is assisted by his family.




