ROSEBERY IS ALL RIGHT. London, June 8 .- Lord Rosebery's friends state that his health is good and that he is not suffering from insomnia. They declare that there is no meason why he should resign the leadership of the Liberal party.

A SICK KING. London, June 8 .- The King of Saxony is dangerously ill at Sibyllnort, and medical experts are hastening to his bedside from many cities. The extensive trips which he had intended to make throughout his kingdom have all been canceled.

BRITISH EXPORTS ON THE IN-CREASE.

London, June 8 .- The returns issued by the Board of Trade for the month of May show a decrease in imports of £1,400,000, and an increase in exports of £470,000, as compared with May,

THE METHODISTS.

London, June 8 .- The Primitive Methodist Conference, opening on June 10, will have as the chief subject for discussion the question of corporate union with other Methodist churches. Those who know the prejudices, say that the Conference will not decide the question this year.

THE UMBRIA IN A STORM. London, June 8 .- The Cunard Line steamship Umbria (Capt. Dutton), from New York, on May 30, which arrived at 6:50 a.m. Saturday, had a rough passage, a strong southeast gale, accompanied by terrific seas, prevailing for the past few days. On June 2 the steamship passed through a perfect and all their camels, horses and prohurricane, during which high head seas swept her decks, and between June and June 4 she only made 335 knots or about 100 knots below her average.

GRAND REVIEW AT MOSCOW. Moscow, June 8 .- The Czar on Sunday reviewed 50,000 troops on the Hodynsky Plain. A great crowd assembled to witness the review, and their Majesties were enthusiastically greeted when they appeared.

It is reported here that the Russo-Chinese bank has obtained a concession for a railway through Manchuria to Peking, with a capital of 100,000,000 gold roubles. Each country grants a concession, and guarantees the capital for the lines running through their respective territories.

BRITAIN'S PARLIAMENT. London, June 8 .- The Government, according to what the Conservative whips tell members, have positively decided to prorogue Parliament at the latest on the last Tuesday in August. To effect this, debate in committee on the Education Bill must be met by closure, allowing even a moderate period for discussion of the principal amendments. Arthur J. Balfour, Government leader in the House of Commons, announces that the debate or the Irish Land Bill recently introduced by his brother, Gerald Balfour, will begin today.

THE ROYAL FAMILY. London, June 8 .- Princess Christian is supplying the place beside the Queen so long occupied by Princess Beatrice, who has gone to the continent. The notion in court circles is that the change will be beneficial. Sympathetic as Princess Christian may be, the Queen has been so long accustomed to the companionship of her youngest daughter as to feel her absence keenly. Beatrice, who is now at Kissingen, will probably be called to her royal mother before the Queen leaves Balmoral. It is said Princess Christian prefers the greater freedom of her own set. CHOLERA IN FRANCE. London, June 8.—There are stories

FIGHTING AT FIRKET. London, June 8.-The Marquis of War, has received a telegram dated Akasheh, June 7, evening, from Sir Kitchener, Sirdar of Herbert Egyptian army, saying:

'We surprised the enemy at dawn They resisted gallantly, at Firket. holding the hills and the village, but were completely defeated and their retreat cut off. We captured their camp visions. Our oasualties were slight. The troops behaved excellently.'

A dispatch from Akasheh the ad-vanced post occupied by the Egyptian rain, have prevailed throughout Ger troops in the Soudan, states that 1,000 Dervishes were killed in the fighting at and around Firket, including their commander, Emir Hammuda. The Egyptian loss was 70 killed and 82 wounded.

THE SOUDAN PROGRAMME. London, June 8.-The War Office has ordered the heads of the staff to prepare for the dispatch of 5,700 troops at loon. the end of August. Part of these will take part in the expedition in September. ANARCHIST OUTRAGES. Madrid, June 8.-The Anarchists have resumed their activity at Barcelona. Saturday night a bomb was exploded while a religious procession was taking place, and several persons were killed. The outrage has caused great excitement. Six persons were killed by the explosion and 24 wounded. It is not known what explosive the bomb contained. The captain-general of the Province of Barcelona acted as standard-bearer in the procession, while the civil governor and the city alcalee held the streamers



monster meeting was held. Speaker Balfour was called upon to preside, and he did not require any sergeant-at-arms to enforce order. The chairman, in his introductory, regarded the visit of Mr. Laurier as a good augury of success. He reminded the audience that exactly two years ago Sir Oliver Mowat had visited Amherstburg, and that he (Mr. Balfour) was elected by a majority of nearly 800. He would not be a bit disappointed if, as a result of Mr. Laurier's visit, a majority of twice the dimensions was rolled up for Mr. Cowan.

Mr. Cowan got an ovation when he arose to address the audience. Mr. Cowan, who has a graceful and effective style of address, made a bright, and convincing speech. He described Mr. Laurier as the most gifted, the most eloquent, and the most distin-guished French-Canadian in public life today. He showed that the Dominion Government had imposed a great hardship upon fishermen in placing them under restrictions on the Canadian side of the international waters which were not enforced against the fishermen of the United States. As a result of the policy of the Government, the expense of the Marine and Fisheries Department had increased 400 per cent, while the catch of fish had increased 7 per cent. While he believed in the protection of fish, he demanded that the Canadian fishermen should be afforded facilities for the pursuit of their avocation as good as those provided for the Amerigood as those provided for the American fishermen. Mr. Cowan condemned the corrupt methods of the Government, and proclaimed to the people that when Mr. Laurier becomes Premier of Canada public affairs will be honestly and efficiently conducted.

The Pipes the Champion Long Distance Musical Instrument.

Residents around Crane court, Fleet street, London, were greatly alarmed for some time recently by what some considered a shock of earthquake and others the sound of a whirlwind. It proved, however, to be nothing more serious than a lecture on the bagpipes by Dr. N. Hay Forbes, with practical illustrations by a band of stalwart pipers. 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

> Kansas Corn Crop Ruined - Villages Wiped Out.

Chicago, June 8.—Severe storms prevailed throughout Wisconsin Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska. South Dakota and Michigan. Hailstones fell so thick in some places in this vicinity that they could be taken up by the shovelfull. After the rain residents of Hyde Park picked up in one spot nearly a peck of shells and gravel. In other places in the suburb small fish and turtles were found in large numbers. Of this remarkable occurrence, Observer Cox stated that the transplanting of fish, shells and gravel from their original resting-places to points miles away was due to the air vacuums whirlwinds and straight winds which have prevailed throughout the west fo a week. Basements and first floors were flooded and the big packing houses were heavy losers Hundreds of windows were blown in and the rain entering spoiled tons of beef which had been prepared for canning.

A QUEER LIGHTHOUSE.

One on the Scottish Coast is Without a

Light. The most extraordinary of all lighthouses is to be found on Arnish Rock, Stornaway Bay-a rock which is separated from the Island of Levis by a channel over five hundred feet wide. It is in the Hebrides, Scotland. On this rock a conical beacon is erected, and on its summit a lantern is fixed from which, night after night, shines a light which is seen by the fishermen far and wide. Yet there is no lamp burning goes to it, for the simple reason that there is no lamp to attend to, no wick to trim, and no oil well to replenish.

The way in which this peculiar lighthouse is illuminated is this: On window in the tower a stream of light on the summit of Arnish Rock. These rays are reflected to an arrangement of prisms, and by their action are converged to a focus outside the lantern, from where they diverge in the

necessary direction. The consequence is that to all intents and purposes a lighthouse exists which has neither lamp or lighthouse keeper, and yet which gives as serviceable a light as if an elaborate and costly lighthouse, with lamps, serviceroom, bedroom, living-room, storeroom, oilroom, water tanks, and all other accessories were erected on the summit of the rock.
