ANTHRAX FATAL.

Disease Supposed to Have Been Communicated to a Tanner at Acton, Ont., From Diseased Hides.

Toronto, Sept. 2.-Dr. Bryce has been summoned to attend a fatal disease that has broken out in a family residing at Acton, near Guelph. A week ago last Monday Wesley Campwho works in the tannery at Acton, noticed a swelling on his face. There had been a small scratch on his face and the swelling was most pronounced in the immediate vicinity the scratch. The swelling enlarged so rapidly that Mr. Campbell was obed to leave his work on Monday. The disease made such headway that death occurred on Wednesday, the deeased being buried on the following On Sunday the father of Mr. Campbell took ill with the same trouble, and, according to a lady who was visiting at Acton, he was not expected to live on last Monday night. It is also feared that another of the sons is taken ill. The father had waited upon his son during the few days of his illness, and it is believed he contracted the malady from him. The local doctors diagnose the cause as anthrax, which is a well-known disease common in cattle. It is supposed that the germs were communicated from the hides in the tannery to the scratch on the face of the first vic-



Embargo on Bikes.

New Regulations of the U. S Customs Department.

Duty to Be Collected on All Foreign Made Wheels Entering Uncle Sam's Territory.

Detroit, Sept. 2.-Orders were issued by the collector of customs at Detroit vesterday instructing deputies to collect duty on all bicycles of foreign make that are brought into this country. Under the old tariff law a ruling of the treasury department instructed collectors to classify wheels as per-sonal effects. As such they were entitled to free entry, but the new law makes wheels merchandise, and they will be classified as such and duty asssed accordingly.

REPORT ON GRECO-TURKISH WAR.

Neither Nation Recognized the Red Cross-Woman Conspicuous in the Grecian Army.

Washington, Sept. 2.-Dr. Senn, of Chicago, organizer of the National Association of Military Surgeons, has submitted a report on military surgery n Greece. He says that in the recent var neither the Turk nor the Greek recognized the Red Cross, and that of the attachees of the medical and hospital branches of each army were not regarded as non-combatants. At the entrance of every military hospital, he asserts, was an armed guard —much to the astonishment of the Americans and Europeans present, who regarded the offices of surgeon and nurse removed from the active influences of the war.

'The war," the doctor says, "was characterized by an immense waste of ammunition, and the marksmanship on both sides was exceedingly poo The Greek surgeons say that nearly all the wounds which they saw were small and presented all the appearances of small calibre, and the firing was done evidently at great distances."






