

GAEDKE ANALYZES POSITIONS

London, Dec. 6.-Simultaneously with the ement in English newspapers that ome of the Lloyds underwriters have between Russia and Japan in 1907 at a guineas per cent, Col. Gaedke, whose article and correspondence in the Berliner Tageblatt during the recent war attracted universal attention, writes for that journal a remarkable article on the military

sition in the far east. Col. Gaedke recognizes that the time for a renewal of hostilities is not yet. He says that there are clear signs that the air is loaded with electricity, but the financial condition of both Russia and Japan

will postpone hostilitie Russia's naval strength in that region eed not be considered. Still, Japan inends to have eight battleships of the Dreadnaught type affoat within years, while the continued increase of her fighting strength is remarkable.

For a time Japan increased her army only by four divisoins raised during the war. She now intends to increase it to twenty divisions, gradually forming ten army corps. The cavalry also will be increased gradually

Machine guns will be attached to every nfantry regiment. The railway troops and balloon detachment will be raised, and the fortress artillery increased. The authorities are meditating a reduction of the period of military service from three

Meanwhile Russia's military position in the far east has been considerably bet-tered. She had only 88 battalions there before the war, and now has 187, including the European division, which remains at Harbin until April 1, when Japan and Russia should evacuate Manchuria, according to the treaty.

Altogether, in West Siberia, Trans-Baikalia and the maritime provinces. Russia has nine divisions of rifles and one of foot, with three reserve brigades of foot. The latter are twice as strong as they were before the war. Thus Russia has fifteen field and reserve divisions, not including the force at Harbin, each of sixteen battalions, totaling 256 battalions, as compared with only 136 mobile

Russian peasants near Astrakhan are taking their wives to that city and compelling them to enter the brothels, the husbands receiving about \$14 in each

Surely in the country to the east of London, failing a satisfactory sunface source, it is possible, by boring, to find an abundant supply, though I am inclined to think careful investigation would prove to investigators the existence of a good watershed, and in either case you would bring to your aid the most valuable of all factors in water engineering, viz., gravitation.

Give me a gravitation scheme, with a

pipe line of 100 miles to one, which volves pumping for even five miles, Even if the supply was secured fro wells, the cost of pumping from these into a reservior would be small, compared to the incessant pumping needed to bring water to our city up an altitude of 130 feet. It must be remembered that as far as London is concerned the law of gravitation helps you when treating with water from the east. By way of passing I note that the adoption of the meter system has been suggested. This has certainly its advantages and its disadvant-First of all I must take exception borne in mind that in the desire to save water amongst the poorer classes there would be a tendency to create carelessness and filth, which, in its turn, brings on infectious diseases, al-





British Columbia Engineer Wants to Join the Island and Mainland.

Ottawa, Dec. 5.-H. P. Bell, a British

Columbia engineer, has just prepared a report for the department of railways and canals in Ottawa on the feastbility and cost of building a bridge from the mainland to Vancouver Island. Bell calculates that such a bridge would cost at least \$35,000,000, and says the work would be of a formidable character.
