BRITISH CIEAN UP COMMERCE RAIDERS

PETAIN'S MENAUSTRO-GERMANS ARE BALKED ON HEELS OF

French Troops Are Pressing Pressure of Enemy Strongest Closely the Retirement of Germans.

LATTER CROSS THE ALETTE

Armies Now Facing One Another on Banks of Stream The French Booty.

Paris, Nov. 3. - The French are advancing between the Oise Canal and bie region of Corbeny, and h've reached the south back of the Ailette River, the war office announces.

The Germans have retreated to the north bank of the river. The bridges across the Ailette were destroyed by the Germans. Since Oct. 23 the French have captured 422 guns and 720 machine guns.

Official Report.
The announcement follows:
"In the course of the night our troops continued to make progress between the Dise Canal and the region of Corbeny, and reached the south bank of the Ailette River over this entire front. (Friday night's official French communication, in which the beginning of this move-ment evidently was announced, has not been received.)

"The enemy has retired to the north bank of the river, whose bridges and footbridges were cut. "Artillery fighting continues very gorously in the sector of Chavignon and at certain points in the region of the plateau. Petain's Prizes.

"In the way of material captured since October 23 we have actually counted 200 heavy and field guns, 222 trench cannon and 720 machine



GERMANS ARE Destroyers Wipe Out Fleet of the Enemy's Commerce Raiders, Sinking the Crocodile and Many Smaller Vessels.

London, Nov. 3 .- An official statement issued by the admiralty says that ten armed patrol craft, in addition to a German auxiliary cruiser, which was equipped with six-inch guns, were destroyed in the Cattegat.

The statement issued by the British admiralty

"Further reports fro m our forces operating in the Cattegat have been received. We destroyed a German auxiliary cruiser armed with six-inch guns and we also destroyed ten armed patrol craft. Sixty-four prisoners have been rescued by our forces. No British losses have been reported.







When the story was told in this page a couple of weeks ago of the proposed community singing and chorus for Chatham, the question was asked, "Why not London?"

The answer has come back, "London, too."

singing idea. London, indeed, through certain musical citizens, had a well thought out plan for organizing community singing as far back as September, 1916, a year and at least two whole months ago. The promoters of the big idea were just working along, perfecting details and intending to make announcement when the time was quite ripe. In the meantime, Chatham took up the community singing movement, the news reached A Minor, who considered is such an excellent one that the very first thought which came to mind was "Why not London?"

What It Is All About.

The plan that has been in mind for more than a year is to organize on the same lines as the New Lork community chorus. The constitution—and there will be something of the kind, will read something like this:

"THE LONDON COMMUNITY CHORUS PROVIDES FOR THE FREE AND REGULAR MEETING OF THE PEOPLE OF LONDON, ANY OR ALL, IRRESPECTIVE OF PREVIOUS MUSICAL KNOWLEDGE OR TRAINING OF ANY KIND, WINTER OR SUMMER, INDOORS OR OUT, IN PUBLIC HALLS OR PARKS, TO SING TOGETHER FOR THE JOY OF SINGING AND FOR WHAT SONG CAN DO TO AWAKEN THE COMMUNITY SPIRIT."

What is the source of this planning for London?

A Musical Art Society 1 .

A year ago last summer when the Musical Art Society was organized it was proposed to take up community singing and make a community chorus a part of the plan of work. But it was felt that the organization of a chorus and orchestra on the lines undertaken a year ago would be sufficient work for one season. At the first meeting of the Musical Art Society this fall, the subject of community singing was revived. A. D. Jordan, conductor of the Musical Art Society, was particularly keen about it, even more enthusiastic than a year ago, and other members of the society evinced more enthusiasm. It was suggested that the secretary, Arthur Little, should get in touch with organists and other leading musicians of the city, with a view to seeing who would be willing to co-operate. It is understood that the suggestion has been regarded with favor by a number.

The plan, as explained to the editor of this page, is to divide the city into, say, half a dozen districts or communities, with a musical leader for each to take charge of the community chorus for the district and of the weekly rehearsal or "sing song." In this way there will be a community centre and chorus in the south end, one in the east end, north and so on.

The chorus will not be a chorus in the accepted sense of the term. It will be open to all who love singing, to those who have wanted to sing but who have not had a chance, to those who perhaps are not good enough for church choir singing, to those who would like to sing for the love of singing.

If these dreams come true, and every possible effort will be made to realize them, a grand community chorus concert will be given out-of-doors when the weather is warm enough, say next June. Possibly Queen's Park will be the scene of this event, with the chorus of 100 or 1,500 massed in front of the grandstand. SENDING PRESENTS BY PARCEL POST (Clip This Out for Reference.)

For the information of those sending parcels to soldiers in England or at the front, The Advertiser publishes the rates of postage: To England, the rate is 12 cents a pound or any fraction thereof; limit weight on parcels to England is 11 pounds. To France or Belgium, the rate is 24 cents for parcels any weight up to three pounds; from three pounds to seven pounds (the limit), the rate is 32 cents-not 32 cents per pound but 32 cents for any weight from three to seven pounds. Any letter or parcel for any soldier in the hospital (even if this hospital is not known to the sender). having the word hospital' marked across it will be delivered. A customs declaration must be attached to each parcel, for which application should be made at the stamp window of the postoffice.



HY, M'DONALD **GETS LIFE TERM** IN PENITENTIARY

Ridgetown Man Withdrew His Plea of Not Guilty.

WAS QUICKLY SENTENCED

Confession of Brother Figured Largely in Trial for Murder.

CHATHAM, Nov. 2 .- Henry McDonald of Ridgetown was this afternoon sentenced to a life term in Kingston Penitentiary by His Lordship Clute for his part in the wrecking of the M.C.R. express at Ridgetown on May 31, 1911, resulted in the death of Russell Oakes, fireman, and Stephen Quinlan

His brother, Frank McDonald, received

after a three-days' trial on the charge of murder, the jury finding him guilty of manslaughter.

As the evidence against Henry McDonald was almost identical with that used against Frank, the prisoner decided to accept the same fate as his brother by pleading guilty to a charge of manslaughter. The proceedings lasted five minutes.

R. L. Bracklin, counsel for the prisoner, intimated to the court that the prisoner had decided to withdraw his plea of not guilty to the murder charge and plead guilty to that of manslaughter. Prosecuting Counsel Agar stated that he was willing to allow the prisoner to plead in such a manner.

"You understand perfectly what this means," said his lordship to the prisoner.

"Yes," he replied.

After summing up briefly the facts of the case of Frank McDonald, pointing out that they were identical to those in the murder charge against the prisoner, his lordship said to the accused: "The sentence of the court for the charge of manslaughter with which you are now charged is that you will spend your life in the penitentiary."

The prisoner accepted his fate calmly and was led out of court at once.

The confession of Frank McDonald which was used as evidence in his trial implicated his brother as the one mainly responsible for the train-wrecking. The hearing of the bribery charges was adjourned for the few minutes required to pass the sentence. The prisoner was to have faced the murder charge tomorrow.



What promises to be an important first method of attacking the problem discovery in the motion picture industry has been recently made by Major by adding to their thickness.

Last Day for Reporting for Service or Claiming Exemption.



Only one week remains for the men in Class One to respond to the call under the Military Service Act. In order that every man may fully understand and fulfil his obligations, the following questions and answers are given. required to report for duty or be placed on active service earlier than the 10th day of December, 1917. Who is in Class One ?

All Male British subjects, ordinarily or at any time since the 4th day of August, 1914, resident in Canada, who had on the 13th October 1917, attained the age of 20 years, who were born not earlier than the year 1883, and were on the 6th day of July, 1917, unmarried, or are widowers, but have no child, etc.

"1. Members of our regular, or reserve, or auxiliary force, as defined by our Army Act.

"2. Members of our Military forces raised by the Governments of any of our other dominions or by our Government of India. "3. Men serving in our Royal Navy, or in our Royal Marines, or in Naval Service of Canada, and members of our Canadian Expedi-

"4. Men who have since August 4th, 1914, served in our Military or Naval Forces, or in those of our allies, in any theatre of actual war, and have been honourably discharged therefrom. "5. Clergy, including members of any recognized order of an exclusively religious character, and ministers of all religious denominations existing in Canada at the date of the passing of our

said Military Service Act. "6. Those persons exempted from military service by Order in Council of August 13th, 1873, and by Order in Council of December 6th, 1898."

How should Report for Service be made?

Men who do not desire to claim exemption will report for service either by mail or in person.

Forms of report will be found in all post offices, and will be transmitted free of postage.

What is the next step? The man who has reported for service will be advised by Registered Letter as to anything thereafter required of him. He will not be

How should claim for exemption be made?

Claim for exemption may be made by any man in Class One, by his employer, business associate or near relative, but it is desirable that not more than one claim be made for any one man. Forms of claim for exemption will be found in all Post Offices and will be transmitted free by the postmaster to the Registrar.

What are the grounds for Exemption?

(a) That it is expedient in the national interest that the man should, instead of being employed in military service, be engaged in other work in which he is habitually engaged;

(b) That it is expedient in the national interest that, instead of being employed in military service, he be engaged in other work in which he wishes to be engaged and for which he has special

(c) That it is expedient in the national interest that, instead of being employed in military service, he should continue to be educated or trained for any work for which he is then being

(d) That serious hardship would ensue, if the man were placed on active service, owing to his exceptional financial or business obligations or domestic position;

(e) Ill health or infirmity;

(f) That he conscientiously objects to the under-taking of combatant service and is prohibited from so doing by the tenets and articles of faith, in effect on the sixth day of July, 1917, of any organized religious denomination existing and well recognized in Canada at such date, and to which he in good faith belongs.

(g) That he is exempt from combatant service because disfranchised under the War Times Election Act.

What is the last day for reporting for service or claiming Exemption?





NOTED AMERICAN MILITARY CRITIC SAYS KERENSKY HAS DONE ALLIES GREAT WRONG IN BLAMING ALBION,

War Started Over Russia and Allies Fight On Her Account—Rumanian and Italian Tragedies Due to Russian Acts.

TO PLACE HOPE IN RUSSIA NOW IS LIKE BUILDING UPON SANDS

Attack On Britain Most Unjust and Ungrateful, Considering Great Burdens Latter Has Borne-Allies Must Give Italy Full Measure of Help and Concentrate On the Western Front, Where Decision Will Come.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

(By Frank H. Simonds. Copyright, 1917, by New York Tribune.)

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—Of all that Kerensky said in his latest statement there is little that one must not regret that he said at all. Unquestionably one is brought to feel that at a critical moment in Allied fortunes, the Russian leader has sought safety at home by sacrificing his allies abroad.

After all, we should remember that we have a world war, because Russia was not abandoned by France and by Great Britain in August, WAR STARTED OVER RUSSIA.

The origin of the war was the dispute between Austria and Russia, and all the nations which are fighting on the Allied side have been from the beginning fighting in Russia's cause.

from the beginning fighting in Russia's cause.

It is true that during the first two years of the war Russia made great sacrifices and bore great burdens.

It is not less true that those wno controlled Russia in 1916 betrayed Rumania and left her to be destroyed, and it is equally true that the Russian collapse of the present summer has brought upon Italy her great disaster. Those soldiers of Brusiloff who ran away from a field of witten in lune were the architects of the contemporary ruin of Italian victory in June were the architects of the contemporary ruin of Italian prospects.

UNJUSTLY ASS AILS BRITAIN.

Nor is Kerensky more just or more honest when he paints the alleged British failure. There never was a more ungenerous attack. From the very outset of the war British resources have been unsparingly devoted to Russian service; British submarines and British naval officers have served in the Russian fleet, and the pell-mell flight of the Russians from the Galician battlefield was covered by British in armored cars. Today it is the British who are bearing the great burden of the war willingly and uncomplainingly, and only prejudice or personal aims could procure such a statement as Kereneky has now made. LIKE BUILDING ON SAND.

It is unwise and it is unnecessary to characterize further the words of the Russian leader. They will confirm the conviction, long held in Europe, that to build any hopes on Russian foundations is to build upon the sand.

Yet since the war remains, and since all our future depends upon a yet since the war remains, and since all our luture depends upon a successful termination of the struggle, it must be the duty of those who direct Allied policy, who direct American policy, to recognize that Russia has ceased to be a factor in the war, and that all our resources and all our efforts, and all our ald must be concentrated in the fields and in the countries whose soldiers are still fighting for the common cause.

CONCENTRATE ON WEST.

What we might have done for Russia we must do for Italy, and above What we might have done for Russia we must do for larly, and above all we must concentrate all our efforts upon the western front, where, between Belfort and Nieuport, the decision of the world war will come. One must regret the decision of Kerensky, because there was a moment when he seemed perhaps to be the one man born of the new Europe, who might contribute to the best settlement of the world struggle. For this role he has proved inadequate. We do not know his necessities; we cannot imagine his difficulties. Therefore we can only regret his decision and the words in which he has announced it. These words will be the text of every German statesman and every German propagandist. It is the great and enduring evil that Kerensky has done his Allies—to those Allies all of whom were still loyal to Russia.

"The writer then tells of the immense sacrifice in men that Russia has made, and recalls the revelations in the trial of Gen. Soukhomlinoff, former minister of war, of how Russian heroes stood up with only sticks, stones and fists against the organized German troops. He believes that the Russian casualites have been higher than those of any other of the main beligerents.

The Telegraph says: "We should hate to regard the statements as authentic. They have the ring of pro-German propaganda."

The newspaper then says that Kerensky, "if he has made such a statement," should be reminded that France and Great Britain have been in the war as long as Russia, but are not yet warweary, and do not desire to shirk their responsibilities. Russia, it declares, also has received generous assistance, from the Allies and the United States. The Graphic concludes: "Now is the time to prove her devotion to the ideals of the Allies, not by ilp service, but by good hard blows on the weakened Austro-German lines in the east."


