# YUDENITCH PREPARES FOR NEW ATTACK ON PETROGRAD

# PREMIER E. C. DRURY AND MEMBERS OF HIS CABINET TAKE REINS OF OFFICE

Government of Ontario Now in Charge of Farmer-Coalition Cabinet and Members—New Ministers Are Sworn Into Office by Lieutenant-Governor Hendrie This Forencon — Nelson Parliament, M. P. P., of Prince Edward, Likely To Be Selected As Speaker of the Legislature.

Toronto, Nov. 14 .- According to schedule the Government of the province of Ontario passed into the hands of the farmer-coalition cabinet, headed by Hon. Ernest Charles Drury, shortly before noon today, when the new premier and his colleagues were sworn Hendrie. They then proceeded to the legislative buildings, where premier. they were introduced to the staffs of their respective departments to whom in every case each new head was practically a stranger.

But one member of the new cabinet, Hon. Beniah Bowman, M. P. P. for Manitoulin, and minister of lands, forests and mines, was a member of the last Legislature, and none of the others have ever had sents in the Ontario House. Seats in the present Legislature have yet to be found for the premier, and for Hon. W. E. Raney, attorney-general, and Hon. Manning W. Doherty, minister of agriculture, but it is understood that various offers of retirements from elected candidates have been received to cover these.

This afternoon the Drury Government council held its first official meeting. Many matters were awaiting immediate attention. Jews who have relatives in the old country, and will stand surety for them. Jews who have relatives in the old country, and will stand surety for them, are asked to register their names with the nearest committee as soon as possible, so that the Jewish Congress may apply for permits for them. Even those who have not relatives in Russia or Poland are being asked to register and assist in this work of rescuing the people of their race from destruction in Europe.





#### THE CABINET.

The province will wish Mr. Drury all success in the formation of his cabinet. We have been waiting with hands ready to applaud and a glance over the names semi-officially announced sets most hands clapping. The men are new to the political life of Toronto, but most of them have been active in their home districts. Among the ten or eleven gathered round the premier-designate may be noted four graduates of the O. A. C., one D. S. O. with four years' war experience, especially in road construction and engineering, one lawyer of course, a former teacher, and one with third year standing in the University of Toronto. These farmers are men of liberal culture as well as of practical agriculture, and at least local political experience. No men more typically representative of the Ontario people could easily be got together. It is a very idiomatic cabinet in the best sense.

It is calculated that if a line be drawn north and south somewhere near Kitchener, half the population of the province lies west of that line. The great day of the "Guy" was probably some half century ago. Then it was that the effigy of the notorious criminal of the hour or that of the unpopular politician, dressed in the most outrageous masquerade, was carried through the streets until in the evening it was set on top of the local bonfire, and disappeared in smoke and flame. Long after London's thousand "Guys" had disappeared from its streets the celebration was continued with unabated enthusiasm elsewhere. Its Ultima Thule was the town of Lewes, in Sussex. Here, after the rest of England, forgetting Bishop Sanderson, had forgotten also "the fifth," and "Guy" continued to hold high carnival, and the huge bonfire, on Downs at night, became one of the local sights. One interregnum in all those centuries there appears to have been. It was when James the Second was King, and Mr. Evelyn records solemnly in his diary under the date of "5 Nov," that, "It being an extraordinary wett morning, I did not go to church, to my very greate sorrow, it being the first Gun powder Conspiracy anniversary that had been kept now these 80 years under a prince of the Roman religion. Bonfires were forbidden on this day; what does this portend!" What it portended the great diarist was soon to learn. ### **LLOYD GEORGE SAYS NO PEACE PROPOSALS** MADE TO BOLSHEVIKI

Declares International Conference Proposed

TO TAKE UP PROBLEMS

Which Peace Conference Has Found Itself Unable To Settle.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Premier Lloyd George declared in the House of Commons today that no person at any time on his behalf or with his consent, had interviewed Bolshevik representatives in order to learn whether negotiations for peace might be opened, and upon what terms.

The premier announced that it was proposed to call, at an early date, an international conference, at which the ministers of the Allied and associated powers might consider the various problems which the peace conference had as yet found itself unable to settle, among which was the problem of Russia.

Performing to the so-called peace ad-

Referring to the so-called peace advance by the Bolsheviki, Mr. Lloyd George said the Allies had always delined to take action on communications irporting to come from hostile coun-les through responsible agencies, and a thought it inadvisable to depart from The premier admitted that the Bol-



WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 13 .-President Wilson, propped in the great mahogany bed in which the late King Edward VII. slept when he visited States, and no movement in Russia by the United Washington in 1860, greeted today the grandson of that British king in the person of Albert Edward, Prince of

The visit to the White House followed a motor trip to Mount Vernon, where the prince laid a wreath on Washington's tomb and planted a young cedar before his resting place.

planted a young cetar before and the prince had exchanged greetings, the president noticed that his visitor was looking closely at the massive bed and told him its story—how the prince's grandfather had slept in it when he was entertained at the White House by President Buchanan, and of its being the same bed in which President Lincoln slept during his years in the White House.

The president inquired of the prince as to his father, mother and grandmother, and mentioned particularly the pleasure with which he received a cablegram today from Queen-Mother Alexandra.

The meeting between the prince and the president was much the same as might occur between any healthy normal boy with a keen sense of humor and a middle-aged statesman whose cares have not driven the gift of laughter from him. The president laughed heartily at the vivid and humorous account the prince gave of his experience since his arrival on the American continent. The conversation between the two covered a widerange of subjects, and after the prince had left Rear Admiral Grayson, the president's personal physician, said that the president's spirits had risen as a result of the visit and that he had enjoyed it greatly.

Enjoyed Drive.

The prince was accompanied to Movnt Vernon by Vice-President Marshall and Secretary Lansing, and he seemed to enjoy thoroughly the drive through the autumn-tinted Virginia woods with the sun shining for the first time since the royal visitor entered the United States.



# PROPOSED IN N. B. U. S. HOUSE SETTLES PRINCIPAL POINTS OF

Provide Conditions of the Return To Private Ownership.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13 .- Four im portant points of the railroad reorganization legislation were settled by the House of Representatives today during consideration of the Esch railroad bill. Each of the provisions approved has far-reaching effects in providing capital to the carriers, both in the period immediately following government control and afterwards. the period immediately following government control and afterwards.
With one exception all of the provisions provoked sharp fights, but only one was charged. In brief, the provisions approved by the House provide:

Carriers must ask the Interstate Commerce Commission for general increases of rates within sixty days after their return to private operation. their return to private operation.

Revenues of carriers, including short lines and express companies, for the first six months of private operation are guaranteed by the Government to equal the corresponding standard return paid as rental by the Government, during lederal control.

Carriers' indebtedness to the Govern ment, remaining after a settlement of the rental owed by the Government, may be funded for ten years on demand notes, at 6 per cent interest. Carriers may obtain government loans from a \$250,000,000 revolving fund dur-ing the first two years. ing the first two years of renewed private operation, such loans to mature in five years, bear six per eent interest and to be secured.





#### FINNISH DELEGATES WILL BE ADMITTED TO THE CONFERENCE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 13.—Finland is to be admitted to the international labor conference on the same conditions as obtain in the case of other countries which have not adhered to the covenant of the league of nations. The end of the two days' debate on the majority and minority reports of the committee on administrations ended in a substitute motion pretions ended in a substitute motion presented by L. C. Christie of the Canadian delegation on behalf of Hon. N. W. Rowell, who was unable to be in attendance at this afternoon's sitting

attendance at this afternoon's sitting of the conference.

Mr. Rowell had presented the minority report of the committee, a report which took the stand that Finland could not be admitted to the international labor organization without first becoming a member of the league of nations.

In its new form, Mr. Christie said, the resolution would secure the practical object on which all were agreed so far as Finland was concerned, and at the same time would not projudice the constitutional foundation of the international labor organization.

Gino Baldesi, Italian workers' dele-gate, who presented the majority re-port favoring admission of Finland, ac-cepted the substitute motion with the addition of a provision that the confer-ence, in extending an invitation to Fin-nish delegates, is not giving a ruling on the question of principle.

#### **ENGINEERS FAVOR** LAKE ERIE WATER FOR CHATHAM USE

Citizens At Meeting Discuss Three Propositions For Supply.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
CHATHAM, Nov. 13.—Lake Erie as the source of Chatham's future water supply is recommended in a report of James Louden & Company, expert Toronto engineers, who for several months have been investigating the water situation for the water board. The engineers estimate that the cost of such a scheme would be about \$600,000. It would provide a filtration plant at Erie Ridge, to which the water would be pumped, and then allowed to flow by gravity for twelve miles to the city.

The engineers also investigated the Snye Carte and the River Thames as future sources of supply. The former would require a water main 21 miles in length, the scheme to cost approximately \$700,000. The remodelling of the present plant to continue to use River Thames water would cost \$300,000.

The report states that Lake Erie

The report states that Lake Erie water is free from harmful bacteria. The Thames water is shown to reach 80 degrees of heat in the summer time, and that at all times it is highly polluted and would impose a heavy burden on any known method of water provification.

burden on any known method of water purification.

Chairman Westman has stated that he is in favor of the Lake Erie scheme. Mayor Hammond, who is also a member of the water commission, and Commissioner Stone have not yet made a statement. The three propositions were laid before the citizens at a mass meeting held this evening. It is probable that at the January elections citizens will be asked to decide on the propositions.






