London, Jan. 6 .- Dissatisfied with the apparent approval at an early date of the Irish peace treaty by the Dail Eireann, Eamon de Valera has resigned the presidency of the Irish republic, and a new Dail ministry is being formed.

The removal of de Valera as head of the republic, it is believed, will do much toward hastening approval of Premier Lloyd George's offer of ion status to Erin.

Stabs Fellow Prisoner To Death With Shoe

BOSTON, Jan. 6. - Giovanni Valiordi stabbed two fellow prisoners at the state prison late vesterday, fatally wounding John Arzenti, and cutting a gash in the shoulder of Dominic Toscano. He was immediately seized by guards and locked up. All three were serving life sentences for

The stabbing was done with shoe knife which Valordi had obtained and secreted in his clothing while working in the prison shoeshop. The three men with other prisoners, were having their daily exercise in the yard when Valiordi suddenly drew his knife and struck Arzenti over the heart, and then stabbed Toscano in the right shoulder. Guards rushed and and seized Valiordi, who was overpowered after a brief struggle





CUSTOMS MARKING

January first the new regulations governing the importation of goods through the customs in Canada became effective, the first new regulation governing the

the first new regulation governing the naming of the country of origin in stamped letters upon each commodity, and the other bearing on the value of the article which is being sent to Canada, the foreign consignee being required to affirm that the market value is not lower than the wholesale price.

Collector O. H. Talbot, in explaining the new clause in the oath of affirmation, said that it was to prevent Canada becoming the dumping ground of certain foreign corporations, who, finding their home market slumping at cheap prices, sent the goods to this country.

The new clause states that the owner or his agent or attorney in Canada shall be prescribed the oath of affirm-ation in cases where the goods have been actually purchased for importa-

tion into Canada.

The new clause in the oath of affirm-The new clause in the oath of allirmation asks the consignee to affirm that the market value of the goods which the consignee sets to be exported to Canada, is not lower than the wholesale price of the goods, and that in the case of new or unused goods the market value set is not below the actual cost. of production plus a reasonable profit.

F. Palmer Delivers Treatise On Production of Strawberries and Raspberries.

SPEAKS IN LONDON

Director of Vineland Experimental Station Urges Better Care of Soil.

F. Palmer, director of the Vineland Experimental Station, gave the members of the London branch of the Ontario Fruit Growers' Association many faluable pointers on the production of btrawberries and raspberries at a meeting held Thursday afternoon in the London office of the department of Agriculture.

Mr. Palmer answered the many ques-tions of the growers in an entirely sat-

sfactory way. In speaking of strawberries Mr. Palmer stated that a sandy loam was the best, well drained and fairly open. He advised the growers to steer clear of beavy soils.

rich soil was an absolute necessity, Mr. Palmer declared, although a strawberry plant actually took less food from the soil than any other fruit. However, the point was that from blossom to picking time the plants drew heavily on their food supply, and it was es-sential that it should be there in easily available form. A good plant would produce three or four times its weight in fruit.

The growers in the Niagara district turned under a heavy clover sod in the fall previous to planting, but there was nothing so good as barnyard manure, plus a little acid phosphate to balance the nitrogen in the soil. As a rule fall plowing was to be advocated. Should Roll Ground.

The speaker stated that it was good practice to roll the land before planting. Distance in planting was a mat-ter of personal preference. As a gen-eral rule plants were placed 15 to 18 inches in rows three to four feet apart. It paid to take plants from patches that had never been fruited.

Mr. Palmer laid particular stress on early planting, even before growth had really started. Recent experiments had shown that plants formed after mid-summer did not bear fruit the following season, and if they did, the fruit was of inferior quality. Early cultivation was desirable and

should be continued till late in the fall. Mulching was necessary for winter protection, clean straw being preferred, put on after the first freeze-up. A good average yield was 6,000 quarter per acre, although some growers in the Niagara district had picked 14,000 boxes per acre off their patches. This, of course, was exceptional, but the good grower picked about 10,000 boxes.

DOES NOT AID BACHELORS

Relief Will Not Be Given To Those Who Refuse To Work.

TORONTO, Jan. 5.—The Drury government today, though the premier himself was absent, announced its dehimself was absent, announced its decision to co-operate with the municipalities of the province in taking care of those who, through no fault of their own, are unable to get work, and who are, as a result, destitute.

The decision was conveyed to representatives of the municipalities during a conference attended by an official of the federal government, who came with essurances that the Dominion would do its share.

The plan outlined is simply an ex-

The plan outlined is simply an ex-tension of the arrangement under which the province agrees to pay one-third the excess cost of municipal works undertaken for the purpose of

works undertaken for the purpose of providing employment.

Where employment cannot be found for a man and the municipality assumes the responsibility of taking care of him and his family the province will pay one-third of the amount so spent.

This aid, however, will not be given as a set-off for anything spent by the municipality in the way of cash doles, but will cover expenditures for food and fuel, underclothing and boots.


