A C. P. R. Enterprise.

The error of locating the C. P. R. through the semi-arid region of Alprising corporation. It has begun what is described as the greatest irrigation project on the continent. The soil in the semi-arid region is fertile, and the sheltering Rockies and the warm chinook winds make the climate the finest in the country, being mild in the severest winter. An insufficient rainfall is the only drawback which pre. vents the district from becoming the garden of the west. A Globe correspondent describes the plans for redeeming this otherwise well-favored tract from its arid blight. The dry area extends eastward from Calgary 150 miles, and is 60 miles deep. The water for irrigation is to be obtained from the Bow River, which rises in the Rocky Mountains, and carries about 3,000 feet of water per second at extremely low water, with a high water discharge of 30,000 to 40,000 feet per second. The first section of the irrigation works will be a main canal 20 miles in length, with 85 miles of lateral or distributing canals, capable of irrigating 300,000 acres, and rendering 400,000 contiguous acres fit for grazing or dairying. If this is a success irrigation will be extended to 1,500,000 acres, and an equal area developed for grazing and dairying. The cost of the complete plan will be between four and five million dollars.

In Alberta irrigation has passed the experimental stage; there are 400 miles of eanals and ditches delivering water. The grazing lands within the C. P. R.'s irrigation belt will be sold at \$4 to \$5 per acre, and the arable land at about \$10 per acre. It is expected that greatly to the volume and variety of production in the Canadian West.







Frequently case occur of drownings within a short dis tance of scores of people all unable to render assistance, because none know how to swifn. In Buffalo recently Health Commissioner Walter D. Greene made the following statement apropos of this matter to the press. "I think it would be a splendid step for the city to take. It would certainly lessening the number of deplorable lake and river tragedies each summer. Boys who can now swim only thirty or forty feet before becoming exhausted would be trained to swim much greater distances and under the instruction of skillful athletes they would be taught how to reserve their strength. how to swim with the easiest and least fatiguing stroke. They would also learn how to float and tread water, two arts which often are the chief factors in saving one's own life when thrown into the water at a great distance from shore.
