Only to the initiated is the news of the reverse positively known at this time. Emperor Nicholas and high military officers, of course formed by General Kuropatkin's telegram of Tuesday, stating tersely that Mukden must be abandoned, and they received details of the beginning of the withdrawals as they appeared in excised portions of the official dispatches given out yesterday. Last evening a newspaper contained a vague report, of doubtful origin, credited to Chinese sources, but the first positive statement was derived from the Associated Press dispatch from General Kuroki's headquarters, the contents of which were quickly telegraphed to many Liberals from friends abroad. The report probably will not be printed in this morning's papers, the Government, true to its policy of breaking bad news gently, only preparing the way by authorizing the publication of number of premonitory telegrams. The news, however, is only what was expected, ultimate retirement having been discounted from the moment that Oyama inaugurated his brilliant move westward. From information in the possession of the Association Press it is known that General Kuropatkin contemplated retirement before the beginning of the battle, and that he had hoped to accomplish it without a serious combat. The Japanese, however, forced him to accept battle. The double turning movement compelled him to send the major part of his reserves to the fighting line, and rendered an effective counter stroke out of the question, and the decision to retire was immediately taken on March 6, as was stated by the Associated Press on that day. 



BANDITS BEHEAD RUSSIAN SPIES

New Chwang, March 8,-Noon.-Via Tien Tsin.-With the Japanese flags flying, a band of Chinese bandits today beheaded two young Russians, evidently an officer, but he was wearing a Chinese overcoat. He knelt without a murmur, while his companion watched the death stroke. The second captive was clothed in Chinese clothing throughout. He whimpered and struggled fiercely. He was thrown The chief of the bandits was a mild-

Today the whole band, consisting of 200 cavalry and 100 infantry formed a great circle on the outskirts of Sintheir gaily trapped and shaggy ponies The men were armed to the teeth with long rifles and Mauser pistols. infantry was mostly turbaned, but many wore Russian caps. The Russian captives were brought to the center of the circle with a flourish of trumpets. They were stripped and their arms bound together behind their bodies. They were then turned over to a 6-foot executioner sword, afterward wiping the blade on the clothing of the dead men. When the executions were finished

Manual Training and Domestic Science.

Principal Radcliffe reports that in no manual training high school which he visited was the object to teach the student a trade. While the eye and hand are trained, it is chiefly a mental exercise, stimulating the inventive faculties and the qualities of resourcefulness and self-reliance. It is the function of the school to equip the student to make the best use of his powers in whatever work he may choose, but it is no part of primary and secondary education to train him for a particular occupation. Some of the schools in this Province have gone too far in this direction, in the effort to give education a more "practical" bent. The teaching of shorthand is defensible, because it is an excellent mental discipline, but there is no purely educational value in typewriting. If the object of domestic science was to teach girls to earn their livelihood as milliners, dressmakers, or cooks, it should have no place in the schools; but this is not the intention. As Principal Radcliffe says in his report, the purpose of the course is "not to qualify them for positions to draw salaries, but to prepare them for a cultured, thrifty, intelligent governing of a household." The happiness and health of society would be promoted beyond measure if all girls received efficient instruction in household duties, and qualified themselves to create well-ordered homes. It is impossible to estimate the amount of misery, the number of domestic tragedies, that grow directly out of ignorance of household economics.

Immigration Problem.

Mrs. Close's scheme of child emigration to Canada, propounded at a meeting at the Mansion House, London, was described in these columns the other day. Briefly, the scheme contemplates the acquirement of a number of 200-acre farms in different parts of Canada, where English poor law children shall be reared under the care of managers, the expense to be borne by the English poor law funds. The poor law guardians of England, who exercise parental rights over 4,000 children, met the other day and strongly denounced the scheme. Dr. Barnardo also opposes it, claiming that the work can be done better by existing agencies, including his own.

Mrs. Close's scheme will not find enthusiastic support in Canada, Experience has shown that the colony plan of immigration, by which natives of one country, or members of one sect, are settled in compact groups, is not the best for themselves or for the community. When immigrants of the same nationality are massed together, they are not so readily influenced by the customs and institutions of their adopted country. Dr. Barnardo has the right idea, his wards being distributed throughout the country, wherever homes are found for them, His scheme is also superior to Mrs. Close's in that Barnardo boys and girls serve a probationary term in the Barnardo homes before they are sent to the Dominion, and the physically and mentally de-

fective children are weeded out.

The immigration problem would be greatly simplified if this sifting process could be applied to all immigrants entering this country. The rush of popvlation is such that the authorities should impose wholesome tests and restrictions in the interests of good citizenship. Happily the main streams of immigration are coming from Great Eritain and the United States, so that we may be comparatively indifferent about seeking an increase of population from other countries. There is said to be a movement on foot for the emigration to Canada of 200,000 Stundists, a Russian sect, but under no circumstances should they be encouraged to settle here in a colony. Income—No Possible Way to Avoid the Tax.



The man with the most arbitrary powers in London at present is As-Bessment Commissioner Grant. This the city under the n e w assessment act, and it is this act which confers these powers upon the commissioner.

For instance, when the assessors start out the act empowers Mr. Grant to authorize each of hem to swear every man-and for that natter, every woman-in London, as to his or her income. The commissioner also has the power to send to each employer in London a printed slip, to be filled out for the purpose of ascertaining what each employe receives as wages. Thus it will be exceedingly hazardous for any person to attempt to deceive the assessors, so as to avoid paying income tax. If the employer loes not fill out the slip within a prescribed time, he is liable to a penalty of \$10 a day for each day the information is délayed. The assessment commissioner also has the power to de-mand the names of the stockholders of panks, loan companies, etc., so that he may use them for incomes, but the incomes of stockholders in manufacturing plants is exempt, because the fac-

tory is taxed for 60 per cent of its value for a business tax.

This year the assessors will not value stocks in stores or machinery in factories, as no personalty tax will be collected. Instead of the usual personalty tax, each member will pay on a percentage of the value of his busiless premises. Mr. Grant has just completed an adjustment of the realty values in the business section of the city, as a basis upon which to assess this year, and he repeats his former statement that the new law will likely be hard on the small merchant, and slightly easier on the larger business men, but as a whole the substitution of the business for the personalty tax will leave the city's income almost unchanged.




