**SIGNALS MADE AT FORT GEORGE, WHEN SSVELS ARE COMING INTO HALIFAX HARBOUR.**

One ball clofe,	For one fquare rigged vefel.
One ball half hoifted,	For two do.
Two balls clofe,	For three do.
Two balls feparated,	For four do.
A pendant of any colour	For five do.
A pendant under one ball,	For fix do.
A pendant over a ball half hoifted,	For feven do.
A pendant under two balls clofe,	For eight do.
A pendant between two balls feparated,	For nine do.
A Flag of any colour,	For ten or more do.

The above are hoifted at the eaft or weft yard-arm, according to the quarter the vefel firft appears in, with the addition of a ball in the centre of the yard, until the vefels can be feen, when one or more of the following defcriptive colours will be hoifted at the maft-head :—

- A Union for a flag-ſhip, with or without a ſquadron.
- Do. with a red pendant over it, for a two decker.
- Do. with a blue pendant over it, for a Frigate.
- Do. with a white pendant over it, for a ſmall armed vefel.
- A red flag, pierced white, for a Packet.
- A blue pendant for a merchant ſhip.
- A red pendant for a merchant brig.
- A white pendant for a topfail ſloop or ſchooner.
- A red flag for a neutral man of war.
- Do. with a blue pendant under it, for a neutral merchant ſhip.
- Do. with a red pendant under it, for a do. brig.
- Do. with a white pendant under it, ſloop or ſchooner

**ENEMY'S SIGNALS.**

- A French Jack for an enemy's fleet.
- A blue pendant under a French pendant, for do. ſhip.
- A red pendant under a do. for an enemy's brig.
- A white pendant under a do. for a do. ſloop or ſchooner.
- A union jack over enemy's ſignals, denotes the vefels to be prizes.

**SIGNALS OF DISTRESS.**

In caſes when immediate aſſiſtance is neceſſary, a ball at the maft head, in addition to the defcriptive colours of the vefel in diſtreſs; and guns occaſionally, until the ſignal is attended to.

**SIGNALS MADE ON THE ENSIGN STAFF AT FORT GEORGE.**

- A Red Flag denotes a vefel from Europe.
- A White Flag do. do. Newfoundland.
- A Blue Flag do. do. Weſt-Indies.
- A Red Pendant do. do. United States.
- A White Pendant do. do. A Coaſter.
- A Blue Pendant do. do. From ſome part of the world for which there is no particular ſignal.

A white pendant over any of the above, denotes the vefel to have failed, either before or at the ſame time, with the one already arrived.

**REPEATS FROM OUT-POSTS, AT FORT GEORGE.**

- For a ſquare rigged vefel—two balls or a fix.
- A ſhip—a large ball at the end of the yard, with a ſmall ball in the centre.
- A brig—a ſmall ball at the end of the yard, with a large ball in the centre.

with an account of a severe Battle having  
taken place between the Indians of Kentucky  
and the Americans under Genl. Harrison; the  
latter lost 3 Colours killed, and a number  
of other principal Officers; the Indians took  
place at the dead hour of the Night, the  
Americans having been call'd into security by  
a supposed friendly intercourse between the  
chiefs bearing a white flag the Evening before.  
This dear bought experience may hereafter be  
of salutary service to the Americans. The  
Winter, up to the present hour, has pass'd over  
without experiencing any frost at all to  
speak of; the Fields, strange as it may appear,  
(those protected from the North Winds, particularly)  
were now a beautiful green, no Snow having

For the information of Travellers between Windsor and Parriborough, &c.
