The notary (who had been called hastily to the performance of his duty) had no opportunity of correction, and he spelt the name of his immortal client from the recollection of accustomed orthography alone, Shakespeare.

New Opera by Mozart.—Quite a sensation has been produced in the musical world by the announcement of the discovery of a new opera by Mozart.

UNITED STATES.

The legislature of Maine has passed a resolve, appropriating \$10,000 to extend the Aroostook road from the Aroostook to the St. Johns, which will be sent to Massachusetts for concurrence.

It is estimated in the Maine papers that the timber cut down and destroyed by trespassers on the public land, has amounted to a million and a half of dollars annually for fifteen years past.

The expense of prosecuting criminals in the state of Massachusetts last year, is said to have been \$70,000.

They are playing "The Aroostook, or the Boundary Line," at the National Theatre, Boston.

In the House of Representatives of Maine a bill has been introduced to incorporate the County of Aroostook, with Houlton for the shire town—and embracing within its limits the disputed territory.

The New-York merchants have subscribed \$1200 to purchase a silver vase to be presented to Capt. Roberts, the commander of the first English steam-ship that crossed the Atlantic.

The Hudson is now completely open to navigation to Coxake, within twenty miles of Albany, and there is now regular steam-boat communication between New-York and Albany.

Congress have made an appropriation for building three steam-ships for the American Navy, which, with the Fulton, will give the United States four steam-ships of war. France has fifty steam-ships of war, and Great Britain upwards of forty.

A quantity of gunpowder is said to have arrived at the Restook, marked cokes and steel meats for the Blue Noses and Red Coats! Brother Jonathan is well aware that the New Brunswickers have a "sweet tooth." We thank him for his consideration, and politely inform him, that in return, we have procured a large quantity of grapes, from which he will be at liberty to extract the juice; and have provided ourselves with a good supply of canister, admirably adapted for the better preservation of his country.—D. Astak Times.

LOWER CANADA.

Montreal, Feb 16.—It is reported that the Honorable Mr. Justice Pyke is about to retire from the Bench. He will carry with him into retirement the best wishes of those, whose respect he has so especially commanded during the many years we have known him in public life.—Fraser's.

It is understood that Mr. Justice Bowen, from Quebec, will succeed to the Chief Justiceship of this District.—Id.

Sympathising outrages still continue on the frontier. A house and barn were set fire to in Odelltown, close to the American line, on Tuesday night, by a party from the other side. Full particulars have not yet reached town, but the fact may be relied upon.—Gazette.

THE TRANSCRIPT.

QUEBEC, WEDNESDAY, MARCH 30, 1839

There is no later intelligence of moment from the boundary; but the American papers talk in a less warlike key, and the opinion gains ground that there is no immediate prospect of war. The following we extract from the New-York Star of Wednesday last:—

Major Kirby, commanding the U. S. Army, yesterday received a letter from Major Kirby, commanding the U. S. Garrison at Houlton, confirming the previous rumour that Sir John Harvey was withdrawing the British troops from the frontier.

By accounts from Bangor to the 9th, we learn from a gentleman who arrived there direct from Houlton, that there would be no bloodshed, and that the people on the British side are decidedly averse to war.

Fitzbergt, charged with abetting Her Majesty's subjects in arresting Mr. McIntyre, the Maine agent, has been examined at Bangor, and ordered \$500 to appear at the common plea in May.

Verbal intelligence from Bangor gives us a rumour that Sir John Harvey has sent two companies to fortify Mills Hill, two miles within the disputed territory, and to plant there the British standard.

The major correspondence of the Boston Atlas got the information as positive, received by private express from Houlton, with despatch for General Hodson for Gov. Fairbanks that Sir John Harvey has actually taken possession of Mills Hill, as is supported by eight companies of regulars. The correspondent says, Mills Hill is within the territory of Maine, and west of the boundary. A letter from the secretary of Gen. Hoan confirms the above.

Gen. S was still at Augusta, to leave for Houlton Friday. He expects to have an interview with Sir John Harvey.

Several companies of Gen. Hodson's division had in up a position at the month of the Presque, a stream that flows into the Aroostook miles above the location Col. Jarvis has chosen. Nine companies were to follow to Presque Isle on Monday.

Mr. Bell passed through Bangor the 9th, from Wash, with despatches for Sir John Harvey, spoke unfavourably of the prospect of peace.

Toronto is the 13th inst. were received by post. They are principally occupied the proceedings of the Legislature.

The Hon Assembly has adopted an address to His Excellency calling for copies of the documents connected with the establishment of theories, and a committee of

nine members has been appointed to consider the question of the Clergy Reserves. On the 12th inst. His Excellency transmitted to the House several important despatches on the affairs of the Province.

Col. Prince arrived in Toronto from the West on the 11th, and took his seat in the House. He was received on entering the House with hearty cheers.

The Montreal Gazette of Saturday says:—"The sentences of the Court Martial, on the last Beauharnais and St. Césaire cases, having been submitted to His Excellency the Commander of the Forces, have been sanctioned in general orders. Of the Beauharnais is prisoner, Louis Turcot, François-Xavier Prévost, André Papin-au, David Gagnon, Charles Rapin, Despire Bonbonnais, and Michel Longtin have been found guilty, and condemned to death. Of those however Bonbonnais and Longtin are recommended for a commutation of their sentence. James Perigo and Isidore Tremblay are found not guilty and acquitted."

The St. Césaire prisoners, Louis Bourdon, François Guertin, and Bousquet are found guilty and sentenced to death.

The speculations lately so rife in the American papers, respecting the person to be appointed Special Envoy to England, appear for the present to be put at rest, in consequence of its being now understood that no appointment will be made, until intelligence has been received from the American Minister in England respecting present doings.

It is stated in a Burlington paper that Mr. Holmes, accused of the murder of Mr. Taché, is to be detained in confinement until the 28th instant, when the Governor of Vermont will decide whether he shall be given up to the authorities in Canada. Mrs. Taché is at present in Quebec, and is said to be in a dangerous state of health.

Sunday last being the anniversary of Ireland's Patron Saint, an eloquent and impressive discourse was delivered by the Rev. Mr. McMahon, to a very crowded congregation. At the conclusion of the services a collection was made in aid of the funds of the church, which produced about £60.

In consequence of St. Patrick's day falling on Sunday, the usual procession of the several Societies did not take place, and the customary festivities were deferred until the following day, when about ninety gentlemen partook of a sumptuous dinner at the Albion Hotel, the arrangements for which were made on a scale of splendour and with much taste.

Another dinner took place at the same time at Mr. Maguire's Shamrock Inn, at which a company of forty forty and fifty sat down, and spent the evening delightfully.

The Criminal Term of the Court of King's Bench for this District will commence on Friday next. We believe that the number of prisoners for trial is not so great as usual; and comparatively few of them for crimes of a very heinous nature. The trial likely to excite the most interest is that of the boys Touchette, Derouin and Languedoc for the murder of Baptiste Comeau, on Cote d'Abraham about the end of January last.

J. P. Boucher Belleville, editor, and F. Cinq-Mars, printer, of a small paper published at Montreal entitled L'Aurore des Canadas, were arrested on Friday last, and committed to jail on a charge of treason. The press and types were at the same time seized, and removed to the police office.

Seven new Ordinances received the sanction of His Excellency the Governor-General on Thursday last,—making the total number 21 passed by the Special Council during the present session—

Mr. Auin, late Editor of the Fantasque... last night commenced a series of lectures and experiments on chemistry, at the City Hotel, St. Ann Street.

On Monday some rocket practice took place on the ice at the mouth of the St. Charles, under the direction of Captain Aronson, Royal Artillery, in presence of Major General Sir James Macdonnell, Lieut-nant-Colonel Kirby, R. A., many Officers of the Garrison, and a great number of spectators. The practice was made at a great distance from the shores and the ice roads, as the formidable missiles had been in store since 1815, and there was some uncertainty as to their working properly. They appear, however, to have sustained but little injury from the length of time they have been made up, and the heavier rockets, especially, were thoroughly effective and showed the terrific destruction they spread when in order and properly employed; against wood-burnings or block houses their effects must be irresistible, and we learn that a supply accompanied the last reinforcements which marched from this Garrison to New Brunswick. Mr. Fairfield's warriors, should they be exposed to their operation, may find the wooden walls of their log pen a berth too hot to be agreeable.—Mercury.

The Emperor of Russia has given orders to export the surplus corn of his vast territories, in order to assist foreign nations who are in great want of that essential article. On the 20th December there were at Odessa 124 English, French, Italian and Spanish vessels taking in cargoes of wheat and barley. All the other harbours of the Black sea are equally encumbered with vessels for the same purpose.

The King of the Two Sicilies has also permitted the exportation of corn from his dominions.
