## PHILATELIC NOTES FROM NEW ZEALAND.

BY RALPH W. GOSSET.

Since last writing the Great Barrier Pigeon service stamp has changed colour and also design. The words "One Shilling "on either side of the stamp are in the new lot white letters on coloured ground, the previous ones being coloured letters on white ground. The new stamp contains a lot of scroll work and is printed on very light mauve coloured paper. The total number of this stamp printed is 2,000 . There were 1,800 of the first lot issued, and when the new one came in vogue there remained 400 , which amount were purchased by a well known English Philatelic firm at Ipswich and therefore there were only $\mathrm{t}, 400$ of the Great Barrier Island stamp issued.

The new one is perforated $121 / 2$ and is the same in shape as the first one (oblong horizontal.)

The Id Blue Cooks Islands with Queen Makea's head on was, (at the beginning of this month) surcharged $1 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ as under, in black.

> ONE
> HALF PENNY

The surcharged is very indistinct and when on the letter with the post maris over it, it is barely noticed. All the Id Blues there were in stock were surcharged and official value of $1 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ surcharged was \& 40.

Official advices from the same islands also state, that there is to be a new issue of $1 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ and Id very shortly.

Philatelic news from these Islands take a long time to reach Auckland as there is only one mail a month.

The number of Post Offices open in New Zealand at the close of the year 1897 was 1,524 ; it may also be interesting to note that the last published international statistics placed New Zealand before all other countries in the world as regards the proportion of population to each post office, the figures being 1 post office for every 520 inlabitants ; Canada being second with 1 to 538. New South Wales and Victoria third and fourth with I to 645, and I to 751, United States sixth with I to 884 and Great Britain fifteenth with I to 1,922 .

The postal conference which met at Hobart on March 28, '97, passed the following resolution:-"That it would be inadvisable to make any further reduction of the oversea postage rate, until the way is clear for a reduction in the present large subsidies paid for the carriage of such mails, and the present inland and intercolonial rates."
"That the various agents general delegates to the postal conference in London be instructed to oppose the proposal to reduce the rate of postage to all parts of the British Empire from $21 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ per $1 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ oz. to 2 d , and also the Canadian proposal to reduce her out going rate from 5 cents per $1 / 2$ oz, to 3 cents per ounce, for the following reasons :-
I. The present rate is not an unreasonably high one, having in view the large cost to the colonies involved in the maintenance of the present means of postal communication with the, various portions of the Empire.
2. Because of the anomaly which would be created by carrying letters, fourteen thousand miles, for the same rate as now charged for delivery within the limits of the town where posted.

## AND AGAIN. -

Regarding the proposal of Canada to reduce her out going postage, this conference is strongly of opinion, that no reduction should take place which would be a departure from the present uniform rate for the following reason, inter alia : at present a charge of 2 d per $1 / 2 \mathrm{oz}$. is made in Australia for the carriage of letters to however small a distance, while the Canadian proposal would involve the carrying of her letters over the same routes at a greatly reduced cost. This would, in the opinion of the conference lead to confusion, and dissatisfaction."

The postal department here, are in correspondence with the manufacturers of the patent automatic date stamping machines (as used in the States and Canada), with a view to obtain one or two on trial, as they have proved a practical success in the two countries mentioned.
The following clippings and statistics may be of interest to the M.P. readers.
"An error was unfortunately made in engraving the plate for the $21 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ stamp; Wakatip being misspelt Wakitipu, but this has since been corrected. The keen demand by collectors for the "Error" somewhat embarrassed the department in the sale of these labels for their legitimate purpose necessatating a minimum quantity only being sold to any one applicant. Through a misunderstanding in London, the design for the 4 d stamp was adopted for the id stamp involving a costly process of double printing for the denomination more largely used, than any of the others. Instructions have already been given to rectify this as early as possible. Another matter of cosiderable importance is that future issues are to be printed on watermarked paper. The colours of several of the stamps will be changed to brighter tints, as soon as the printing is done in the colony. In the meantime the transposition of the designs for the Id and 4 d labels will carry with it changes in colour as follows :-One penny from brown and blue to lilac: 4 d from rose lake to brown and blue ; and 9 d from lilac to rose lake.

The following is a cutting from the " N Z. Herald " which speaks for itself :-

At a meeting of the Auckland Philatelic Club, last night, it was stated that a lot of corlespondence had been received from Canada bearing only two cents (Id) postage. Such correspondence here is fined 3d (double deficient postage). The Canadian people evidently think New Zealand is included in the British colonies where the Id postage is authorised.

## BEWARE OF THESE.

Our correspondent, Rev. Edwin Ewell of Denmark, lowa, desires to warn collectors against certain dealers in St. Catherines, Ont. Mr. E. writes, "A few months ago I bid on stamps offered for sale by W. A. Beatty, and on report of purchase made remittance, but found the stamps short in number and many almost worthless. Later, I sent him, bids, saying that deficiency must be made up before I could make further remittance, I cannot get an answer from him.

I wrote to Mr. Bradley of the "Stamp Reporter" (weekly) enquiring about Mr. Beatty, and he replied, saying that he was unreliable, but that he could recommend one Mr. Wm. Riddle, whose sale ad. appeared in the Reporter. I sent bids and on receipt of report of purchase I sent him pay for stamps in Chicago Exchange, which he returned saying that the banks would not cash it and requested cash $\$ 1.30$ which I sent. I have waited sufficient time and have written him, but still no answer or stamps.

Still further, I offered Mr. Bradley a $50 c$ Omaha for the paper. 1 year and a $1 / 2 \mathrm{c}$ Jubilee, I received the $1 / 2 \mathrm{c}$ Jubilee but 10 paper. I have given sufficient time for a reply to my enquiry, but got answer. What kind of a "gang" have I struck?

We shall be pleased to hear what the St. Catherines people referred to have to say for themselves. If Mr. Bradley said that Beatty was unreliable how is it that Beatty's ads were in the Stamp Reporter every month ?

## ARE THEY THE SAME?

A short while ago, publishers and collectors alike were fleeced by a concern calling themselves "Novd Scotia Stamp Co." Upon an enquiry to the P. O. Inspector at Halifax we were informe that the Stamp Co. consisted of L. H. McDonald, a boy 16 years of age. We were unable to get our money, or any further particulars. Now comes a company advertising in the same style, and calling themselves "Eureka Stamp Co. advertising everywhere, using a typewriter, and issuing a grand price list, offering stamps very cheap. From information received we are led to believe that the Nova Scotia and the Eureka Stamp Co's. are one and the same party.

A RIDE IN A MAIL CAR.
by R, C. BACH.
How many of our readers have ever ridden in a ma.l car, and watched the operations of sorting out the mails? Let us take a trip to New York, via the Central Vermont and N. Y. Central Rail Roads.

It is Friday night. The Trans-atlantic mails close at Montreal at 5 p.m. so as to go by the steamer leaving New York on Saturday. The train starts. Now let us take a look around. A mail car is divided into two parts, one of which is reserved for mail bags which do not require sorting wut. In the other hal, pigeon holes occupy all available wall space, while on one side is a large gridiron shape frame, used for holding the mail bags open, so as to faciliate sorting.

The mail clerks operating these cars have no "cinch." With them it is work, and work hard, too, till the end of the route is reached. The route from Montreal to St. Albans, Vermont is a busy one. St. Albans is the money order exchange office between Canada and the U. S. and there is always a goodly pile of mail for this sleeply little town. After leaving St. Albans, the clerks start to
sort out the mail for the towns between St. Albans and N. 1. At Burlington, Bennington, and Rutland, the train stops just long enough to enable the mail clerks to throw out the sacks destined for these towns and to receive in turn sacks for N . Y. and intermediate places.

At Troy, the entire mail has to be transferred to the N, Y. Central R. R. cars, which is quite a job, by the way.

Here, also, the mails for N. Y. from other trains are taken aboard. The six hours which the trip form Troy to N. Y. City occupies are the mail clerks busiest hours and who can blame him, when, after the mails are delivered to P.O. vans at the Grand Central Depot, he goes home to take a well earned nap.

> ONCE MORE IN NEW YORK.

Having to go to New York on business we again had the pleasure of meeting Messrs Herbit and McDonnell. These two gentlemen have opened up a stamp shop on 125 th St. and it is reported, that Bro. Herbst has to hire a cab to take him to the bank every afternoon, as our friend is not strong enough to carry all the money, (It must be all coppers.-Ed). Being the only stamp dealers up there, they really do a rushing trade. Bro. Herbst sells the stamps, and McDonnell "mends your shoes while you wait."

Father Brown is still at the same stand on Park Row, and also reports a good trade. In fact all the dealers in N. Y. claim they are exceedingly busy, and it is not surprising to hear, that Messrs Bogert \& Durbin's auction on Saturday, June 3 rd, was most successful. One thing is very noticeable. Most of the big dealers, and smaller ones too, receive a visitor courteously, whether he buys \$10 or \$100.00 worth. We know one Nassau St. dealer, however. who, because we brought him back an approval book (which had been sent unsolicited) without buying any of the trash it contained, was like an iceberg. But if he only knew, that the gentleman from England, who happened to enter his shop with us and who was also treated "à la glace," went two doors further down and bought over $\$ 60.00$ worth of stamps,-would'nt he kick himself?

## MONTREAL NOTES.

Not one new stamp has been issued by the P. O. Dept. lately, and we're all getting real anxious. The ic numeral number appears in a new shade. Our Ontario brethern have chronicled the 5 c . numeral more than once, and the Boston correspondent of the Virginia Philatelist has even seen it, yet it is funny that they are not for sale here yet,nor does the daily Ontario mail received by business firms here, bear any.

Maps are still on sale, both at the Post Office and Stationery stores.

The International Stamp Co. has opened up an office opposite the Post Office, right in the business centre of the city.

Most of our dealers report trade as rather slow just now, locally, but say that mail orders are just pouring in.

The Dominion Stamp Co. has opened up a branch office in the Y.M.C.A. building. They also intend to open another branch in the East End. Good indications of the state of trade.

Purple envelopes are recovering and prices are slowly advancing. Surcharges are selling at 10 . each for 98 issue, and 35 to 50 c . for the 1887 issue.

Some of the local philatelists, who intended to go to the 1). P. A. convention in Toronto, on June 3oth and July 1st., were very disappointed to find out that owing to the local militia batallions being ordered into camp at Laprarie in those days, the visit to the Queen City has to be put off. It was said that the ist Prince of Wales Regiment Fusiliers was to visit Toronto on July ist, but nothing definite has been announced yet. As there are about 10 of our local "lights" in that regiment, it would be quite an augmentation to the "meet."

## REVIEW. <br> conducted by Mon Ami Joseph.

The Montreal Philatelist has secured the services of a collector, not a dealer, who will conduct this department in an open fearless way, criticizing where he thinks fit, and vice versa. Publishers, please rake notice that we do not care a continental (or a 2 C U.S.) about your opinion of this column, but will conduct it in the interest of the true philatelist.

The American Journal of Philately ot June continues the Catalogue for advanced collectors. Joha N. Luff continues the article on the Postage Stamps of the United States, giving the quantities of the Departments, surcharged specimen which were sold.

Mekeels Summer Special was a good one.

In the Weekly Era for June 3rd, we read that the New Cuban stamps are to be the color as the present issue U. S. stamps I. 2, 3, 5 and roc. The Special Delivery is to be Orange. Under the heading Montreal Notes we read the following :-

Dealers who sent their entire supply of three-cent envelopes and letter-cards to Ottawa to be surcharged are sorry that they did not keep a few unsurcharged, as the price of the unsurcharged has advanced on account of the limited supply now on hand.

Our only comment is that some of these amateur quill pushers seem to think that a dealer is so foolish as to keep only one kind in stock. We will wager a dollar against a button that most, if not all dealers, have a full supply of both surcharged and unsurcharged on hand. Perhaps this is only a little boom for the writer, who may happen to have a quantity of unsurcharged envelopes on hand.

In the Philatelic Bulletin for May, H. A. Chapman concludes "Some Rare Stamps." This is an extract:-Outside
$f$ he United States, I would be satisfied with the 12d black of Canada, and other Dominion issues are desirable." No doubt you would, Mr. Chapman.

The Philatelic Advocate for May is up to its usual standard. G. W. Starnaman contributes "Pithy Philatelic Sayings," Russell C. Yates and H. A. Chapman also contribute good articles.

The Perforator, for May, does not contain much reading matter.

The Bay State Philatelist gives the portrait of Mr. W. Russell Brown.
"Energy" is the name of a new paper, published by F. I. Weaver, of Canadian Philatelic Weekly fame. We thank God that we were not so unfortunate as to receive a copy, as it is the worst amateur paper we have ever seen. There is a column called "Stamp Lore," but it consists of an article insultang Brother Stone of the Era Staff. Green is the best amongst the many clipped items in this number. Mr. Widdicombe, in his Canadian Notes, copies word for word what has appeared in other papers. Mr. Paalzow's review of the M. P. is ridiculous in the extreme. It is conceded hy many readers of the V. P. that it is far behind in literary quality to what it was a year ago.

Stamp Talks commences Vol. II with the May number and has some good reading in it. Leave out a few of the "bad" ads. you are running, and it will improve the paper.

## PARIS POSTMEN ON STRIKE.

## Three Thousand Letter Carriers Leave Work and Delay Business.

Paris, May 18.-Owing to the refusal of the Senate to vote the bill providing increased pay for postmen, recently passed by the Chamber of Deputies, about eight hundred postmen refused to go to work early this morning and, later, the whole force numbering three thousand men went out on strike. As a result there were no mail deliveries this morning. Even the Embassies have not received their letters. The men are standing in groups outside the post office.

Later, the postmen held an open-air meeting around the post office and were addressed by the Under Postal Secretary, M. Mougeot, who vainly urged them to return to work. The strikers responded by demanding an increase of pay. The post office was besieged by business men this morning, who demanded their letters. M. Mougeot has arranged for a delivery this afternoon. The sorting is being done by clerks who have been placed at the disposal of the post office authorities by the big commercial houses and banks. They are under the direction of the auxiliary sorters. The mail will then be delivered by soldiers conducted by policemen. The absence of a regular mail delivery has caused great disturbance in business circles.
