Russia Sympathises With Servia and There is Great Danger That She Will Butt in and Precipitate a European Race War

London, July 27 .- The darkest war cloud which has appeared on he European horizon since Germany sent warships to Agadir, has FEAR GENERAL risen within the last 48 hours. The Servian Government refused o comply with Austria's demands for the expiation of the Sarayevo urders, for which Austria holds anti-Austrian conspiracies in Servia responsible and for a guarantee of future good behaviour, the ost humiliating demand ever made of an independent nation.

It was ten minutes before six o'clock Saturday night, when the Grave View of the Austroustro-Hungarian ultimatum expired, that the Servian Premier anded to the Austrian Minister at Belgrade Servia's reply. The linister immediately severed diplomatic relations and started for

The contents of the note have not been revealed, but the Servian gation at London understands it accepted some of Austria's condions and rejected others. Apparently Austria was resolved to have he whole bill paid or nothing.
