PRISONERS WERE ARRANGED TO-DAY

[Canadian Press Despatch]

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 13--Four of the five prisoners who were arrested in Montreal yesterday on a charge of murder in connection with the mysterious death of Abe Rubenstein, here on August 28th, were arraigned in the police court this morning and without being asked to plead were remanded until next Saturday.

The four prisoners are Nathan Shapiro, who employed Rubenstein; Chas. Dreyfus, who was in the dead man's company on the night he disappeared; Bessie Simms and Lottie Bringham, colored women, who were also seen in company with Rubenstein on the

night of the murder. The fifth prisoner, R. H. Dermo, of Toronto, held as a material witness, was arraigned on a nominal charge of vagrancy. He, too, was remanded for a week. Detectives found a key of the vacant store where Rubenstein's body was found in Dermo's possession. He is an employee of a former tenant of the place and claims that when they gave up the store he retained the key by mistake.

A. E. Fripp, K.C., M.P., counsel for Shapiro and Dreyfus, asked for bail and was refused.

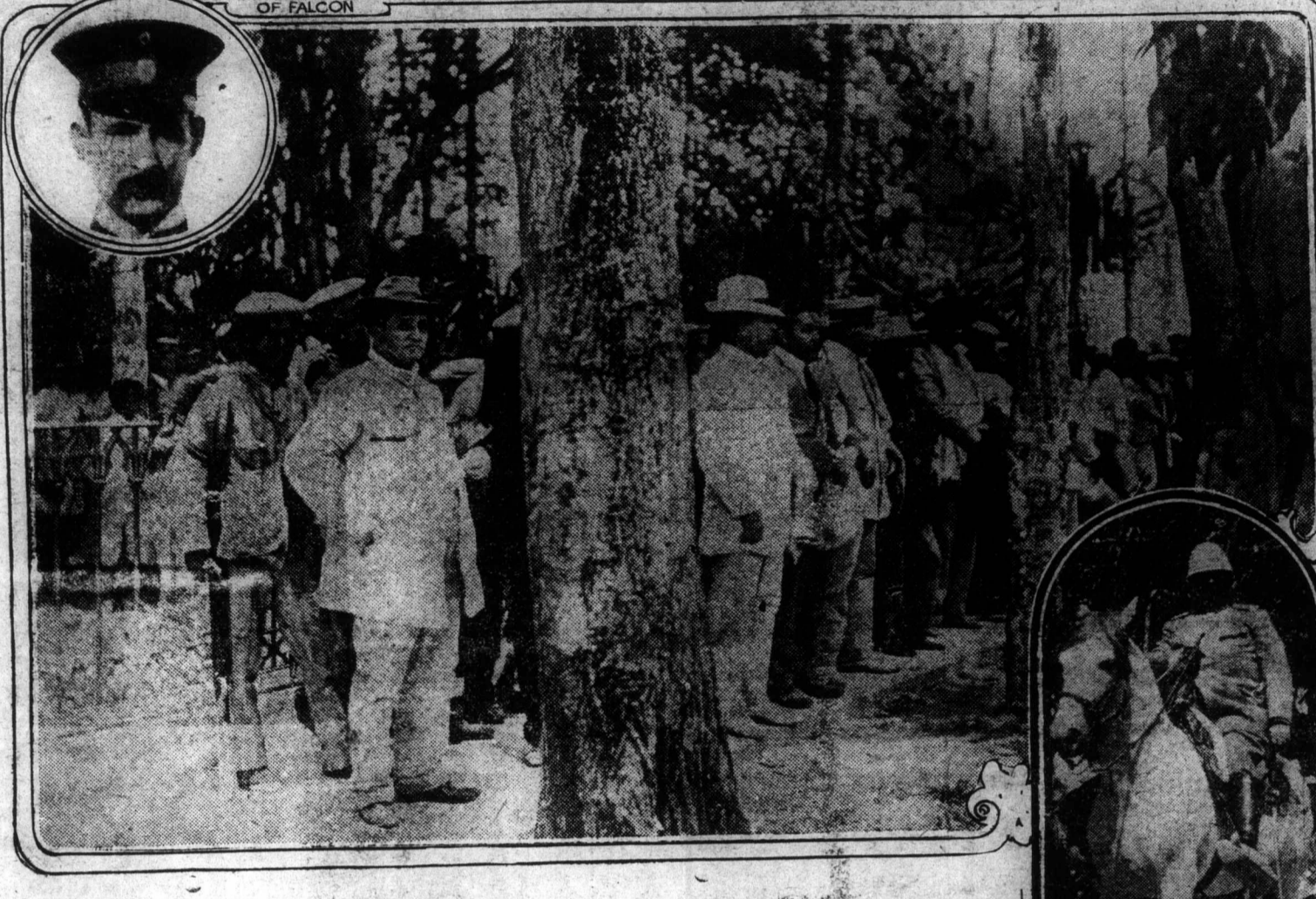
ROCHESTER BEAT MONTREAL

ACTOR SHOT WOUND ON THE STAGE

The Dangers of Using Cartridges—Wad in Wound.

The stage shooting tragedy at the Theatre Royal, Brantford, which involved the death of Mr. Wilson, aged thirty-four, on Noel-street, Islington, was inquired into on Tuesday by coroner Mr. Wilson. The part of the hero in the play "The Woman Conquers" was performed on Tuesday night, and the tragedy occurred in the course of the play. A wad was noticed in the flesh.

Eva Trevenna, an actress, who was taken to Northern Hospital, said on Tuesday that the wad was not the one that should be. He stated that only three feet away from the actor was a wad.

Dr. Pain who was called immediately after the tragedy, said he found a wad in the left shoulder-blade. He asked if he probed for another, and replied that he did not startle the wound. Wilson's suggestion that the wad was something more in the wound must be seen by a medical man.

Richard Shellabear, who was employed by Messrs. Gamble, gave evidence of the tragedy. The coroner said that the wad could be used on the stage—Perfectly where. Care should be taken that the wad is not pointed the gun at any person. Mr. C. A. Elgood (solicitor) said that the wad was fired from a gun which was used in the tragedy.

ACTOR SHOT WHILE ON THE STAGE

The Dangers of Using Blank Cartridges—Wad in the Wound.

The stage shooting tragedy at the Elephant and Castle Theatre which involved the death of Mr. Herbert Wilson, aged thirty-four, an actor, of Noel-street, Islington, was further inquired into on Tuesday by the Islington coroner.

Dr. Pain, who was called to Wilson immediately after the accident at 11.15, said he found a wound in his left shoulder-blade. He bathed it, and a wad came out. Witness was asked if he probed for anything further, and replied that he did not, adding that the wound might have started bleeding.

Did he treat the matter lightly?—It was treated very lightly indeed. Witness thought the wound was superficial; he was sure it had not penetrated the chest.

Richard Shellbeare, shop assistant, employed by Messrs. Gamage, of Hubbard, gave evidence of the purchase of the gun and 500 blank cartridges. The Coroner: Do you think the cartridges could be used with safety on the stage?—Perfectly safe anywhere. Care should be taken not to point the gun at any person.

Warning Unnecessary. Mr. Tristram Beresford (for Mr. Wilson) said he was not going to fire the gun on the stage. He had previously sold Mr. Wallace blank revolver cartridges, and should not dream of saying to him, "Now they must not be fired in a man's face."
