

**Two British** Ships are Torpedoed

Penzance, England, May 28 .---The British steamer Cadeby has been sunk off the Scilly Isles by gunfire from a German submarine. All those on board the vessel, including four passengers, were saved.

The Cadeby was sent to the bottom yesterday. Her crew of 18 men, together with the passengers on board, took to the boats, and were later rescued by a fishing smack and brought into New Lyn, a fishing village near here.

The steamer Cadeby was of 677 net tons register and 225 feet long. She was owned in Glasgow.

Crew of 250 and 70 Work ers Perish on Former C. P. R. Boat.

London, May 27—The Princess Irene, a British mine-laying ship, was literally blown to atoms with at least 325 men aboard as she lay at anchor in Sheerness harbor vesterday. anchor in Sheerness harbor yesterday. The explosion apparently was inter-nal, its origin being marked by complete mystery, and so far as known, only one man has survived, a stoker named David Wills, who was picked up badly injured.

It is understood that all but three of her crew of 250 men were aboard agara-on-the-Lake, and will probably the steamer, as well as 78 dockyard men carrying out repairs. Some estimates, however, place the number of victims much higher. The Daily Mail asserts that in addition to the 78 shipwrights there were on board 100 workmen from Chatham, as well as 240 members of the crew, whch would give a total of 418 persons on the steamer at the time she was blown
