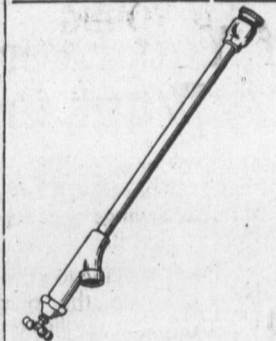

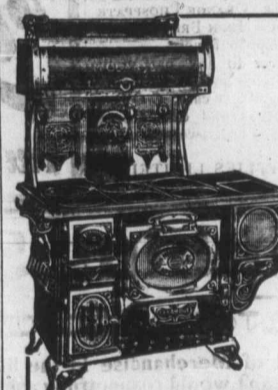

Acadia's Fifth Campaign for Endowment Most Successful.

About two months ago in April the Governors of Acadia University, decided to inaugurate a campaign to raise one hundred thousand dollars for an endowment, the interest of same to be used entirely towards increasing the salary of the professor. There is no doubt that Acadia's teaching staff is underpaid when the ability of the members of the staff is considered, and the fact that other institutions would like their services at higher salaries.

This was the fifth forward movement attempted at Acadia towards endowment and it found the friends of the college just as ready to respond as heretofore. At the closing at the end of May, less than two months after the campaign was started. President Cutten was able to announce that about \$80,000 of the amount required had been pledged. This was made up of two sums of \$30,000 and \$33,000 from donors whose names are withheld for the present, and a few smaller amounts. As yet the general public of supporters of Acadia have had no opportunity to contribute. The full endowment well soon be raised and in consequence a few hundred dollars will be added to the salaries of Acadias efficient professors.

Another endowment Campaign has been proposed to the Governors, that of raising funds for the collegiate and Business Academy. This is now a most important institution and increasing in efficiency, usefulness and numbers every year.

CANADA REGISTRATION BOARD CARD FOR FEMALES. Includes fields for Name, Address, Nationality, and various questions about health and occupation. Procedure of Registration section follows.

Procedure of Registration. On June 22nd every person residing in Canada, male or female, British or alien, of sixteen years or over, must attend one of the registration booths located in his or her district, and there observe the procedure explained below.

Where to Register. Every person required to register has the privilege of registering at any of the public places provided for that purpose. The location of all such places will be specified in proclamations posted conspicuously.

How to Register. The procedure of registration is simple. The questions upon the registration card can be answered very easily, but they must be answered truthfully and fully.

The card shown in the illustration is a facsimile of the registration card for females. An advertisement showing the card for males appears in another paper. Study the questions carefully so that you will be able to answer them promptly when registering. If you have any special qualification, or feel that your services would be more beneficial to the country in some other line of work, say so.

While all are compelled to register on Registration Day, it is not contemplated by the Government to force the sick, feeble and aged to turn out. If such persons will notify the Registrar prior to June 22nd of their inability to attend at a place of registration, an effort will be made to register them at home, provided the request is reasonable and justified.

Remember the Day—June 22nd—Remember the Hours—7 a.m. to 10 p.m. Register early and get your Certificate for your own protection.

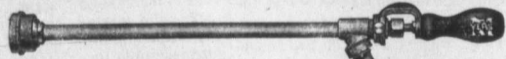

HON. H. H. WICKWIRE IS MINISTER OF HIGHWAYS

The new portfolio of Minister of Highways has come to Kings Co and Hon. H. H. Wickwire now fills that portfolio. His acceptance of office has created a vacancy in Kings and on Saturday last a most enthusiastic convention of the Liberal party was held in Kentville and he was again nominated for the vacancy. Nomination day is June 26th with election, if a poll is demanded, on July 3rd.

There is no probability of a contest in Kings Co. The Liberal Conservatives of Kings Co. and the Province also as a party are against holding elections in war times. They favored an equal distribution of the seats last federal election without contests but the Liberals forced elections in about all counties even after Union Government was organized. The party holds the same views today, that our energies and resources should be used towards winning the war and even if the Murray government was so partisan and unpatriotic as to bring on the challenge for a contest now, the party still adheres to that idea. Conservatives in Kings Co. accept no responsibilities for the carrying on of the new road act. Time will reveal what are its merits and demerits. Already from all parts of the county and province are coming forth condemnations of the bitter partizanship exhibited in the preliminary working of the act. Mr Wickwire as Minister of Highways will have a full opportunity to check this and have the act carried out with fairness to all.

At the adjourned public meeting on Monday the citizens voted to purchase the complete plant, franchise, real and personal property of the Kentville Electric Light Co. at the price of \$33,750.00. HERE IS THE DAY YOU REGISTER,

ON June 22nd, Saturday, every man and woman, resident in Canada, who is 16 years and over, must attend at one of the places provided for registration, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 10 p.m., and there truthfully answer all the questions set forth upon the registration card. Upon signing the card, vouching for the accuracy of the answers, the man or woman will receive a Registration Certificate, as shown below, which must be carried upon the person thereafter.

Why the Certificate is so Important

For failure to register a maximum fine of \$100 and one month's imprisonment is provided, also an added penalty of \$10 for each day the person remains unregistered after June 22nd.

Persons remaining unregistered cannot lawfully be employed, and cannot draw wages for work done after June 22nd. Employers who keep unregistered persons in their employ will be liable for fines equal in amount to those recoverable from the unregistered employees.

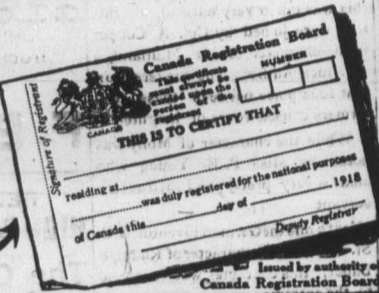
Unregistered persons cannot lawfully purchase transportation tickets, and may find themselves

barred from travelling on railroads, steamboats, etc. Similarly they may be denied board and lodging at any hotel, restaurant, public house or boarding house.

In a word—All persons remaining unregistered, and all persons having dealings with unregistered persons, knowing them to be such, incur heavy penalties under the law.

CANADIAN WATER POWERS

By H. P. TIMBERMAN, Industrial Commissioner, Canadian Pacific Railway.

The following estimate is given by the Dominion Water Power Branch of the water power available in each province, showing to what extent this already has been developed.

It will be seen from the above that of some eighteen million horse-power available, and which further exploration will enlarge, less than ten per cent has so far been developed. Nevertheless, with but few exceptions all our principal cities, and by far the greater number of our towns and villages are supplied with hydro-electric energy, and the surplus production permits of the exportation of considerable power from New Brunswick to the State of Maine, from Quebec to New York, from Ontario to New York and Minnesota, and from British Columbia to Washington. The bearing which this exportation of power has upon the imports of coal, especially into the provinces of Ontario and Quebec, the source of two-thirds of the available current, may be surmised. Since the war resulted in a scarcity of vessels for transportation of Nova Scotia coal up the St. Lawrence River to the industries of Montreal, there have been converted to the use of electrical energy in that vicinity no less than one hundred and fifty private steam plants, with a demand load of about as many thousand horse-power; while many others are considering a like transformation.

Having mentioned Montreal, it may further be said that with a population approximating three-quarters of a million that city and vicinity, according to one of the principal power companies, was supplied by it alone last year with slightly under a billion kw-hrs., the equivalent of the amount available to the city of New

York, with a population of five millions, and to have set all lit up on one-fifth or less, providing also for traction purposes, indicates that the manufacturing enterprises of that great city must have gone somewhat shy on power, excepting such as may have been produced from coals that would otherwise have been available for heating.

A similar comparison doubtless might be made between Toronto and Chicago, or any other Canadian and American city of relative position, a comparison sure to become more striking as time passes and the upward tendency in the cost of coal is contrasted with the lowering cost of hydro-power.

The relative cost of steam and hydro-power being subject in the case of coal to labor, transportation and other variable expense is at present rather difficult to estimate, but admittedly the advantage in economy is with the latter source of energy, while in many cases for the mere ease of distribution and control, the electric current is secondarily made use of, being first generated by steam produced from coal. Hydro-power being the one necessary commodity which paradoxically decreases in cost in inverse ratio to the demand for it, this clearly is to be the manufacturing force of the future, and as coal is not at all likely ever to revert to pre-war prices, many industries supplying the world's markets will take advantage of this fact by locating in Canada where also raw materials are plentiful, and whence the same are

now, to some extent impeded. In fact, some of the larger users of heat and power, such as the electro-chemical and metallurgical plants, already have divined the coming situation and are looking to the vicinity of potential sources capable of providing adequately for not only their present needs but for all possible future developments. In this they are not forestalled nor inconvenienced by the enormous expansion of the pulp and paper industry, which finds its requisite timberlands themselves to be the means of the conservation of immense supplies of water, affording adequate footage as well as such mechanical force as is necessary to their development as other favorable conditions arise.

The same current of water having turned the wheels of one industry, in many cases passes along to drive still another, and on its further course to the sea-bears the burden its own restless energy has helped to produce. No natural resource useful to the future or to any other purpose is sacrificed and no accretion of human toil destroyed. Canada is gifted by providence in almost every form of the basic elements of manufacture and the natural powers by which these may be developed, having at the same time the lands suited to diversified agriculture, by which a greatly increased industrial population may be sustained. Her products already are in demand wherever known around the world, and geographically she is on the trade routes of the world.

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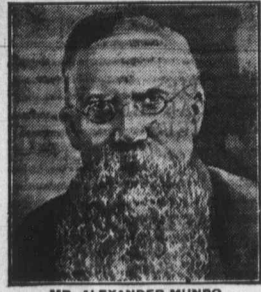

METEOROLOGICAL RECORD AT KENTVILLE FOR MAY 1918

The temperature during the month of May has been higher than usual. The mean temperature was 53.975 degrees as compared with 46.2, 49.07, 50.72, 46.14 and 43.63 during the same month in 1913, 1914, 1915, 1916 and 1917 respectively.

The precipitation was very light, aggregating only 1.21 inches, of which .50 inches fell on the 1st, .16 on the 23rd and .36 on the 28th, as compared with the same month in 1914, 1915, 1916 and 1917 when the precipitation was 3.17, 1.78, 1.46 2.5 and 2.92 inches respectively.

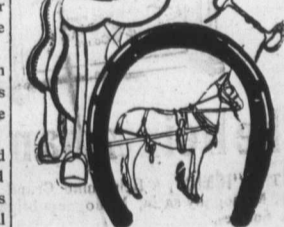
The amount of bright sun was greater than usual amounting to 224.6 hours, as compared with the sunshine record for 1913, 1914, 1915, 1916 and 1917, which was 178.2, 186.8, 189.6, 160.9 and 101.72.

From the above it will be seen that May has been a warm, bright, dry month, which has greatly favoured the putting in of crops, and as a result much more land has been plowed and put into crop than had been intended. The month has been too dry for grass and prospects for even a fair hay crop are not good unless there are abundant rains early in June.

There was one frost on May 5th of 6 degrees and another of one degree on the 27th, these being the only two during the month. It is reported that damage was done by the frost on the 27th to apple blossoms which were out, but it is thought that the injury was not great. The blossoming period started on the 18th of May, whereas in 1917 it started on the 7th June, three weeks later. The period of bloom has been prolonged and trees were still in bloom at the end of the month. The weather on the whole has been satisfactory for a good distribution of pollen and a good set of fruit should result. The amount of bloom is about one half a normal one.

Some 90 acres of turnips planted for seed purposes have made a fair start, particularly those planted early. The later planted ones were dried out some owing to the unusually warm weather, and this also forces growth in the pits or in storage. The dry weather with unusually drying winds, also has hindered the growth and checked development. The stand as a result been cut down about 25 p. c.

Clovers killed badly during the past winter and the plants on the alfalfa plots were almost entirely winter killed.

OUR LADY FARMERS.

Of the many enterprising farmers of Canada, we think the Sisters Eleanor and Margaret MacDonnell are away in the lead. They with their mother are running their 90 acre farm with only a young boy helping through the Summer months. Eleanor devotes her attention chiefly to the cattle. The herd, while small is always in good condition and the cows much above the average in milk production. The milk of each cow is weighed and records left, so the "boarders" are soon detected and disposed of. Not being satisfied with the production of the grade cows, they began investigating the records of pure breeds. After considerable correspondence with various breeders, they purchased a fine pure-bred Holstein heifer "Homestead Hazel Vale," from Logan Bros, Amherst. She is sired by "Hugewild Mingo" whose dam has an A. R. O. record of 18.5 lbs. butter in seven days as a two yr old. Next dam, a 30 lb cow. On her dam side she is equally well bred, being a granddaughter of Sadie Vale Concordia's Grand Son, of the voted Sadie Vale family. The records of her six nearest tested dams average over 26 lbs in seven days.

On Jan 14th she dropped a beautiful bull calf by "Sir Natoye Gladi" whose dam has a record of 30.50 lbs. Also an eight months after calving record of over 20 lbs. Eleanor has had a very attractive offer for the calf from parties in Hants Co., but we understand has refused to sell.

Several months after calving "Hazel" is giving 30 lbs. of 4 per cent milk daily. This is really good work as grain has been very hard to get. We prophesy before many years there will be many of the "Black and White" in Canada.
